Since last Wednesday night we have covered two major accidents involving five vehicles and one fatality.

How the loss of life kept from being higher is something of a miracle.

But there is another near-miracle that occurs at these times that I've been observing for years. Too much cannot be said about it.

This near-miracle arrives in the form of volunteer firemen and rescue men.

I watched units from volunteers at Blossom and Reno work Wednesday night. I watched units from Bogata, Talco and Clarksville work Sunday afternoon. I've watched Deport, Pattonville, Cunningham...all of them, for the years.

They are tremendous. They do what has to be done...directing traffic, clearing dangerous debris, helping the injured, comforting the stricken. Sometimes what they do is difficult, dangerous work. Sometimes it is simply disturbing.

These people don't do this for a living. They take time out of their normal lives to train as much as they can. They may nly be faced with a specific situation once or twice during their "careers" as emergency personnel.

But they are always there...always working hard and doing a fantastic job.

Consider sometimes what an accident scene would look like without the volunteers. One highway patrolman, when he arrived from somewhere in his huge territory, a county deputy or two, also trying to cover a large area, and the paramedics in the ambulance...again called from a larger town and taking some time to arrive on the scene.

To this, add the traffic streaming by, curious onlookers, wreckage blocking the road, injured people needing attention, sometimes the danger of fire.

Without the volunteer firemen and emergency teams there would be chaos...not enough people to handle the situation.

Volunteer firemen do a great deal more than just go to fires. They are on hand to search for the lost, to help at wrecks, to work during tornadoes, they never know exactly what type of thing they will be doing.

But work they do. For as long as it takes, through whatever the crisis may be. Then they go home, bone weary, and resume whatever their lives routinely are.

They may not be the classic television heroes we watch performing amazing dramatics on the screen.

They are heroes.

One Killed, Two Injured In Wreck

One person was killed and two injured Sunday in a two-vehicle accident which occurred two miles southeast of Bogata on U.S. Highway 271.

Joy Nell Wilson, 58, of Denton was pronounced dead at the scene after the car in which she was a passenger with her mother was hit broadside by a pickup at 1:50 p.m., according to the Department of Public Safety report. Nellie Williams, 76, of Bogata and

Donna Stewart, 25, of Mt. Pleasant were taken by Emergency Medical Service to Titus County Memorial Hospital where Mrs. Williams remained Monday in stable condition. Mrs. Stewart was treated and released.

Mrs. Williams was driving a 1986 Ford Tempo southeast and attempted a left turn into her driveway when a 1975 Ford pickup, driven northwest by Mrs. Stewart, crashed into the right

side of the car, according to investigating DPS officer Jerry Conway.

Mrs. Stewart's two children, Joseph, 3, and Rebecca, 5, who were passengers in the pickup, were reported to be uninjured. Talco and Bogata EMS and firefighters responded to the call. Justice of the Peace J.C. Watson pronounced Mrs. Wilson, who was formerly of Bogata, dead at 2:40 p.m.

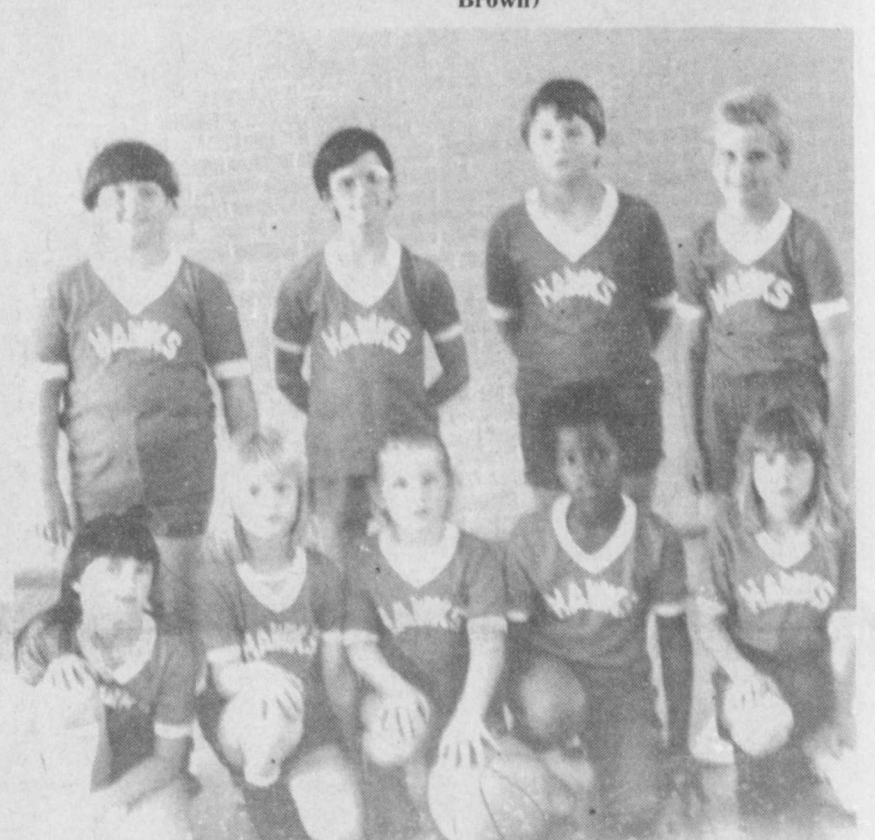
