FHA Makes Loans To Farm Families

Loans are made by the Farmers Home Administration to eligible farm owners to construct or repair farm houses and other farm buildings, to modernize adding bathrooms, utility rooms, and to provide water supply for dwellings and farm buildings.

These loans bear interest at the rate of 4 per cent on the unpaid principal and have a repayment period up to 33 years, depending upon the type of building and the individual's ability to repay the loan.

Due to the change in farming from cotton to livestock, farmers will need more farm buildings including barns and buildings for
