Pamphlets Help Students Prepare For the Future

A new service to assist the Senior students of Talco High School in planning and selecting careers has been made available through the High School Guidance Department.

According to J. M. Chism, Guidance Counselor, the publication is received on a bi-weekly basis and is thoroughly utilized in the school curriculum through regularly scheduled occupational periods and as a part of subject matter courses.

The policy of "Your Future Occupation" is to stimulate and encourage students to search out career information and guidance on their own initiative, and to encourage parents to actively participate in the Guidance process.

Each issue contains current information and data, and reflects changes in occupational standards, newly developing career opportunities and new advances in Guidance procedure. Important features such as changes in draft status, seasonal or regional demands for workers, availability of scholarships, etc., are reviewed regularly.

The Editorial Staff of "Your Future Occupation" is headed by guidance experts across the nation.

Mr. Chism stated that in order for students to be able to make intelligent and soundly planned career choices, it is necessary that they receive up-to-date, authoritative information on the rapidly changing nature of the world of work and careers.

The purposes of the program are to:

1. Stress a student-oriented guidance program.
2. Broaden the students outlook in making career choices.
3. Get students to think about their future.
4. Give up-to-date information.
5. Make vocational classes more interesting.

Geo. P. Blackburn Dies in California

George P. Blackburn, 74, former city and county attorney and district judge and later assistant attorney general of Texas, died in a hospital at Vista, Calif., the funeral being announced for Wednesday in Rosecrans, Calif.

Judge Blackburn, who retired two years ago, was making his home with his son, George P. Blackburn, Jr., in California, his death occurring last Thursday.

He served two years as Lamar County attorney and then for 16 years as district judge for Fannin and Lamar Counties.

After serving as district judge, he was appointed assistant attorney general under both Gerald Mann and Grover Sellers.

Poll Tax Sales Are Below 1960

A survey shows that 1962 will be a normal year for potential voting in Texas. Total vote strength will be less than for a presidential election year but greater than for an off-election year such as 1961.

In Titus County this year's poll taxes totaled 3,220, Tax Assessor-Collector Wallace Fields said.

This is 712 less than the 4,932 paid two years ago. Fields said last year's total was 2,700 and four years ago there were 3,678 paid. He reported Mrs. O. D. Welch at Talco sold 235.

Seek Bids For Improvement of Court House

Bids for remodeling the Titus County Court House will be opened at 7 p. m. Feb. 23 in the district court room. W. L. Means, chairman of a committee named to prepare plans for the work, announced.

Titus County voters approved the issuance of time warrants up to \$100,000 in an election held last April 4, to finance the remodeling program.

Among other things, the remodeling calls for a complete re-wiring of the structure and the installation of all new lighting fixtures.

The ceiling in the district court room will be lowered, and the interior re-plastered and painted. The exterior will be of aluminum in three shades, with a base of crushed granite.

Complete air conditioning of the building and a heat pump would be installed to provide year-round heating and cooling. In each of the offices in the building, individual units would be installed to take care of heating, cooling and ventilating. A clock will be mounted on each of the four sides of the building.

The committee which has worked out the remodeling program numbers 25 Titus County citizens.

Candidates File For Places On Titus Ballot

Twenty-eight persons have filed for places on the ballot in the Democratic primary of May 5, County Chairman John V. (Vic) Horn, said. Midnight Monday was the deadline for filing.

Four Titus County officers are uncontested. These are district clerk, county clerk, county treasurer and Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, Place 2. Also uncontested are the races for state senator and judge of the Civil Appeals.

Jack Cross has filed as a candidate for County Judge. Two others had previously filed, being Harry Taylor, the incumbent, and Cecil Franklin.

Others who have filed with opposition are: Representative, First Congressional District — Wright Patman, Texarkana; Sam B. Hall Jr., Marshall.

Austin. — A hectic final night ended the special session of the Texas Legislature. Two major problems — loan regulation and appropriations — were left unfinished.

Senate killed the loan regulatory bill by a two-vote margin, after the House had approved it by 18 votes. It was described by experts as the strongest loan regulatory law in the nation.

Death came to the appropriations bill in the House. It would have provided money to advertise for tourists, repair San Jacinto Monument, repair damages done to state properties by Hurricane Carla and by fires, pay Senate employees, and finance a number of other items.

Gov. Price Daniel called it a very productive session, nevertheless. He said it had settled two long-standing issues — bank escheat reporting and farm-to-market road policy.

Daniel was disappointed about the failure of the loan legislation, tourist advertising, and San Jacinto Monument repairs, but he said he would not call this Legislature back into session in the foreseeable future.

Lawmakers headed for home to file for re-election and begin their campaigns for the same or other offices.

Daniel was pleased at the bill changing the name of the State Board of Water Engineers to the Texas Water Commission, and reworking it into an image of the State Highway Commission. The chief engineer takes over full administrative control, leaving policy matters in the hands of the three-member commission.

Governor Daniel studied a flood of mail, telegrams and phone calls, which he had elicited, and decided that there was a definite public demand for him to try to become Texas' first four-term governor.

WHO SHOULD CENSOR? — Question of school book censorship was buffeted about by 22 witnesses, when the House Textbook Investigating Committee held its fourth weekly public hearing. Some 200 persons attended the hearing.

Frank Wardlaw, director of the University of Texas Press, Don Yarborough, Houston at-

torney, paid Austin a visit to announce his candidacy for governor.

So far, the only Republican contender for governor is Jack Cox of Breckenridge.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White filed for re-election to the post he has held since 1950. White said 1962 should be a turning point in achieving greater self-determination for farmers and ranchmen.

