Law Enforcement Talco - Bogata Grants Approved School News

Austin. - Two grants totaling \$38.921 to Ark-Tex Council of Governments, Texarkana, were approved today by Governor Preston Smith

The money will come from the Criminal Justice Council, which oversees statewide law enforcement planning and administers funds from the U.S. Department of Justice for crime control projects in Texas.

Approved was a \$19,460 grant for a regional law enforcement civil disorder project. Participating agencies are sheriff's departments of Bowie, Cass, Franklin, Lamar, Morris, Red River and Titus counties and police departments of Texarkana, Wake Village, Hooks, New Boston. De-Kalb, Atlanta, Paris. Lone Star, Naples, Clarksville and Daingerfield. These agencies will function as a regional committee on riot and disorder control and have agreed to a regional riot control plan. Grant provides for purchase of equipment, protective wear, chemical agents and weapons, and riot control training for peace officers. Cash match of \$6,487 will be provided.

Also approved was a \$19,461 grant to provide basic and advanced training courses for police officers of the region. Ark-Tex, Deep East Texas and East Texas Councils of Governments have pooled their grant monies to contract with Kilgore Junior College to provide a law enforcement training program for most of East Texas. Ark-Tex COG will train 29 officers in basic training courses and 162 men in specialized and advanced courses. Grantee will be required to furnish \$39,427 in-kind match from the operating budgets of the local agencies that send the officers to the schools.

Counties in the Ark-Tex region besides those taking part in the civil disorder control project are Delta and Hopkins.

The two grant applications were among 34 totaling \$1,333 .-746 considered by the CJC Executive Committee May 12.

Austin. - State agencies received a recent warning to renew efforts to recruit minority group and women employees "before they are confronted with ultimatum and deadlines" from Washington and federal courts.

The agencies were reminded by the Governor's Committee on Human Relations staff that jurisdiction of the Equal Opportunity Commission has been extended to cover local and state governments.

EOC will be giving "very critical examinations" to state employment practices, Committee on Human Relations Director James R. Ray wrote the agencies and departments.

Federal law goes farthtr than the state statute making it unlawful to discriminate against a person because of race, religion, color or national origin. The U. S. law also bars discrimination on the basis of sex.

Each state agency, advised Ray, will have to submit a detailed action plan to prove non-discrimination.

"In other words, you will not be able to prove non-discrimination without a federally-approved plan for recruitment of minorities and women for all levels of employment in your agency or department," the state units of government were told.

"Historically, the main concern of (EEOC) has been with numbers or quotas, and claims of recruitment difficulties have been summarily rejected as valid exthe Human Relations Committee staff maintained.

"Significant steps" were applauded within the state government during recent years to achieve equal employment oppor-

MENDED - A task force composed of legal professional leaders, judges and legislators has joined in recommending modernization of the Texas court sys-

The group, headed by State Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert, released a draft of its proposal at a meeting here. Highlights include:

Merging the State Supreme Court and Court of Criminal Apyeals, giving courts of civil appeals authority to hear criminal as well as civil cases, merging overlapping district courts and providing a single district court with multiple judges for metropolitan counties, creating a statewide system of new county-level courts with judges who are law-

yers to replace all present courts below district level, setting up a system of administration by a statewide administrator and deputies under the chief justice of Texas, selection of judges in nonpartisan elections or by gubernatorial appointments and requir-

ing that all judges be lawyers. FIFTY-ONE COUNTIES NOW POVERTY AREAS - Fifty-one counties are now designated as poverty areas for Hill-Burton hospital construction aid. Those counties may receive up to 90 per cent of money for constructing hospitals and related facilities from the federal program.



RM. 16:16 Preacher: John Wright

The Title "Pastor" (Lesson 2) Please re-read lesson one. The Greek word "poimen" is translated just one time in the New Testament as "pastor," "and he gave some, apostles; and some. evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers," Eph. 4:11. It is translated "shepherd" other places it is used. The meaning of the word is one who tends a flock as well as feeds the flock, to protect, to guide. A study of this word. in the context where different words are used to refer to the same men, will allow us to see who "Pastors" are according to Bible definition and not definition. Acts 20:17 says, "And from Miletus he (Paul) sent to Ephesus, and called the elders of the church. In Acts 20:28, while still talking to the elders of the church at Ephesus, Paul uses terms describing the work of the elders that help us to know that elders, overseers or bishops, and pastors or sheepherds are the same men. "Take heed therefore unto yourselves. and to all the flock. over the which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers, to feed the church of God, which he hath purchased with his own blood." The "yourselves" in the first part refers back to the elders mentioned in verse 17. In the middle of the verse he uses the greek word "Episkopous" which is translated overseers. This word is translated bishop in some places that this greek word is used. The word bishop means overseer. Just after this reference he says these elders. these overseers or bishops are "to feed" the church of God. "To feed" is translated from the greek word "poiemen" which was translated Pastors in

Eph. 4:11. Thus from these verses we are able to see that this inspired writer calls this one group of men by three different titles or terms pertaining to their work. He calls them elders. overseers

(a word sometimes translated bishop), and tells them to feed the church and does this by using a word that is translated pastor in Eph. 4:11. Let's adhere to the Bible in all of its teaching, "whosoever transgresseth, and abideth not in the doctrine of Christ hath not God," 2 Jn. 9.
