

These companies operate on a narrow margin of capital—and every year thousands of them go out of business because their managers make mistakes their budgets can't afford. For a mistake is much more expensive when when you can't afford it than when you're part of an industrial giant with rich financial reserves.


ADVERTISING AS AN EXAMPLE
