

SHIVERS CALLS YARBOROUGH HANDPICKED CIO CANDIDATE

Lufkin.—Gov. Allan Shivers opened his campaign for re-election in his birthplace Monday night with a charge out-of-state labor bosses are demanding his defeat.

Shivers spoke to a large crowd in fighting language to officially launch his bid for a third term. 3,500 people crowded the streets adjoining the square to hear the Governor.

A dozen times the spectators broke into cheers to interrupt Shivers' speaking.

Shivers lashed out against Ralph W. Yarborough, Austin attorney who is his main opponent, as a hand-picked candidate of the CIO Political Action Committee.

He did not mention Yarborough's name in his 25-minute speech, but he made clear his identity by referring to the candidate whom he defeated two years ago.

"There is one basic issue in this Governor's race," said Shivers, "whether the CIO-PAC, ADA, NAACP and Parr combine is going to select the next Governor of Texas, or whether you are."

He referred to the left-wing Americans for Democratic Action, the National Association for Advancement of Colored People and George Parr, the Duval County political duke against whose boss rule Shivers has been waging war with the aid of Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd.

Shivers charged that "The message has come down to Texas from Walter Reuther's office in Washington, over the CIO-PAC party line, that Allan Shivers can not be Governor of Texas." "I am in their way," he said. "They want to substitute a man

in the Governor's office who will do their bidding.

"They have their candidate in this race, and they are backing him to the hilt—with poisonous propaganda, with paid workers who go from door to door, and with more outside money than has ever before been spent in a political race in Texas."

Shivers said he would fight to the "last ditch and last breath" against "these ruthless, dictatorial overlords of labor who want to sit in their plush offices in New York or Chicago and punch buttons controlling the Governor's office in Austin, Texas."

He emphasized he was talking not about the rank and file membership of Texas labor unions, whom he praised as good, decent and patriotic citizens. Shivers said his opposition believes "in a strong central government and a dominating central political party, in which the state government and the state party are mere puppets."

The tidelands issue best exemplified the philosophy of the centralists, he said.

Two years ago, Texas elected him Governor in an endorsement for an all-out, last-ditch return to Texas of the tidelands, he said.

"And, brother, we got them," he boasted.

Shivers predicted a bitter race, saying, "the opposing candidate has never run any other kind."

Shivers also blasted the United States Supreme Court's recent ruling banning segregation in public schools.

"As far as I am concerned," he said, "we are going to keep running the public schools of Texas as they are today."

All Texas Under Pink Bollworm Quarantine

Washington.—The entire state of Texas went under pink bollworm quarantine Tuesday when fifteen Panhandle counties were brought under federal regulations, the Agriculture Department reported.

The counties involved are Armstrong, Carson, Dallam, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Potter, Randall, Roberts and Sherman.

The department pointed out that these counties have virtually surrounded by quarantined areas since April 1 when all of Oklahoma was put under regulations. "This isolation caused difficulties in administering the quarantine," agriculture spokesmen explained. "Since cotton production is negligible in these counties, Texas officials have agreed to their inclusion under the quarantine to ease the situation."

