Joe Chapman Is Re-Elected Representative

Rep. Joe N. Chapman, Sulphur Springs attorney, won re-election to the Texas House of Representatives in Saturday's Democratic primary.

He polled 7,016 votes in the four-county district. J. J. Womack of Cookville, Titus County, was second with 3,335 votes. Third man in the race was Bayless W. Evans, Sulphur Springs minister, who had 1,794 votes.

In Titus County, Womack led the ticket with 2,254 votes. Chapman was next with 2,148 and Evans received 384.

In Hopkins County, Chapman polled 2,914 votes to 886 for Evans and 555 for Womack.

In Franklin County, the vote was Chapman 919, Evans 333 and Womack 314.

In Delta County, it was Chapman 1,035, Womack 212 and Evans 191.

This is the first primary in which the legislative district embraced these four counties. In prior years, Titus County had been part of a district which also included Red River and Camp Counties.

Dog Attacks Child At Talco Friday

Six stitches were required to close wounds on the face of 3½ year old Scottie Taylor after he was attacked by a dog Friday morning. He also received scratches on his head.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Hoyt Taylor of Talco, and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Damron of Bogata, the child was playing outside the home of his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Buford Taylor of Talco, when he was attacked by a dog owned by John D. Wright of Talco.

Two dogs, both owned by Wright, were present when the child was bitten. Since it was not known which animal attacked the child, both are being kept under observation by a veterinarian.

Son of Herman B. and Effie Jane (McClinton) Kelley, he was born Feb. 7, 1899. Mr. Kelley had been in business in Talco since 1936 until he retired four years ago, due to ill health.

He is survived by his wife, the former Thelma Bennett Schoolfield, whom he married March 15, 1919 in Foreman, Ark.; his mother, Mrs. Effie Kelley; one son, D. Herschal Kelley Jr., all of Talco; one daughter, Mrs. D. M. Thomas of Odessa; three sisters, Mmes. W. G. Aubrey of Tulsa, Okla., Don Wimp of Joplin, Mo. and Ivan Holaman of Brownwood, and one brother, Wilton Kelley of Talco; seven grandchildren, one great-granddaughter and a number of nieces and nephews.

Sunray DX Oil Co. has announced from Tulsa headquarters purchase of 42 oil wells on 1,054 acres in the Trix-Liz field area of North Titus County.

Sunray said the properties were acquired from Abaca Oil Co., Tulsa, and covered the holdings of W. M. Coats, Longview, and R. E. Moore of Omaha. Purchase price was withheld.

The announcement stated the wells produce from various zones in the Woodbine formation with a daily output of about 500 barrels. The Trix-Liz field, a multiphase area, was discovered in late 1958 by the Coats-Moore partnership.

Re-Elect Patman Congressman In First District

Wright Patman was re-elected Congressman from the First Congressional District over his opponent, Sam B. Hall Jr. Patman polled 61 per cent of the votes in the Democratic primary held Saturday.

In Deport the vote was Patman 160; Hall 60.

In Titus County the 1960 Census counted 5,958 housing units. Of these 3,629 were in sound condition with all plumbing; 5,453 were occupied; 3,930 were occupied by owners; \$5,800 was the median value of owner-occupied places; 1,523 were occupied by renters; \$44 was the median gross rent of rented places;

4,210 had hot and cold running water; 4,311 had flush toilet; 4,284 bathtub or shower; 70 had basement; 38 were trailer homes; 928 households had air conditioning; 4,070 had TV, 5,013 radio, 2,941 telephone; 3,300 had washing machine; 247 clothes dryer; 1,186 had 1 or more food freezers; 3,140 had 1 automobile; 992 had 2 automobiles; 107 had 3 or more automobiles.

The 1960 Census of Housing counted 12,853 housing units in Lamar County. Of these 6,193 were in sound condition with all plumbing; 11,419 were occupied; 7,258 were occupied by owners; 4,161 were occupied by renters; \$43 was the median gross rent of rented places.

Median value of owner-occupied places was less than \$5,000. 8,263 had hot and cold running water; 8,974 had flush toilet; 8,498 bathtub or shower; 330 had basement; 23 were trailer homes; 2,450 households had air conditioning; 6,418 had TV, 10,321 radio, 7,214 telephone; 6,362 had washing machine, 313 clothes dryer; 1,786 had 1 or more home food freezers; 7,271 had 1 automobile; 1,597 had 2 automobiles; 85 had 3 or more automobiles.

In Red River County the 1960 Census of Housing counted 5,780 housing units. Of these 1,736 were in sound condition with all plumbing; 5,091 were occupied; 3,370 were occupied by owners; 1,721 were occupied by renters; \$34 was the median gross rent of rented places;

Median value of owner occupied places was less than \$5,000. 2,523 had hot and cold running water; 2,705 had flush toilet; 2,727 bathtub or shower; 10 had basement; 17 were trailer homes; 674 households had air conditioning; 3,003 had TV, 4,344 radio; 2,272 telephone; 2,228 had washing machine, 72 clothes dryer; 1,099 had 1 or more home food freezers; 2,698 had 1 automobile; 672 had 2 automobiles; 83 had 3 or more automobiles.

Taylor Withdraws From Judge Race

Harry Taylor Tuesday withdrew from the race for County Judge.

In a statement he said in part: "I feel that I cannot overcome the lead given my opponent in the first primary and am requesting that my name be taken from the ballot for the second primary."

