Wright Patman's Weekly Letter

1st Congressional Dist. of Texas "Heart of the Gulf Southwest"

HALF-MENDED IS STILL HALF-BROKEN. The President's formula for putting the country back together may prevent some further deterioration of the economy, but it is a far cry from getting our production and market mechanisms back together in proper working order. The price of a head of lettuce frozen at 69 cents does not help the housewife, and the dairy farmer who must pay \$400 per ton for soybean meal is no better off under the Administration's 60-day price freeze.

INFLATION IS LIKE A BULL LOOSE IN THE VEGETABLE PATCH. Since Phase II controls were prematurely lifted in January, inflation has been on a rampage hurting just about everybody here at home and weakening the dollar abroad. Unable to admit failure, the Administration vigorously opposed legislation which I introduced earlier this year that would have put an immediate halt to ruinous increases in prices and interest rates. Since April, prices have shot up at an annual rate of 24 per cent and the prime lending rate is up 25 per cent over the January level! The whole sorry episode is like a farmer finding a bull loose in his vegetable patch and trying to reason with it. The President's action last week to control prices (but not interest rates) is at least a belated admission that we had better start getting things back under control while there is still something to save. Talk, by itself, won't move a bull — or stop inflation.

THE LBJ MEMORIAL POSTAGE STAMP will go on sale on August 27 — the 65th anniversary of the birth of our 36th President. The vertical, jumbo-size (1.05 by 1.8 inches) stamp is based on a portrait of LBJ (his favorite) which hangs in the White House. Collectors desiring first day cancellations may direct requests to "Johnson Stamp, Postmaster, Austin, Texas 78710" enclosing eight cents (cash, check or money order). A memorial stamp honoring President Harry S. Truman was issued earlier this year.

VETERANS PENSION AND COMPENSATION LEGISLATION. Last week the House Veterans Affairs Committee commenced hearings on measures to provide cost-of-living increases in VA pension and compensation rates and to raise income limitations restoring benefits lost as a result of the recent social security increase. I strongly support these proposals.

WORLD WAR I GENERAL SERVICE PENSION BILL. Among the veterans measures receiving study is my bill, H. R. 5243, to establish a general service pension for World War I veterans similar to that which has long been in force for those who served in the Spanish-American War. Copies of my seven page statement in support of H. R. 5243 will be sent free to constituents upon request to my office.

"AMERICA BURNING." This 177-page report by the National Commission on Fire Prevention and Control discusses fire safety problems and methods of significantly reducing losses due to fire in homes, institutions, and industries. It also contains a summary of the Fire Prevention and Control Act of 1973 (discussed in my 1856th newsletter). Single copies of this worthwhile report will be sent free to constituents upon request.

FISH AND WILDLIFE. Texas has 2½ million licensed hunters and fishermen. It is not surprising, therefore, that the U. S. Department of the Interior has allocated \$1,663,000 to the State of Texas to develop land and water areas for managing game species and sport fisheries. Another Texas as first — Texas received more funds than any other state for fish and wildlife restoration! This money comes from taxes on sporting arms, pistols, revolvers, ammunition, and fishing equipment — all paid by sportsmen!

WHY DO THEY HUNT? According to a recent survey less than 15 per cent of our hunters are actually interested in bagging game; over 40 per cent hunt because they enjoy nature or want to "get outdoors," and others like to have "a god time with friends," or just a change of pace.

BUT "HUNTERS BEWARE." There is a definite and formidable campaign underway to stop all hunting as well as the ownership of firearms. The first effort is being directed against public hunting on three national wildlife refuges where hunts are essential to reduce the deer population and protect their habitat. With the decline of natural predators, hunting is both necessary and humane.



Austin. — Texas state government may see far-reaching new changes in budgeting techniques, hopefully to save money and curb a tax increase.

Gov. Delph Briscoe expressed enthusiasm for the Georgia "zero base" budget methods inaugurated by Gov. Jimmy Carter two years ago.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and a delegation of Texas budget experts, including Sen. A. M. Aikin of Paris, visited Georgia last week for a briefing by Carter's aides.

When the officials returned, Briscoe said he expects to "be proceeding with implementing (changes) very shortly."

Hobby is chairman of the Legislative Budget Board, which ramrods the Texas budget process. Briscoe said he will instruct his own budget office to take the Georgia system as a model in preparing the executive department's spending recommendations.

Under the "zero base" system, all agencies are instructed to start "from scratch" in drawing up their appropriations requests rather than taking present levels of spending as their beginning point.

Governor Carter asked all Georgia agencies to detail how they would operate under existing revenues, a 15 per cent cut and a slight increase. He also insisted that they list their own priorities of programs as a guide to the legislature in directing economies.

