Wright Patman's Weekly Letter

1st Congressional Dist. of Texas "Heart of the Gulf Southwest"

FROM ARISTOTLE TO CAL COOLIDGE. Both gentlemen believed that money should have a constant value since it is our guarantee that the wages we earn today will buy food for tomorrow. President Coolidge said in 1922 that inflation was "repudiation" — a fact which his party 50 years later would do well to remember. Inflation is the Black Plague of our society. While the wealthy may think they can escape its consequences, they are mistaken because in the long run everyone loses. Inflation, which destroys the purchasing power of money, must be brought under control, and I have introduced H. R. 6168 to roll back prices and interest rates to levels lower than those prevailing on March 16, and to extend the Economic Stabilization Act for one year. This is a tough no-nonsense bill that keeps faith with the wage earner, the housewife, and all those who live on pensions and other fixed income.

HOW HELPING OTHERS HELPS ALL TEXANS. Last year, the Texas Rehabilitation Commission successfully rehabilitated 21,907 handicapped people, more than any other State. These people are now employed, with a combined income of almost \$78 million, as compared with about -13 million before rehabilitation, much of which was received from Welfare payments. In our own First Congressional District, 705 persons were successfully rehabilitated and were able to become largely self-sufficient citizens. It is easily seen that the money spent to help these people is a sound investment, since handicapped individuals who are restored to gainful employment get off the Welfare rolls and pay taxes during the balance of their working lives in an amount many times greater than the cost of the help they receive.

A MEAN VETO. The above figures represent an outstanding achievement by our Texas officials, but much more needs to be done. Therefore, it is tragic that this Administration has vetoed the Vocational Rehabilitation Act, which included Federal funds for this very worthwhile work. It remains to be seen whether the Congress can summon sufficient support to vote to override the veto.

This book by Dale Carnegie is considered by many to be the outstanding practical guide for people who want to learn to get along well with others and to make the most of their potential for successful human relations at home, at school, and at work. Because I think it is tremendously helpful to young people I have just completed mailing a free copy of this book to each member of the senior class in 94 high schools in our First Congressional District — a total of 6,598 copies.

Austin. — The complex job of rewriting the 97-year-old State Constitution began officially last week with initial work sessions of the new Constitutional Revision Commission.

Commissioners outlined plans for a series of public hearings in 18 areas.

The hearings will be held between now and next fall in Houston, Dallas - Ft. Worth, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, McAllen, San Angelo, Lubbock, Longview, Wichita Falls, El Paso, Amarillo, Abilene, Midland - Odessa, Laredo, Tyler, Lufkin, Beaumont - Port Arthur-Orange and Austin. Chairman Robert W. Calvert, former Texas Supreme Court judge, said the hearings will "determine largely whether people accept the final product."

The 37-member Commission heard advice from a large group of experts, then divided into seven sub-committees to study specific areas of the Constitution which one of the advisors labeled an "appalling" document.

Revision Commissioners received these key bits of advice:

- Do the best job they can of streamlining the Constitution, but be prepared for the Legislature to "water down their recommendations."

- Don't try "to solve the problems but make clear who solves the problem."

- Sweep out detailed property tax provisions . . . get rid of the grants and loans prohibition and provide "home rule" for counties.

The Commission will be backed up by a statewide advisory committee.

Revision drafts must be completed by November. The Legislature will convene January 1 as a constitutional convention.

OPEN MEETINGS BILL PASSES — An amended version of legislation to strengthen state laws requiring that the business of state government be conducted in public has been finally passed by the Senate.

A much-revised version of the bill to shield newsmen's sources state. Length of immunity is vetoed in the Senate calendar with Jurisprudence Committee blessing.

The Texas Joint Media Committee representatives and "Common Cause," the people's lobby, termed the open meetings bill as passed by the Senate an improvement over both present law and the Jurisprudence Committee bill.

One controversial section of the latter was amended to allow closed sessions on "negotiated contracts" only for gifts or donations to the government. The bill would allow private sessions of governing bodies to discuss purchase, exchange, lease or value of real estate — but not the sale of property. Also stricken from the Committee bill was a provision for closed sessions with attorneys on "possible avoidance of litigation."

Remaining as exemptions from open meetings guarantees are a wide range of discussions of personnel matters including "employment evaluation."

The revised shield bills would allow forced disclosure of information and sources on mandamus by the State Supreme Court which could be sought by any individual to prevent "substantial harm or injury . . . or substantial injustice."

Association called for immediate revaccination of all horses for Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (V.E.E.).

The Association said 100 per cent immunity can be established and reservoirs of the disease eliminated. It urged revaccination of all horses vaccinated in 1971, vaccination of all newborns, those six months of age and older and those coming into the state. Length of immunity is uncertain.

COURTS SPEAK — Persons who have sexual relations with wives or husbands of others can be sued for damages, the State Supreme Court held.

The High Court turned down an appeal of a Dallas lawyer who lost his license after a jury found he asked a client for \$500 more than his legal fee, allegedly to prosecute an assistant district attorney.

The Supreme Court set a hearing April 25 over whether Austin could sell 32 acres of park land to a school district without an approving vote of local residents.

The Court of Criminal Appeals overturned convictions for sale of heroin (an 1,800 year sentence from Ector County) and possession of marijuana (25 year sentence from Tarrant County) due to judicial error.

A Lipscomb County youth ordered fined and jailed for aggravated assault on a deputy sheriff he called a "pig" won a new trial on appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals, which held the boy's contention that he was resisting what he considered unlawful arrest should have been presented to the trial jury.

AG OPINIONS — A bill (HB 168) proposing to give the governor authority over state agencies and require submission of quarterly expenditure plans is unconstitutional, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

Hill said, however, the legislature might confer on the governor's discretion to approve or disapprove expenditures of funds appropriated to restructured agencies discharging only duties which could be constitutionally discharged by the governor.

In other recent opinions, Hill held:

- A district judge has discretion to grant a prisoner credit for pre-trial time spent in jail between trial and final conviction and must give credit for time spent in jail awaiting determination of appeal. However, he cannot reduce a sentence due to good behavior and prisoner reform.

- Hunting club employees can carry firearms but unless they are law enforcement officers have no more right to enforce the law or to protect the club property than any other individual.

- An individual convicted of a felony three years ago, and is now on probation, is not qualified to be appointed a deputy sheriff.

SHORT SNORTS

Gov. Dolph Briscoe went to Washington to protest that new federal regulations would destroy the social services program in Texas for non-welfare recipients and increase welfare rolls.

A bill to set up a "little Hoover commission" on reorganization of the executive branch of state government finally won Senate approval and now goes to the House for consideration.

August and September primary election dates received Senate approval.

GED Test At PJC Saturday, Apr. 7

The General Educational Development (GED) test battery will be given at 8 a. m. Saturday April 7, in the Ballroom of the McLemore Student Center at Paris Junior College. Ken Dailey, counselor, will administer the test battery to persons unable to come during regular Wednesday testing sessions or those who prefer taking the test on Saturday.

Successful completion of the GED leads to issuance of a high school equivalency diploma from the State Department of Education. Testing fees are \$7.50 and should be paid prior to testing. No appointment is necessary, Dailey said.

According to the counselor, approximately 70 per cent of those who take the test complete it successfully. The average age of those taking the test at PJC is 30, Dailey said. He explained that persons failing to pass the test battery may retake it at no extra charge after a waiting period.

Texas residents must be at least 17 years of age and out of school one academic year to be eligible for the GED testing. Those 17 or 18 must obtain letters from their principals showing the last date they attended school.
