Deport Dam Land Grant Approved

Congressman Wright Patman announced Monday that the Department of Housing and Urban Development has approved a Community Development Discretionary Grant in the amount of \$200,000 to the City of Deport which will be used for the construction of new sewer lines and land acquisition.

Deport Mayor Charles Foster had received the papers to be completed by the city on the land acquisition and sewer line grant, by Sunday night, but had not been officially notified of the approval of the grant.

"This means we will no longer have to put up with water flooding our downtown section every time there is a rain in the watershed," Foster said. "Now Deport will begin to grow rather than to slowly die. Another advantage is that the sewer plant, on which bonds will have to be approved, will now cost the taxpayers substantially less. It is cheaper to build a sewer plant that is not subject to flooding than one that goes under water several times a year, and we will not have to buy lift pumps for the station."

Patman also announced that the Department of Agriculture has approved federal assistance for carrying out the Deport Creek Watershed project in Lamar and Red River Counties.

The project, to be carried out in three years, is designed to provide measures for watershed protection and flood prevention in the 6,160 acre watershed. It is a local undertaking with federal assistance under the provisions of the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act. Project sponsors are the Lamar Soil and Water Conservation District, Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District, and the City of Deport.

With federal funds available, assistance can be provided immediately for accelerating the installation of land treatment measures and preparing final designs and specifications for structural measures. Some of the land treatment measures already are being applied.

In addition to the conservation land treatment measures necessary to protect and improve the land and water resources of the watershed, the project includes on floodwater retarding structure.

Total cost of the project is estimated at \$257,000. Local interests will operate and maintain the project.

Arson Cited In Bogata Fire

Arson has been cited by Bogata Fire Marshal Joe Greger as the cause of the fire Thursday, August 7, that totally destroyed The Game Room in Bogata.

Further investigations are to be undertaken by State Fire Marshal Charles Meadows, according to Greger. The alarm was sounded at 11:55 a.m. and was under control at 2:30 p.m. Both the Bogata and Deport Fire Departments took part in fighting the blaze.

The fire started outside the building on the southwest side in a small corridor between The Game Room and Bogata Butane. Minor damage occurred to the butane company, and losses to an adjoining dress shop, beauty shop and barber shop were light.

Don Roach, owner of the barber shop, discovered the blaze, and said that it was small when he found it. Roach turned in the alarm, and drove the truck to the fire.

Highway traffic was blocked for a time on 271 by hoses running across the road to fire plugs.

The building was the property of J.B. Roberts, who also owned a large warehouse also destroyed by the fire. Roberts considered his losses in excess of \$20,000, and said

All Students To Register August 21

General registration for all students in the Talco-Bogata Schools, which includes Rivercrest High School and the Bogata and Talco Elementary Schools will be Thursday, August 21, 1975. Buses will make their regular runs on Thursday morning arriving at school at approximately 8:30 and will return students to their homes about mid-morning.

Students will not return to school until the following Monday, August 25, which will be a full day of school with meals being served in the cafeteria.

All students entering kindergarten must be five years of age on or before September 1, 1975 of the current year. All students entering the first grade must be six years of age on or before September 1 of the current year. Both kindergarten and first grade students must furnish a birth certificate if one has not already been furnished the school.

Parents are reminded that all children entering Texas Elementary and Secondary Schools must have met the required state immunizations for diphtheria, tetanus, polio, measles and rubella.

Teachers and aides will report on Tuesday, August 19 for a week of in-service training and workdays in preparation for the new school year. The first general session for teachers and aides will be held at Rivercrest at 8:30 a.m. on Tuesday, August 19.

Rivercrest Dress Code Approved By Board

A dress code for students at Rivercrest High School was approved and a tentative dress code for elementary students is under study by the Talco-Bogata School Board in a regular meeting August 5. The high school dress code is part of a student handbook which was approved by the board.

Mike Vinyard, Rivercrest principal, met with the board to present and discuss the handbook. Plans are to mail copies of the handbook to parents as soon as they have been printed. Also in the works is a revised handbook for elementary students which will be presented for Board study and approval and afterward mailed to parents.

In other action taken, Mary Ann Macsisak, was approved as the second kindergarten teacher at Bogata. Miss Macsisak is a recent graduate of East Texas State University and is certified in music as well as kindergarten. Ann Brumley has previously been approved by the Board as a kindergarten teacher at Bogata replacing Maggie Lee Morgan who had resigned. Also, Jane Cain was approved as a Title I teacher at Bogata. Miss Cain is a 1970 graduate of Rivercrest and a recent graduate of East Texas State University. In a previous Board meeting, approval was given for Frank Stubblefield, Rivercrest math teacher, to be girls basketball coach at Rivercrest.

