## TROJANS STORM MT. VERNON TIGERS 20 TO 8 FRIDAY NIGHT

Talco Trojans playing before a large Homecoming crowd downed the Mt. Vernon Tigers 20 to 8 Friday night. The Trojans staged a brilliant fourth quarter show of offensive and defensive ability to storm past the strong Tigers and broke up an 8-8 tie that had stood since early in the second quarter.

Play started with Mt. Vernon kicking off to the Trojans. The Trojans were unable to move the ball and punted out to Mt. Vernon. The Tigers immediately started rolling over the Trojans and a pass play from Quarterback Jerry Titale to Ronnie Broach went over for the touch-down. The extra point try was good and the Tigers led 8 to 0 at the end of the first quarter.

After a series of tries in the second quarter by both teams the Trojans took over the ball on the 43 yard line. Sidney Bonds executed a reverse beautifully for a 20 yard gain and set up a first and ten from the 24, but here the Trojans were smoothed in four attempts to move the ball and Mt. Vernon took over.

After three tries at gaining some yards they were forced to punt. The punt went some 100 feet into the air but traveled only a few feet from the line of scrimmage and the Trojans took over on their own 30 yard line.

From here the Trojans drove to the 10 yard line and on a 3rd down try Quarterback Ronnie Nelson passed 10 yards to Sidney Bonds for Talco's first TD. The extra point try was run over by Bonds and the ball game was all tied up with 4 minutes left before the half and that's the way the first half ended, with both defensive units getting stronger all the time.

Second half of play started

with Talco Fullback Russell kicking off. The ball was only slightly moved by both teams during the third quarter with Trojan Roger Howard along with all the Trojan defensive squad stopping the Tigers at anything they tried. The third quarter ended with both teams still deadlocked in an 8 to 8 tie.

The fourth quarter started with Mt. Vernon punting to the 20 yard line and here Halfback Sidney Bonds took the ball all the way to pay-dirt with one of the most spectacular runs of the year. He picked up some fine blocks from his teammates and side-stepped and out-ran the rest of the large Tiger tacklers on his 80 yard scamper to the goal line. Extra point no good and the Trojans led 14 to 8.

Talco kicked off and Mt. Vernon, after several unsuccessful attempts to move past the now rugged Talco defense, fumbled on the 25 and Talco recovered.

Jackie Dixon on the first play moved to the 12 yard line and Russell on the next play carried half the Tiger line to the 2 yard line before being stopped. Quarterback Nelson on a keeper play, went over from the 2 to bring the Talco Trojans ahead 20 to 8. The extra point try failed and with 6 minutes left in the last quarter Mt. Vernon tried to move, but the Trojan defensive unit was not to be run over now and with no further scoring the game ended with Talco getting some sweet revenge by beating Mt. Vernon 20 to 8.

This week the Trojans will journey to Honey Grove to take on the Warriors in another non-conference tilt which should prove to be another tough contest. The Trojans now have a 3-2 record for the season but have not been out-scored as far as TD's go. They have lost both the games by extra point attempts. So let's all go to Honey Grove and see the Trojans rack up another victory.

## Deposits, Loans Resources Up At Talco State Bank

Statement of financial condition of The Talco State Bank appears in this edition. The call from the State Banking Commission was issued on Sept. 28, 1962.

Deposits were up \$63,275.91, being \$843,963.97 now compared to \$780,688.06 last year.

Resources also increased \$74,723.14 over a year ago, being \$982,075.44 now compared to \$907,352.30 in 1961 at the same date.

Undivided profits are up from \$58,133.66 to \$59,365.65, an increase of \$1,232.00.

Loans and discounts are up, being \$488,263.04 now compared to \$422,011.15 last year.

Capital stock and surplus of the bank increased \$10,000, being \$70,000.00 now compared to \$60,000.00 a year ago.

Austin. — With 12 indictments already returned in the East Texas slant-hole investigation, there are strong side-currents growing out of the East Texas scandals.

Rep. Charles Ballman of Borger and his fellow House investigators sent a preliminary report to Speaker James A. Turman and Gov. Price Daniel. They urged "immediate action" on eight changes in or additions to the criminal laws.

They also proposed that a procedure be set up to replace state officials who become ill and unable to handle their duties. This obviously is a reference to Railroad Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson, who has been ill at his home in Amarillo for several months.

A major policy change would be revision of the old "marginal well law" which could be very important to many Texans, particularly in old oil areas.

Present law says that if an oil well cannot make as much as 20 barrels a day it is a "marginal well" which must be exempt from shutdown days. Thus, a well producing 19 barrels a day will get an allowable of 570 barrels a month. But a well capable of making 1,000 barrels a day will be held to 160 barrels a month—20 barrels a day times eight producing days.

Committee recommended that marginal wells be held to the same monthly allowable as a non-marginal well in the same field.

Governor Daniel has been non-committal on the possibility of calling a special session of the Legislature to act on this and other current problem areas.

COMMISSION SHAKEUP — Texas Railroad Commission is under a reorganization study by the Texas Research League. Already changes in procedures are being put into effect.

Commissioners William J. Murray Jr. and Ben Ramsey named a committee of oilmen headed by James E. Russell of Abilene to advise on revision of rules and procedures which most admit had become too cumbersome and slow.

