Notaries Must File Between May 1-15

Secretary of State Mark W. White Jr. announced that all presently commissioned Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1973 and ends June 1, 1975, must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with the County Clerk between May 1, 1973 and May 15, 1973, inclusive.

Secretary of State White further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term on June 1, 1973, should apply to the County Clerk before May 14, 1973. The required application forms may be obtained from the County Clerk. Mr. White emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the County Clerk approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the application to the Secretary of State.

Approve Grant Alcohol Abuse

Rep. Ed Howard announced today that The Texas Commission on Alcoholism has approved a grant application from the Red River Regional Council on Alcoholism to mobilize the network of alcohol abuse and alcoholism services in the North East Texas State Planning Region.

Federal funding of \$10,670 plus grantee contributions of \$3,309 will be used to employ a volunteer services coordinator, to assist in training volunteers in the nine-county area, and to develop an Orientation Handbook for Volunteers in Alcoholism.

The North East Texas State Planning Region includes Bowie, Cass, Delta, Franklin, Hopkins, Lamar, Morris, Red River and Titus Counties. Further information on the volunteer services project may be obtained from Ms. Judy Arnold, executive director of the Texarkana-based Council on Alcoholism.

Austin. — Car and home owners had encouraging promises of lower insurance rates from high-level sources last week.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe threw his weight behind a modified form of competitive auto insurance rating, subject of an unsuccessful special legislative session last year.

The State Board of Insurance issued new rules and regulations which it pledged would bring lower rates for fire, homeowners and extended coverage policies.

Basically, what both plans would do is permit companies to deviate from the standard rates issued annually by the Board.

A bill introduced in the House and Senate undertook to permit the auto deviations — either below or above the standard rate on showing that companies could make the change without endangering their solvency.

Companies would apply to the Board for deviated rates, and reductions (or increases) would be permitted if they meet tests of fairness to customers and financial stability for the companies.

While Briscoe expressed confidence the bill, if enacted, would mean substantial rate cuts, some remained skeptical that the so-called high-risk driver wouldn't pay more under it.

Rate deviations on property insurance are permissible under state law and can be implemented by the Board's regulations.

Meanwhile, the House concurred in Senate amendments and sent to Briscoe HB 143 which would authorize \$2,500 medical payment and loss-of-income coverage for auto passengers. The coverage would be included in all liability policies unless specifically rejected. Whether the new law would help lower or raise rates was a subject of debate.

MEETINGS LAW SIGNED — Governor Briscoe signed into law legislation (HB 3) to strengthen open meetings and predicted it will bring more "responsiveness" to government. Stiffer fines and a jail term are provided for violators.

The newsman's shield bill to protect confidential sources of information went to conference committee, as expected and an attorney general's opinion concluded parts of the Senate revision are unconstitutional.

A Senate committee version of a new lobby control act was rapped by House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. as a "step backward" and by "Common Cause," the people's lobby, as "a joke." Changes were predicted after critics said the Senate panel bill is weaker than the 1957 act.

The Senate, meanwhile, passed another of Daniel's so-called reform bills prohibiting "legislative bribery" in exchange for support of a candidate for speaker.

JOB DISCRIMINATION REPORTED — Minority group members who work for the state generally hold lower-paying jobs, even though their employment level has improved somewhat, Texas Legislative Council reported in a new survey on ethnic groups in government.

The Council found the percentage of Negroes working for the state has risen from 9.20 per cent of the total number of employees five years ago to 10.90 per cent.

and the percentage of state employees with Spanish surnames from 7.8 per cent in 1968 to 9.02 per cent in 1972. Blacks comprise about 12.5 per cent of the state population and Mexican-Americans more than 18 per cent.

A group of legislators, responding to the report, scheduled a series of meetings with state agencies which they claimed demonstrate "discriminatory employment practices" directed against blacks, Mexican-Americans and women.

Department of Public Safety officials told the legislators they may begin recruiting women law enforcement officers and that they are doing their best to hire qualified minority group members.

COURTS SPEAK — A Tyler youth fined after being arrested in a nude swimming incident won a reversal in the Court of Criminal Appeals.

