## Tornadoes Create Trail Of Tension

At least one tornado touched down, and two others were sighted late Sunday afternoon, as the twister destroyed one barn in Lamar County and at least four others in Red River County.

The first reports of a funnel came in from Brookston, causing recently devastated Paris residents to experience another scare.

No other word of the tornado was received until Deport residents looked up to see the eye of the tornado swirling right above them, sucking up dust and causing people to run for ditches, culverts and closets.

The tornado apparently first touched down just south of the old Deport Cemetery, destroying a barn and damaging a tree on land belonging to Rodger Allen. It then moved in a big jump straight north, where it hovered in the sky and went directly east, while startled residents of Deport watched it pass overhead.

Just past the Lamar-Red River County line, in Red River County, the twister set down near the home of H.W.

(Jinks) Whittle, destroying a large hay barn belonging to John Farmer, and another, smaller barn. The storm threw a board through the kitchen window, and did some damage to the roof and parked cars, and knocked down a light pole in the front yard.

A brick home across the road had sheet iron thrown into it, dirt blown through the large windows and the antenna swept away.

The tornado then rampaged across toward Clarksville, tearing up a large number of trees and damaging barns.

At the small community of Lone Star, the storm destroyed one barn, belonging to the Ronnie Tippit's, leaving the hay and a cow undisturbed inside it. It blew a large tree up next to the house, and broke the glass door from the home of Carl Vickers, and smashed the Vicker's garage.

There was also some damage to the water station near Ye Ole Smokehouse.

Somewhere between Clarksville the tornado disappeared into a cloud, but reports state there was some

more damage at Annona.

At one time, the twister sprouted a second, very thin funnel, almost from the base of the original. This funnel did not touch down, but soon disappeared up into the cloud again.

The tornado was not typical in that it was white, apparently not filling with debris to turn it dark.

The wall cloud from which the funnel descended was considered a "classic example" of a tornado producing formation.

Deport Volunteer Firemen alerted the community to the storm, and one truck followed the storm in case assistance was needed.

The Bogata Volunteer Fire Department also sounded the siren and alerted residents to take cover in case the twister had approached Bogata.

Area residents are urged to take heed of the long, uninterrupted blasts from the sirens which indicate a tornado sighting, since the storm season is at its height.

## Varsity Takes Second

In the District 20AA Varsity track meet held at Rebel Stadium last Wednesday, May 21, the Rivercrest Rebel track team placed second in the meet and qualified nine members of the team for the Region III track meet.

In the field events, Joel Mangrum placed third in the pole vault and Charlie Skaggs placed fourth in shot put. The Reb team swept the high jump with Craig Clemmons placing first, Richie Winkler second, and Bradley Moore sixth. Randy Galloway gave Rivercrest a third place and Moore placed fourth in the long jump.

The Rebel sprint relay team, composed of Randy Galloway, James Noey, Larry Davis and Bradley Moore, qualified for the regional meet by placing second with a time of 46.2

seconds. Randy Randolph also qualified for region with an eleven minute, seven second, two mile run. Rusty Damon placed fourth in the two mile. Bradley Moore came in second in the 120 yard high hurdles only two hundredths of a second out of first.

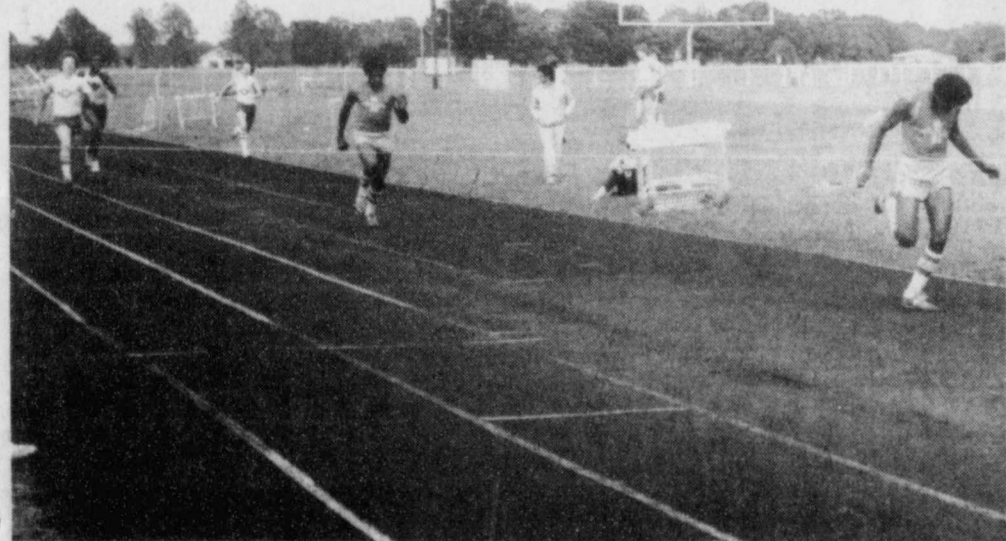
James Strickland finished third and Jim Earley placed fifth in the event. Lonnie Sheffield gave Rivercrest a first in the 880 yard run with a time of two minutes and ten seconds.

