LANDSLIDE FOR EISENHOWER; TEXAS VOTE GREATER THAN '52



DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER
Re-Elected in landslide

President Eisenhower won a tremendous second-term victory over Adlai E. Stevenson in Tuesday's election but in the battle for control of Congress Democrats held a narrow edge.

Eisenhower submerged Stevenson under a flood of votes which swept over every section of the nation. He appeared certain to win 41 states, as against the 39 he captured in defeating Stevenson four years ago.

That would mean 457 electoral votes to 74 for Stevenson. Four years ago it was 442-89.

Stevenson carried only seven states in the Deep South, and Missouri.

Stevenson carried Titus County with 2335 votes to Eisenhower's 1971. This is a majority of 414 votes. Four years ago his majority over Ike was about 1000.

All the constitutional amendments were given approval by Titus County voters.

Stevenson carried Red River County with 2565 votes to Eisenhower's 1930. All constitutional amendments were approved.

HEAVY RAINS FALL IN THIS AREA TO RELIEVE LONG DROUGHT

Slow falling rains which began Friday, brought some relief to this drought stricken area. Government rain gauge at Deport showed a total of 6.83 inches, according to A. C. Nixon, for the three day period. Friday, .59 of an inch was recorded; 5.62 inches Saturday and .62 on Sunday.

The soaking rain put water in stock ponds and replenished supplies in rural areas for home consumption. There was some runoff, but the majority of the moisture soaked into the dry soil.

The three day rainfall produced more moisture than this section received during the last five months combined. The June thru October total was 4.46 inches. The rain proves a life saver to

winter pastures which were hopelessly planted in bone dry soil during the last two months. Earlier showers pushed the plants above the ground giving fields their first green look since last spring. The rainfall will stimulate enough growth to produce limited grazing on some pastures.

With many permanent pastures damaged by over grazing and hot dry weather that has killed scattered stands of grass, a large number of farmers are depending on winter cover crops for grazing. Although delayed a month, some farmers predicted rain will bring along rapid growth.

Week end rains brought 8 inches of moisture to Bogata. River Crest reported 8.76 inches.
