**PJC Gets Part Of Federal Pie** 

Congressman Wright Patman announced today that the U.S. Office of Education has approved funds in the amount of \$458,324 to six colleges in the First Congressional District of Texas to assist an estimated 1,047 students under the National Direct Student Loan Program, authorized under Title IV of the Higher Education Act. These funds will provide 90 percent of the student assistance and a matching institutional contribution will provide the remaining 10 percent.

Colleges receiving funds are as follows: East Texas Baptist College in Marshall (\$97,627 for an estimated 223 student awards); Henderson County Junior College in Athens (\$8,786 to assist 20 students); Jarvis Christian College in Hawkins (\$199,437 for 456 students); Panola Junior College in Carthage (\$1,347 for 3 students); Paris Junior College (\$35,146 for 80 students); and Wiley College at Marshall (\$115,981 for 265 students).

Texas Secretary of State Mark White today announced that all presently commissioned Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1975 and ends June 1, 1977, must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with the County Clerk between May 1, 1975 and May 15, 1975, inclusive.

Secretary White further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term on June 1, 1975, should apply to the County Clerk before Aprl 30, 1975. The required application forms may be obtained from the County Clerk.

Mr. White emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State as the law specifically provides that the County Clerk approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the application to the Secretary of