Galloway placed sixth in the 100 meter dash and Richie Winkler and James Noey came in third and sixth in the 220 yard dash. Larry Davis led the pack in the 440 yard dash with a regional qualifying time of 54.42 seconds. Billy Joe Stewart came in second and Jim Earley placed sixth in the event. Bradley Moore

qualified for his third regional event with a first place 40.19 time in the 330 yard high hurdles. Stan Wood placed fourth in the event.

Mark Brown placed third in the mile run and to cap off the day, the Rebel mile relay gave themselves a regional berth with a three minute 39.47 time in the mile relay. Running the mile are Lonnie Sheffield, Richie Winkler, Billy Joe Stewart and Larry Davis.

The Rebel team had a total of 159 points, just four points shy of Maud's first place showing. Head coach Milford Groves was very pleased with the performance and has high hopes for the team at the regional track meet to be held at R.E. St. John Memorial Stadium on the Kilgore College campus in Kilgore on May 7 and 8.

## Estimated Budget Released For District

Local school boards, city councils and the Red River County Commissioners Court will soon be receiving an estimated budget for the proposed Collections Department of the county appraisal district.

Wednesday, April 21, the Red River County Appraisal District Board of Directors approved a preliminary budget prepared by Chief Appraiser Gary Lesniewski. The budget is for a consolidated property tax collections system for all 11 taxing units in the appraisal district including Talco-Bogata ISD and the City of Bogata.

Several jurisdictions have expressed an interest in the appraisal district taking over the tax collecting duties. The district already is responsible for all appraisals as well as qualifying property owners for various exemptions and special use values. Lesniewski says with a single record for each property parcel, a single tax bill is now a possibility. However, each taxing unit must decide for itself if they want to retain the collections function or contract to the appraisal district.

Lesniewski said that if any of the 11 units decide to keep their collections, then a reworked budget reflecting the remaining workload will be proposed in June. The process will continue until all taxing units remaining approve a proposed budget submitted or until all reject a final proposal.

The \$65,000 budget compares with total expenditures by the 11 units of \$180,000 in 1981. Therefore, the potential savings under a consolidated collections system may go as high as \$100,000 district-wide.

"The savings per

jurisdiction depends on their previous budget and the number of parcels within the unit," Lesniewski commented. "The cost of the system for each taxing unit will be based on the number of parcels in it. We won't

know the final count until all the re-appraisal field work is completed, but we can about guess the cost."

Lesniewski will be available to present the collections system to each board and council and has

already lined several meetings to do so during the month of May. "We have made our proposal for the service and now it's up to each governing body to decide," the chief appraiser remarked. "We

are ready to help in this area if we are called upon."

Results of the decisions will be reported to the appraisal district board of directors at its next meeting May 24.

## Weekly Ag Update

Agricultural producers in East Texas and throughout the state are faced with serious economic decisions, according to Wayne Taylor, economist-management for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Unless the right decision is made, bankruptcy is almost certain in many instances.

Taylor says that newer producers who are buying land, equipment, cattle and other fixed assets are the hardest hit. With the current low price of most agricultural products and high interest rates, these producers are faced with a serious cash flow problem. It is often difficult to make just the interest payments on loans obtained to purchase the fixed assets. Therefore, any inputs into the agricultural operation must be carefully studied and sound decisions made to maximize the available resources.

