Bogata Welcomes Wolff Manufacturing Company

Wolff Manufacturing Company began making dresses in Bogata at 8:00 a.m. Monday morning, December 1, when four employees clocked in and went to work. The number of employees will be increased each day until a total of 15 are employed by the end of the week.

The plant is located in the old Assembly of God Building on Fifth Street in Bogata, and there is a possibility that as many as fifty employees may be on the payroll at maximum

capacity. Jerry Conroy, a representative of Wolff, said that the present building will accommodate only thirty employees.

The plant was located in Bogata largely through the efforts of Mrs. Bill Pirtle, who owns a dress shop in Bogata and whose husband is the pastor of the Assembly of God Church. As a customer of Wolff, she heard that the company was looking for a town in which to locate a small plant, and

went to work on getting them in Bogata.

The plant would have a payroll of approximately \$4,000 a week with 30 employees, which may be reached in as little as three months, Conroy said.

Initial interviews were made at the First Baptist Church in Bogata on October 17 and 18, and 146 applications were taken for positions.

Conroy said that Wolff Manufacturing Company has been in business for 14 years

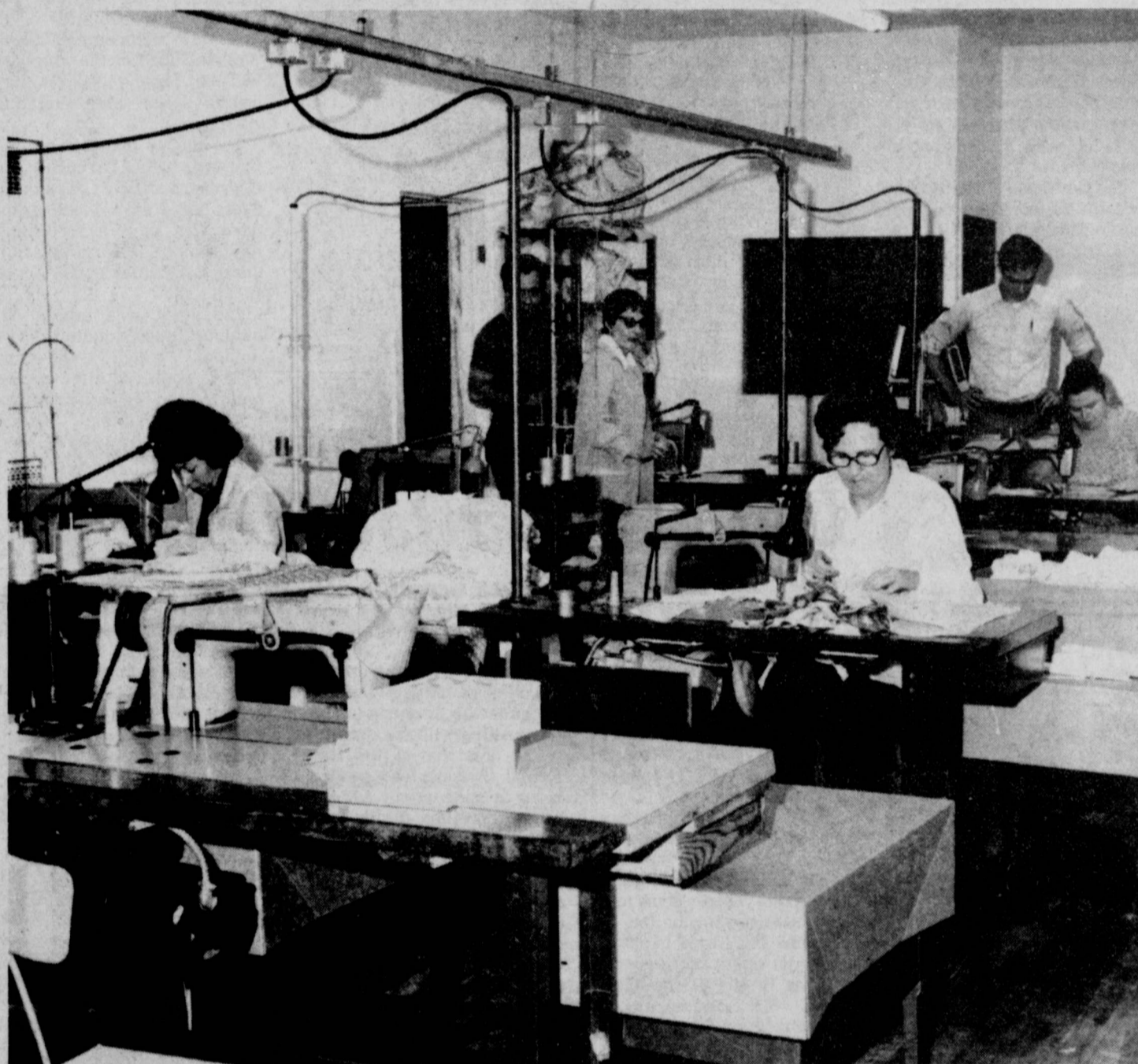
and operates three plants in the Dallas area. The company has experienced a 15 percent per year growth rate, and manufactures basic, stable lines for ladies half sizes. Distribution of the product is nationwide, with concentration in the southwest, and a New York buying office is also part of the operation.

