Austin. - Car and home owners had encouraging promises of lower insurance rates from highlevel sources last week.

· Gov. Dolph Briscoe threw his weight behind a modified form of competitive auto insurance rating, subject of an unsuccessful special legislative session last year.

· The State Board of Insurance issued new rules and regulations which it pledged would bring lower rates for fire, homeowners and extended coveragepol-

Basically, what both plans would do is permit companies to deviate from the standard rates issued annually by the Board.

A bill introduced in the House and Senate undertook to permit the auto deviations - either below or above the standard rate on showing that companies could make the change without endangering their solvency.

Companies would apply to the Board for deviated rates, and reductions (or increases) would be permitted if they meet tests of fairness to customers and financial stability for tre companies.

While Briscoe expressed confidence the bill, if enacted, would mean substantial rate cuts, some remained skeptical that the socalled high-risk driver wouldn't pay more under it.

Rate deviations on property insurance are permissible under state law and can be implemented by the Board's regulations.

Meanwhile, the House concurred in Senate amendments and sent to Briscoe HB 143 which would authorize \$2,500 medical payment and loss-of-income coverage for auto passengers. The coverage would be included in all liability policies unless specifically rejected. Whether the new law would help lower or raise rates was a subject of debate.

MEETINGS LAW SIGNED -Governor Briscoe signed into law legislation (HB 3) to strengthen open meetings and predicted it will bring more "responsiveness authorities and other special disopenness" to government. Stiffer fines and a jail term are provided for violators.

The newsman's shield bill to protect confidential sources of information went to conference committee, as expected and an attorney general's opinion concluded parts of the Senate revision are unconstitutional.

A Senate committee version of a new lobby control act was rapped by House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. as a "step backward" and by "Common Cause," the people's lobby, as "a joke." Changes were predicted after critics said the Senate panel bill is weaker than the 1957 act.

The Senate, meanwhile, passed another of Daniel's so-called reform bills prohibiting "legislative bribery" in exchange for support of a candidate for speaker.

JOB DISCRIMINATION RE-PORTED -Minority group members who work for the state generally hold lower-paying jobs, even though their employment level has improved somewhat. Texas Legislative Council reported in a new survey on ethnic groups in government.

The Council found the percentage of Negroes working for the state has risen from 9.20 per cent of the total number of employees five years ago to 10.90 per cent,

# Weekly Letter

1st Congressional Dist. of Texa

"Heart of the Gulf Southwest" PHASE I, PHASE II, PHASE III AND OUT? And by out I mean catastrophic economic chaos - for the whole country, including consumer and producer, landford and renter, borrower and lender, and you and me. Nobody gains by inflation and that is why the Banking and Currency Committee reported out a bill to adjust all prices back to a reasonable level - with this very important safeguard - that allowances or exemptions could be made to prevent inequities or unnecessary changes. The President must be given the authority

he needs to fight inflation.

NORTH FROM THE GULF. High winds and torrential downpours struck the Eastern United States last year leaving disaster in their wake: Federal, state and local officials worked hard to minimize loss and to aid victims. A highly interesting publication, "Tropical Storm Agnes", (63 pages) has been prepared by the Army Corps of Engineers explaining and depicting in numerous color photograprs the severe damage suffered and the hard work involved in putting floodtorn communities back together again. Single copies of this booklet will be sent free to constituents upon request to my office.

FLOOD DISASTER PROTEC-TION ACT. The widespread flooding caused by Agnes vividly illustrated the vital importance of our national flood insurance program to low-lying areas, but it also pointed up some shortcomings. I have, therefore, introduced H. R. 6524, the Floor Disaster Protection Act of 1973, to strengthen and expand flood insurance throughout the nation. The current flooding along the Mississippi shows again how necessary it is that the Congress provide this type of protection in

flood-prone areas. PRIVATE PENSION PRO-GRAMS. Most employee retirement programs operated by private companies are sound, but there have been too many instances in which mismanagement, poor, planning, and occasionally outright fraud have left retirees with nothing to show for their long years of labor. To prevent workers from being victimized by such practices, I am supporting legislation now under active consideration by the Congress for the proper and reasonable regulation of private pension programs. Prospects for approval by the 93rd Congress are good.

