Sunday, Dec. 9th "Safety Sunday"

Officially proclaiming Sunday, Dec. 9, as "Safety Sunday in Texas," Governor Price Daniel noted that traffic deaths had declined, both on "Safety Sunday" and during the year-end holiday period, since religious emphasis was first included in the traffic safety program in 1958.

Governor Daniel said official records of the Texas Department of Public Safety showed that traffic deaths averaged 106 for each Christmas-New Year's holiday from 1954 through 1957, and 83 for each such holiday for the years 1958-1961. The year-end holiday periods totaled 46 days during the 1954-57 period and 41 days in the 1958-61 period. Average number of traffic deaths per day for each of the two periods dropped from 9.2 in the early years to 8.7 in the latter years.

On "Safety Sunday" itself, since its institution in 1958, traffic deaths averaged 8 per Sunday for 1957-61, whereas deaths on the same Sunday for each of the preceding four years averaged 10.5.

"Reduction of the death toll on 'Safety Sunday' itself is not the prime objective," the Governor said. "As a matter of fact, this idea was proposed by the McAllen Chamber of Commerce Traffic Safety Committee and the McAllen Rotary Club for the purpose of focusing public attention on the moral obligations and responsibilities of vehicle drivers to protect their own lives and the lives of others. Since it was deemed especially fitting for the Christmas holidays, we have designated 'Safety Sunday' in recent years as a signal for the opening of the year-end traffic safety campaign, and it has been most timely and beneficial."

"The activities of Texas churches and religious organizations in taking traffic safety into their church programs and directly to their church membership is one of the strongest forces in behalf of traffic safety in Texas," the Governor said.

The Governor's official proclamation said "the individual driver must realize more clearly his moral and ethical responsibility to insure the personal safety of himself and all others on our highways, and that continuing misuse of automotive vehicles has become an unrighteous abuse of God's most precious gift, life itself."

The proclamation asked Texans to help "awaken the conscience of every driver while he is operating a motor vehicle." It asked church leaders to "remind their members of the personal and moral responsibility to drive their vehicles safely and legally, to obey the traffic laws, and to respect the sanctity of human life on our streets and highways."

Voters Approve Bond Election

Blossom residents overwhelmingly approved two propositions dealing with sewer bonds in an election Saturday.

Both proposals, one for sewer revenue bonds and the other for sewer tax bonds, passed by identical 114-3 margins.

Each of the propositions was for \$20,000.

Wilkinson Man Dies In Accident

Jessie Arch Johnson, 82-year-old retired farmer of Wilkinson, was killed instantly Monday night when he was struck by a pickup truck as he attempted to walk across Highway 67, East in Mt. Pleasant.

Johnson was struck about 6 p. m. by a 1962 Dodge pickup driven by N. A. Mattingly, 51, Rt. 3, which was traveling west.

The Highway Patrol said Johnson was walking east along the north side of highway and apparently attempted to cross the road to the south side.

Mattingly told officers he didn't see Johnson, wearing dark clothing, until an instant before hitting him and was unable to apply his brakes.

Both the Highway Patrol and Justice of Peace Marshall Branch ruled Johnson's death as result of unavoidable accident.

Funeral services for Johnson were held Wednesday at 3 p. m. at Liberty Hill Baptist Church. Rev. James Bell conducted the rites and burial was in Liberty Hill Cemetery.

He was born in Titus County Sept. 7, 1879. He is survived by three sons, Jessie Arch Johnson Jr. of South Viet Nam, Cecil Palmer and Clayton Palmer of Houston; two grandchildren; one sister, Miss Effie Johnson of Dallas; and a brother, T. R. Johnson of Tyler.

consideration. More controversial items will be presented separately.

Public will have a chance to challenge the proposals on December 6 and 7 when an open hearing will be held in the Senate chamber. Committee also will hold hearings at that time on a voter registration law and a proposal to change the dates of primary elections.

Some of the 120 proposed amendments concern:

1. Having voters check preferred candidates on paper ballots, instead of scratching those opposed.

2. Requiring write-in nominees and runoff candidates to pay the same fees as other candidates.

3. Fining voters who cast a ballot in one party's primary and then vote in the runoff of another party.

4. Requiring campaign expense reports by newspapers, magazines, billboards, printers, radio and TV stations, on all advertising contracts.

5. Requiring all voters over 60 years of age to get annual exemptions.

6. Permitting different parties to hold primaries in the same building, as long as there is no means of direct passage between polls.

GUARDSMEN WAIT — Waiting for approval of armories under the federal-state building program are 32 units of the Texas National Guard.

Federal government, which underwrites 75 per cent of the cost of each armory, is approving construction at the average rate of six per year, but there is no priority arrangement.

So far, 11 armories have been built under the program, according to Harry B. Kelton, director of the Texas National Guard Armory Board.

Eight are under construction at Bonham, Seguin, Dallas, Mexia, Kerens, Mission, Mercedes and Harlingen. Units at Brownwood, Tulia and Fredericksburg have approval for construction.

On the waiting list are units in El Paso, Clipper, Canyon, Belton, Olney, Houston, Electra, Winnsboro, Galveston, Paris, Taylor, Kingsville, Austin, Port Neches, Gatesville, Alice, Huntsville, Borger, Pecos, Monahans, San Antonio, Sulphur Springs, Grand Prairie and New Boston.

