Texas Allowable Is Cut for Fifth Straight Month

Austin. — The Railroad Commission slashed Texas oil allowables another 65,854 barrels daily for December in a proration order issued Monday.

The December figure of 2,756,906 barrels daily is 407,996 below the high mark last summer. Commissioner Olin Culberson said that new wells likely will add 17,000 barrels production daily to the Texas flow for the month.

The five-month decline, coming at a season when Texas oil demand usually rises, also is posing a problem in state finances. The state collects about 13c a barrel taxes on oil production. The recent cuts have trimmed the expected annual income by nearly \$20,000,000.

The December order calls for seventeen days operation by fields generally, including East Texas.

An unseasonably warm fall in the north and east added to this problem, as it kept down the usual heavy demand for heating oil. Culberson also blamed some producing states and importers for failing to go along with Texas in

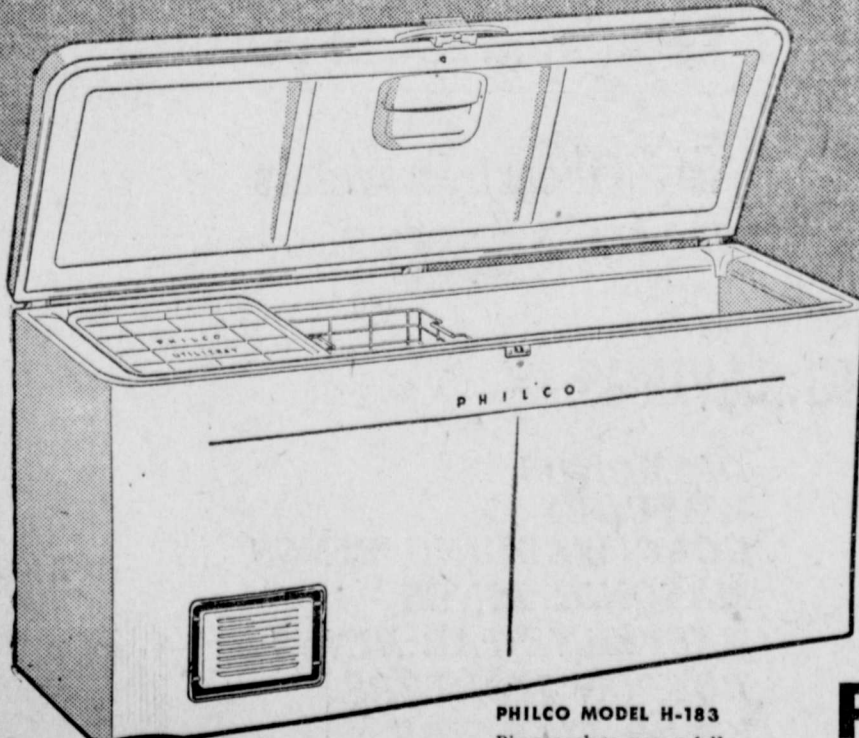

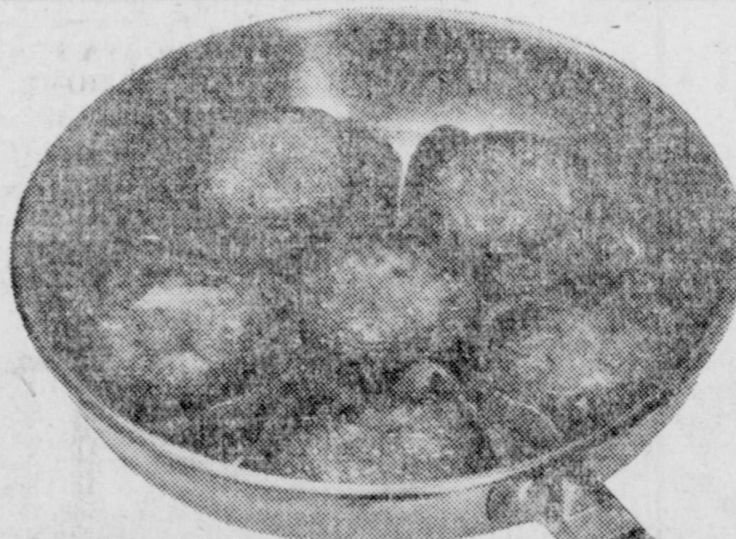

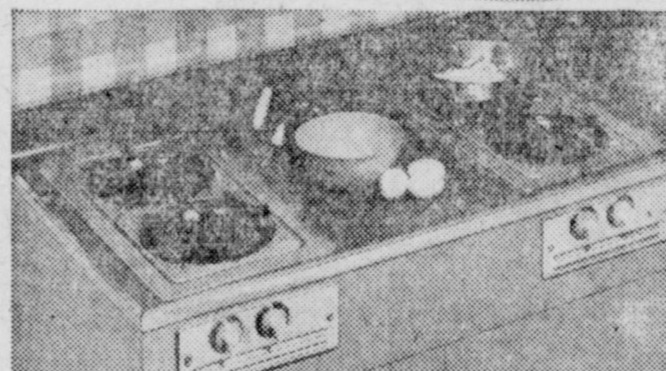