Also related to personnel matters, Richard Garrison was approved as a bus driver and Zelma Wood as a cafeteria worker at Bogata. Another cafeteria worker will be employed at Rivercrest before the beginning of school to replace Ruby Cogburn who resigned due to health reasons.

On the Bogata campus, the board directed that the elementary office and bookroom be converted into a small classroom for use in this building for Title I purposes.

In final action, board approval was given to the 1975-76 school budget as presented

Superintendent Talmadge Morgan said that it appears at this time that the tax rate and assessment ratio on property will remain the same as last year without any increase. The following dress code was adopted by the board for Rivercrest High School. Modesty and the avoidance of distracting influences are the keys to student dress and grooming.

Wear clothing that is neat and clean.

Wear clothing that is casual and comfortable but is not extreme in style.

Wear clothing that is in good taste and that is modest. Do not wear clothing that is bizarre or that is designed to attract special attention or comment.

Do not attach words, patches, obscene signs, military insignia, or any form of a flag to any part of your clothing. (School related words and patches are acceptable.)

Do not wear clothing that is questionable. If you are not sure that it is proper for school, do not wear it.

The standards of this dress and grooming code shall apply to all school parties, trips, and related activities.

All questions related to the interpretation of this dress and grooming code shall be resolved at the discretion of the principal.

Standards For Girls
Prohibited are the nude look, see-through styles, and other revealing fashions.

Dresses and skirts shall be of a length that presents a modest appearance.

See-through blouses, extremely low-cut dresses or blouses, backless dresses or blouses, and bare midriff attire will not be permitted. Blouses and shirts are to be worn inside unless they are obviously intended to be worn outside.

Pant style dresses and pants, including blue-jeans and western wear, are acceptable so long as they conform to other provisions pertaining to safety, provocative effect, and distracting influences.

Shorts and cut-offs are not permitted.

Shoes will be worn at all times.

Hair must not be in rollers. **Standards For Boys**
Shirts designed to be worn inside shall be tucked in at all times.

T-shirts of the underwear type (arms cut out) and tank tops will not be permitted.

Shoes or boots, with socks, shall be worn at all times. Beards, mustaches, and sideburns shall give a neat and well groomed appearance.

Hair shall give a neat and well groomed appearance. It shall conform to some style and shall not extend below the top of the eyebrow in front or below the base of the neck in back.

The following dress code for elementary students, while not yet approved by the Board, is under study and will serve as a general guide until approval.

Dress and Grooming
Modesty and the avoidance of distracting influences are the keys to student dress and grooming. (All questions related to the interpretation of the dress and grooming code shall be resolved at the discretion of the principal.)

Kindergarten-Fourth Grade
Shorts, blue jeans, western wear, and dresses with sufficient length blouses may be worn.

A parade was held Saturday, August 2, with some riding the fire truck and ending with refreshments of snow cones at Denny's Skating Rink.