TO VETERANS ATTENDING COLLEGE UNDER THE GI BILL. As you may know, a recent change in the law provides for an advance payment (up to two months' allowances) starting in August. In order to take advantage of this advance, you should - as soon as you know you will enroll for the Fall term -obtain a certificate of eligibility from the VA; then get a certification from the school that you have been accepted; and then apply to the VA for the benefits. this is accomplished prior to registration, a check should be waiting at the college when you start classes, easing some of the financial hardship many have

experienced in the past. REVENUE SHARING PAY-MENTS. The Treasury Department has apportioned revenue sharing funds for the first quarter of 1973 (Jan. 1 - March 31) with the 108 eligible county and community governments in Texas' First Congressional District receiving a total of \$1,942,817.

## Wright Patman's Talco - Bogata Sch. Board News

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools met in special session on Monday, April 9, 1973 at 7:00 p. m. at R ivercrest with six of the seven members present.

The major purpose of the meeting was to canvass and approve the returns of the April 7th trustee election. Due to the fact that the returns of the election judges indicated a tie vote between Carol Jean Dion and Wilbur Dover, both of Talco, the Board recounted the votes of these two candidates. The recount gave the following results: Wilbur Dover, 187 votes and Carol Jean Dixon, 186 votes. Mr. Dover was declared the winner of the 3-year term and Mrs. Dixon will serve a 1-year term in keeping with school board policies on trustee elections. C. R. Williams of Bogata, having led the ballots with 203 votes, will serve the other 3year term on the Board,

The Board expressed its appreciation to retiring board members: Kenneth Jeffery and A. D. Stephenson of Bogata and Howard Swarts of Talco for their dedication and work on the Board.

In another matter, the Board approved August 27th as the 1st day of school for students for the 1973-74 school year. Other parts of the school calendar as to inservice training, workdays, and holidays were left to the discretion of the superintendent and principals.

Superintendent Talmadge Morgan said that the proposed calendar had called for August 20th as the 1st student day but was not approved due to the feeling of the Board that there was rather wide-pread opposition in the community to such an early starting date due mostly to hot weather in mid-August. Elementary schools are not air conditioned. The superintendent further stated that while the Board and administration are sensitive to the desires and feelings of the community on such matters as this that it is rather difficult to determine the true feelings of the majority of the public. He said that he felt that questions concerning the school calendar and opposition to earlier beginning dates was due largely to a poor job on his part of informing the community of the many problems and complexities in working up a school calendar.

Mr. Morgan stated that since the 1970-71 school year, schools in Texas have been required to schedule or add 15 additional days to the school calendar five extra days for students and 10 days of in-service and/or work days for teachers. He said that in his opinion it is no longer possible to have a school calendar as many remember in previous years due to the longer school year that is now required.

Mr. Morgan further said that as a point of information to the community that most of the schools in the eleven counties making up Region VIII Education Service Center of which our school district is a member are beginning their school year for students on August 20th. In addition, all the schools making up District 15AA in which our school district participates in Unversity Interscholastic League, will begin their school year for students on August 20th with in-service for teachers the prior week. The superintendent said that while it is not wise or necessary to imitate other schools in all their



America's newest oil refinery is now operating at full capacity. The Mobil Oil Corporation facility at Joliet, Ill., can process 160,000 barrels of crude oil a day. It is one of the largest oil refineries ever built from scratch in the world, and the company says it is one of the cleanest and most efficient.

For Mobil, it more than doubles the company's total refining capacity in the upper Midwest--an area that has experienced severe fuel shortages this winter.

Illinois Governor Dan Walker says the new refinery is 'sincerely welcomed in view of the fuel shortage in the Midwest and the need for new job opportunities."

The new refinery is a help, but it alone will by no means solve the shortage--either now or in future years.

"Because of the over-all tight supply of distillate fuels," Mobil said, "we do not expect to be able to increase our al- help.

ers, or take on new customers. All the oil refineries in the

United States combined process about 13.5 million barrels of crude oil a day. But the experts say some 18 million daily barrels of capacity will be needed by 1980.

Just to meet this need, five plants the size of Joliet's would have to be completed each year for the next seven years. Once an oil company decides to build a refinery, it takes at least four years before the facility is fully operational.

Yet there is no new refinery under construction in the United States now. This is largely because of lawsuits and regulations stemming from environmental fears. Oil men point also to rising costs and uncertainties about oil imports and drilling for oil in offshore waters around the continental United States.