Labels manufactured include Tribute, Premier Row, Femm, C&R half size dresses, and Regal Row sportswear.

Titus County Road Construction In Program

ATLANTA - Road construction in seven Northeast Texas counties is included in the 1975 Farm to Market Road and Off-Federal System Programs approved recently by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

District Engineer L. L. Jester Jr. of the Atlanta District said the programs, statewide, provide \$28.1 million for the development of 582.5 miles of secondary roads.

In District 19, headquartered in Atlanta, the program provides for 3.0 miles of Off-System Roads at a cost of \$645,000. Locations and types of work are:

Farm Road 3287 in Bowie County from FM 989 north of US 59 west 1.4 miles, grading, structures and surfacing;

Farm Road 2151 in Cass County at Line Creek and West Line Creek north of St. Highway 77, reconstruct bridges and approaches, 0.2 mile; and

A new Farm Road designation in Panola County from FM 2517, 1.3 mile southeast of FM 31, southeast 1.4 miles, grading, structures and surfacing.

The Farm to Market Road Program for District 19 provides for 11.9 miles at a cost

of \$1,009,000, as follows:

Farm Road 130 from FM 161 east to FM 250, 1.6 miles, grading, structures and surfacing, a Cass County project;

Farm Road 2625 in Harrison County from near Stricklin Springs east to FM 9, 3.1 miles, additional funds for grading, structures and surfacing;

Farm Road 1735 in Titus County from State Highway 11, north to near Hickory Hill, 2.5 miles, grading, structures and surfacing; and

A new designation in Upshur County from State Highway 154 at Rhonesboro, north 1.8 miles, grading, structures and surfacing.

"This is a total of 14.9 miles for the district, to cost \$1,654,000," Jester said.

"Some of this money is allocated for additional finance on roads already designated and authorized for construction, and a portion of this total has been previously authorized to be financed in this program," Jester added.

The district engineer pointed out that under the familiar Farm to Market Road Program, the state provides for all the construction and maintenance while counties or cities provide right of way and utility adjustments.

"The Off-Federal system designation refers to routes not on the federal-aid highway system," he added.

Meeting To Consider Red River Criminal Justice Grants

Three local issues are to be discussed at the Ark-Tex Council of Government's Board of Directors meeting at 7:30 p.m. tonight, Thursday, at the Morris County Courthouse in Daingerfield, Texas, and all pertain to law enforcement.

First is an application by the County of Red River to the Texas Criminal Justice Division for a grant of \$11,797 matched with \$1307 local cash to be used to employ a qualified criminal investigator for the County Attorney-Prosecutor's Office. Pat Beadle, Red River County Attorney, said that the grant would be a continuation of the grant now in effect and being used to employ Don Cockram as a special investigator. The grant would cover a two year period.

The directors will also consider an application by the Ark-Tex Council of Government for a grant from the Texas Criminal Justice Division in the amount of \$14,250 to be matched with local cash funds of \$1500 for a Multi-County Jail Feasibility Study involving Hopkins, Delta, Franklin and Rains Counties, Texas. This application will also be presented by Glen Goodwin, director,

regional criminal justice. Finally, the directors will consider an application by the Ark-Tex Council of Government for a grant from the Texas Criminal Justice Division in the amount of \$15,200 to be matched with local cash funds of \$1600 for a Multi-County Jail feasibility study involving Hopkins, Delta, Franklin and Rains Counties, Texas. This application will also be presented by Goodwin. Each of the counties involved in the feasibility studies are to provide a proportion of the total. This amount is to be based upon total population of the county. According to Franklin County Judge Lanny Ramsay the proportionate share of the total \$1,600 for Franklin County is estimate at \$300.

