Gov. Dolph Briscie said new taxation must be avoided - for the second legislative session in 20 years - and offered a budget which would require no new rev-

Further, the Briscoe budget would leave \$300 million in unobligated funds on the table to meet unforeseen court developmnts in th public school finance case and uncertainties of welfare spending requirements.

Briscoe's no-new-tax proposals met generally favorable reaction from legislative leaders and rankand-file legislators, although on, Wanda Goates, Dudley R. some differed with him on speci-

The governor delivered to a joint session of the House and Senate a \$9.6 billion biennial appropriation recommendation -\$391.6 million above the present Patti Huey, Jean Ann Norman, level of general revenue outlays and federal revenue-sharing in-

> Even with the addition and the holding back of \$300 million, Briscoe was \$173.1 million under former Gov. Preston Smiths last budget draft for 1974-1975, and \$91.6 million below the Legislative Budget Board's recommendations.

He recommended \$240.3 million more for education; an \$111.3 million increase for the state departments and agencies; \$29 million more of public health, hospitals, mental retardation and youth institutions and \$11 million more for the courts and legislature.

While governor's budget recommendations are generally ignored, Briscoe's were promised careful review, although House and Senate appropriations bill drafters had already concluded their hearings whe nhe offered his set of figures.

EDITORS HERE FOR INTER-VIEWS - Texas newspaper editors will converge on Austin Monday, March 19, to seek "editorial" and "column" material. Legislative Day for editors will feature meetings with Governor Briscoe, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, Speaker Price Daniel Jr., Sec. of State Mark White and Atty. Gen. John Hill - and hometown legislators.

Current issues of interest to Texas editors and publishers include revision of the Constitution, judicial reform. penal code reform, drug laws, election laws and "reform legislative package" by Speaker Daniel. It includes revisions of the Open Meetings Law, Free Flow of Information Bill - newsman's privilege measure - and Open Records Bill.

INFORMATION BILLS TO ADVANCE - Lieutenant Governor Hobby said he is optimistic that a strong press "shield" law an da tougher open meetings bill will clear the senate soon.

The lieutenant governor said th shield law will not only protect newsmen from having to divulge sources of confidential information but also will grant privilege to all information they obtain in the course of their offi-

cial duties. HB 10 - the House-passed shield bill - got a rough reception in the Senate Jurisprudence Committee last week, but Sen. Chet Brooks of Pasadena said that doesn't mean it is logjammed there.

"The hearing just provided an opportunity for some members of the Senate to vent their hostility against the press," said Brooks.

LEASE SALE NETS MILLION-An oil and gas lease sale on state-owned lands -largest since 1-966 - brought the state \$7,451,278 in bonus payments for the permanent school

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong said renewed interest in oil and gas production on state lands is due largely to increased demands for energy fuels.

A total of 113,737 acres were leased at an average per acre price of \$65.51.

For the first time in recent years, the highest bid was over one million dollars. Houston Oil and Minerals Corporation bid \$1.5 million for 394 acres in Galveston County submerged tract.

CONSTITUTIONAL REVIS-ION BEGINS - The 37-member State Constitutional Revision commission held its first meeting Saturday after legislators failed to register enough protests to block appointments;

The Commission was bombarded with criticism because its ranks did not include more women, blacks, Mexican-Americans and youth. Several areas of the state also felt they were insufficiently represented on the blue ribbon body.

First task of the Commission will be selection of a staff, choosing quarters and dividing into subcommittees to split up work which must be completed by November. The Legislature will convene as a Constitutional Convention next January, and a 10member legislative committee has been authorized to plan that historic session.

THE U. S. POSTAL SERVICE. Neither change of name, nor zip codes, nor increased charges, nor fancy machinery, nor office losings, nor decreased deliveries, nor eliminated town names have really helped the Postal Service in along with Director William the proper performance of its appointed duties. Remembering for the Regional Solo and Enthat the mail service was one of th few functions of government specifically provided for in the Troutt preseted a trumpet trio Constitution - "The Congress shall have Power . . To establish Post Offices and post Roads . ." and firmly believing that the U. are now eligible for state com-S. Mail should be returned to the people, I have introduced H. R. 5296 to abolish th Postal Service and re-establish the U.S. Post Office Department.

