#### Talco - Bogata Sch. Board News

The Board of Trustees of the Talco - Bogata Schools met in regular session at Rivercrest on Tuesday, May 1, 1973 at 8 p. m.

The first item on the agenda was the administering of the oath of office to newly elected Board members: Carol Dixon, Wilbur Dover, and C. R. Williams. Board officers elected for the coming year are: Jerry Stansell. president; Neil Rozell, vice president, and Carol Dixon, secretary.

Jimmy Haynes, Jack Franklin, and Jim Pirtle were approved as the Board of Equalization for the year. July 2nd was approved as the first meeting of the Board which will be held with major tax payers. (oil and utility companies). Soon after this date, the Board will meet with local tax payers.

Charlie Walker of Harrison & Walker Construction Company in Paris met with the Board to discuss plans and procedures for the construction of the vocational agriculture and industrial arts facilities on the Rivercrest Campus. Mr. Walker met in an advisory capacity to assist the Board and administration in getting under way as soon as possible on this project.

Approval was given by the Board to the remainder of the school calendar for the 1973-74 school year. August 27th as the first student day had been set by the Board at a prior meeting. Superintendent Talmadge Morgan said that the school calendar is almost identical to the present school calendar with the major exception being that school will begin a week later next year.

The superintendent reported that full settlement had been made in the amount of \$77,000 on the fire loss of the vocational agriculture facilities at Johntown and that the Texas Education Agency had given approval to the purchase of \$34,000 of new equipment for the new vocational facilities. It was stated that the Agency will reimburse the school district 74% of the cost of this equipment. In other matters, Clarice Vaughan was approved as the authorized representative for the school lunch program for the coming year; approval was given to the purchase of a Brushhog type mower for the school, and approval was given to the various financial reports.

The next regular meeting of the Board will be June 5, 1973.

WATERGATE LOOKING desk. MORE OMINOUS. Some Americans are discounting the serious implications of the Watergate incident preferring to view it as a harmless "caper" or prank, but recent disclosures have produced second thoughts about the propriety of espionage tactics. The cloak of secrecy thrown around these events and the refusal last week by top-ranking informed officials to appear before the Banking and Currency Committee and set the record straight are not in the best interest of our country. 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
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