The same Court reversed the conviction of a Dallas underground newspaper editor on charges of interfering with a policeman during a park disturbance.

The Supreme Court held a Silvertown man is entitled to \$3,000 damages for tornado loss of household goods though the insurance policy on the house he resided in was in the name of his employer.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals ordered a new trial for a Dallas housewife who shot her husband to death because a confession should not have been admitted as evidence.

A Houston district court ordered ARMO Steel Corporation's Houston Works to pay \$125,000 in civil penalties for water pollution, and ordered treatment facility modifications.

POLLUTION BILL PASSED — A bill to allow local units of government to issue revenue bonds to finance air pollution control facilities for lease to industry has approval of both houses.

Cities, counties, villages, river authorities and other special districts could issue the bonds. Facilities would not be exempt from property taxation.

Texas, meanwhile, was faced with an April 15 deadline set by the federal government for implementation of its clean air plan. No restrictions on autos were found necessary by the Air Control Board.

CONSUMER BILL ADVANCED — An amended version of Atty. Gen. John Hill's consumer protection and anti-deceptive practices bill cleared the House 133-9 and was sent to the Senate.

The measure would give the attorney general additional powers to sue fraudulent and deceptive trade practices, authorize class-action consumer suits and permit individuals to sue offenders for three times the amount of damages plus punitive damages.

SHORT SNORTS

Forty-six million dollars has been allocated to Texas for manpower programs during the 1974 fiscal year under the federal manpower revenue sharing program; larger cities will get \$34 million.

Texas cities and counties will get \$19.1 million from the U. S. Labor Department for public employment program (PEP) jobs during the next 14 months. Jobs are in public service and for disadvantaged youth.

Wright Patman's Weekly Letter

1st Congressional Dist. of Texas "Heart of the Gulf Southwest" PHASE I, PHASE II, PHASE III AND OUT? And by out I mean catastrophic economic chaos — for the whole country, including consumer and producer, landlord and renter, borrower and lender, and you and me. Nobody gains by inflation and that is why the Banking and Currency Committee reported out a bill to adjust all prices back to a reasonable level — with this very important safeguard — that allowances or exemptions could be made to prevent inequities or unnecessary changes. The President must be given the authority he needs to fight inflation.

NORTH FROM THE GULF. High winds and torrential downpours struck the Eastern United States last year leaving disaster in their wake: Federal, state and local officials worked hard to minimize loss and to aid victims. A highly interesting publication, "Tropical Storm Agnes", (63 pages) has been prepared by the Army Corps of Engineers explaining and depicting in numerous color photographs the severe damage suffered and the hard work involved in putting flood-torn communities back together again. Single copies of this booklet will be sent free to constituents upon request to my office.

FLOOD DISASTER PROTECTION ACT. The widespread flooding caused by Agnes vividly illustrated the vital importance of our national flood insurance program to low-lying areas, but it also pointed up some shortcomings. I have, therefore, introduced H. R. 6524, the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973, to strengthen and expand flood insurance throughout the nation. The current flooding along the Mississippi shows again how necessary it is that the Congress provide this type of protection in flood-prone areas.

PRIVATE PENSION PROGRAMS. Most employee retirement programs operated by private companies are sound, but there have been too many instances in which mismanagement, poor planning, and occasionally outright fraud have left retirees with nothing to show for their long years of labor. To prevent workers from being victimized by such practices, I am supporting legislation now under active consideration by the Congress for the proper and reasonable regulation of private pension programs. Prospects for approval by the 93rd Congress are good.

TO VETERANS ATTENDING COLLEGE UNDER THE GI BILL. As you may know, a recent change in the law provides for an advance payment (up to two months' allowances) starting in August. In order to take advantage of this advance, you should — as soon as you know you will enroll for the Fall term — obtain a certificate of eligibility from the VA; then get a certification from the school that you have been accepted; and then apply to the VA for the benefits. If this is accomplished prior to registration, a check should be waiting at the college when you start classes, easing some of the financial hardship many have experienced in the past.

