# Talco - Bogata Sch. Board News

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools met in regular session on Tuesday, July 7, 1970 at 8:00 p. m. at Rivercrest. Four members were present. Alvis Tabor, representative of the Vibra-Whirl Company, met with the Board to discuss building an all-weather track on the Rivercrest campus. Mr. Tabor stated that a complete track with all Lecilities could be constructed for Approximately \$36,000. The Board decided that final action cn the matter would be postponed until all dirt work was completed on the track site.

Larry Tucker, high school principal, met with the Board to discuss the track as well as other matters pertaining to the assignment of teachers at Rivercrest for the coming school year.

The Board accepted the resignation of M. L. Barron who has been employed as high school principal with the Redwater Schools; Eva Watkins who has been employed as librarian with the Clarksville Schools; and Kay Webb who resigned because of personal reasons.

Ray Miller was employed as junior high coach and teacher in the Talco School. Mr. Miller is araduate of Talco and is pres-ently attending East Texas State University. Jerry Russell was approved as a bus driver replacing B. B. Rindman who is moving from the district.

Approval was given by the Board to incorporate the new sick leave policy for teachers as passed by the 61st Legislature with the present sick leave policy of the district. The superintendent is to present the new plan for Board consideration at a future meeting.

The Board approved the administering of a test for the purpose of establishing eligibility for the Founadtion Kndergarten Program to all students who will be at least 5 years and 5 months of age as of September 1, 1970. Beginning with the 1970-71 school year, each school district must offer a Kindergaten Program to students meeting this age requirement provided they come from families whose annual income is \$3,000 or less and/or the child is educationally handicapped. Superintendent Talmadge Morgan stated that the test to determine eligibility for the pro-

SHORT SNORTS reau of the Census. The '70 census was taken by

two methods: by mail-out and mail-back of questionnaires in most major metropolitan areas and by census takers in the rest of the United States. The latter procedure entailed the mailing out of questionnaires and subsequent visits by census takers who would pick up filled-out forms or, lacking this, interview families while following a house-to-house route.

Canvassing in the metropolitan areas required checking of addresses by postal employees before the mailout. A similar step is now being taken by mailmen following the visits by census takers.

This is the procedure: When census district offices completed their preliminary counts, they turned over to the post office a set of white cards listing every address canvassed. The mailmen, turn, check these addresses against the households on their routes. If the mailman discovers what he considers a "missed" address, he fills out a blue card noting this fact. The blue cards are referred to the Census Bureau, which will check them against the census records.

The Census Bureau has found from experience that many households for which such cards are filled out have already been enumerated. This can happen for a number of reasons. For instance, some people get mail at two or more addresses, or there may be differences in the way a rural address is described.

The Census Bureau will check the blue cards turned in by mailmen and then take appropriate steps to provide a complete census count.