Austin. — Twenty changes in Texas' two per cent sales tax law are recommended by the Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy.

Some changes would result in decreased revenue and some would mean an increase. But the total outcome of a legislative put-and-take would produce an additional \$10,500,000 a year from a tax that is expected to bring \$170,000,000 into state coffers this year.

Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas is chairman of the commission. Other members are Hugo H. Loewenstern of Amarillo, Dr. John R. Stockton of Austin, Senators Louis Crump of San Saba and Jep S. Fuller of Port Arthur, Representatives Charles Sandahl of Austin and Charles Wilson of Trinity.

Parkhouse predicted that if spending in the next biennium is in line with the present level, no additional taxes would have to be levied.

A large addition to income—if recommendations are adopted—would come from applying the state sales tax to motor vehicle sales in place of the selective excise tax now levied on vehicles.

Commission recommended repeal of the exemption of farm machinery and equipment, but suggested that feed for farm work animals; herbicides, defoliants and desiccants, and all fertilizer sales be exempt.

Some other recommendations were:

1. Apply sales tax to all clothing sales, which would up revenue \$10,000,000 a year.

2. Exempt vending machine sales of less than 25 cents, and all sales of less than 25 cents for retailers who derive 50 per cent of receipts from such sales.

3. Exempt sales made to state banks, since sales to national banks are exempt.

4. Exempt all sales of alcoholic beverages.

5. Permit grocery stores to pay sales tax in proportion to purchases of taxable and non-taxable items. Grocers with annual receipts of less than \$100,000 would pay sales tax on the assumption that 85 per cent of receipts are from exempt items.

ELECTION CHANGES — The Election Law Study Committee released a 221-page report on proposed changes in Texas election laws.

Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, chairman of the committee, said the main goal is to remove conflicts and deficiencies from the present code. The more palatable suggestions will be included in one bill for legislative

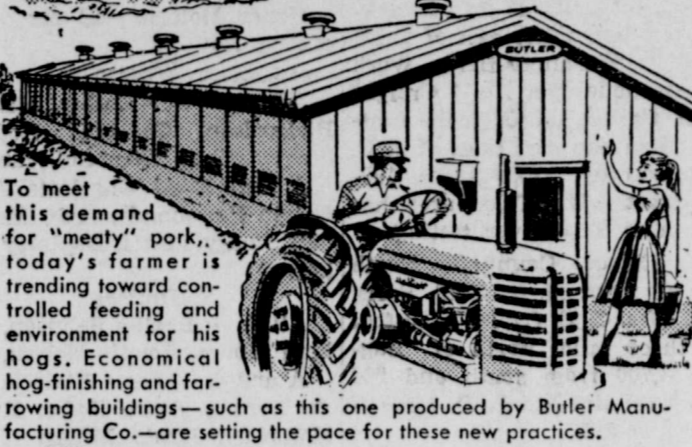
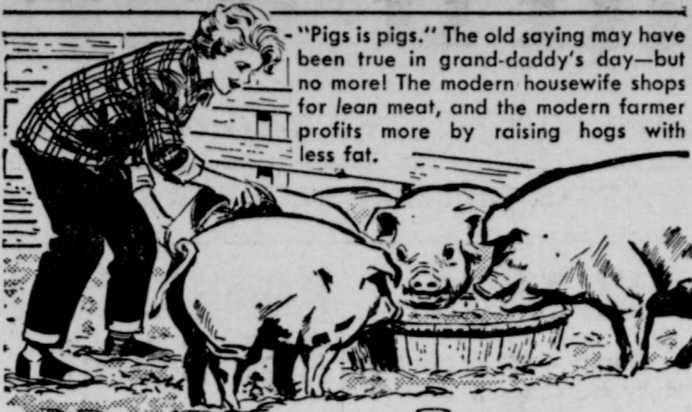
One Hospitalized Following Wreck

Alcorn Wants Farm Income Tied In With National Economic Index Plan

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur looks at the economic index, his letter this week reveals.

Dear Editor: I don't know where they get the figures, I know they don't use any of mine, but some government experts come out once a month with a report on what the cost of living index was the previous month.

Under this system, if the cost of living goes up so many points, as it has for the past several years, certain wage earners get an automatic increase in pay.

I was reading the figures for the past month and noticed that among the people getting an automatic increase were farm equipment workers. What I would like to know is why don't these experts figure out a way to give us farmers an automatic pay increase that's tied in with the economic index? It's the only way to meet the increased cost of farm equipment resulting from the increased pay for the farm equipment workers. It wouldn't

be too hard to do. Since we don't get paid by the hour, it would have to be figured on a yearly basis, but I'd agree to wait till the end of the year for my check.

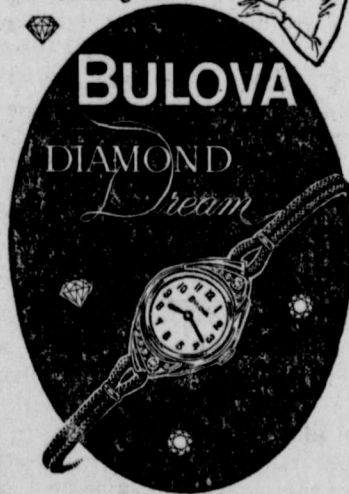
