Burglars Strike Jones & Bonham

Investigation continued in the \$4,000 burglary Wednesday night of the Jones & Bonham dry goods store on Broad Street.

The burglary was discovered by the owner, Harold Bonham, who, when opening the store Thursday morning, noted that one of the male dummies in the window was without a coat. Inside the store he found that a large portion of the stock of men's clothing and accessories had been taken, plus some women's slacks, besides his wife's summer clothing which was in storage there.

Effort had been made to enter the store by the back door and the rear door of Talco State Bank, in the same block, had been tried, also unsuccessfully. The burglars finally made entry by prying open the store's front door. Titus County law officers and Texas Rangers were conducting the investigation.

Girl Scout Cookies Now On Sale

The Girl Scout cookies have arrived and will be on sale Friday. Two hundred and forty boxes are in the shipment to the two Talco troops. Five kinds of cookies are being sold by the girls: Pecanettes, a chocolate chip cookie with pecans, butter flavored shorties, the personal favorite Girl Scout cookies loved by young children and a standby for use in desserts; mint, a chocolate covered mint cookies; peanut butter, a crisp oatmeal cookie with peanut butter fillings; and assorted sandwich. All varieties retain their freshness for several months when frozen.

The family size boxes being sold for one dollar are attractively packaged. A new feature is that these large boxes are really small boxes wrapped together; when one section is empty it can be snapped off to save storage space. This protects the freshness of the unused portion.

The direct sale of cookies will be conducted for two weeks ending March 18. Local troops plan to sell all of theirs before that date, according to Mrs. Larry Tucker, Cookie Captain for the Talco troops.

Austin. — Insurance again made headline news on three fronts here.

● President Nixon's Phase 2 inflation controls, the State Insurance Board said, will mean lower premium rates for hundreds of thousands of Texas homeowners.

● Lawmakers threatened to "put the state in the insurance business" unless rates are reduced for a new catastrophe pool designed to protect hurricane and other disaster-prone areas.

● An American Insurance Association executive offered to "guarantee" that no-fault auto insurance in Texas would bring a minimum cue of 25 per cent in bodily injury and property damage coverage rates.

New homeowners' insurance rates are expected to be issued May 1, effective June 1. A federal price commission order of a 37.5 per cent cut in the Board's "trend factor" (aimed at keeping rates up with normal inflation) may mean a reduction of 2.1 per cent in the Central Inland Territory. Usual rating formulas would have meant an increase of 5.9 per cent there.

While most fire and extended coverage rates will go up, the rise will be lower than expected due to the new federal limits.

The State Insurance Board proposes to cut catastrophe pool rates for non-beach property about a third. Insurance companies strongly resisted. Legislators at a rate hearing retorted that the state may have to get into the insurance business.

Under the pool, authorized last year by the legislature, insurance companies are required to join in providing coverage for areas of the coast which cannot buy policies in the regular market.

The State Board of Insurance is studying effects of various no-fault insurance plans which provide compensation from a driver's own policy regardless of whether he was at fault in an accident.

MORE TIME SOUGHT — Texas is seeking more time to avoid loss of \$24 million in highway funds.

Gov. Preston Smith has asked U. S. Secretary of Transportation John Volpe to extend the deadline for adopting prohibitions against additional erection of billboards adjacent to interstate and primary highways. A transportation department hearing officer proposed a May 31 deadline for the state act. Smith asked until September 1, start of the new fiscal year.

The Governor noted a special session of the legislature must be called to enact appropriations for the fiscal year beginning September 1.

The session may be timed before May 31, Smith said, but a later date would be "preferable."

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes said the potential penalty of \$24 million for lack of a billboard act demands that Smith call an immediate special session of the legislature.

To Participate In Talco - Bogata School News

Barney Barnwell, Talco FFA member, will be participating in the world's largest calf scramble during the 1972 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo at the Friday night performance, March 3. Of the 388 boys who participate, half of them will be successful in winning a calf of his own. Since its beginning the scramble has put more than one million dollars in livestock in the hands of Texas youth.

At each performance 24 boys are lined up within a square in the center of the Astrodome, and 12 calves are turned loose. At a signal, the boys race after the calves, the idea being to place a halter on a calf and bring it into the square. The 12 boys who accomplish this receive a calf certificate for either a dairy or beef calf, which has been donated by businessmen in the area. With his cash certificate he purchases the best animal he can find. He must then take care of the calf, furnish monthly records to the Houston Livestock Show and his sponsor, then return his animal to the Show next year to be shown in either the Junior Dairy or Junior Breeding Beef Division of the Houston Livestock Show.

The purpose of the Calf Scramble is to encourage and further the education of 4-H Club boys and FFA boys in the raising, feeding and breeding of high quality cattle in Texas. 5,817 calves have been awarded in this program. Dates for the 1972 Houston Show are February 23 through March 5, with the first two days set aside solely for livestock judging and sales.

Tomorrow's Housekeeping

I've seen so many items recently about ways to save household money. And who doesn't want to do that, these days?

Some of the ideas, though, are so far out they seem hardly worth the time and trouble. I just came across one that suggests cutting

instances, it can perform as well as specialized products which tend to cost a good deal more.

For example, 1/4 cup of Lestoil to a gallon of water makes a dandy ceramic tile cleaner. The cost for cleaning an entire bathroom? Less than 6¢! Just apply with a damp mop, sponge or cloth. No rinsing needed!

If the grout between the tiles is especially grimy, apply a little full-strength liquid cleaner to the dingy areas. Let it soak in for about 10 minutes. Then go over the grout with a brush. Anything from a scrubbing brush to a discarded toothbrush will work. Rinse with clear water. The grout will look new!



A good all-purpose heavy duty cleaner like Lestoil also will shine up bathroom faucets and the chrome trim on refrigerators or stoves just as well as a metal polish — and without any danger of scratching. Simply apply it full-strength on a damp sponge or cloth, then rinse and wipe away.

Open house will be held in the church Sunday afternoon from 2 until 4 p. m. All former pastors and members and the public are invited to attend.

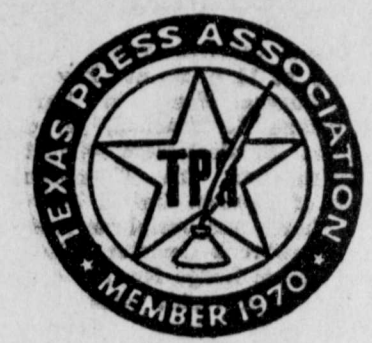

HEARTY WAFFLES



A waffle according to the dictionary is a soft but crisp indented cake made of batter and cooked in a waffle iron. This definition just barely covers the versatile waffle. We made our batter with CREAM OF WHEAT Cereal and added some minced cooked ham and a dash of mustard for flavor.

HEARTY WAFFLES

- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup CREAM OF WHEAT Cereal, Instant, Quick or Regular
- 1/2 cup dairy sour cream
- 1 teaspoon powdered mustard
- 1 cup cooked ham, minced
- 3 eggs, well beaten
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- Maple syrup
- Ripe bananas, sliced

Pour milk over cereal; allow to stand 10 minutes or longer. Blend sour cream, mustard and ham; add eggs. Stir in cereal and oil. Sift dry ingredients together; fold in. Pour into preheated waffle iron. Cook until steam ceases and waffles are golden brown. Serve with maple syrup and sliced bananas. Makes five 7-inch round or four 9-inch square waffles.