SERVICE PENSION. The tragic decrease in VA pensions for World War I veterans and their dependents due to increased social security payments - in some cases resulting in an overall loss in total income - emphasizing the urgent need for a pension based on service alone without regard to other income. World War I veterans now average over 76 years of age and they and their dependents deserve the same pension benefits that the U. S. has provided to veterans of all earlier wars. I have, therefore, re-introduced my World War I general service pension bill (H.R. 5243 of the 93rd Con-

NOVEMBER 11 is a significant date for veterans because it is the anniversary of the 1918 Armistice ending World War I and for half a century has marked the traditional observance of Veterans Day. I have, therefore. introduced H. R. 5295 to restore November 11 as Veterans Day.

LITTLE CYPRESS RESER-VOIR. Economic growth in the Little Cypress Basin of East Texas continues at a rapid rate. Looking ahead to increased future water requirements for municipal, industrial, and recreational use and for protection against flooding, I have re-introduced my bill providing for the construction of the Little Cypress Lake and Reservoir (H. R. 5297). Such capital improvements are an investment that will benefit the entire nation for generations to come.

FARM ACREAGE BRINGS RECORD PRICES. While the average for U. S. farmland is \$230 per acre, prices are up to \$1,200 and over in Connecticut and New Jersey where population pressures are most severe. Lowest prices are found in New Mexico and Wyoming where farmland averages \$48 per acre. Georgia acreage has gone up 91% in the past 5 years and now averages over \$300 per acre. During the same period, Texas farmland prices rose 43% with a state average of \$175 per acre. In just one year, from 1971 to 1972, the entire Gulf Southwest saw an increase of at least 10% per acre of farmland.







ment in Southeast Asia, the U.S. must start paying more attention to its relations with North Atlantic allies. A good starting point is the Atlantic Union Resolution now before Congress. This resolution calls on Congress to create a delegation to organize and participate in a convention of North Atlantic Treaty nations. Purpose of the convention: to explore the possibilities of a formalized federal union of these democratic countries.

The creation of a supranational government of mature democracies should be weither accepted nor rejected summarily. It deserves careful

Supporters see North Atlantic unity as the best hope for preservation of trans-national peace, economic stabil-ity, quality of life. No one can deny the validity of these objectives.

The concept of such a union is workable. The U.S. political system is a standout example.

Youth for Federal Union, Washington, D.C., a new educational group advocating a federated union of the world's mature democracies, presents this argument for the proposal:

"Scientific development and technology rush on irrespective of national boundaries. So does economic devel-

opment. The multi-national corporation is commonplace. Social phenomena, such as the youth culture, are not restricted to national boundaries. Poverty and disease do not stop at the border. Nor do environmental problems of air and water pollution. Unity among nations is the way to solve problems of pollution, population, trade barriers, travel restriction and

Support for the federal union concept cuts across par-ty and ideological lines. In

1966 President Nixon said: "It is fitting that the United States, the world's first federal government, should be the main force behind the effort to find a basis for a broad federation of free Atlantic nations. Recent events of history and numerous technological advances of the past 20 years point the way in this direction.

Hubert H. Humphrey, in explaining why he favors the Atlantic Union resolution, says it is time "to explore with our NATO allies a federal union answer to the challenge of how to unite effectively and democratically the great moral and material strength of these free people.'

A number of prominent citizens in and out of government tend to disagree on many issues but unite on the principle that our North Atlantic alliances should be strengthened. We must unite, they say, against our problems before the problems unite against us.

How the strengthening of this alliance can best be achieved is certainly open to debate. Formalized federal union is a possibility that deserves closer attention by both the American people and the Congress.