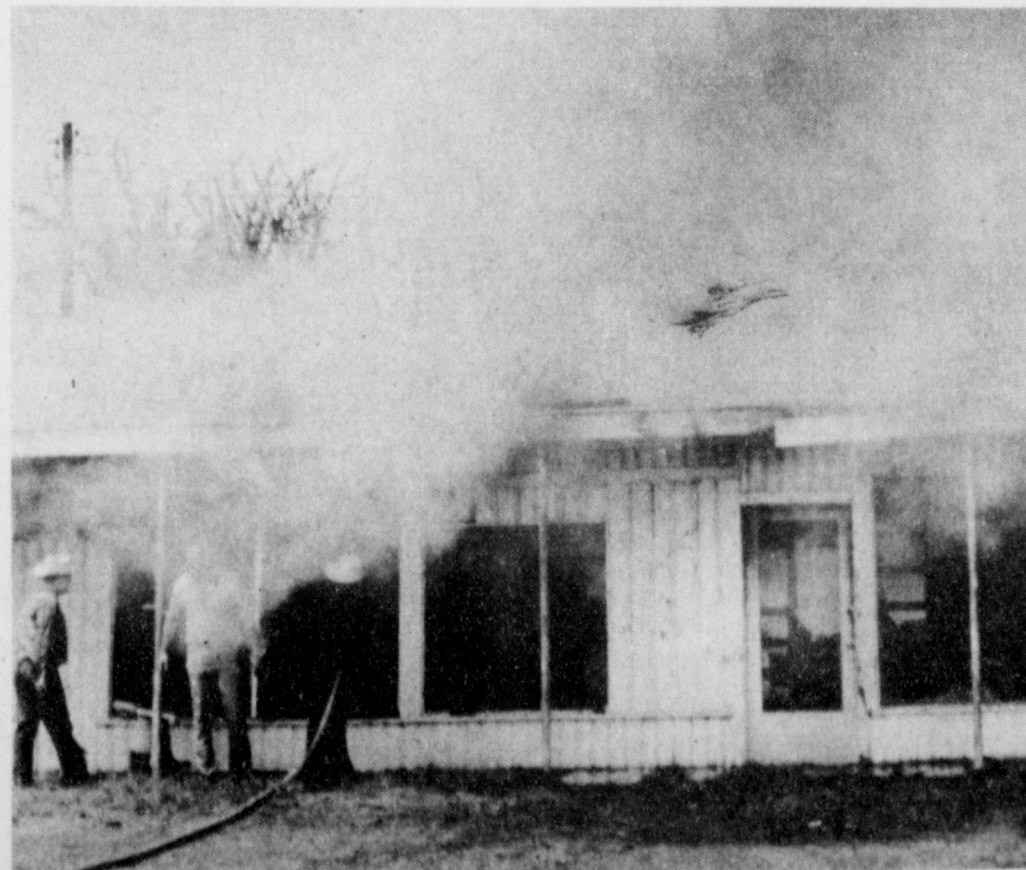
Family Night was held Friday night with the different departments, nursery thru sixth grades, showing their work and followed with a sandwich supper.