J. Evetts Haley of Canyon is the only other announced candidate for commissioner of agriculture.

Other candidates for statewide offices flooded the State Democratic Central Committee headquarters.

Judge W. T. McDonald of Bryan, Court of Criminal Appeals justice, joined the attorney general race.

Immediately after the House passed the loan bill, Speaker of the House James A. Turman announced for lieutenant governor.

That brought the total of democrats running for the second top spot to six: Sen. Preston Smith of Lubbock; Sen. Crawford C. Martin of Hillsboro; Sen. Robert W. Baker of Houston; Sen. Jarrard Secret of Temple and former representative Gene Smith of Fort Worth, plus Turman.

There was activity on the Republican side, too.

O. W. (Bill) Hayes of Temple and Kellis Dibrell of Seguin both filed as candidates for lieutenant governor. Dibrell practices law in San Antonio. Hayes is president of Continental Belton Company in Belton. Both are 43 years old.

Earlier, two other Republicans had filed for the same office — Congressman-at-large. They were Giles E. Miller, Dallas publisher, and Desmond Barry, Houston industrialist.

SUGGESTS FORUM — Tom Reavly, Austin attorney running for attorney general, suggested joint appearances for himself and opponents, Waggoner Carr of Lubbock, Les Proctor of Austin, Tom James of Dallas and Judge W. T. McDonald of Bryan.

"Joint appearances of the candidates will bring the issues and the candidates squarely before the people of Texas," he said.

ABUNDANT LIFE

WHEN GOD VISITED A GENERAL

During our Charleston, South Carolina Crusade, I had the privilege of visiting the Citadel, South Carolina's "West Point." General Mark Clark was my gracious host, and while I was there, he told me the following inspiring story, which I believe he will be glad for me to share with you. God visited the general in a crisis and helped him through one of the most desperate problems of World War II.

At the last moment, before the invasion of Europe, orders came from Washington altering the invasion plans and removing the protective covering of 15,000 paratroops who had been designated to protect the landing of General Clark's men. The general tells in his own words how God helped the Americans to meet this emergency and gave their leader strength and wisdom to lead his men to victory.

"There I was on the night of September 5—my plans twisted, yet knowing we must sail the next morning.

"Did the Germans know about the invasion? How much did they know?"

"All these things were running through my mind, and with the fate of so many thousands of men, as well as the hopes of the free world, resting upon the success of the invasion, I was literally overwhelmed with a sense of my responsibility.

"Troubled and worried, I went to my cabin. A sense of my own helplessness swept over me. I desperately needed help

from some greater power.

"I picked up a little book of devotions and began to read. I turned to the prayer for September 5. There I read the following inspiring lines:

*Father, in Thy name I pray,
Let me know Thy will today.
With Thee I am unafraid,
For on Thee my mind is stayed.
Though a thousand foes surround,
Safe in Thee I shall be found.*

"As I began to read, the words seemed to leap off the page at me. A sense of another presence overpowered me. A great reassurance of the rightness of our cause, as well as the certainty of ultimate victory, came. God was with me. I knew it. I felt His presence! And a glad thankfulness rose in my heart. I knew we would succeed.

"As I finished reading, the peace of God flooded my soul. I slept better that night.

"We sailed early the next morning with a convoy of about 70 ships. Ten minutes before midnight, I stood with Admiral Hewitt on the bridge of the USS Ancon. The naval phase of the assault was completed.

"Then the incomparably brave officers and men of the Fifth Army started that last dash toward the beaches. Their fierce fighting, their countless inspiring acts of heroism and the ultimate victory are written in our nation's history—but that is another story. My purpose here is to say very simply and sincerely that I will always thank God for His visit to me in my hour of desperate need."

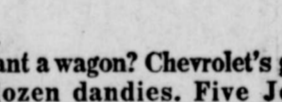

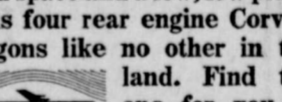

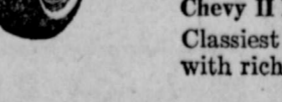

Alcorn Claims Weather Has To Be Right for Both Orbiting, Farming

Editor note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur, takes a look at space flights, his letter this week reveals.

Dear Editor: Like nearly everybody else, I was glued to a television set watching preparations for launching a man into orbit around the earth and like everybody else I too was disappointed when the launching had to be postponed.

I was talking later with a man in town and he said, "Aw, I don't understand it, why should a few clouds get in the way when he's going to be orbiting above them anyway?"

It's pretty clear that that man doesn't understand the intricacies of space launching or farming either.

I don't know whether you're aware of it or not, but launching a man into space is almost exactly like farming—the weather has got to be just right before you tackle it. It can be too cloudy to orbit the earth just as it can be too wet to plow, or too windy to fish.

Even if the weather is right, that's not the whole answer. On

a bright, sunny day, a leak in a fuel line can stop Col. Glenn from orbiting and me from farming, and I think everybody ought to come to a fuller appreciation of the complex difficulties of both these enterprises.

If a man is all set to orbit the earth or cultivate its surface, he's got to be philosophic about the situation and not rush into either unless everything is exactly right. Col. Glenn, as far as I'm concerned, expressed a sound philosophy toward both orbiting and farming when he crawled back out of his space cabin after the flight was postponed and said: "If not today, some other time. What's the rush?"

Col. Glenn, you're welcome to visit this Johnson grass farm any time you want to.

People have got to understand that it's impossible to say: "Next Thursday at 9 a. m. sharp we'll put one man into orbit and two million farmers to plowing."

Us space and farming technicians have learned long ago that things don't work that way, and I'll be glad when the rest of you laymen learn it too.
