## TROJANS JOURNEY TO QUITMAN FRIDAY FOR SEASON'S OPENER

The Talco Trojans, young but spirited, launch the 1956 football season Friday night when they journey to Quitman to do battle with a veteran crew of Bulldogs from Quitman. The Bulldogs, favorites in their district, reportedly are fast, have a good passing attack, and possess a good defense.

Head Coach A. C. Cannaday and Line Coach Dan Willis, who did excellent jobs in piloting the Trojans to a district championship in their first season here, will have their work cut out for them for the Trojans will start the game with an entirely new backfield and only three regulars in the line.

Quarterbacking this aggregation will be Jerry "Bo" Daugherty, a senior who knows his way around in the backfield and who looks like a real passing threat.

At left half is the power man of the backfield, Junior Jerry Russell, a top notch blocker and a rugged runner.

At fullback there is Sophomore Johnny Hood, a real speedster, who is a breakaway threat every time he gets the ball.

Then, at right half is Senior

Allen Elkins, a man who saw a lot of service last year and who will be a consistent ground gainer all year long.

Backing up this quartet will be Sophomores Jackie Martin, Joe Clark, Cecil Loftin, and Gerald Morris.

Spearheading what appears to be an excellent line will be two All-District performers of 1955, Tackle Richard Rothwell and End Ney Blackburn. Battling for the other end position will be Grady Hawthorne, Leon Rodgers and Mickey Via.

As for the tackles, Ney Blackburn will also see time there, along with Charles Graf, a 210 pounder who has really stood out in practice.

At guards will be two of the scrappiest pair to come along in several seasons, Donnie Eberts, a 140 pounder, and Wayne Blackburn at 150. Also battling for a guard position is Sophomore Donald Ray Gipson.

At center is last year's stand-out performer, Jerry Simmons; and backing up these starters will be a fine group of freshmen, sophomores and juniors, who will see a lot of action. The complete squad:

Vesta David Trumble, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Vesta Trumble of Marietta, died shortly after he was taken to a hospital at Naples.

Seriously injured were: Jimmy McCoy, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo McCoy of Bryan's Mill, had a severe neck injury.

Billy Gene McCoy, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene McCoy of Marietta, has head and facial lacerations and broken ribs.

Gainer McCord, 14, driver of the car has a broken left leg, broken ribs and internal injuries.

Mike Dale, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene McCoy of Marietta, has multiple cuts and bruises and suffering from shock.

The youngsters were on their way from Marietta to Naples for football practice when the accident occurred.

Cass County Deputy Sheriff Jim Crow said the accident happened on Highway 77 about 10 miles east of Naples.

He said the accident occurred when the right rear tire blew out, causing young McCord to lose control of the vehicle. He said the automobile crossed the highway, leaving the left side and traveling 142 feet before coming to a stop. It turned over several times and landed on its top.

## Strike Thursday Seen By Head of Lone Star Steel

E. B. Germany, president of Lone Star Steel Company said Tuesday that he expects the United Steelworkers Union to strike Lone Star's big Morris County plant at midnight Thursday.

A strike would affect 4,000 workers, Germany said that such "non-economic issues" as the termination date of the contract, combining jobs, contracting work out and the layoff pool are holding up agreement between the union and company.

He said that negotiators have been trying to reach agreement for two weeks and that Lone Star offered the union all of the "money" features in the basic contracts which recently ended the Big Steel strike.

Lone Star's last strike lasted four days, three years ago. Germany said two weeks' production were lost before operations could be restored to normal.

## Yarborough Gives Up Nominee Claim for Gov.

Ralph Yarborough announced Tuesday that he would not file a claim in the closely contested race for governor. He said he would accept what the State Democratic Executive Committee finds when it meets next Monday.

His statement heightened speculation that he might enter the race to succeed Daniel in the United States Senate.

Daniel will resign from the two years remaining of his term sometime after his nomination for Governor is made final at the Sept. 11 state convention in Fort Worth.

Yarborough thus far has remained silent on any ideas he might have for making the Senate race, which will be a special election. Some of his backers are trying to draft him.

Announced candidates for the Senate so far are Republican Thad T. Hutcheson of Houston, an Eisenhower-Democrat, State Senator; Searcy Bracewell of Houston and liberal-loyalist Jas. P. Hart of Austin. Congressman-at-Large Martin Dies of Lufkin also has said he would run.

The wounded man was injured when a gun in the hands of Teddy Smelser, young son of Mr. and Mrs. Guy Smelser, owners and managers of the telephone exchange, was accidentally discharged. The accident victim was carried to the hospital by Bogata Funeral Home ambulance.

Brindley, who with his wife and daughter, resides in a trailer home parked on the lawn at the Johnnie Gill home in Bogata, was doing well at last report.

## Funds Allocated For 1956 Lateral Road Obligations

Allocation of State funds to counties from the one-cent gasoline tax has been announced for 1956. This year \$7,300,000 will be disbursed.

Counties first apply this money to retirement of debts assumed by the Board of County Road Bond Indebtedness. Where no debts exist the entire amount may be used in connection with new road projects.

Most counties in Texas have obligations which were assumed when this plan of aid was established.