Taylor, who now holds the office, trailed County Treasurer, Cecil Franklin in last Saturday's Democratic primary.

Judge Taylor first was elected to the office in 1952, re-elected in 1954 and 1956 for a two-year term. In 1958, he was elected for a four-year term, which will expire at the end of December, 1962.

Potential Water Way Shippers Being Contacted

Representatives of the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors, New Orleans District, and Tulsa District, U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, are now canvassing the upper Red River Valley, contacting potential waterway shippers for the proposed Red River Navigation Channel.

In making the announcement, Colonel Edward B. Jennings, District Engineer, U. S. Army Engineer District, New Orleans, stated, "Eight men are now in the field calling on industries that may be able to utilize the proposed waterway in the conduct of their business." He said that these interviews will help to ascertain the commodities and quantities that would move on the Red River Navigation channel if authorized and constructed. These data will be used in the compilation of estimated transportation benefits, he added.

Colonel Jennings noted that letters have been sent to about 150 firms in the Lower Red River Valley advising them that these representatives will be calling on them during May. The full cooperation of these firms is essential if we are to be able to accurately portray the justification for a project of this magnitude."

He pointed out that there may be potential waterway users unknown to the Corps and that these persons should make themselves known so that they too may be contacted and interviewed.

Colonel Jennings emphasized that, in addition to navigation features, this review will develop a comprehensive, integrated plan of improvement by means of levees, bank stabilization and channel improvement for flood control and preservation of land in the main valley of Red River.

The study of Red River was authorized by the Senate and House Committee on Public Works in Resolutions adopted Sept. 12, 1959 and Feb. 24, 1960, respectively. The study was initiated in fiscal year 1961.

Summing up accomplishments to date, Colonel Jennings said, "Public hearings have been held in Alexandria and Shreveport, La., and in Paris. Field surveys, soil borings, office studies and field reconnaissance for navigation benefits are underway."

In conclusion he added that the study is being conducted jointly by the New Orleans and Tulsa Districts, U. S. Army Corps of Engineers.

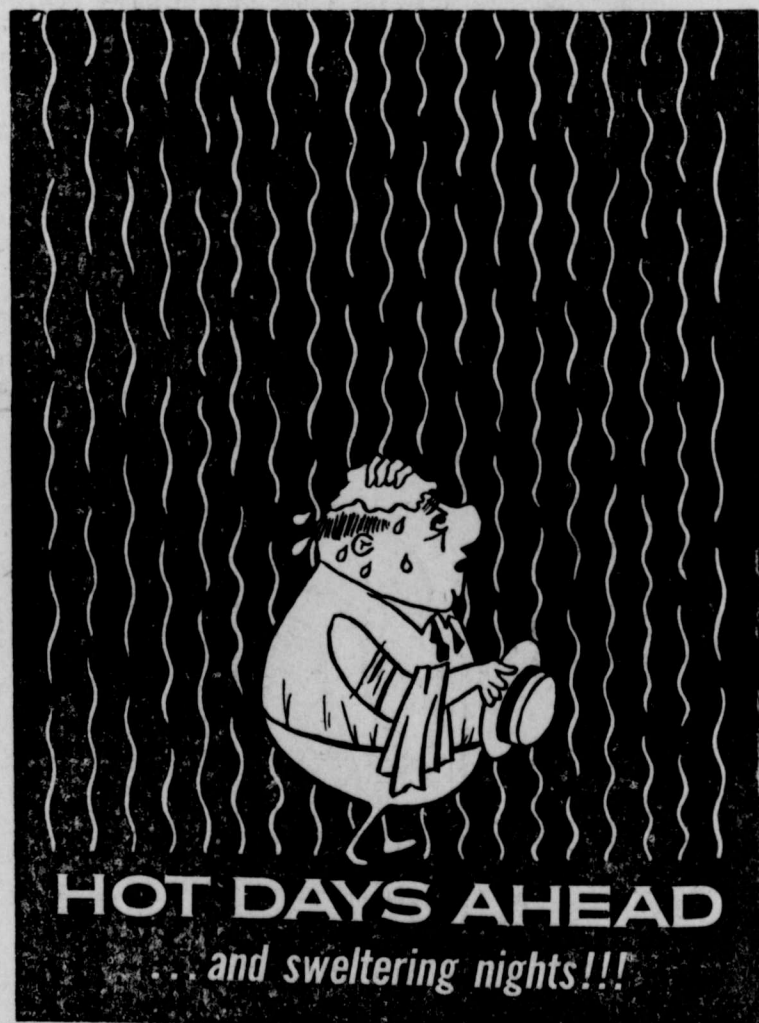

Parsons was also elected a board member at the annual meeting of stockholders held the same day.

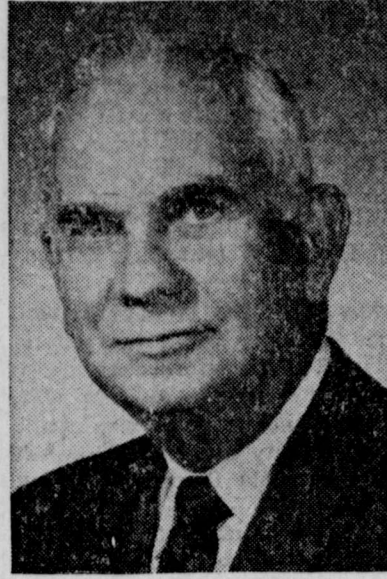
