Coming from behind in the fifth inning, Talco Red shut out Mt. Pleasant Builders with a 7-6 score in the Pony League Park at Mt. Pleasant Tuesday night. Mike McAfee pitched and Gary Howard was the catcher the entire game. McAfee was credited with nine strike-outs and only two walks in the game.

Salters and Pope pitched for the Builders, with Dees behind the bat. Alexander was high point man with three runs for the Mt. Pleasant team. Both teams were plagued with errors during the game.

Mt. Pleasant Piggie squealed past Talco Red Sox 1 to 0 behind the seven hit pitching of Hockaday. Although the Red Sox out-hit the Porkers 7 to 3 they failed to get a run across the plate. Michael McAfee and Rodney Russell led the Red Sox hitting attack. McAfee collected 2 singles in four trips to the plate and Russell whacked out 2 doubles in two times at bat. Albert Whitney and Otis Hall had a hit apiece, Hall's via a pinch-hit role in the last inning.

McAfee absorbed the loss although the only run scored off him was on an infield error.

Rodney Russell bagged his second win of the season as the Red Sox grabbed three runs in the 6th inning to coast past Omaha 5 to 4. Omaha led until the 6th with one away Albert Whitney walked and Johnny Taylor singled to put runners on first and second. McAfee doubled off the wall in left field to tie the score 3 to 3. The Omaha pitcher got the next batter with a strikeout only to be confronted by Ronnie Nelson who waved his war club and proceeded to poke another long double against the wall in left-center to score the eventual tying and winning runs.

Omaha go one run in the 7th, on a sacrifice fly that scored a runner from 3rd base.

Talco Man Escapes Injury in Wreck

Heavy damage was reported in a two-car accident Sunday morning north of Paris at the intersection of U. S. Highway 271 and the Slate Shoals road.

A 1959 Chevrolet, driven by Larry Norton of Talco, was totally demolished when it crashed into the rear of a 1951 Chevrolet, driven by Charles Dillard of Powderly.

Highway Patrolman Wray, who investigated the crash, stated that both autos were traveling south on the highway when Norton attempted to pass the Dillard car.

The crash occurred as Dillard began a left turn off the highway and Norton smashed into the rear of the auto. No one was injured.

Wray estimated damage to the Dillard auto at \$200, while the Norton car was a total loss.

Twenty-Seven Motorcides Are Predicted July 4

An alert went out to Texas motorists today as the Texas Department of Public Safety predicted 27 motorcides will occur on streets and highways of this state during the three-day 4th of July week end.

The period covered by the prediction, during which time the Texas DPS will conduct its Operation Deathwatch, extends from 12:01 a. m. Saturday, July 2 thru 11:59 p. m. Monday, July 4. The DPS Statistical section keeps the official state records of the holiday death count on the calendar day basis, in contrast wire service counts using fractional parts of days, and different holiday periods.

The DPS prediction released by Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director, emphasized that 4,000 cars will be damaged requiring garage repairs—some a total loss—during the three-day period. The report said that 1500 persons will receive bodily injury with some persons being crippled for life.

"These are some of the factors on the grim side of the holiday," Garrison said, "but it is necessary to relate them in order to explain the seriousness of the holiday traffic situation to Texas motorists."

"The Fourth of July is a holiday in which Texans go out of doors and do lots of driving. I wish everyone a good time during the July Fourth week end. At the same time I would like to advise them to be careful.

"Let someone else drive if you drink, watch your food and keep it refrigerated, and don't mar your holiday with personal injury, death, or damage to your automobile. We will have on the highways to help you every available patrolman. You can make their job easier by planning safety into your holiday activities."