Briscoe has emphasized repeatedly that he proposes to follow that procedure in weighing the value of existing educational programs, as he maps his recommendations for revision of the public school finance system.

LEADERS CHALLENGED — One of the top leaders in the National Democratic Party was in Austin last week. That's a unique political position for a head of the nation's largest corporation.

C. Peter McCollough, chairman of the board of Zerex Corporation, told top business executives in the capital city that social problems in the United States have become problems of business and industry and challenged the Austin leaders to quit treating symptoms of problems instead of causes.

Businesses must become less resistant to change. American institutions must examine all fundamental values in the 1970s and establish a new framework to come to grips with new problems.

EDUCATION STUDY ORDERED — The State Board of Education agreed to go along with Governor Briscoe's request for a complete restudy of the school system after some griping that the job already had been done.

Some board members claimed they had gone over the system with a fine-toothed comb since the initial Rodriguez case decision in 1971 faulting present finance methods for public education.

Briscoe, meanwhile, said he isn't asking for "just another study." What is needed, said Briscoe, is to determine the fair market value of each school district. A fundamental change, he insisted, is necessary in methods of evaluating wealth of a district. There will, pledged the Governor, be no sacred cows in his coming study.

"It would be unfair to commit the people of Texas to another spending increase measured by billions without taking every step to first correct the crumbling foundation of public school finance," said the Governor.

Red River Co. Has Two Dist. Courts

Red River County now has two district courts. The 63rd Texas Legislature added Red River County to the counties (Lamar and Fannin) served by the 6th Judicial District of Texas and left Red River County also as part of the 102nd Judicial District, which is composed of Bowie and Red River Counties. Both courts will sit in Clarksville.

The Judge of the 102nd District Court is the Honorable Herbert Line of Texarkana. The Honorable Henry Braswell of Paris is Judge of the 6th District Court.

Upon being asked about the addition of Red River County to the 6th Judicial District, Judge Braswell stated: "I welcome the opportunity of serving the citizens of Red River County and working in cooperation with the Judge of the 102nd Judicial District to provide the fairest and most effective administration of justice possible."

Judge Braswell, age 44, has had a distinguished legal career. A graduate of the University of Texas, B. A. 1950 and L.L.B. 1953, he was elected County Judge of Lamar County at the age of 25. He served as County Judge for four years before moving to Austin and becoming an Assistant Attorney General for the State of Texas. In 1962 he returned to his hometown of Paris and entered the private practice of law. He was appointed Judge of the 6th Judicial District in January of 1969 and has twice been reelected to that office without opposition.

Prior to his appointment to the district bench Judge Braswell held many positions of leadership in his community, among them being Chairman of the Lamar County Democratic Executive Committee, Chairman of the Lamar County Child Welfare Board, Member of the Paris Junior College Board of Regents, President of the Paris Community Concert Association, President of the Lamar County Bar Association.

Judge Braswell's wife, the former Rachel Clark of Blossom, is a descendant of one of the prominent pioneer families of Red River County. She is a great-granddaughter of James Clark, for whom Clarksville was named, and a granddaughter of Dr. Pat B. Clark, the first white child born in Clarksville. Mrs. Braswell's father was Buck M. Clark, who was born and reared in Red River County and farmed on Red River near Madras for many years before moving to Blossom.

Mrs. Braswell, a graduate of the University of Texas and holder of a Master's degree from East Texas University, is a teacher in the Paris Public Schools.

She has been especially active in the Paris Y.W.C.A., helping to found it and serving as its president.

The Braswells have two daughters, Lauren, 16, and Amy, 12. They are active members of the First United Methodist Church in Paris, where Judge Braswell is church lay leader and a long time member of the Official Board.

On May 1, 1971, Judge Braswell was the featured speaker for Red River County's Law Day observance in Clarksville.

FDA Approves \$19,900 Grant 19 County Area

Congressman Wright Patman (D-Tex) announced today that the Economic Development Administration has approved a grant in the amount of \$19,900 to the North East Texas Economic Development District, Inc. with offices in Texarkana. This grant is to pay administrative costs and to help continue the program of planning for economic growth in a 16 county area of northeast Texas through June 30, 1973. These counties include Bowie, Camp, Cass, Delta, Franklin, Gregg, Harrison, Hopkins, Lamar, Marion, Morris, Panola, Red River, Titus, Upshur and Wood.