Dr. Sim Reeves, Jr., Extension agronomist, indicates that the decision to fertilize pastures is critical this year. Some producers may rent additional land cheaper than they can fer-

tilize their own pastures. This substitution of added acreage for fertilizer can delay out of pocket costs for a year or more. During this economic crunch is an excellent time to cull the cow herd, says Dr. Randall Grooms, Extension livestock specialist. While the price of cattle is on the

upswing, as it normally is during April and May, is the time to go through the cow herd and cull those animals that will not produce a calf this year or that will be late in calving. Culling will also free up some of the pasture land for the better cows left in the herd.

### Aide Course Planned

An 11-week nursing aide training course is scheduled to begin on May 31 at Paris Junior College, according to Nancy Jackson, PJC's facilitator for allied health programs in continuing education. The 300-hour program will train nursing assistants for hospitals, nursing homes, physicians' offices and home health services.

Classes will be taught from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday in the PJC Downtown Center, 136 Grand Avenue. Fee for the course is \$225, and the textbook will cost about \$12. Those registering for the program must be at least 18 years of age, must have a physical examination and must provide three references.

Topics discussed will include basic anatomy, medical terminology, nutrition, illness symptoms, reading thermometers, counting pulse and respiration, reading blood pressure, patient care and hospital procedures.

Application may be made by calling Mrs. Jackson at the Downtown Center, 785-7661, extension 152, or going by the center.

## Hall Fighting

### Congress Tax Breaks

First District Congressman Sam B. Hall, Jr., a frequent critic of Congressional pay raises, has signed three discharge petitions aimed at forcing the House of Representatives to vote on legislation to eliminate special tax breaks for Members of Congress.

Last December, Congress enacted legislation giving itself a special tax write-off for living expenses in Washington. Using a complex parliamentary procedure, and without benefit of prior notification, members of the House were prevented from recording a vote on the bill.

Congressman Hall and a handful of his colleagues at the time strenuously objected to the scheme.

The East Texas legislator has vowed to use every legislative means to overturn the hastily-enacted measure.

Termining the \$75 per day tax deduction for Members of Congress a "backdoor pay raise," Mr. Hall said, "It is very unlikely that a bill rescinding this tax advantage will come to the House floor for a vote unless we can get sufficient signatures on a discharge petition to force the vote."

Under the rules of the House, if a bill is tied up in committee, it is possible to remove the committee's jurisdiction over the bill by getting 218 members of the House, which is one over 50 percent of the membership, to sign a discharge petition forcing the bill out of committee for a vote by the full House.

Last year, Mr. Hall led a successful discharge petition effort on a bill that had been languishing in the House Judiciary Committee for several years.

"As I have pointed out over and over, if Congress

wants a pay raise, tax benefit, or anything else, then at least have the intestinal fortitude to stand up and vote one way or the other. People elected us to record votes, and to duck a recorded vote on an important issue, especially a pay raise, is unconscionable," Mr. Hall said.

Congressman Hall said that he refused to take the special tax deduction on his recent federal income tax return.

