PLAN REFINANCE OUTSTANDING WATER, SEWER REVENUE BONDS

Bond holders of Talco's outstanding water and sewer revenue bonds, issued in 1941 and amounting to \$195,000, have agreed to a refunding of those bonds at 75 cents on the dollar, according to Mayor Jerry Jones.

Only \$50,000 and some interest has been paid on those bonds since 1941. In 1942 there was \$10,000 paid, 43—\$4,000, 44—\$6,000. Nothing was paid in 45, 46, 47, 48 and 49. In 1950 \$2,000 was paid; nothing in 51, but in 52 \$5,000, 53—\$2,000; nothing in 54 and 55, but in 56—\$1,000. In 1957—\$15,000 and 58—\$5,000.

This new issue of refunding bonds amounting to \$108,750, which is 75 cents on the dollar for \$145,000 outstanding, will

carry an interest rate of 3½ per cent. First bond will be due on July 15, 1959 and the final bond July 15, 1975.

Said Mayor Jerry Jones: "It is going to cost \$800 a month to finance this program. On August 2, 1957, there was \$7,100 in the water and sewer department account. We paid out past due interest amounting to \$3,563, and there is outstanding past due interest amounting to \$2,300 which must be paid before the bonds are refunded."

Talco will save \$36,250 in this refunding operation and an ordinance will be published soon in The Talco Times more fully explaining the official action Talco City Commission will take regarding it.

Confiscate 52 Cases of Whiskey

An Oklahoma man was in Red River County jail Saturday night after Highway Patrolmen confiscated 52 cases of whiskey from his pickup truck.

Highway Patrolmen Max Womack and James Wray stopped the man in Bogata at 7:10 p. m. Saturday. The cases of whiskey—a wide assortment of bottle sizes and brands—was loaded in the bed of the pickup and in the seat alongside the driver.

Womack and Wray said they were acting "on information" and were hunting the 1957 model pickup truck when they stopped the Oklahoma man.

The man, identified as Lige Hammack who lives between Grant and Hugo, Ok., was fined \$1,000 and costs by Judge Gavin Watson.

The patrolmen, working in cooperation with Deputy Sheriff Loyd Matthews of Lamar County, had been watching for the man's 1957 model pickup.

Seek New Farm Road East to 37 From Cunningham

A new farm road from Cunningham in Lamar County east to State Highway 37 in Red River County has been requested by a delegation appearing before the Texas Highway Commission this week.

Making up the delegation which appeared before the Highway Commission in support of the road on Thursday in Austin were State Senator A. M. Aikin of Paris, Frank Branson and County Commissioner J. N. Lee of Bogata, James E. Jones, Edwin Cox and Clifford Pynes of Cunningham, County Commissioner Jas. Rheudasil of Lamar, and Jack Elder of Longview, owner of extensive land in the Sulphur River bottoms.

The proposed road would extend from FM 196 at Cunningham east to State Highway 37 near McCrury south of Bogata in Red River County. The road would cover 9.4 miles and would cost an estimated \$390,000.

The Highway Commission heard the delegation's testimony in the matter and took it under advisement.

Talco Uses Insect Destroying Fog

Talco put its insect fogging machine into use on Wednesday night of last week, and the town now has no flies and mosquitoes, according to Mayor Jerry Jones.

About 60 gallons of a new insecticide, mixed with diesel oil was used in the fogging operation.

"If anyone has standing water anywhere on his premises where mosquitoes will breed, he is asked to call the City Hall and report it to Secretary Mrs. O. D. Welch, and oil will be used to prevent propagation," the mayor said.

Titus Tax Rate Remains Same

Tax rates in Titus County will remain fixed for the coming 1958-59 fiscal year, Titus County Commissioners Court decided Tuesday.

Pleas for reduction of taxes were presented by oil and railroad interests. No action was taken, however.

Boost in Mail Rates on Aug. 1

President Eisenhower has signed into law the highest postal rate increases ever voted by Congress.

The bill, which he approved, also carries the biggest postal pay increase ever voted. Most postal workers will get approximately a 10 per cent raise, retroactive to last Jan. 1.

First class letters require a 4c stamp, instead of 3, effective Aug. 1. Airmail will go up from the present 6c and 7c, post cards from 2 to 3.

Raises of various size will apply to newspapers, magazines and advertising circulars.

