Talco-Bogata School Board Candidates

Voters will go to the polls May 7 to vote for trustees to fill three positions, each for three-year terms on the Talco-Bogata Board of Trustees. Those places to be filled are Position 1-Talco, Position 4-Bogata and Position 7-Talco or Bogata.

Candidates for Position 1-Talco, are: incumbent Jerry Russell, Bruce Case and Dianne Duffie.

Jerry Russell is a graduate of Talco High School and East Texas State University with a Bachelor of Science and Master of Education degree in Physical and Elementary Education.

He holds a Lifetime Texas State Teacher Association membership and a teaching certificate. In addition, he is well acquainted with school business, having worked for the Talco-Bogata Schools for 11 years as Tax Assessor-Collector and Administrative Assistant. Recently he has satisfactorily completed 22 additional hours to meet state requirements for school board eligibility. He has served on the Talco-Bogata Board for the past seven years as vice-president for two years and president for three years. During his tenure there have been numerous renovations and improvements on all three campuses in an effort to better education children. A lifetime resident of Talco, Jerry is married to the former Barbara Mankins, who is a teacher at Rivercrest. They have two children, a son, Greg, a Rivercrest graduate completing his Associate Degree at Tyler Junior College, and a daughter, Jerilyn, a freshman at Rivercrest. All of the family are active members of Calvary Baptist Church where Jerry serves as deacon on a choir director. He is employed by Exxon as a senior operator. If given the privilege to serve on the Board again, Russell said, "I will continue to work for a quality education for our young people and at the same time, to get the most from our tax dollars."

Bruce Case is a life-long resident of Talco and a 1973 graduate of Rivercrest High School. He is presently serving as president of the Talco Baseball League and coach of the Wildcats (15-18) boys baseball team. He is a ten-year employee of Texas Utilities Mining Company in Winfield South. He is married to the former Tammie Hare and they have two children, Ryan, age 6, who attends Talco Elementary and Rachel, age 3. The family are members of the Calvary Baptist Church in Talco. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Buster Case, also of Talco. Bruce said, "I would like to have the opportunity to open the doors of education for all the children of our community."

Dianne Duffie is 40 years old. Her educational background is from Memorial High School in Houston and L.S.U. She has been involved in educational facets since 1972 serving in advisory capacities with the Texas Parents Teachers Association. She has served as Administrative Assistant, Public Affairs Office at NASA. She is an engineering technician being employed by NASA in that capacity also. Mrs. Duffie is presently Chief Executive Officer of Administration Duffie Electric in Talco. She performs the engineering design work for her company's Powerline Distribution Systems. She also has extensive hours in Pre-law and Psychology. Mrs. Duffie says she can understand the legal aspect of the school district and still understand the thoughts of the teachers and children. She is versed in bond issuance, appropriations for expenditures and the district tax base. Mrs. Duffie is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ritchie of Mt. Pleasant, who have been in the oil business for 35 years and are employed by Exxon, USA. She is married to Gene Ray Duffie, a lifetime resident of Johntown.

He has two sons, Gary, a junior at Rivercrest, and B.W., a fifth grader at Talco Elementary. Her son, Shane, is a 1985 graduate of Rivercrest and serves in the Intelligence Squadron at Bergstrom, AFB. She actively attends Calvary Baptist Church in Talco. Mrs. Duffie has served as a primary Sunday School teacher, sings in the choir, writes and directs the children's Christmas programs, helps prepare the church budget and bulletin. She states the following reason why she is running for the Talco Trustee position, "When I was chairman of the Special Olympics several years ago, I saw children who were mentally handicapped. I promised myself then when I felt I was mature in my own life, and if ever given a chance, I would help those who can learn. Our school system molds our children and they should be given every opportunity to grasp their

star and absorb all the knowledge possible. Our teachers are our greatest treasures. I know Talco and Bogata have gone through a difficult time as far as having to pay high taxes. I will strive to have the district tax ratio help our people and not hinder them."

