Mrs. A. L. Stalls **Rites Wednesday**


Mrs. A. L. Stalls, Deport's oldnative born resident, died early Monday morning after several years failing health. She had been a patient at McCuistion Hospital in Paris since last Wednesday. Mrs. Stalls made her home at the Deport Nursing Home for four years.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 2:00 p. m. at the Presbyterian Church with the pastor, Rev. Sam Rice, officiating. Grant Funeral Home made burial in Highland Cemetery.

Survivors are two sons, Jess Stalls of Deport, Troy Stalls of Denver, Colo,; two daughters. Miss Clara Stalls of Dallas and Mrs. J. R. McSkimming of Los Angeles, Calif; also a sister, Mrs. Frank Welch of Sherman and a brother, John Thompson of Lubbock; five grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Stalls. daughter of Col. Dee and Mattie Ann (Grant) Thompson was born January 29, 1880. Her birthplace was located near where the American Legion building now stands at the north end of Main Street. She married Arthur L. Stalls Dec. 13, 1899 and they lived in Deport their entire wedded life. Mr. Stalls died in 1964. Another daughter, Evelyn, preceded her parents in death.

She attended school in Deport. Her paternal grandfather, John L: Thompson, gave the land for Deport's first school and for the Presbyterian Church. Deport was named for her father. Col. Dee Thompson. A Presbyterian since she was ten years old, she taught a ladies Sunday School class for many years and this class is named for her, "The Euna Stalls Class."

Austin. - The long-awaited special finance session of the Texas Legislature has been called for 10 a. m., June 14. Gov. Preston Smith issued the

official proclamation last week, stating repeatedly he plans to present a 1973 budget which will require no new taxes. The governor, who has implied he would veto a tax bill. said he

does not think lawmakers can pass one without his placing the subject of revenue on the special session agenda. Under the proclamation. Smith will allow legislators to consider

"such other subjects as the governor may submit from time to time." However, he made clear

does not plan to open the call to any other business until the 1973 budget - financing state operations from Sept. 1, 1972 - August 31, 1973 — is finally passed. Smith vetoed all 1973 fiscal year appropriations adopted by the legislature during the 1971

regular session. In anticipation of more federal aid (that never was received), the Legislature did not enact a 1973 welfare budget - which made a special session inevitable even without the governor's veto.

A proposed state officials' code of ethics and a recommendation for repeal of a controversial new trailer brake law are among items to be offered the special session for action after passage of the appropriations act.

There is some speculation Smith may try to avoid the need for new taxes by proposing a welfare finance act covering less than a full fiscal year. This would leave the balance of 1973 welfare appropriations as emergency business for the regular session next year.



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