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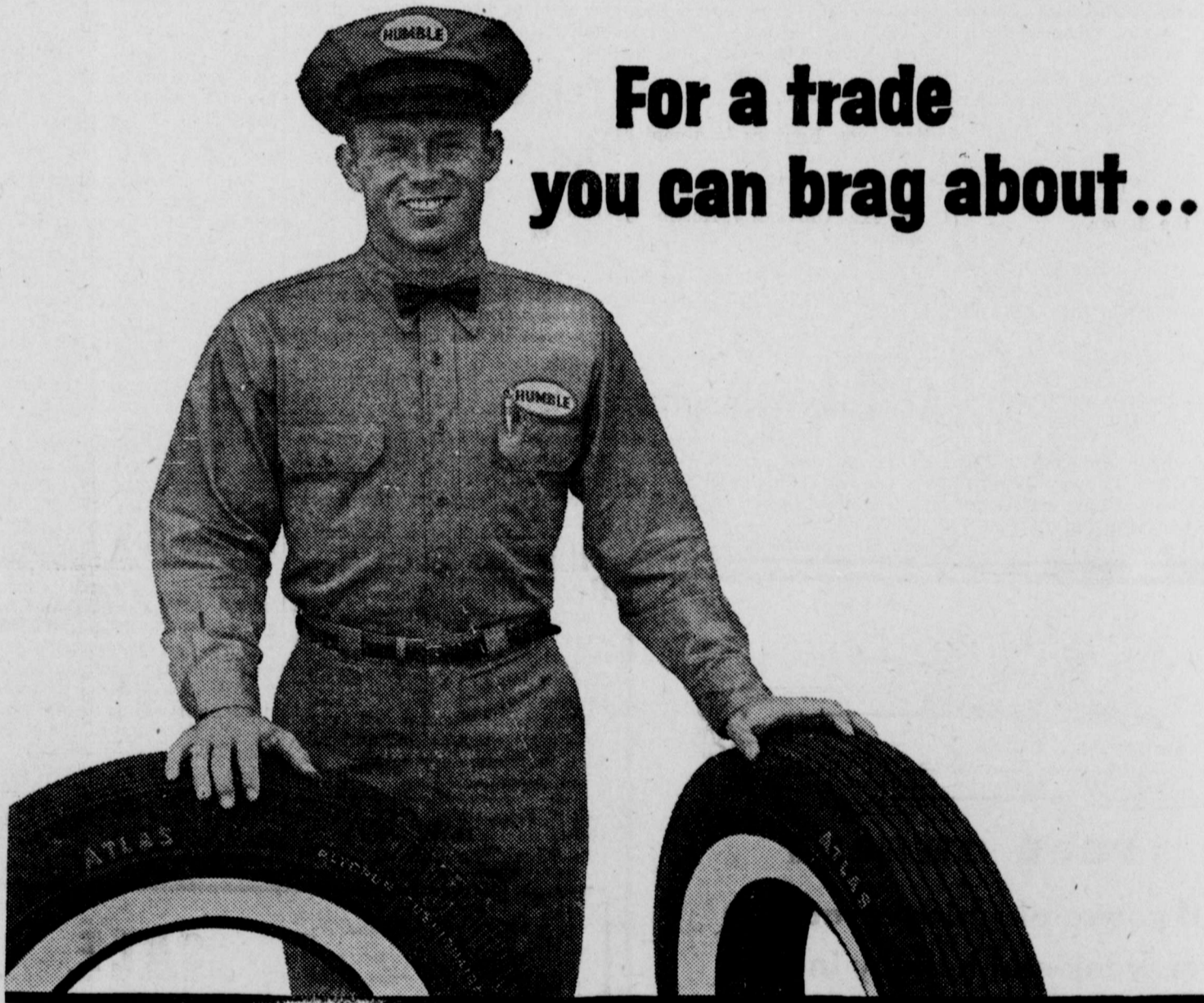

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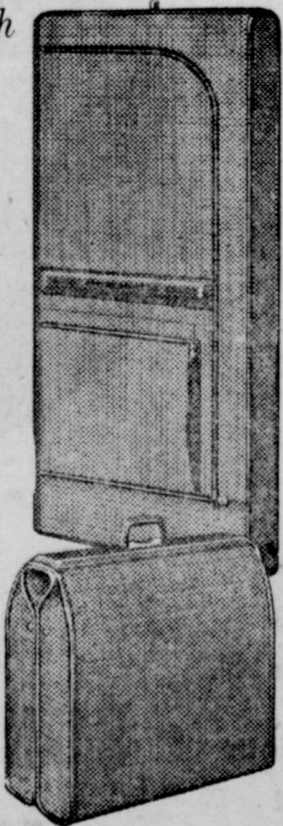
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PASTORAL APPOINTMENTS ARE ANNOUNCED BY METHODISTS

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WRIGHT PATMAN ANNOUNCES FOR RE-ELECTION CONGRESS



To the People of the First Congressional District of Texas:

On January 3, 1959, the Eighty-Sixth Congress of the United States will convene in Washington. Since you have permitted me to be your representative in this great Body during a long and important period of our national history, it is with a deep sense of gratitude that I ask you for the nomination of the Democratic Party, July 26, 1958, to be elected as your representative in the next Congress.

Since you have given me the privilege of serving you, I have at all times done my dead-level best to make a record to be proud of and one that you would be pleased with; and I sincerely trust that my record has met with your approval, and that I have your good will and support even though I do not have an opponent.

