DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER Re-Elected in landslide

President Eisenhower won a tremendous second-term victory over Adlai E. Stevenson in Tuesday's election but in the battle for control of Congress Democrats held a narrow edge.

Eisenhower submerged Stevenson under a flood of votes which swept over every section of the nation. He appeared certain to win 41 states, as against the 39 he aptured in defeating Stevenson Titus County voters.