REVENUE SHARING PAYMENTS. The Treasury Department has apportioned revenue sharing funds for the first quarter of 1973 (Jan. 1 - March 31) with the 108 eligible county and community governments in Texas' First Congressional District

Talco - Bogata Sch. Board News

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools met in special session on Monday, April 9, 1973 at 7:00 p. m. at Rivercrest with six of the seven members present.

The major purpose of the meeting was to canvass and approve the returns of the April 7th trustee election. Due to the fact that the returns of the election judges indicated a tie vote between Carol Jean Dion and Wilbur Dover, both of Talco, the Board recounted the votes of these two candidates. The recount gave the following results: Wilbur Dover, 187 votes and Carol Jean Dixon, 186 votes. Mr. Dover was declared the winner of the 3-year term and Mrs. Dixon will serve a 1-year term in keeping with school board policies on trustee elections. C. R. Williams of Bogata, having led the ballots with 203 votes, will serve the other 3-year term on the Board.

The Board expressed its appreciation to retiring board members: Kenneth Jeffery and A. D. Stephenson of Bogata and Howard Swarts of Talco for their dedication and work on the Board.

In another matter, the Board approved August 27th as the 1st day of school for students for the 1973-74 school year. Other parts of the school calendar as to in-service training, workdays, and holidays were left to the discretion of the superintendent and principals.

Superintendent Talmadge Morgan said that the proposed calendar had called for August 20th as the 1st student day but was not approved due to the feeling of the Board that there was rather wide-spread opposition in the community to such an early starting date due mostly to hot weather in mid-August. Elementary schools are not air conditioned. The superintendent further stated that while the Board and administration are sensitive to the desires and feelings of the community on such matters as this that it is rather difficult to determine the true feelings of the majority of the public. He said that he felt that questions concerning the school calendar and opposition to earlier beginning dates was due largely to a poor job on his part of informing the community of the many problems and complexities in working up a school calendar.

Mr. Morgan stated that since the 1970-71 school year, schools in Texas have been required to schedule or add 15 additional days to the school calendar — five extra days for students and 10 days of in-service and/or work days for teachers. He said that in his opinion it is no longer possible to have a school calendar as many remember in previous years due to the longer school year that is now required.

Mr. Morgan further said that as a point of information to the community that most of the schools in the eleven counties making up Region VIII Education Service Center of which our school district is a member are beginning their school year for students on August 20th. In addition, all the schools making up District 15AA in which our school district participates in University Interscholastic League, will begin their school year for students on August 20th with in-service for teachers the prior week. The superintendent said that while it is not wise or necessary to imitate other schools in all their



SOME GOOD NEWS ON HEATING OIL SUPPLIES



America's newest oil refinery is now operating at full capacity. The Mobil Oil Corporation facility at Joliet, Ill., can process 160,000 barrels of crude oil a day. It is one of the largest oil refineries ever built from scratch in the world, and the company says it is one of the cleanest and most efficient.

For Mobil, it more than doubles the company's total refining capacity in the upper Midwest—an area that has experienced severe fuel shortages this winter.

Illinois Governor Dan Walker says the new refinery is "sincerely welcomed in view of the fuel shortage in the Midwest and the need for new job opportunities."

The new refinery is a help, but it alone will by no means solve the shortage—either now or in future years.

"Because of the over-all tight supply of distillate fuels," Mobil said, "we do not expect to be able to increase our al-

locations to contract customers, or take on new customers."

All the oil refineries in the United States combined process about 13.5 million barrels of crude oil a day. But the experts say some 18 million daily barrels of capacity will be needed by 1980.

Just to meet this need, five plants the size of Joliet's would have to be completed each year for the next seven years. Once an oil company decides to build a refinery, it takes at least four years before the facility is fully operational.

Yet there is no new refinery under construction in the United States now. This is largely because of lawsuits and regulations stemming from environmental fears. Oil men point also to rising costs and uncertainties about oil imports and drilling for oil in offshore waters around the continental United States.

Meanwhile, the Midwest has a new refinery—and that's a help.


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