Our district is the very heart of the Great Gulf Southwest. We have an abundance of controlled, mineral-free water. We have two big lakes finished: Texarkana, serving Bowie and Cass Counties; and Ferrell's Bridge, serving Marion, Morris, Cass and Harrison Counties. We have one under construction at Cooper, serving Delta, Hopkins and Lamar Counties; and we have gotten Congressional and Executive recognition of five others, by appropriations of money for studies and investigations to determine their feasibility; to wit: Cypress Creek, south of Mt. Pleasant; White Oak Creek, north of Mt. Vernon; Sanders Creek (Pat Mayse Lake), north of Paris; Big Pine Creek, northeast of Paris and northwest of Clarksville; and Colliers Creek, north of Clarksville. The chances are excellent that we will get a good report on each of these.

Our fine Soil Conservation Districts have ready for budget and Congressional approval several projects under Public Law 566, which will provide our area with

many more lakes for soil and water conservation and other worthwhile purposes.

In addition, we have plans for water navigation to Jefferson, Marshall, Texarkana, Clarksville, Paris and Denison on the streams of Big Cypress, Caddo Lake and Red River. Caddo Lake is also in our planning for improvement, including a new dam near Mooringsport, Louisiana. Every dollar spent by a tourist travels to eight people and does eight dollars' worth of business before leaving the community. One Southern Governor has said that his State is getting out of the cotton business and catering to tourists, because his people had discovered that one tourist is worth two bales of cotton "and not near as hard to pick."

We have been fortunate in having a number of new and important plants locate in our section; many more are considering locations. With a series of beautiful, clear, blue lakes supplying abundant mineral-free water for irrigation, municipal, industrial, and recreational purposes; with the wonderful expanding steel industry based on a 100-year supply of iron ore; and with continued hard work, we can soon realize a balanced economy and become an area of attraction for the expanding population of the Nation.

We are on the threshold of a great economic development. We must not overlook any opportunity to make our district a finer and better place to live.

After all these years, I believe you know fully of my deep interest in agriculture, industry, small business, workers, the aged, war veterans and their dependents and in expanding opportunities for the young people—in fact, the welfare of all the people I have the honor of representing. I shall continue to work for their welfare.

I shall also continue to work to restore the proper division of authority among our three branches of Government, as provided by the Constitution, and to oppose the encroachment of any branch on the authority of another. I am disturbed not only by the encroachment of the Supreme Court on the authority of Congress, but also by new forms of encroachment from the Executive Branch, these being the Administration's policy of withhold-

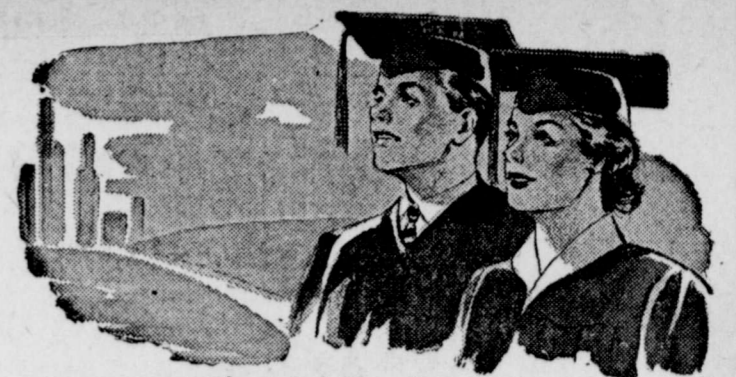

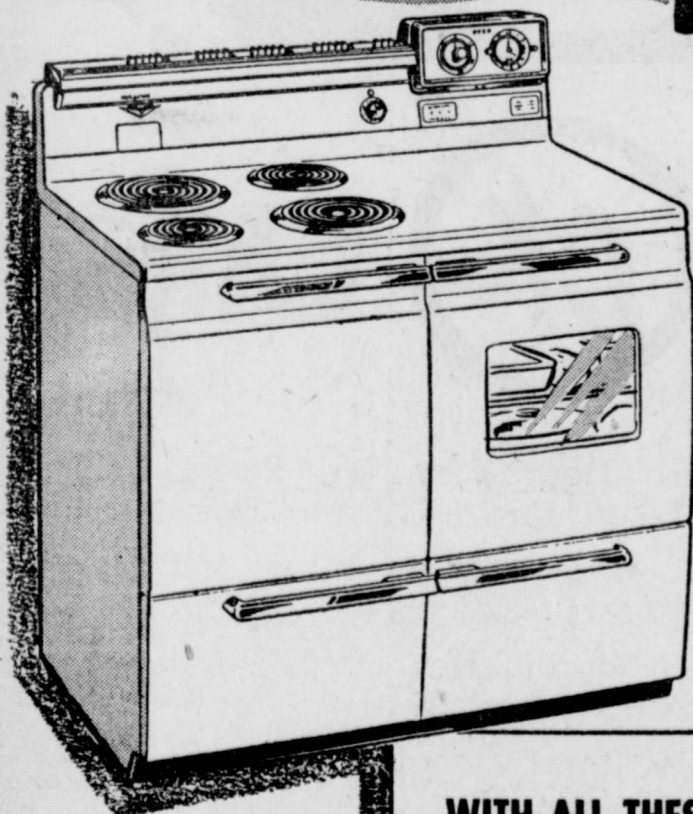
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