The lateral road fund distribution to be made in Northeast Texas counties has been announced as follows, the first column of figures representing the amount of the allocation to be applied to local debts, the second column showing the money available for new construction:

## Drivers Reminded Of Stops Required For School Buses

Austin.—With schools opening for the fall term, motorists are reminded that they must stop whenever they meet a school bus which is picking up or delivering passengers.

This applies to all vehicles meeting or passing a bus. The law applies only in rural areas. On divided highways, where the passing vehicle is on a different roadway, no stop is required.

Dr. J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education, noted that many drivers do not understand the requirement for stopping every vehicle when it meets a school bus.

The buses are plainly lettered and equipped with flasher warning lights for use when students are being picked up or let off.

School buses were involved in 279 accidents in Texas last year. Three children and two adults were killed in such accidents.

## Wind Damage and Some Rainfall in Thursday's Blow

A violent thunderstorm that brought gusts of wind estimated at 60 miles an hour and nearly half an inch of rain, did considerable damage in this area Thursday evening of last week.

Many TV antennas were toppled, some roofs damaged and small out-buildings overturned.

Rain at Deport amounted to .41 inches, according to A. C. Nixon, government gauger.

Rivercrest reported .11 inches of rain till midnight Thursday, from stormclouds that covered this area Thursday afternoon and night. Bogata got .2 inches of rain Thursday night.

The storm came from the southwest, with tornadoes in Dallas and Collin counties, along with high winds, rain and hail.

Considerable open cotton was damaged in the fields, although the bulk of the open cotton had been picked.

**Your Chamber of Commerce—Best Bet**

"The harvest truly is plenteous, but the labourers are few."

It is a sad commentary on the business community when  
 we can point to the fact that the average union member pays  
 more in union dues than the average businessman pays as a  
 member of his chamber of commerce. For this fact, we cannot  
 blame anyone but ourselves.

The Chamber of Commerce is the only organization that is  
 set up to represent each and every segment of the American  
 economy. It is the only organization that represents the service  
 station operator and the physician, the industrialist and the  
 retailer, the investment banker and the construction contractor.  
 And while most of these have their own associations, expected  
 to represent their best interests, the Chamber of Commerce re-  
 presents them all.

The rich man who says he does not belong to his Chamber  
 of Commerce because he is not engaged in retail trade has not  
 seen the picture as it is. He has not given credit where credit  
 is due for all the civic and social improvements which he and  
 his family enjoy. He has not experienced the inward joy that  
 comes from making unselfish contribution to the place he calls  
 "home." He lives in the community but he is not "of" it.

And the man who looks upon his investment in his Cham-  
 ber of Commerce as a "donation" is confusing fact with fiction.  
 The man who gives of his time and his money in the further-  
 ance of the best interests of his community is seldom heard to  
 mention the word "donation" in relation to what he has done.  
 He is usually the man who will express remorse that he could  
 not have done more.

The tragedy of this life, to many men, is the realization of  
 the shortage of time; to others, the realization that they have  
 given so little — a realization coming too late for them to  
 make amends.

It has been said that "no man has a right to graze in the  
 pastures of his community who does not contribute something  
 to pasture improvement." And no man has a moral right to  
 benefit from the work of others while he, with equal facility,  
 might have done as much himself.

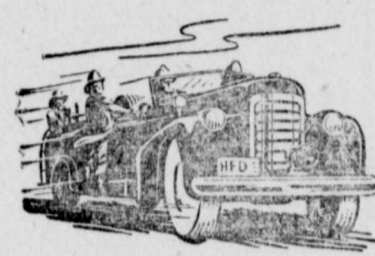

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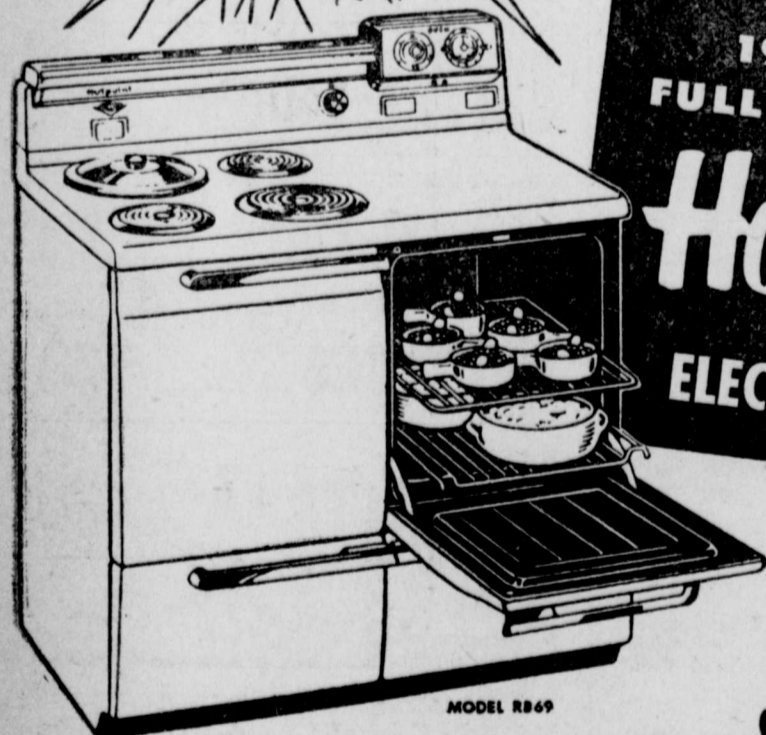
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
