1st Congressional Dist. of Texas "Heart of the Gulf Southwest"

THE DECLARATION OF IN-DEPENDENCE. Next Wednesday marks the 197th anniversary of the approval by the Continental Congress of this mighty document which broke the chains of despotism and proclaimed new ideals of human freedom. Indeed. the specific words of the Declaration have special meaning for us today - for example the King of England was accused as follows: "He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good . . " and ". . he has utter-ly neglected to attend to them." The pertinence of these words to today's events is a measure of the lasting greatness of our Declaration of Independence.

A TWO HUNLRED YEAR-OLD SCANDAL. In 1773, Ben Franklin came into possession of imporant confidential letters which showed that British officials in the colonies were sending false information back to the government in England. Franklin made the papers available to Samuel Adams, asking that they be kept secret. But the fiery Bostonian released their contents, creating a great international scandal which culminated in a duel over who had leaked what to whom. The controversy was finally settled when Franklin himself publicly assumed responsibility for the disclosure. It is truly carved in marble on the National Archives building here in Washington: "What is Past

is Pologue.' MORE DELAY. The Rural Development Act was approved in the summer of 1972, and Administration officials were saying last Fall that it would be implemented by April 1. That date slipped past, and the word then was that the Act would be in operation by July 1. While the Farmers Home Administration may begin accepting applications fo rural development projects by the first of July, it now appears that no projects will be approved until August, because final guidelines have not yet been issued. Despite this continued foot-dragig by the Administration, is strong support for rural development in the Congress; in fact, the House has already approved sufficient funds to get the Rural Development Act off to a good start - whenever the Administration gets around to it.

R. 2246, which I co-sponsored, and EDA remains in business. Eat Texas has benefitted greatly from these programs, receiving assitance for new industry, industrial parks, water and sewerage systems, and other public facilities. We need every available weapon in the fight against unemployment and economic stagnation; and it is reassuring that the Administration now seems to agree that this is not the time to scrap EDA which has been tested by time and proven successful. particilarly for ru-

THE NATIONAL WATER COMMISSION REPORT - AN ATTACK ON TRADITIONAL AMERICAN BELIEFS. This document manages, or rather attempts, to demean the tremendous accomplishments of the American people in the field of water conservation and development - accomplishments made possible over the years through the cooperation of local, state, and Federal authoities working hand in hand with thousands of communities and industries. The report also fails to recognize that the people do beenfit from the products of industry - a concept which is fundamental to our free enterprise system. The Water Commission Report would deprive future generations of proper flood protection, prevent them from enjoying adequate water for home, industry and recreation, and halt development of energy-efficient water transportation. The underlying flaw, however, is that the report ignores a basic truth - every good work

Austin. - Experts offer little hope for an early easing of the energy crisis, and Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Langdon warns a lot more oil and gas is being used than is being found.

A House committee studying the crisis heard a national authority's grim opinion that "there is no way out."

Dr. John McKetta, past chairman of the National Energy Policy Committee, said President Nixon should declare a national emergency, since it's too late for problem studies in the area.

Langdon told the same committee legislative efforts to cope with the problem will be frustrating because solutions must be sought at the national level.

Although the state regulatory agency has been permitting 100 per cent production for more than a year, Langdon said Texas producers are still falling short of demand for oil by 400.000 barrels a day, or roughly 10 per

Atty. Gen. John Hill termed the situation "extremely critical," and said no other matter should receive more attention to-

As the commission set the July oil allowable at 100 per cent for the 16th straight month (with buyers seeking a record 3.8 million barrels a day), Langdon issued a new warning that only nine million barrels of oil a month are being added to Texas supplies while 105 million barrels are consumed in the same period. "Unless this trend is reversed, the Texas oil and gas industry is

in the process of self-liquida-

tion," said Langdon. Texas crude oil stocks as of June 8 were 94.7 million barrels, a decline of 7.2 million from 1972. Langdon asked for reports at the July commission meeting on the amount of oil companies discovered in 1972, and somewhere along the line," he said, he will want to know "what it will take to find more" - and whether the industry will really be "able to

stay in business." FUTURE HIGHWAY NEEDS Mass transit needs should be financed from its own funds, not from highway funds, Roy D. Chapin Jr., Board Chairman of American Motors Corporation. told Texas Good Roads Association members and the Texas Highway Users Conference here last week.

"Highway construction and maintenance needs during the next 20 years will be \$600,000,-000,000 in the United States," he explained. '! Mass transit needs will total \$50,000,000,000 for rail construction and development and \$13.000,000,000 for bus transportation.

"Highways are still the basic answers for urban transportation needs. The Department of Transportation says by 1990 that 92 per cent of transportation will be on roads and streets - with only eight per cent on bus and

railroad facilities." Chapin, who is chairman of the board of the National High- troller. way Users Federation, spoke to a partisan audience, but his statistics impressed neutral observers about the need for political unity in the current struggle between eastern states and the rest of the nation for current highway

"HUD says that population density will continue to drop in urban areas," Chapin concluded. "Travel patterns will be from suburban home to suburban jobs. Buses and car pools can start lowering congestion - but highways are still important to those methods of transportation."

He spoke against "crisis" legislation because of the "current misunderstanding and misinformation on the so-called energy crisis. Some restrictive action may taken in the name of crisis, increased tax on gas, excise taxes and personal property taxes on automobiles, Chapin added.

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
