Austin. — Rising insurance rates continue to stir up most of the excitement in the state capital.

A Dallas attorney, Bert Bader, filed suit in the 98th District Court here challenging legality of the State Insurance Board's order boosting insurance premiums an average of 13.4 per cent.

In asking the court to set aside the recent order, which hiked some key liability and collision rates more than 20 per cent, Bader maintained that the state law under which premiums are set is unconstitutional.

He also criticized the Board's allowance of 37 per cent of premium income for company expenses and its failure to consider the investment income of insurance firms in fixing rates.

Bader pointed out that Texas laws virtually make it mandatory that Texans buy auto insurance. Therefore, the arbitrary increase in rates violates due process of law.

Another factor cited by Bader is that the Board failed to take into consideration the actual operating expenses of the insurance companies affected.

He also said that the accident rate is decreasing.

For these and other reasons he contends that the new rate, to become effective on August 1, is grossly excessive.

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Chinese Elm Trees Are Threatened With Extinction

Red River County's Chinese elm trees are threatened with extinction by an invasion of the elm leaf beetle, according to Bob Moody, County Agent. Only an immediate and intensive preventive program by property owners can alleviate the problem, Moody said.

The recommended treatment is spraying thoroughly with insecticide at least twice at weekly intervals, and preferably for three or four weeks. Some effective insecticides are: malathion, sevin, and DDT, all mixed strictly in accordance with directions on the label. The entire leaf area of the tree should be thoroughly saturated with the solution to kill the larvae deposited by the insect, Moody said, in addition to the trunk and the ground area under the tree.

The damage is caused by the larvae consuming the entire leaf structure of the tree, depriving the tree of the photosynthetic process of manufacturing plant food. An invasion of the beetles leads almost inevitably to destruction of the trees, unless corrective measures are taken.

Moody said that the invasion is widespread throughout Texas and can lead to the extinction of the Chinese elm unless a spray schedule is set up and maintained. Reports reaching the County Agent's office indicate that the Clarksville area, with many elm trees, is almost completely infested. The first effect to be noticed is the leaf turning brown, followed by a complete stripping of the leaves by the insects.

Spray treatment should be continued at least twice and, preferably, three or four applications at weekly intervals. One treatment is of little value, Moody stated.

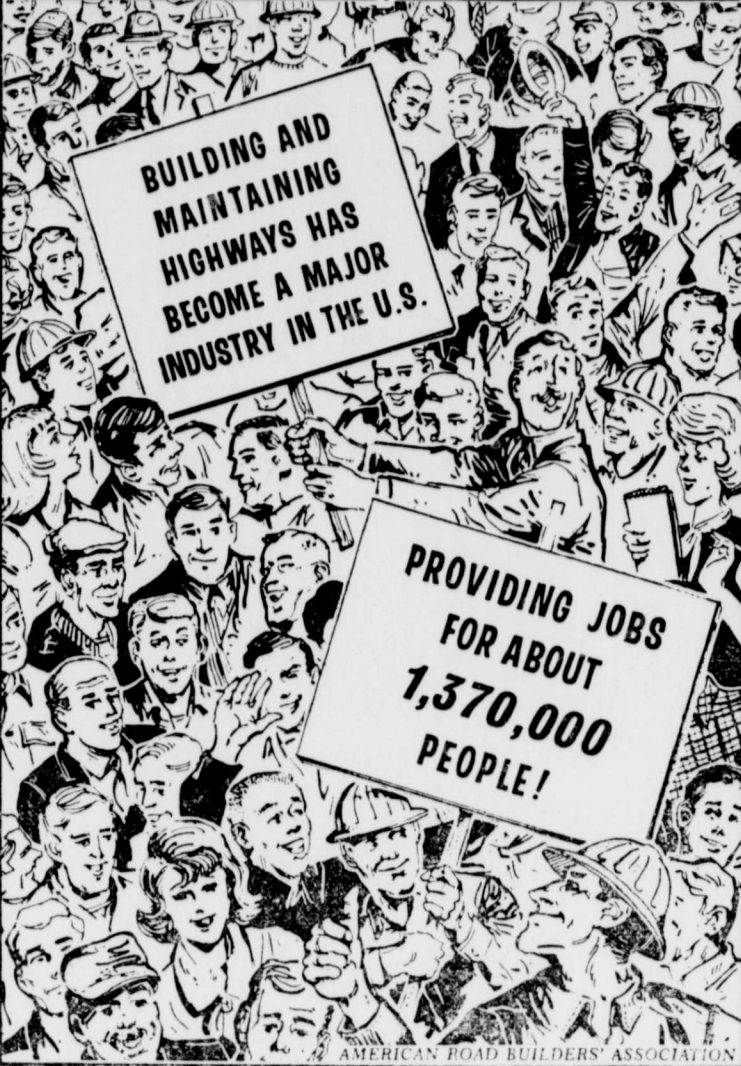
