#### Information On **Social Security**

Q. I get a social security check each month, but I hav continued to farm on a sma scale. Recently I got a disaste: relief loan from the governmen and need to know if this should be counted as income in determining my self-employment earnings for the year.

A. If the loan has to be repaid it does not count as incom' for self-employment reporting but if the loan is cancelled on partially cancelled, the portion which does not have to be repaid is counted the same as income from produce sold and is income in figuring your earnings. I this causes net earnings to exced \$2,100 for the year, it would result in the loss of at least par of your social security check.

Q. I'm 18 and get social secur ity checks because my mothe gets disability payments. Since I will finish high school thi spring I understand that pay ments will continue if I go on to college full time. Since I wil need to work part time, can you tell me what social security considers as full time atendance?

A. The Social Security Administration accepts the standar set up by the s chool. In mos Texas colleges, this means & least 12 semester hours of credit and at least four courses of 3 hour credit each.

> SALUTE TO SMALL BUSI-NESS. The real champion of the American free enterprise system is. and always has been, the small independent businessman who each day takes his chances in the market place, pitting his abilities, his resources, and sometimes the total welfare of his family, against the ebb and flow of strong economic forces. America's 8 million small businesses. which employ 35 million people, receive proper recognition during National Small Business Week (May 13 to 19). As the author of the Robinson-Patman Act, frequestly referred to as the Magna Charta of small busines; of the Resolution which established the House Small Business Committee; and a great deal of other small business legislation, this week has a very special meaning for me. We face an ever-growing concentration of worldwide economic power with big business getting even bigger by gobbling up competitors. Americans must reconize that our economic and political future depends upon maintaining a healthy small business sector. This is our only barrier against the giant trusts that are in fact becoming stronger than some of the nations that give them corporate shelter.

> THE SMALL BUSINESS DIS-ASTER ACT. Flood, tornado, drought - these natural disasasters have long been with us, but a new man-made disaster is closing the doors of many small businesses. At the heart of the problem are the torrents of new laws and regulations imposed by Federal, state and local governments which set tough standards for pollution control, employee health and safety, product design, and a host of other requirements that call for expensive plant modifications. The full im pact of this problem is difficult to assess, but in my opinion these new laws and regulations will force thousands of small industrial plants out of business. I have. therefore, introduced H. R. 4272 authorizing small business loans to help cope with bureaucratic demands. This measure deserves prompt action.

UNCLE SAM - POLLUTER. Our national government should be a model for all in the fight against pollution, but bureaucrats have too often been guilty of ordering people to "do as I say, not as I do." A flagrant example occurred a few weeks ago when it was discovered that the Interior Department was dumping tons of raw sewage into the Potomac while cracking down on private industry and local governments for water pollution! Progress has been made in cleaning up the Federal Government's own pollution mess, and the new military construction bill requests \$116 million for air and water pollution abatement at defense establishments. Included is \$800,000 for air pollution control at Longhorn Army Ammunition plant in Harrison County. This is a welcome development - being polluted by a government plant is like being robbed by a policeman.

Accidents are now the leading cause of death for Americans under age 38 and proper emergency care could have 60,000 lives each year. The Emergency Medical Services Act of 1973 (H. R. 6458) is badly need-

ed - I am for it. DO WE REALLY KNOW IT ALL? Scientists believe that dinosaurs died out because their eggs developed such thin shelels that they would break prematurely before they could be hatched. Austin.-Gulf Coast and South Texas newspaper publishers kicked off an investigation into the "newsprint crisis" last week that could become a nation-wide issue. Last week in San Antonio a

probe was launched into the causes of the current newsprint shortage in the United States. A resolution requesting a "Congressional investigation" of the current newsprint crisis was adopted at the joint board meet-

ing of the Texas Gulf Coast

Press Association and the South Texas Press Association. Publishers speaking for the resolution asked the Texas Press Association and National Newspaper Association to "investigate the problem at all levels" including "price fixing" and the "re-

shortage." The resolution asked the press associations to report their findings to their memberships so that "publishers can make necessary plans and adjustments for the future months and years."

ported nationwide newsprint

Several weekly newspapers recently have converted to daily publication because of the growth of their cities, and are having problems getting more newsprint for their publications.

The regional press associations also asked that the Texas Congressional delegation be alerted to the problem and requested "assistance in working toward solution for an adequate supply of this resource which is so vital to our industry."

Other state press associations in the southwest and midwest have received copies of the resolution, and have received requests for action by their officers at future board of directors

The newsprint manufacturers in the United States have told publishers that shortages have been caused by paper mill closing in some states because of "environmental problems." Wet weather has kept timber in the forests and away from the mills. newsprint officials have said.

Canadian mills - another big source of newsprint in this coun-- have not been contacted by the publishers, but will be asked to report the reasons for current shortages, the press association officials said.

Some publishers have inquired about newsprint supplies in other countreis, and "pool purchases" of newsprint from overseas mar-

Recent price increases by the newsprint companies have sparkpart of the controversy also.

We cannot understand why the price of newsprint is the same in the states with newsprint mills - close to the source of supply - and in areas hundreds of miles from the manufacturing plants,' one publisher pointed out

GOVERNOR SUPPORTS SCHOOL FINANCE AID — Gov. Dolph Briscoe threw his support behind a stopgap school finance aid measure to provide \$39.7 million in enrichment grants to the state's 113 poorest districts.

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

#### Law Enforcement **Grants Awarded**

 Governor Dolph Briscoe today awarded four grants totaling \$396,228 for improving law enforcement and crime prevention in the area served by Ark-Tex Council of Governments, Texarkana.

Recipients will be Texarkana Ark-Tex COG and Cass County. The money will come from the Criminal Justice Council, which administers the state's block

grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Omnibus Crime Control Act. Bulk of the amount will go to Ark-Tex COG for implementation of the regional law enforce-

ment radio communications system designed with a previous CJC award. It will provide equipment for 25 law enforce ment agencies throughout the nine-county region, comprising Bowie, Cass, Delta. Franklin. Hopkins, Lamar, Morris, Red River and Titus counties. Amount is \$332,979.

Each of the agencies will have unimpaired dispatching frequency, plus additional frequencies that will permit law enforcement vehicles to travel throughout the state and remain in radio contact with other agencies. Grantee will provide a \$110,493 cash match.

Texarkana will receive a \$40,-800 award to continue operation of the Northeast Texas Regional Juvenile Detention Center. previously funded, and \$7,565 to implement recommendations of a police department management study.

The detention facility serves other counties of the region as well as Bowie County. Grantees contribution includes a \$7,200 cash match.

Aim of the police department improvement project is to increase clearance of index crimes by 33 per cent in the next three years. The city will provide a \$1,335 cash match to the project.

Cass County will use a \$14,884 grant to provide an investigator for the District Attorney's Office to improve prosecution and case vreparation.
