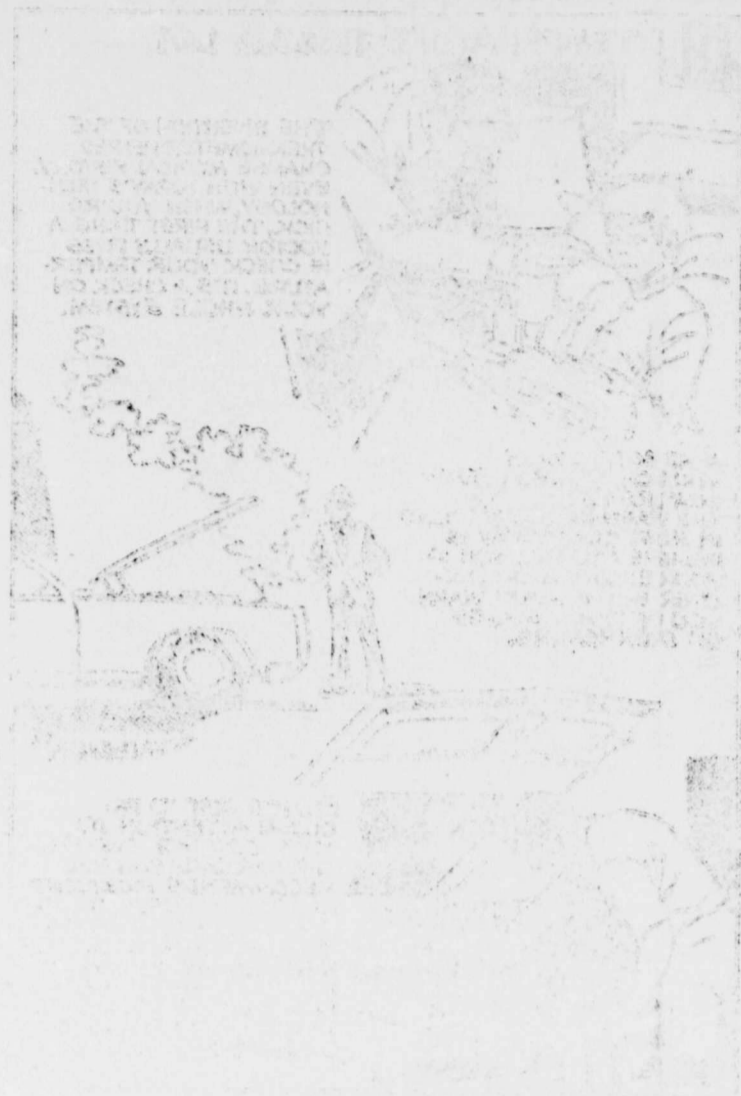

Law Enforcement Grants Awarded

Austin. — Governor Dolph Briscoe today awarded four grants totaling \$396,228 for improving law enforcement and crime prevention in the area served by Ark-Tex Council of Governments, Texarkana.

Recipients will be Texarkana Ark-Tex COG and Cass County. The money will come from the Criminal Justice Council, which administers the state's block grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Omnibus Crime Control Act.

Bulk of the amount will go to Ark-Tex COG for implementation of the regional law enforcement radio communications system designed with a previous CJC award. It will provide equipment for 25 law enforcement agencies throughout the nine-county region, comprising Bowie, Cass, Delta, Franklin, Hopkins, Lamar, Morris, Red River and Titus counties. Amount is \$332,979.

Each of the agencies will have unimpaired dispatching frequency, plus additional frequencies that will permit law enforcement vehicles to travel throughout the state and remain in radio contact with other agencies. Grantee will provide a \$110,493 cash match.

Texarkana will receive a \$40,800 award to continue operation of the Northeast Texas Regional Juvenile Detention Center, previously funded, and \$7,565 to implement recommendations of a police department management study.

The detention facility serves other counties of the region as well as Bowie County. Grantee contribution includes a \$7,200 cash match.

Aim of the police department improvement project is to increase clearance of index crimes by 33 per cent in the next three years. The city will provide a \$1,335 cash match to the project.

Cass County will use a \$14,884 grant to provide an investigator for the District Attorney's Office to improve prosecution and case preparation.

Oil Test Well North Deport

Gibson Drilling Co. of Kilgore spudded in a test well for oil 3.5 miles north of Deport last week. The well is located on the Fred Swint ranch about 100 yards inside the west line of Red River County. Drillers are putting down the well for Continental Oil Co., according to Driller J. H. Miller. The hole was down to 2,370 feet at noon Monday.