CASH ON HAND — While there has been lots of talk about the state government being in the red, it really never has been. On August 31, when the fiscal year ended, the State Treasury had a cash balance of more than \$219,000,000.

all the rest—Legislature, courts, administrative agencies and everything else—cost 9.04 cents of every dollar.

LAND SENTENCE — A third man's conviction from the veterans land scandals of the mid-1950's was affirmed by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

He was B. R. Sheffield of Brady, who was found guilty by a Hill County jury of "uttering false instrument" in the case of one of the 54 veterans whose rights were put together to buy a 10,000-acre ranch in Kinney County.

Previous convictions were on former Land Commissioner Bascom Giles and J. T. McLarty.

Sheffield recently paid back the Veterans Land Board, with interest, the money he received for the land.

FEDERAL AID — Texas has received \$317,920 from the U. S. Forest Service to be allocated to East Texas counties where four national forests are located.

Counties and schools in the forest areas get 25 per cent of the Forest Service's income from the forests, to help maintain road and school programs.

BOOK DEFENDERS — The men and women who run the public schools came out in strong support of the present method of selecting textbooks in Texas.

Plan has been under attack by some witnesses at recent legislative hearings.

Texas Association of School Boards, meeting in Austin, found no fault in the system by which a textbook committee selects as many as five books for each course, and then local textbook committees decide which of the five they will use.

School board members also took no action on an Ector County proposal that central state purchasing of school buses be ended.

COLLEGE TAX ILLEGAL? — Texas Supreme Court action is expected soon on a case which could upset the junior college set-up in Texas.

Taxpayers' suit from Harris County contends that the Legislature had no constitutional authority to allow the levying of taxes by junior college districts.

Supreme Court has been studying the case since April. Should it agree with the taxpayers, it would take a constitutional amendment to legalize the college districts. Meanwhile, state money might be needed to keep the 52 junior colleges going until the voters have a say on the subject.

TWO WITHDRAW — Two Constitutional party candidates have notified the Secretary of State to withdraw their names from the November election.

They are Ruben Lozano of San Antonio, candidate for Congressman-at-Large and Roy R. Brown of Bonham, candidate for Lieutenant Governor.

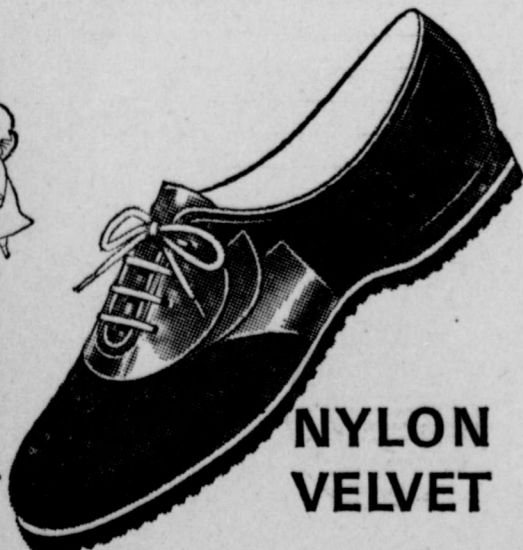

## Postal Rate Hike Effective Jan. 7

Washington.—The House pass-  
 ed a compromise bill to increase

 crease in letter mail rates next  
 Jan. 7. First-class letters will

 bring in an added \$437.8 million  
 a year.

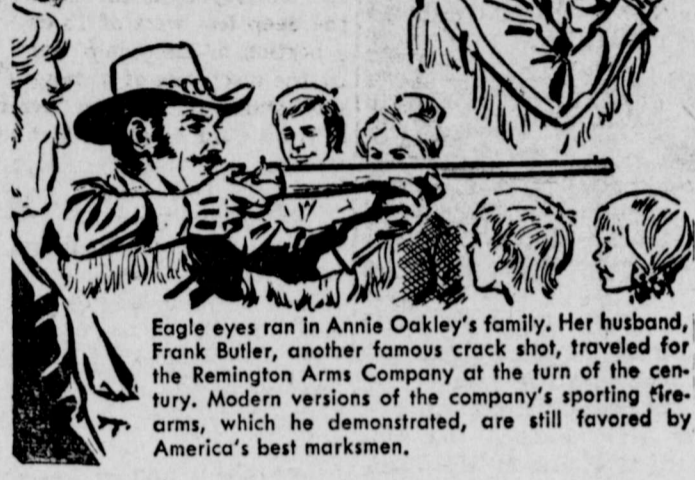
# The Sportsman's Corner

### Burt Lockhart, Veteran News Publisher, Dies

Burt Lockhart, veteran publisher of the Pittsburg Gazette and one of the oldest active newspapermen in the country, died Sunday afternoon in a Tyler hospital. He was 91. He had been hospitalized for about a week.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Monday at the First Methodist Church at Pittsburg with the pastor, Rev. Reginald Brock, officiating. Burial was in Rose Hill Cemetery.

Mr. Lockhart had lived in Pittsburg for about 90 years and had been connected with the newspaper for 75 years.

Despite his age, he was still active and still wrote his popular column, "One Over," which has appeared in this newspaper for many years under the heading of "Editorially Speaking."

Mr. Lockhart was the oldest member of the Texas Press Association, joining that organization in 1889 while he was still a teenager.

He had won numerous honors through the years and in 1961 was awarded the Sam Holloway Outstanding Journalistic Award by the Northeast Texas Press Association.