Detroit School Gets \$3,019 Under Title I

Congressman Wright Patman (D-Tex) announced today that the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has approved a tentative entitlement of \$3,019 to the Detroit Independent School District with a certified immediate payment of \$2,717. This Federal assistance is granted under Title I of Public Law 874, as amended, providing financial assistance for schools in federally affected areas.

The planting of over 1,800,000 small trees by one company is helping America's fire-ravaged national forests' urgently needed reforestation program and has earned the firm the coveted National Arbor Day Committee Award in the company and corporations project category.
In celebration of the centennial year of Arbor Day, the Awards Committee named Hunt-Wesson Foods, Inc., as the recipient.
In ceremonies at Arbor Lodge, birthplace of Arbor Day, Nebraska City, Neb., Mr. William K. Hood, the firm's president, received the award from Edward Cliff, retired Chief of the U.S. Forest Service. 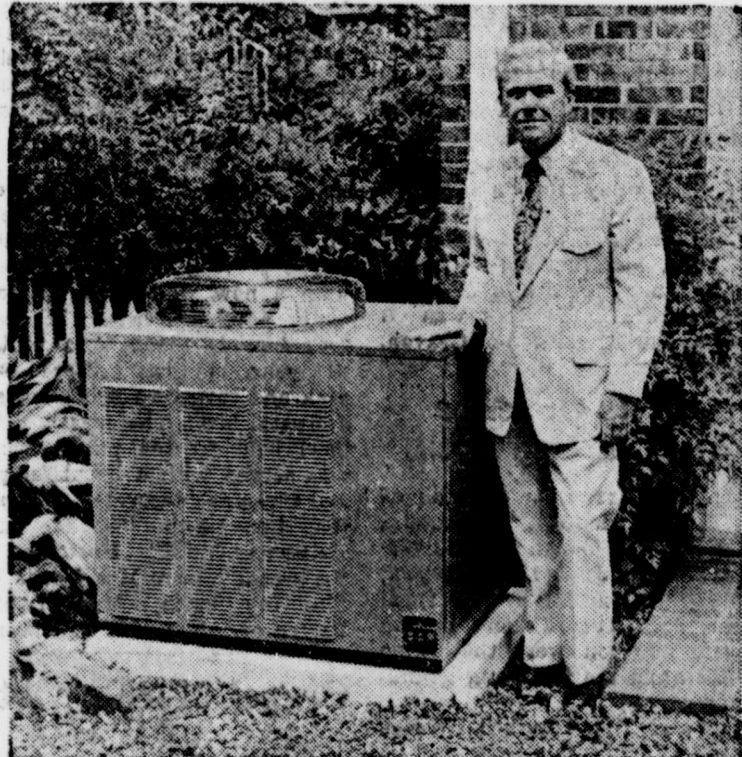

TECHNOLOGY FOR A BETTER WORLD



"There is no harm in getting 'expert' advice. But don't take it."

This ironic statement, made by Dr. Rudolf Kompfner (pictured on the left), recalls the beginning of an event that led to his receiving the Medal of Honor from the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE). Presenting the Award is Harold Chestnut, President of IEEE.

The Institute, the world's largest technical society, cited Dr. Kompfner for his invention of the traveling wave tube. The tube is used as an amplifier in communications satellites because of its very long life, high reliability, high efficiency and its ability to withstand the conditions of launching into the atmosphere. It is also used in microwave relay systems for transmitting television and telephone circuits over long distances. NASA has used the traveling wave tube in its spacecraft guidance systems. Without Dr. Kompfner's perseverance to continue with his idea despite many failures, the development of these types of communications techniques may have been seriously hampered.

The idea came to Dr. Kompfner during World War II. He was working at the University of Birmingham (England) trying to develop a new amplifier for a radar system. Despite being told by an "expert" at the University

that his idea would not work, Dr. Kompfner tried it anyway. The "expert" was wrong.

Encouraged by his success, Dr. Kompfner continued his calculations at home during his spare time and his experiments in the laboratory. He did his own glass blowing and soldering, used the lathe and the milling machine, sealing the wax, etc. "Not that I was very good at it," Dr. Kompfner noted, "but I could do this kind of thing in a pinch."

Many tests and failures were experienced until one day, the power supply faltered and produced a low voltage. Surprisingly, the tube worked! Because of a mathematical error, he had been using too high a voltage. The accidental drop in voltage allowed the tube to function.

In 1951, Dr. Kompfner came to the United States to work for Bell Laboratories. He is still employed there, currently holding the position of Associate Executive Director, Research-Communications Sciences Division.

The Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers is dedicated to improving the quality of life, throughout the world, by the constructive use of technology. Its Awards program recognizes those who have made significant contributions to the knowledge of this field so as to encourage others to emulate this type of excellence.
