"This is a total of 14.9 miles for the district, to cost \$1,654,000," Jester said.

"Some of this money is allocated for additional finance on roads already designated and authorized for construction, and a portion of this total has been previously authorized to be financed in this program," Jester added.

The district engineer pointed out that under the familiar Farm to Market Road Program, the state provides for all the construction and maintenance while counties or cities provide right of way and utility adjustments.

"The Off-Federal System designation refers to routes not on the federal-aid highway system," he added 'The new Off-Federal

System Program will use federal funds on a 70 percent federal-30 percent state basis as provided by the 1974 Federal-Aid Highway Act,' Jester explained.

The 1975 program includes projects formed around suggestions made by county officials in meetings with department district engineers. Most of these projects for new Farm Roads are on routes previously under county or ther local jurisdiction.



# KIMP And KPXI To Open New Facilities County who began employment

KIMP and KPXI facilities is just another step in a long history of service to the Northeast Texas area. It all began when the Mount Pleasant Broadcasting Company was formed by the late Winston O. Ward. The first station - KIMP was placed on the air October 7, 1948. Since that time the Mount Pleasant Broadcasting Company has continued to improve its service to the people of the Northeast Texas area

KIMP was authorized as a CONLERAD Station July 22, 1953, operating on 640 kc. A fallout shelter was constructed and emergency generators added which allows uninterrupted service to Northeast Texas even during power failures. November 6, 1961 KIMP-FM began broadcasting with 3,000 watts of power, providing more musical entertainment, as well as nightime coverage, and expanded sports coverage, with

live broadcasts of football, baseball, basketball and other sports activities.

KIMP-FM power was increased to 54,000 watts on September 15, 1964. In October 1972, stereo broadcasting was added and July 31, 1974 KIMP-FM got a new name, when the call letters were changed to KP



# **Lung Cancer Statistics** Reveal Dramatic Rise

Fifty years ago lung cancer was a rare disease. While 3,000 lung cancer deaths were recorded in 1930, today there are 25 times that number says the American Cancer So-

It is estimated that during this year alone, approximately 91,000 Americans will be stricken with this form of

According to Dr. Clifton F. Mountain, chief of Thoracic Surgery at The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute in Houston, "The incidence of lung cancer today is epidemic. Plotted on a graph, lung cancer represents a sharp rising curve with no end in sight."

Despite the grim statistics, Dr. Mountain, a specialist in lung cancer during the last 16 years, remains optimistic. While surgery techniques seem to have reached their technical limits, the ability to diagnose and identify lung cancer has improved significantly in recent years.

"If lung cancer is discovered in an early stage, which we define as a lesion confined totally within one lung, the patient will have a 45 -50 percent chance of survival five years after surgery,"

If detection is delayed until the cancer has spread to adjoining lymph nodes, the patient's chances of survival fall dramatically to 18 percent. If initial detection is still further delayed, such that the disease spreads to more distant nodes or to organs outside the chest, the chances of survival are even less.

Two of the most promising detection tools at this time are sputum cytology and the flexible fiberbronchoscope. The sputum test, similar to the Pap smear for cervical cancer, allows the doctor to detect malignant cells even before the cancer can be detected by x-ray.

Once malignant cells are detected in the sputum, the fiberbronchoscope, an optical brainchild of Japanese technology, can be used to search the farthest lobes of the lung in search of the pinhead-sized cancer. As an optical probe, the instrument can be inserted into the patient's bronchial tract with the capability to actually turn corners as it moves along the air passages

of the lung, thus permitting the doctor to see and photograph those regions where the majority of lung cancers arise.

Yet another approach under investigation is the concept of using multiple types of treatment, known as adjunctive therapy.