Candidates for Position 4-Bogata are Neva Dell Burns and Greg Bagley.

Neva Dell Burns is a native of Bogata and a 1960 graduate of Bogata High School. She has been employed for 23 years at the First National Bank in Bogata. She has two daughters, RaNell Eudy of Tyler and Marty Burns, a junior at Rivercrest High School. Mrs. Burns is a member of the Administrative Council of the First United Methodist Church and is currently serving as Recording Secretary.

Greg Bagley is a resident of the

Rosalie community and is manager of Red River County Farm Bureau. His educational background includes a Bachelor of Science degree with a major in Economics and a minor in Business Administration from Midwestern University in Wichita Falls. Mr. Bagley has extended his educational training throughout the years with course work in the areas of Life Underwriters Training, Chartered Property and Casualty Underwriting and Limbra Agency Manager School.

He has attained experience with board procedures through serving as President of Farm Bureau District 6, on the Rivercrest Advisory Committee and Chairman of the Board of the Red River Appraisal District. He was drafted into the United States Army and received an honorable discharge. He is a Viet Nam vet after serving a year there in 1968. Mr. Bagley and his

wife, Karen, and their two children, Jeff and Jennifer, attend First Baptist Church in Bogata. Karen is employed by the Talco-Bogata School District and works on the Rivercrest Campus. Jeff is a freshman at Rivercrest High School and Jennifer is a sixth grader at Bogata Junior High. "I support continuance of quality education in the Talco-Bogata School District," stated Mr. Bagley.

Candidates for the At-Large Position 7 are incumbent Billy Daniels and Rex Orrill.

Billy Daniels has served as Pastor of the Johntown Missionary Baptist Church for the past 10 years. He and his wife, Mary Lou, have three children, Ricky Daniels and Susan Shirley of Johntown and Tim Daniels, a teacher in the Richardson Independent School District. They have five grandchildren, one who is in the first grade at Bogata, and two who will begin kindergarten at Bogata this

fall. Rev. Daniels graduated from Grand Saline High School in 1957. He attended Draughton's Business College and received a certificate from Texas Institute of Technology before entering Texas Baptist Institute and Seminary in 1962. He received a Bachelor's Degree and Masters Degree from T.B.I. and in 1984 earned a Doctor of Theology Degree. Rev. Daniels serves the Red River-Bowie Missionary Baptist Association as clerk and the Northeast Texas Baptist Mission Council as secretary-treasurer. In addition to his church duties, he also is a charter member of the Bogata Lion's Club and serves as the club's secretary-treasurer. He was appointed by the Commissioner's Court to serve on the Board of the County Child Protection Services and has served in that position approximately one year. Rev. Daniels has served on the school board for the past two years and has completed the State mandated requirements of 20 hours in school board education. He has received credit in all 12 standards for a total of 30.25 hours. "It is a real joy to be a part of this community and to have observed the progress made in the school system. I will strive to continue improvement of our schools if I am re-elected," said Rev. Daniels.