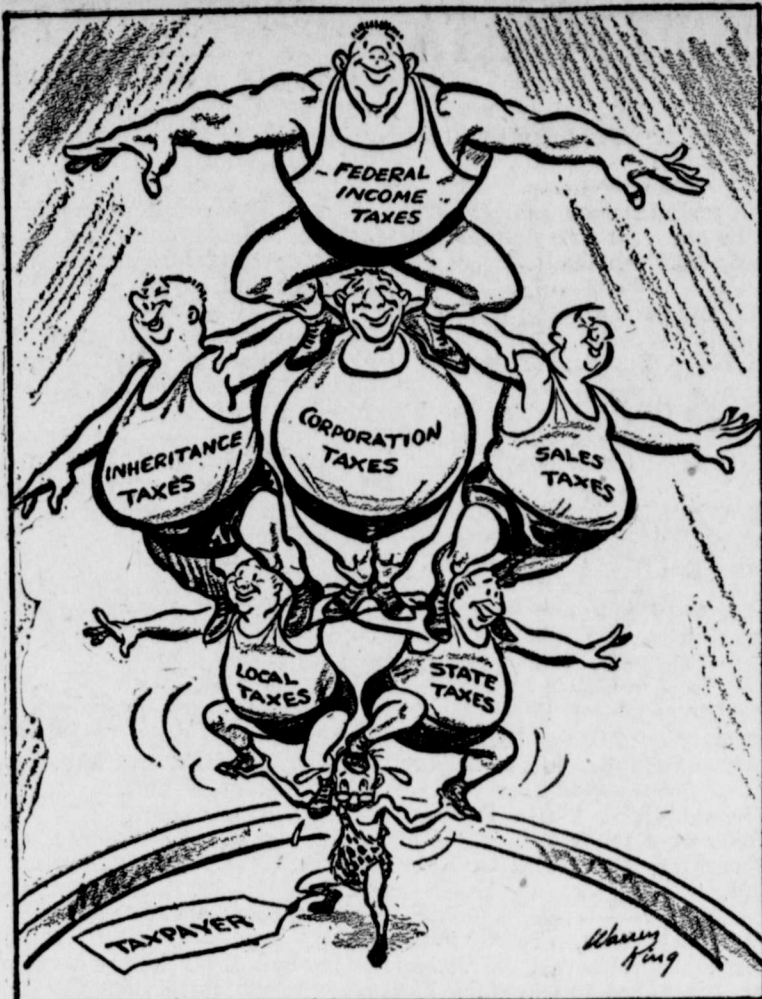
IMPOSSIBLE

Dangers Lurk In Leftovers, Thrifty Wives Warned

Washington.—The U. S. Army has a hot weather cooking tip for housewives: The best thing you can do with the bowl of leftover salad is—throw it away!

This goes also for chicken, tuna or other summer salads made with mayonnaise or salad dressings, for custards, cream-filled pies, deviled eggs, cream sauces or "made" dishes such as seafood casseroles.

A waste of good food to scrape these leftovers in the garbage? Not at all, answer the preventative medicine experts at the Office of the Army Surgeon General. What you'll be throwing away will be a lot of bacterial growth. The gesture can save your family many a tummy-ache.

Dishes based on egg, milk, mayonnaise or salad dressing can carry the insidious menace of staphylococci—the bacteria which causes the most common type of food poisoning. Unless the housewife is using laboratory-sterile cooking equipment and scrubbing her hands as a surgeon would before an operation, the spoon that dips the mayonnaise and the thumb that splits the eggshell may be loaded with staphylococci.

You will not die when the poisons produced by the staphylococci goes to work on your digestive system, but you may wish you had before the infection has run its course. And all because you couldn't resist the slice of yesterday's banana cream pie on the pantry shelf. For this reason, Army cooks figure very close to consumption needs when they build a menu around any of the egg-milk-mayonnaise family of foods. Housewives are advised to do the same. The Army advises also that ingredients for such dishes be kept cold and mixed as near serving time as possible—no longer than three hours in advance of serving.

And if you have an infected cut or any other infection on your hands, the Army has a kitchen rule that is applicable. Let somebody else do the cooking.

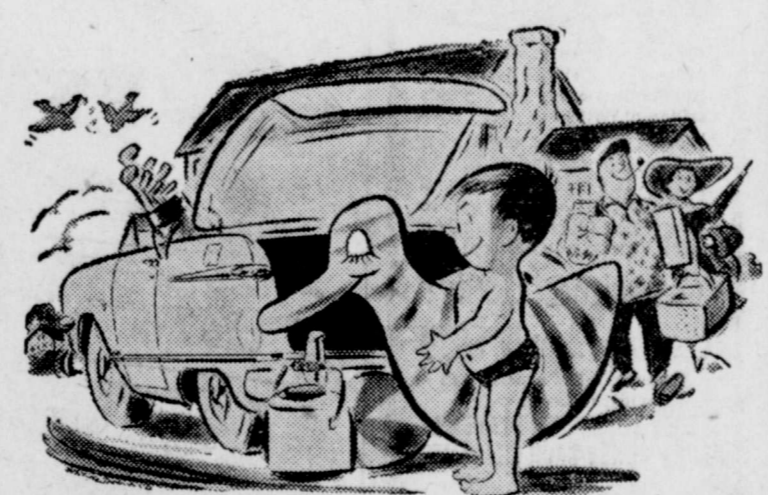