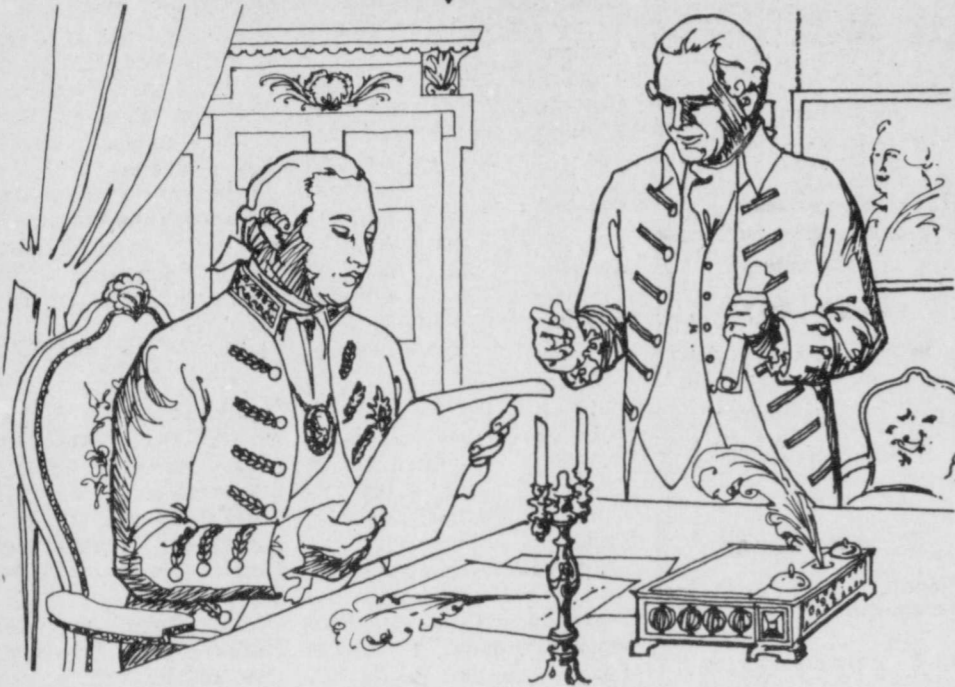

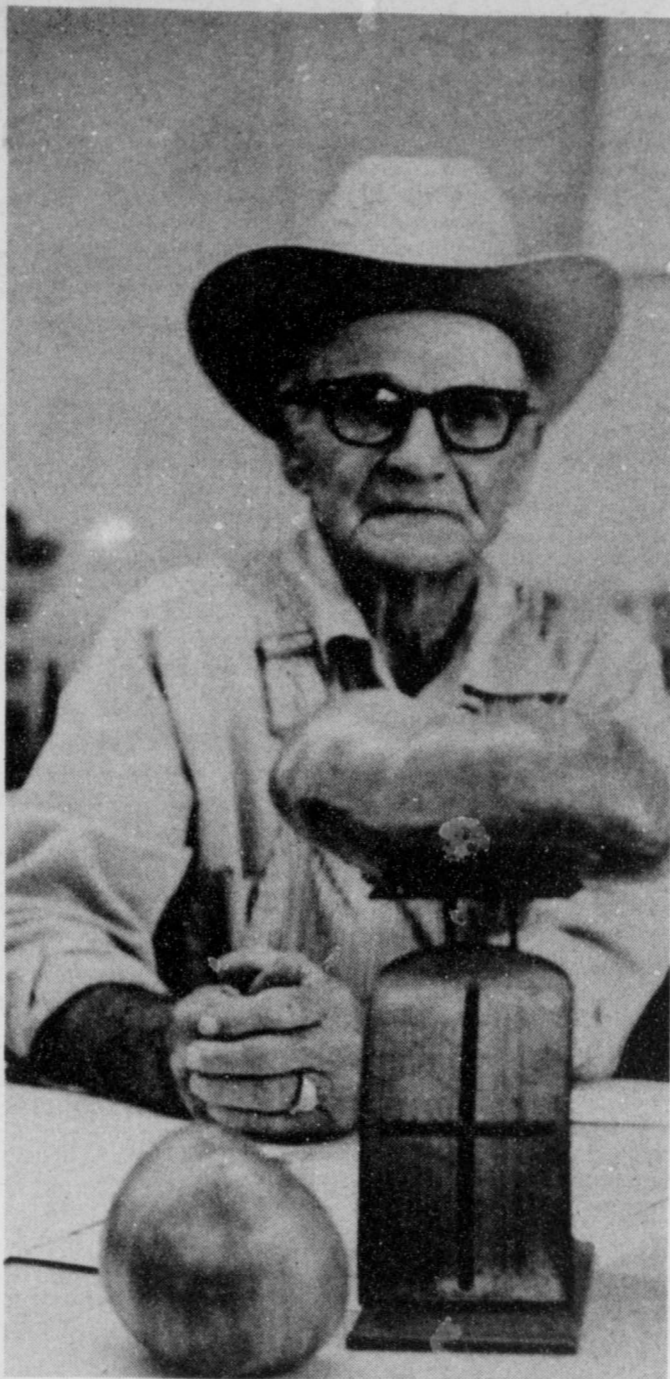

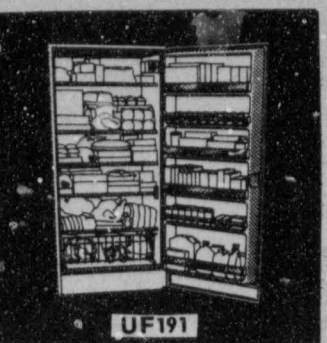

East Texas State University-Texarkana will once again offer a wide range of course offerings in Mt. Pleasant, it was announced recently, with initial on-site registration to be held at the Adult Education Center on August 19 from 3-8 p.m. Academic advisors will also be present to answer questions students may have regarding specific degree or course requirements.

According to John Moss, President of ETSU-Texarkana, the Mt. Pleasant offerings are in keeping with ET-Texarkana's policy of developing a campus without walls' approach in delivering educational programs to various sites within the geographic area served.

"When you consider the fact that we have an energy crisis, which probably is going to become much worse, and the fact that many people who would like to continue their education simply cannot commute over 100 miles several times per week, a "non-campus" college begins to make sense," Moss said.

Six undergraduate courses in the division of Administrative and Managerial Professions are a featured part of the Mt. Pleasant offerings for the Fall semester. The courses include Report Writing, Principles of Marketing, Corporations Finance, Principles of Management, Legal Aspects of Health Care Administration, and a seminar on Fiscal Policy.

Graduate courses in Education include Math Curriculum in Grades One Through Eight, and Techniques of Teaching Children with Learning Disabilities.

All undergraduate courses will be conducted in the Mt. Pleasant Adult Education Center, and all graduate courses will be conducted in Region Eight Service Center.

In addition to the August 19 registration, on-site registration will be held at the Service Center on Thursday, September 4, from 7-9 p.m. and Thursday, September 18 from 7-9 p.m. Registration can also be completed by mail through the Admissions Office of ETSU-Texarkana, P. O. Box 5518, Texarkana, Texas 75501.

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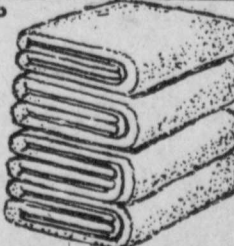
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