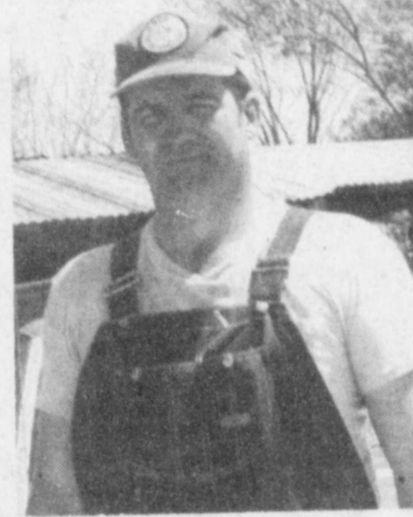

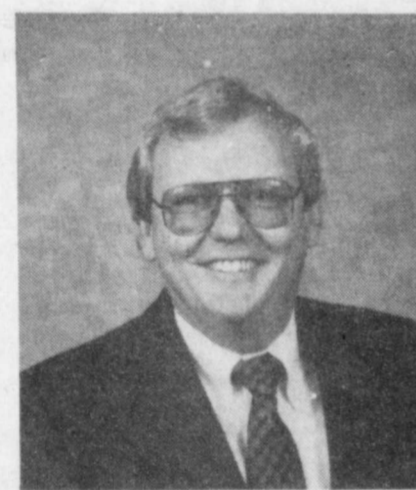

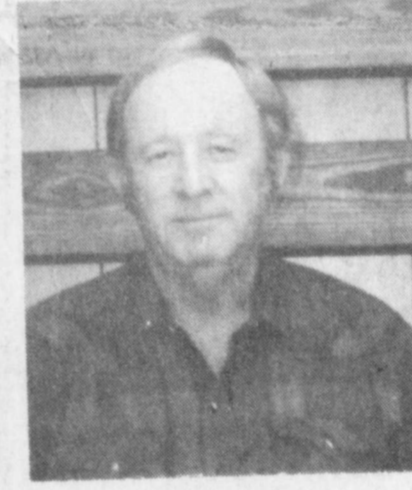

A number of items have been recovered and returned to Ward's Cash and Carry and items from the other burglaries are also in law officials' possession.

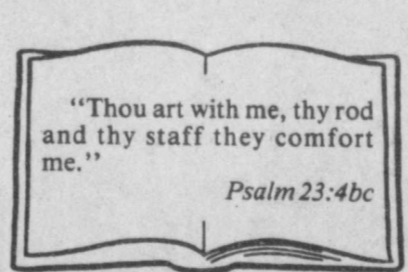

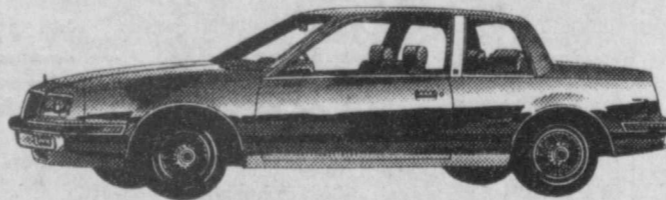

Pond Management Helps Fishing

By Herb Brevard

With the arrival of spring, interest in fishing is increasing. More than 800,000 ponds in Texas offer opportunities for excellent fish production. In East Texas, several opportunities and problems exist for pond owners, says Billy Higginbotham, fisheries specialist for the Prairie View A&M University Cooperative Extension Program.

Weed problems are beginning to develop in many ponds. Proper identification of the weeds must be made prior to the selection of herbicides for control. In ponds where weed problems already exist, the weeds should be controlled prior to any attempts to fertilize the ponds.

Fish producers report an excellent supply of all species of sport and forage fish adapted for stocking East Texas ponds. If catfish are to be stocked, a regular feeding program should be considered if maximum growth is desired.

Ponds managed for largemouth bass should be stocked with appropriate forage species and fertilized to increase production.

Higginbotham says that all pondowners and guess should keep records on the sizes and numbers of all species caught when fishing a pond. These records can serve as a valuable management tool for adjusting harvest rates of various sport species. Management programs initiated now can pay big dividends of good fishing throughout the remainder of the year.

But by far and away, the hardest job has been trying to pick out the pictures that make everyone look alert, attractive and attentive!



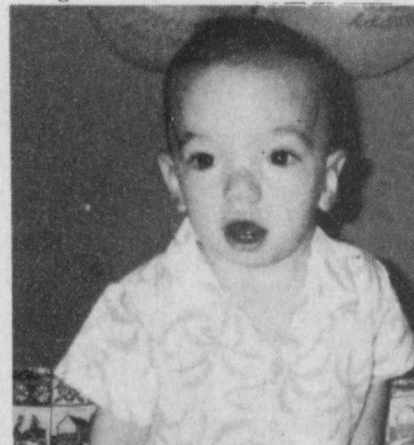
