SAM C. HOLLOWAY, PUBLISHER OF THE DEPORT TIMES, TALCO TIMES, BOGATA NEWS, IS DEAD



Sam C. Holloway, 71, owner and publisher of The Deport Times, The Bogata News and The Talco Times, passed away suddenly Wednesday morning at 4 o'clock at his home following a heart attack. He was up and about his usual work Tuesday, leaving his office about 10 o'clock Tuesday night, although he spent part of last week in a Paris hospital for treatment of asthma.

Funeral service is set for Friday at 3 p. m. at the First Baptist Church in Deport with interment following in Evergreen Cemetery at Paris. Rev. George Griffin, Baptist pastor, and Rev. W. E. Grisham, Methodist pastor, officiating.

Surviving are his wife, the former Lucile Stevens, three sisters, Mrs. Frank D. Chisholm of Belmont, Calif., Mrs. Earl C. Shannon of Mountain View, Calif., and Mrs. John N. Watkins of Atlanta, Ga., and a daughter, Mrs. Jack A. Russell of Dallas.

Son of George and Mollie (Patrick) Holloway, Sam C. Holloway was born at Lancaster, near Dallas, Nov. 23, 1888. He was married to Lucile Stevens at Paris on Feb. 20, 1948.

A veteran newspaperman, Holloway began his career as a newsboy for the Dallas News and later the Times-Herald, and learned printing in Dallas commercial plants and the Dallas News, moving to the editorial department of The News in 1911. He left the News to buy the Deport Times from Claud Council in September 1912. He established The Talco Times in 1936, after the discovery of oil there, and

purchased The Bogata News in 1937.

During the 47 years he has lived in Deport, he has served as president of Deport Chamber of Commerce, twice past Master of Deport Masonic Lodge AF&AM; twice president of North and East Texas Press Association, in 1916 and again in 1928. He was president of the Texas Press Association in 1935.

Holloway was awarded the American Legion Distinguished Citizenship Certificate for Deport's most outstanding and useful citizen in 1929 by Warren Teague Post. He was a member of Deport, Bogata, Talco and Lamar County Chambers of Commerce and a member of Dallas Professional Chapter of Sigma Delta Chi. He was a member of Deport Baptist Church.

During his journalistic career he received numerous honors for his work. The Deport Times was awarded first place by the State Fair of Texas in 1933 and second place in 1934 as the best small town weekly. Other honors have been received from year to year and in 1958 he received a plaque from the North and East Texas Press Association, the first ever given by the organization, in recognition of his meritorious service to journalism.

His hobby was hunting and fishing and for this reason he left the city newspaper to become a country editor.

Sam Holloway will be greatly missed by his fellow workers and employees, friends and acquaintances and the area has lost a real newspaper man.

DO OUR READERS think the vote in the governor's race is a mandate from the people to State Senators and Legislators not to pass a 2c sales tax for money with which to raise teachers' salaries? Daniel is opposed to the sales tax and Cox advocated it. We have put the question to numerous voters. Most of them thought it was, while others disagreed.

DANIEL BEATS COX GOVERNOR RACE BY COMFORTABLE MARGIN

Gov. Price Daniel Saturday won a third-term nomination by a comfortable, though not a runaway margin over Jack Cox, Breckenridge oil drilling contractor.

Cox's showing puts him in a good position to run for Governor again in 1962. It was his first state-wide campaign.

Voters favored present office holders with two exceptions. Land Commissioner Bill Allcorn was defeated by Jerry Sadler, spuff-dipping State Representative from Palestine.

Judge Lloyd W. Davidson of the Court of Criminal Appeals and Dist. Judge W. T. McDonald of Bryan, are in a second primary runoff.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson won third-term renomination over Texas House Speaker Waggoner Carr of Lubbock.

Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey of San Augustine was given a sixth-term victory over Don Yarborough of Houston, candidate of the liberal-labor faction.

Two Calverts were victors. Associate Justice Robert W. Calvert of the Supreme Court won nomination for Chief Justice and Comptroller Robert S. Calvert was renominated.

Daniel took the lead from the beginning of the count and his majority was never in danger.

The Governor became the third man in Texas history to win a third term nomination. Former Gov. Allan Shivers, who supported Cox, was a third-termer.

Daniel paid little attention to the hard-campaigning Jack Cox until the final two weeks of the race. Then, it became a rough match.

Cox charged Daniel with being unable to cope with the state's financial problems, of keeping secret his tax plans.

The Governor shot back that Cox and Shivers had gas pipeline interests at heart, didn't want them taxed, but wanted a general sales tax. Cox had endorsed a sales tax for school purposes and Daniel opposed it.






