THE SCROLL OF HONOR.

After 12 years of conflict in Viet Nam, Texas has emerged with a fatality toll of 3.281 from all causes, including hostile action: and of these honored dead, 106 were from homes in our First Congressional District. Although their voices are no longer heard, nor do they stand among us, the Flag of the United States is carried aloft today and receives our Pledge of Allegiance in further recognitoon of their supreme sac-

TOWARDS PEACE - ARMS CONTROL - 1972. Last year was a very significant one in the history of arms control talks with the President moving actively to obtain agreements in connection with Strategic Arms Limitation Talks (SALT) and Mutual and Balanced Force Reductions (MDFR) negotiations. History teaches us that an arms race is one sure road to war. DISCRIMINATION AGAINST AGRICULTURE. Earlier this year, the Congress approved P. L. 93-24 to put Small Business Administration (SBA) and Farm-Home Administration (FmHA) disaster assistance on an equal footing - or so we

thought. The Nixon Administration, however, is awarding businesses SBA disaster loans-with one per cent interest and a \$5,000 forgiveness feature (for disasters prior to April 20) - while farmers and ranchers are only eligible for five per cent interest FmHA disaster loans! This is outright discrimination against agricultural producers and violates the clear intent of Congress. Considered together with the singling out of meat for price ceilings, the Russia's Wheat Deal, exportation of LP gas, and other actions, it seems as though the Administration is favoring the big cities as against the rural areas. Farmers and ranchers have a right to expect equal treatment. Corrective legislation has ben introduced and will have my full support.

GI EDUCATIONAL BENE-FITS. For many veterans of the Korean Conflict, the time limit for use of their GI educational benefits expires, under present law, on May 31, 1974. Legislation has been introduced to remove this time limitation, since there are many veterans who, for good reasons, have found it impossible to complete their education by May 31. 1974, thereby leaving them out in the cold although they have many months of unused entitlement. This bill has my strong support.

REHABILITATION ACT. In baseball you only get three strikes and you're out, but in government, there is no limit on the number of times a measure can be considered. Last week, the House again passed legislation to extend worthwhile vocational rehabilitation programs which have made it possible for handicapped people to help themselves for more than 50 years. Although two earlier versions of this measure were vetoed, this bill, H. R. 8070, is so limited in cost that the President is expected to sign it into law.

# June 30 Deadline Virgil Pearson **Highway Signs**

along Interstate and federal-aid primary highways face a June 30 deadline to apply for a permit and a license for them.

The Texas Highway Beautification Act, in effect since June of 1972, requires owners of signs which are within 660 feet of Interstate or federal-aid primary highways and are visible from main traffic lanes to file permit requests with the district offices of the Texas Highway Department. The permits cost \$5 each.

Before permits can be approved, sign owners must obtain a \$25 state license and post \$2,500 bond for each county in which they have a sign. Maximum bonds of \$10,000 are required of owners with signs in more than three counties.

Both license and bond applications can be obtained from Right of Way Division, Texas Highway Department. P. O. Box 5075 Austin, 78763, or any Highway partment district office.

Signs advertising the sale lease of property upon which they are located or related solely to activities conducted on the property are exempted by the act along with underground utility markers, signs erected for official purposes by Federal, State and local governmental agencies and, in some cases, those posted by churches and nonprofit service organizations.

Although approximately 15,000 permits have ben approved it is estimated that thousands of signs remain in violation of the

"With the highest projected spending increase (\$1.000 billion), the 1975 Legislature apparently would find itself faced with the need to find \$600-\$700 million in additional biennial revenues," said a new TRL report. "Even (an \$850 million spending hike.) means projecting a biennial revenue need of \$400-\$500 million."



### TOBACCO INDUSTRY TURNS **NEW LEAF IN RESEARCH**



It was very appropriate that one of the most important scientific meetings to take place in the tobacco industry in recent years was the main highlight of recent day-long ceremonies dedicating the new Philip Morris U.S.A. \$6 million Research Center Tower.

As the President of Philip Morris U.S.A., Ross R. Mill-hiser, put it: "The new Research Tower and the scientific symposium are both symbolic and tangible evidence of the company's confidence in the tobacco industry and our reliance on science to point the way toward improved products for consumers."

The scope of the First Philip Morris Science Symposium was representative of the range of research the company is pursuing at the Research Center in its constant search to improve products for consumers. Dr. Glenn T. Seaborg, Nobel laureate and former Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, was the keynote speaker at the dedication of the Research Tower, along with Governor Linwood Holten of Virginia. Dr. Seaborg addressed a large audience of scientists, industry representatives and government officials on the subject, "Science, Technology, and the Quality of Life."

Participants in the symposuim included Nobel prize winner Lord Todd of England and other scientists with

international reputations in

their fields.
The new eight-story tower of the Philip Morris Research Center provides 100,000 square feet of additional space and \$1 million of advanced instrumentation. The tower was designed by the well-known American architect, Ulrich Franzen, and is based on the concept of "loft space" which utilizes modular labs to provide maximum versatility. Equally important, the tower dramatizes Philip Morris's regard for the role of the scientist in the tobacco industry.

Through its many varied research programs. Philip Morris has developed products and processes for more than 140 patents. The major portion of work currently being conducted at the Research Center involves analytical projects in tobacco and tobacco-related areas. These include chemical and physical studies into the nature of tobacco, smoke and flavor; research on perfecting techniques for analyzing tobacco and the thousands of smoke constituents; and development of improved products and processes.

At the dedication of the tower, Mr. Millhiser said: "An era of new emphasis on science and the scientist is opening up. This is particularly true with regard to consumer products, and Philip Morris is continuing its commitment to progress through scientific investiga-