Among those planning to attend the meeting from this area are Bogata Mayor Clifford Barnard and Robert W. Wright, publisher.

Santa Claus will stay a few minutes after the Talco parade at the Community Public Service office to visit with the children. Floats will be assembled at the Talco City Hall.

In Bogata floats will be assembled in front of Kisner's Grocery.

Grant Funds Released For Deport Dam Project

Funds for a grant of \$200,000 were released and deposited in the First National Bank of Deport on Friday, November 21, according to Deport Mayor Charles Foster. The grant is from the Department of Housing and Urban Development and will be used for sewer extensions and land acquisition.

Approximately \$45,000 will be used for extension of the city sewer system, \$5,000 for administrative costs, and \$150,000 for the acquisition of land and easements in the Deport Creek Flood Prevention project. Included in the \$150,000 figure is \$10,000 that will go to the cost of two appraisers and for legal fees.

The Ark-Tex Council of Governments, with offices in Texarkana, has been hired by the city to administer the Deport Creek project and the sewer extensions. William Perkinson of Ark-Tex, in charge of rural development, is the officer in charge. City employees began working on the sewer line that will connect

the new Deport Nursing Home to the city sewer system on Monday of this week. The home is expected to be open near the

first of the year, and is in the area which the city proposes to annex. A public hearing regarding the annexation is

scheduled at 7:00 p.m. tonight, Thursday, December 4, at the Deport City Hall. City council members, in

discussion of the annexation, agreed informally that city taxes should be pro-rated to make up for city services which

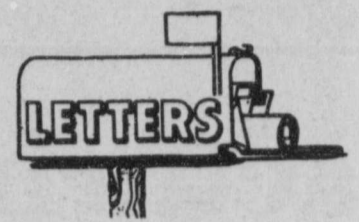
are not provided to newly annexed areas.

KIMP And KPXI To Open New Facilities

The grand opening of the new KIMP and KPXI facilities is just another step in a long history of service to the Northeast Texas area. It all began when the Mount Pleasant Broadcasting Company was formed by the late Winston O. Ward. The first station - KIMP - was placed on the air October 7, 1948. Since that time the Mount Pleasant Broadcasting Company has continued to improve its service to the people of the Northeast Texas area.

KIMP was authorized as a CONLERAD Station July 22, 1953, operating on 640 kc. A fallout shelter was constructed and emergency generators added which allows uninterrupted service to Northeast Texas even during power failures. November 6, 1961 KIMP-FM began broadcasting with 3,000 watts of power, providing more musical entertainment, as well as nighttime coverage, and expanded sports coverage, with

live broadcasts of football, baseball, basketball and other sports activities. KIMP-FM power was increased to 54,000 watts on September 15, 1964. In October 1972, stereo broadcasting was added and July 31, 1974 KIMP-FM got a new name, when the call letters were changed to KPXI.

Authority has now been granted by the Federal Communications Commission to increase power of KPXI to 100,000 watts vertical and 100,000 watts horizontal. Work has already begun on this and it is expected to be completed early in the Spring. The new broadcast facilities incorporate the latest design and engineering techniques. Design and planning have resulted in a combination of the latest developments in Radio Broadcasting. In addition to the new studio facilities KIMP and KPXI have added some of the most modern and efficient engineering advancements for improved service. This includes a new 20,000 watt FM Broadcast transmitter, a new 1000 watt AM broadcast transmitter, new sound equipment, such as REVOX A-77 tape recorders and the all solid state AUTOGRAF console; KIMP and KPXI offer complete entertainment and information with Texas State Network News, Associated Press News, Environmental Science Service Weather by direct teletype, local news, mobile news units, local sports, public affairs and various types of music. The new KIMP-KPXI facilities are planned and designed to serve the radio needs of the Northeast Texas area now, and for decades to come.

Program director is Don Malone who is also in charge of production of commercials and selection of the musical entertainment. Terry May, John Johnson, and Gary Neill are announcers and disc jockeys.