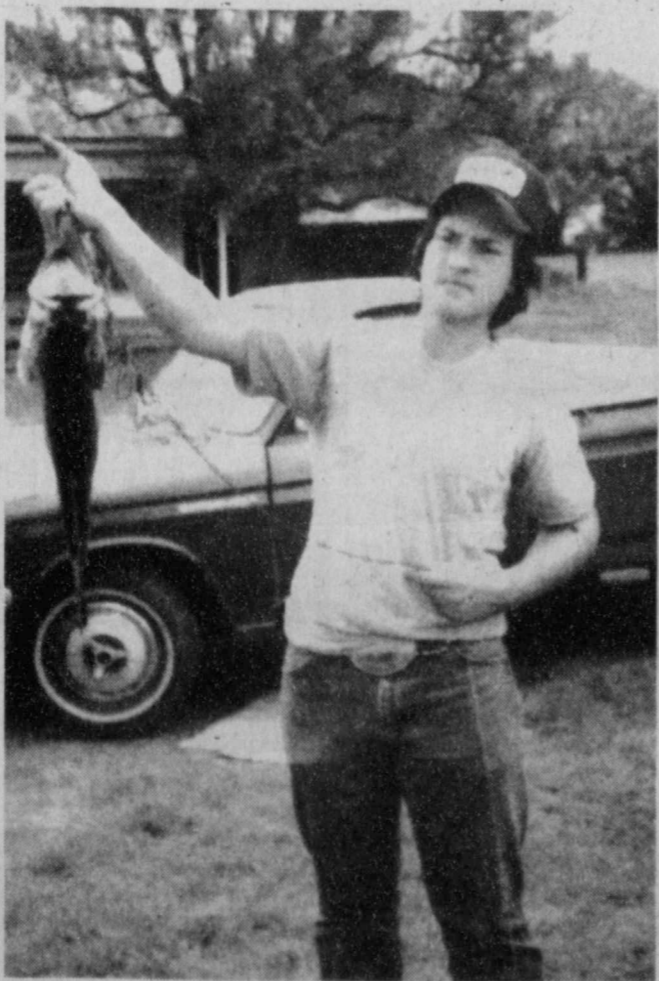

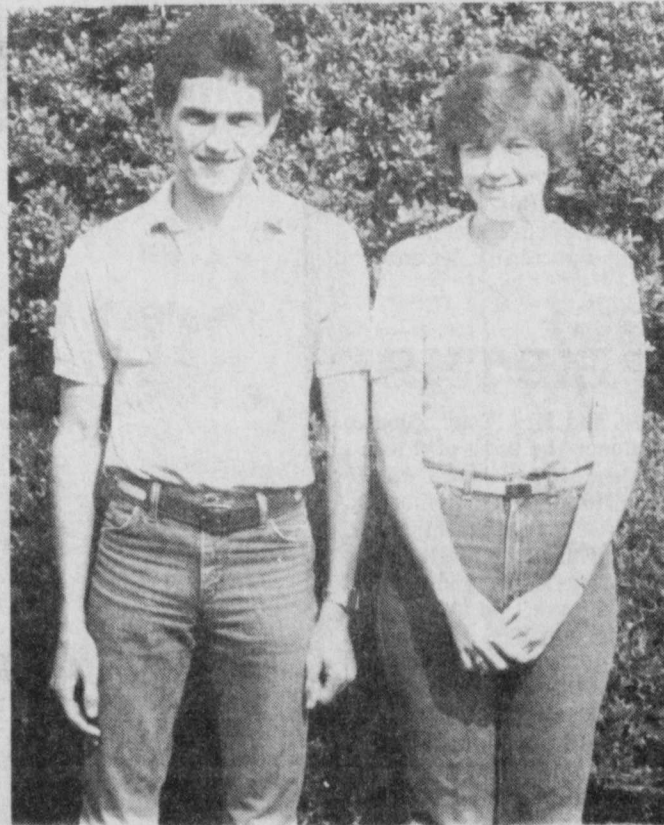

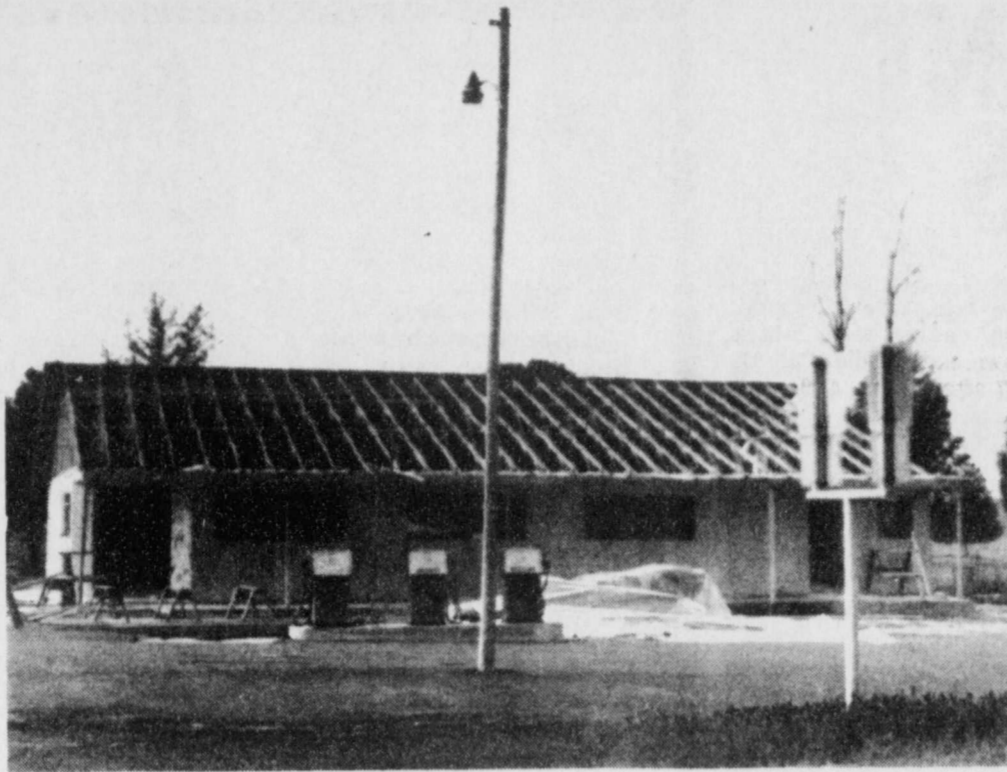

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has recently let a contract for grading, widening structures, base and surfacing.

The total length of the project is 8.366 miles with an estimated cost of \$1,929,794.55.

The proposed number of working days for completion

of this project is two hundred and forty days.

The limits of this project are from 1.4 miles south of Red River County Line, North to U.S. 271 at Bogata.

Work will begin Thursday, April 15 with present plans to place barricades and grading operations to start Monday, April 19.

The contractor is C.T. Martin, Inc. of Terrell and Boorhem-Fields Equipment Company of Paris.

