## Talco Trojans Win Over Bogata 40-0

Fullback Johnny Hood and Left Halfback Jerry Russell teamed up Friday night to lead the Talco Trojans to a 40 to 0 romp over the Bogata Bulldogs. Hood scored two touchdowns in runs of 20 and 8 yards and Russell's scores were on a beautiful 73 yard scamper and an 18 yard run. The other scores were made by Tackle Charles Graf, who recovered a Trojan fumble in the Bogata end zone and reserve QB Jere Parrish on a keeper play around right end.

The first touchdown was by Graf, who pounced on a loose ball in the end zone after Russell was knocked loose from it on the Bogata two yard line. The touchdown play was set up on a 25 yard blast over left tackle by Russell, which carried to the 6 yard line. This all occurred in the first period.

In the second the Trojans scored three times to ice the game away. Russell ran 56 yards for an apparent touchdown, but a clipping penalty set the ball back to the 20 yard line of Bogata, where Johnny Hood took a pitch-out around right end for the score.

The next touchdown play came just as fast, as Russell again broke loose behind some sharp downfield blocking and scampered 73 yards for the score.

Then, after Hood intercepted a Bulldog pass on his own 47, the Trojans drove over the fourth score in six plays with Hood carrying it over from 8 yards out.

The second half opened the same way with the first team receiving the kickoff and traveling 58 yards for the score. Russell concluded the drive when he carried over from the 18 on a dive play over left tackle.

After that the game was handed over to the reserves. The second team operating with Parrish, Reggie Thompson, Joe Clark and Cecil Loftin in the backfield, carried the ball 57 yards on short line thrusts for another score. They mixed their plays well and showed lightning speed in hitting the line. The touchdown play was one which saw Parrish miss a handoff, hide the ball on his hip and run around right end for the score. After that the teams battled on even terms.

Outstanding on defense for the Trojans were Tackle Richard Rothwell, End Ney Blackburn, Guard Wayne Blackburn, Half Backs Cecil Loftin and Johnny Hood. For Bogata the standouts were Tackles Stanley Williams and Arlin Mauldin and Full Back Neil Rozell.

This week the Trojans meet the powerful Linden Tigers, winners over Paul Pewitt 52 to 0 last week. They are the favorites to take the district championship

A former resident of Talco, Dallas D. Fry, 67, died in a Veterans Hospital at Shreveport, La., on Wednesday morning. At the time of his death he was deputy sheriff and made his home in Jefferson.

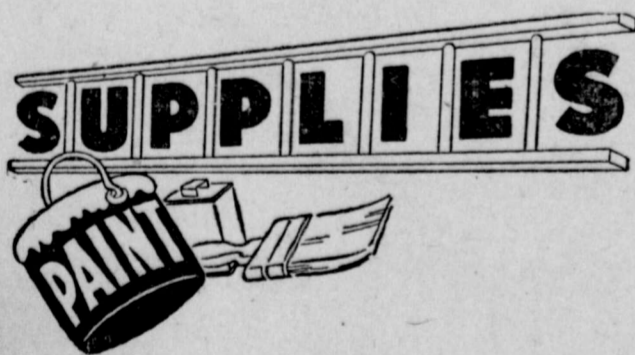

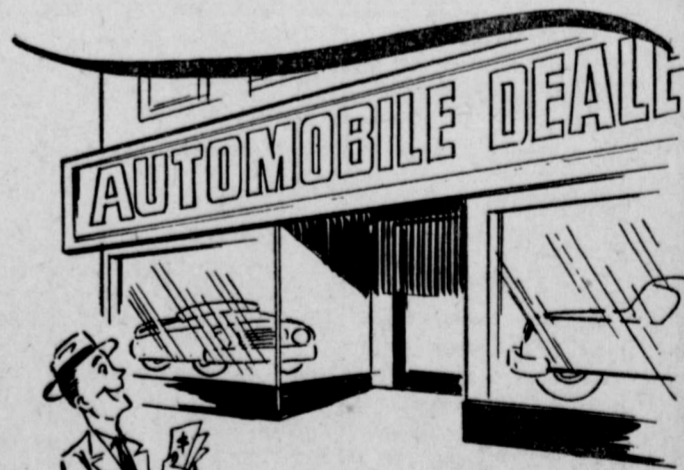

Tex Says He's No Expert But He Believes Ike Is

The other night a bunch of us were sitting around in the drug store after the football game, drinking coffee and talking. You know how it is after a game in a small town, especially after the home team loses. Nearly every man in the crowd had a theory as to why we didn't win the game. Most of them, of course, blamed the coach. I couldn't help remembering that before we consolidated the county schools we didn't even have enough boys to make up a football team. And these same football experts who were saying what Rockne or Bud Wilkinson would have done, up until a few years ago they didn't know a football from a watermelon.

But that's the way it is in a small town (and in big ones, too, I understand). I guess there's no real harm done, although sometimes it's pretty rough on the coach.

I guess we have a right, in this free country, to be self-appointed experts in any line we want to pick out. It seems to me that most people choose either football or politics.

Take this presidential election coming up next Tuesday: During the last few weeks I have heard so many different political experts that I nearly got confused sometimes. I have to stop and think that the fellow who is talking probably doesn't know any more about it than I do, and that helps me keep straightened out.

In fact, I guess I have had my mind made up all along. To make no bones about it, I like Ike. He's a man you can always look up to and respect—the kind of

man you'd be proud to point out to any person, from any country on the face of the globe, and say: "That's our President!"

About Adlai, now, I'm not so sure. Of course, if he was elected, he would be my President, too, and I would hope he'd do a lot better than most people around here seem to think he would. This is something I don't think we need to worry about, because from all I can hear and read, Ike is going to win it again.

It seems to me that if Adlai ever had a chance around here, he threw it away when he came out with that H-bomb business. Now, the folks in our town don't know much about H-bombs, except that they don't want any personal dealings with them.
