## City Authorities Discuss Rates Telephone Co.

Talco City Commission met with a representative of Southwestern States Telephone Co., which is asking for higher rates for telephone service in Talco and for a 25-year franchise.

The mayor and commissioners asked for more detailed statements than have been submitted with reference to expense of operating the Talco plant. It also pointed out that the two per cent gross utilities tax provided by state law was not being collected, telephone service at the city hall being provided in lieu of such tax, and to the low rendering of \$20,000 for city tax purposes.

Telephone rates in neighboring towns are being secured to use as a comparison of the new rates being asked by the telephone company.

"We hope to work out something that will be satisfactory to our citizens, to the City and to the telephone company," Mayor Jerry Jones told The Talco Times.

## Johnson Case Federal Court

The Paris Division of Federal Court came to an abrupt close Tuesday as the parties involved in the last civil case agreed on an out-of-court settlement.

Dorothy Johnson, who was suing Melton Truck Lines for \$168,000 damages in the death of her husband, settled for a reported \$23,500.

Mrs. Johnson and her children were seeking \$168,000 in damages in connection with the death of her husband, Haskell Johnson, in a car-truck wreck on Highway 271 east of Paris in May of 1957. The Johnson home is at Bogata.

Johnson's vehicle allegedly collided with a truck operated by Melton Truck Lines of Nashville, Ark. Johnson died a day later of injuries suffered in the accident.

## Oil Allowable Cut March Production

Austin.—The Railroad Commission has slashed the daily oil allowable for March by 513,814 barrels daily, fixing the statewide permissive flow at 2,517,246 barrels.

The flow was based on only nine days of production, the smallest number of producing days in the state's history of oil regulation.

Independents and most oil purchasing companies asked for the big cut to reduce excessive stocks estimated now to be 112,000,000 barrels above the April 1 desired level.

The nine-day production pattern compares to the March, 1957, of 18 days, which the commission set under pressure to produce Texas oil output during the Suez Canal crisis.

## Changes Made in School Trustee Election Laws

Several important changes in Texas school laws concerning trustee elections were made during the last regular session of the Texas Legislature.

Most notable among the changes is the new deadline for filing for trustee of a school district. All candidates for county school trustee or trustee for any school district desiring to have their names printed on the ballot must now make written application for a place on the ballot not less than 30 days prior to the day of the election. Since trustee elections are set by law for the first Saturday in April, being April 5, candidates for trustee must apply for a place on the ballot not later than March 5. Formerly the deadline for filing was 10 days prior to the election.

The application of candidates for county school trustee in common School Districts or trustee in Independent School Districts having fewer than 500 scholastics should be filed with the county judge. An individual may make application to have his name placed on the ballot or he may be nominated upon petition of five or more resident qualified voters in the district.

## Support Prices Set Cotton Seed and Feed Grains

Washington.—The Agriculture Department Friday announced 1958 support prices for cotton seed and feed grains at approximately the same rate as in 1957. Grain sorghums, oats, barley and rye will be supported at 70 per cent of February parity prices. The national average of the supports were listed as:

Grain sorghums, \$1.83 per 100 pounds, grade No. 2 or better; oats, 61c per bushel for grade No. 3; barley, 93c per bushel for grade No. 2 or better; and rye, \$1.10 per bushel for No. 2 or better.

Cottonseed will be supported at around 65 per cent if the February parity price of \$68.60 per ton on average quality seed. Support loans will be limited to producers of farm-stored cotton seed, at an average of \$45 per ton, and to purchasers of cottonseed from producers and participating gins.

A low pressure system moved into Texas from the west, drawing moist air over the state. Scattered showers and thunder-showers, accompanied the cooler air edging in from the west.

A. C. Nixon, in charge of the government rain gauge, reports 31 of an inch was recorded at Deport up until 1 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. Temperatures were like spring, with the mercury ranging from the mid-40's to the low 70's since Saturday.

Texas Power & Light Company's Rivercrest plant reported .02 of an inch of rainfall.

Eighth grade Talco boys and girls won first place at the County meet at Winfield.

Talco eighth grade girls won first place in their division Saturday by defeating Winfield 28 to 25. Martha Lewis had 22 points for the game with 3 points each for Janice Rothwell and Connie Holloway. Guards Jimmie Sue Gandy, Jo Ann Mankins and Camilla Wright did a good job on the defense. The girls went into the finals by defeating Wilkinson Thursday and Chapel Hill Friday.

The eighth grade boys won their division by defeating Winfield 47 to 12, Wilkinson 36 to 23 and in the finals defeated Chapel Hill 28 to 12.

This was the second tournament for the boys to win this season. Last week they won their division in a tournament held at South Franklin by defeating Winnsboro, Pittsburg and Mt. Vernon. They end their season with 16 wins and 2 losses.

Talco won the right to the championship by winning four straight games over the best teams in the tournament. The Talco five defeated Pittsburg by a score of 28 to 24 in the first round. Then victories over Winnsboro 28-7 and Mt. Vernon 31-29 put them in the finals with South Franklin.

Mt. Vernon defeated Sulphur Springs 32-30 and Sulphur Bluff 31-30 before falling before the tournament champion Talco, 31-29.

South Franklin also played the full route, defeating Sulphur Springs 7th grade, 40-14; Quitman, 34-26, and Saltville, 31-22, to get a place in this final bout. In the final game Talco defeated South Franklin 38-23.

## Harrison Leads in Moonshine Stills

Harrison County continues to be the leader of the illegal moonshine business in Texas. Last year 22 stills were seized in Harrison County, 13 were taken in Titus County and 27 other stills were seized throughout the state. The 62 stills had a capacity of 4-120 gallons.

At the end of the year 142 counties were dry and 92 counties allowed sales of distilled spirits. Seventeen others allowed beer sales and three others allowed the sale of beverages containing 14 per cent alcohol.

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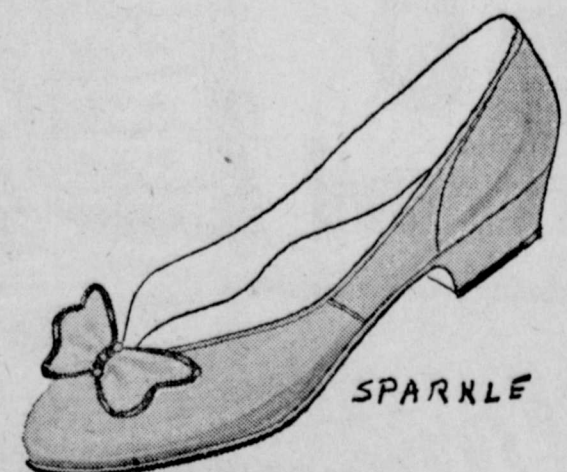