Ark-Tex Gets \$15,000 Grant

Governor Dolph Briscoe announced his approval today of a \$15,614 grant to the Ark-Tex Council of Governments to purchase technical equipment to upgrade the operational capabilities of 13 area law enforcement agencies. Included in the purchase will be photo, identification, crime scene and dictating equipment. The money comes from the Criminal Justice Division of the Governor's Office. CJD administers the state's block grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Crime Control Act of 1973. The grant was among 52, totaling approximately \$3.5 million, which Governor Briscoe approved after having received recommendations from the Criminal Justice Division Advisory Board November 14.

Quail Season Looks Good

Quail season opens December 1 in many Northeast Texas counties and the prediction by Parks and Wildlife Department wildlife biologists is that it will be one of the most productive seasons in many years. Favorable weather conditions throughout the year, a good hatch and plentiful food supply have combined to push quail populations over most of the northeastern portion of the state to record levels. "There are more quail this

year than I've ever seen in the nine years I've been in East Texas," said Roland Hampton, wildlife technician stationed at Marshall. Because of early summer rains, the quail hatch was late this year but the young birds are expected to be approaching adult size with the season's opening. The outlook isn't as bright for Southeast Texas. Heavier rains in that area kept the birds from nesting until late summer and then the hatch was poor.

Deport Rental Housing Applicants Needed

"If more rental housing survey applications are not turned in by Monday, we won't be able to build any units at all," Jerry Burns, executive director of the Deport Housing Authority said Monday. "Only 13 applications have been completed and put on file, and we need at least 40 before we go on with the project," Burns said. "There seems to be some confusion about the applications, but I want to assure those who might be interested in living in one of the apartments that there is no obligation if you fill out a form. On the other hand, there will be no rental housing if you don't." Haste is urged in the completion of the application, as another meeting with the architect, Stanley Brown, has been scheduled by the Deport City Council on Monday night, December 8, 1975. Burns said that the applications would be helpful after Monday, and count toward the number of units that

are built, but that as many as possible should get their applications in immediately for the meeting with the architect. The objective of the Rural Rental Housing loan program is to provide credit for good rental housing, designed for independent living, at a rental cost senior citizens and other people with low moderate income can afford. The living units and site plan will be designed by Stanley Brown, who was the architect for the existing low income housing units. Brown is helping with the preliminary stages and will provide the design and supervision of the units if the project proceeds into full development. The building project would be financed by Farmers Home Administration for a period of 40 years. The project will be approved or disapproved within 120 days from the date of application. Jewel Daughtery, Farmers Home supervisor in Paris, would be closely linked with the construction phase of the project, if approved. Brown said the most popular and practical plan consists of duplexes composed of one and two bedroom apartments. Included in the project cost

would be inside streets, curbing and guttering and sewer, water and gas hookups to the property line. The city would be required to furnish water and sewer to the property. Applications may be left at City Drug Store in Deport, and you may call 214-652-4950 for more information.

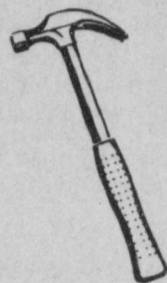

Lung Cancer Statistics Reveal Dramatic Rise

Fifty years ago lung cancer was a rare disease. While 3,000 lung cancer deaths were recorded in 1930, today there are 25 times that number says the American Cancer Society.
 It is estimated that during this year alone, approximately 91,000 Americans will be stricken with this form of cancer.
 According to Dr. Clifton F. Mountain, chief of Thoracic Surgery at The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute in Houston, "The incidence of lung cancer today is epidemic. Plotted on a graph, lung cancer represents a sharp rising curve with no end in sight."
 Despite the grim statistics, Dr. Mountain, a specialist in lung cancer during the last 16 years, remains optimistic. While surgery techniques seem to have reached their technical limits, the ability to diagnose and identify lung cancer has improved significantly in recent years.
 "If lung cancer is discovered in an early stage, which we define as a lesion confined totally within one lung, the patient will have a 45-50 percent chance of survival five years after surgery," he explains.
 If detection is delayed until the cancer has spread to