At a pre-construction meeting, representatives of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation explained that certain hazards to the traveling public would be

prevalent on this project during the process of construction.

Adequate barricades, warning signs, and light will be prominently displayed by the contractor, but motorists should be extremely cautious in driving through the construction area.

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, the contractor, and law enforcement agencies appeal to motorists to obey all barricades, warning signs and exercise caution in traveling through the construction area.

## Weather Warning System Established

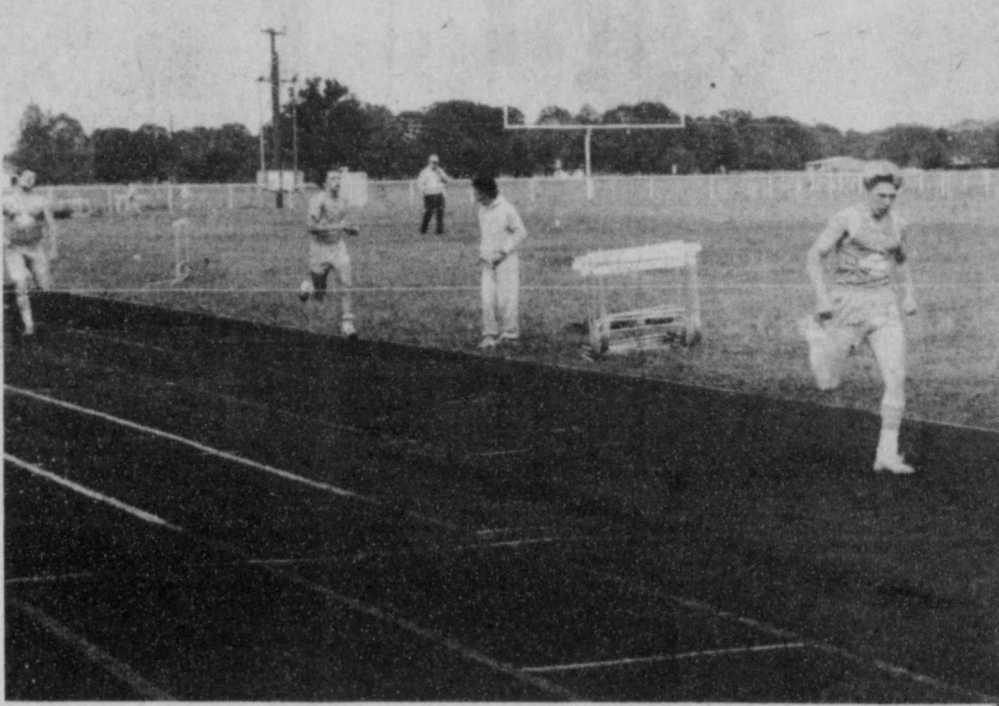
The Bogata Volunteer Fire Department wishes citizens to be aware that a weather watch warning system has been established.
