Boat Accident Causes Given



Sen. Hubert Hudson heads the panel which is studying adminisstration and investment of four tunds totaling \$1,200,000,000. They are the University Permanent Fund, the Permanent School Fund, the Teachers Retirement System Fund and the State Employes Retirement Fund.

Mortgage bankers suggested to the panel that the funds could earn a higher return without sacrifice of safety by investing in government-insured home mortgages. Some panel members observed that the funds now invested in federal bonds were not earning as much as was being lost