adjoining lymph nodes, the patient's chances of survival fall dramatically to 18 percent. If initial detection is still further delayed, such that the disease spreads to more distant nodes or to organs outside the chest, the chances of survival are even less.
 Two of the most promising detection tools at this time are sputum cytology and the flexible fiberobronchoscope. The sputum test, similar to the Pap smear for cervical cancer, allows the doctor to detect malignant cells even before the cancer can be detected by x-ray.
 Once malignant cells are detected in the sputum, the fiberobronchoscope, an optical brainchild of Japanese technology, can be used to search the farthest lobes of the lung in search of the pinhead-sized cancer. As an optical probe, the instrument can be inserted into the patient's bronchial tract with the capability to actually turn corners as it moves along the air passages of the lung, thus permitting the doctor to see and photograph those regions where the majority of lung cancers arise.
 Yet another approach under investigation is the concept of using multiple types of treatment, known as ad-junctive therapy.

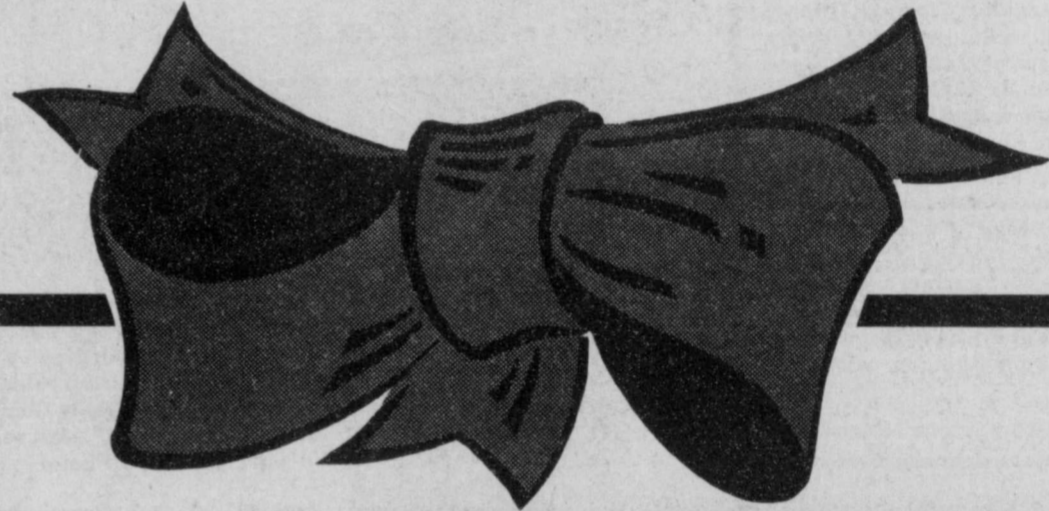

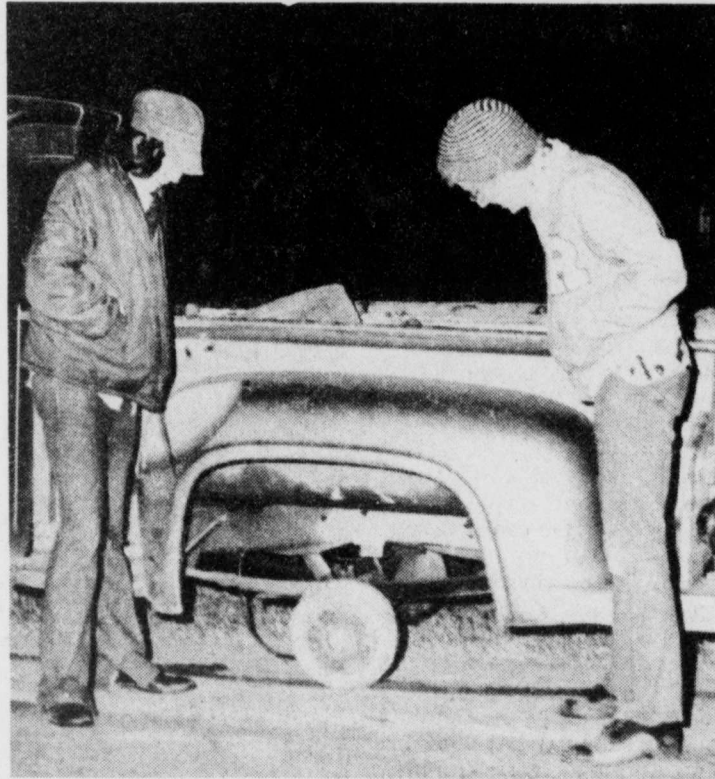
