The Board of Trustees of the Talco - Bogata Schools met in regular session at Rivercrest on Tuesday, March 7 at 7:00 p. m. with six of the seven Board members present and two patrons from Talco.

In major action taken by the Board, teachers were employed for the 1972-73 school year. Auxiliary employees, which includes secretaries, teacher aides, bus drivers, janitors, and cafeteria workers will be employed at the next meeting of the Board on April 4th. Persons in the district interested in positions of this nature may make application thru Superintendent Talmadge Mor-

gan at Rivercrest. Mrs. Sandra Stockton was employed for the remainder of the school year at Talco as a 3rd grade teacher replacing Mrs. Janie McDonald who died as a result of automobile injuries the early part of February. Mrs. Stockton has a degree in elementary education and has three years' experience teaching in elementary grads.

Board approval was given to installing necessary stage lighting in the auditorium at Rivercrest through the use of NDEA Title III Funds to be matched by an equal amount from the Building Fund in the 1972-73 school budget. Austn. -Leaders of both Democratic and Republican state parties will meet March 13 for major decisions as well as routine housekeeping duties.

Texas law requires eexcutive committees of political parties on that date to certify statewide candidates, set ratios for state convention delegate selection, fix hours and sites for June 13 and September 19 state conventions and select a place to canvass May 6 primary returns.

National GOP Committeeman Peter O'Donnell Jr. gave Republicans something else to think about when he unexpectedly submitted his resignation, the vacancy to be filled at the statutory R. E. C. meeting in Austin.

State Rep. Fred Agnich of Dallas is the overwhelming choice to succeed O'Donnell as committeeman, and may get the job unopposed.

Time is also getting close for Republicann to adopt a formal set of written rules for operation of party conventions and regular operations, although that is considered no great problem for the GOP.

Rules writing is a problem of major proportions for Democrats. April 6 is the deadline under new state law for tha perties to submit their roles drafts to the secretary of state.

Democrats are expecten to make a choice at the March 13 meeting between a set of rules drawn under direction of William R. Anderson Jr. of Corpus Christi and watered-down draft which opponents claim perpetuates the winner-take-all system of convention operations.

Supporters of the Anderson rules claim a majority of the State Democratic Executive Committee will adopt them in preference to the alternative which has SREC rules sub-committee approval.

Rumors persist that SDEC Chairman Roy Orr of DeSoto may resign his post at the Austin meeting. Gov. Preston Smith is backing Anderson to succeed. him. Orr early this year became and questions have been raised about his holding both positions.

COURTS SPEAK - Texas Supreme Court has agreed to decide whether party primary election costs can be paid from state funds without special legislative authorization.

The High Court heard arguments in the historic case Monday (March 6). Secretary of State Bob Bullock claims he has power to make rules for conduct and financing of the May and June primaries. Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin maintains only the legislature can provide the mon-- in this case via special ses-Martin tried unsuccessfully to prevent Bullock from bringing the mandamus action against Comptroller Robert S. Calvert to force payment of two minor pre-

liminary election bills. Court of Criminal Appeals has held that probation cannot be revoked for association with disreputable persons unless it can be shown the probationer knew of the reputations of his friends.

For Highway 271 Sch. Honor Roll Right-Of-Way

The Texas Highway Commission today approved a \$200-million, two-year Consolidated Highway Program throughout the

The program calls for rightof-way acquisition. construction and re-construction of US-and State-numbered highways. On such highways, the State shares right-of-way cost 50-50 with local governments.

Work authorized in Lamar County includes the following: 1. An allotment of \$80,000 to complete financing of the construction of grading, structures

and subbase for U.S. 271, a 3.7 mile section, from Loop 480. Southeast to 0.5 mile South of 2. An allotment of \$13,000 to

complete financing of the rightof-way and \$1,369.000 to finance the construction of grading, structures and subbase for two additional lanes on U.S. Highway 82 from U. S. 82 West of Paris to 0.2 miles West of U. S. 271, a distance of 3.4 milts.

3. An allotment of \$100,000 for partial finance for State's portion of cost of right-of-way needed to provide a four-lane highway from Loop 286 Southeast of Paris to Red River County Line. a distance of 14.1 miles.

The approvals will continue the piece-by-piece four laning of Loop 286 around Paris. The northeast segment is about ready for letting for bids now.

The appropriation of \$100,000 for U. S. 271 four-laning rightof-way is the Highway Commission's first firm commitment toward four-laning U. S. 271 from Paris to the southaest. This was understood to be part of the plan for purchasing the old Paris & Mt. Pleasant Railroad right-ofway which now belongs to TP&L. It parellels U. S. 271 and provides needed right-of-way for the four-laning.

Work in Lamar County will be under the supervision of Mr. R. L. Stauter, Supervising Resident Engineer, Paris.

Hood - Talco, Clerks.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 8:00 o'clock a. m. to 7:00 o'clock p. m.

4. Martha Gibson is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting. 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
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
