# Seedling Disease

 Seedling diseases of vegetable plants have been fairly bad in late April and early May, according to Dr. George Philley. Cool night temperatures have contributed to conditions conducive to seedling disease growth. The diseases should subside with warmer temperatures.  
 anthracnose has been prevalent on some shade trees this spring. Ash, sycamore and oaks seem to be the hardest hit. Cooler temperatures also contribute to the existence of this disease. Philley says that in most years, the anthracnose is not severe enough to require chemical treatment. Any treatment should be done in the late dormant stage and again when leaves are emerging. Therefore, prevention is the rule rather than cure.  
 Some pine trees are suffering from die-back of the needles. The condition is found primarily in younger trees with branches all the way to the ground. The probable cause is needle cast fungus that infected the trees last summer or fall and the symptoms did not show until this spring. Control is generally not practical. The trees will look bad for several months, but should recover in most instances.

## Mildred Hill Whitt Dies May 10

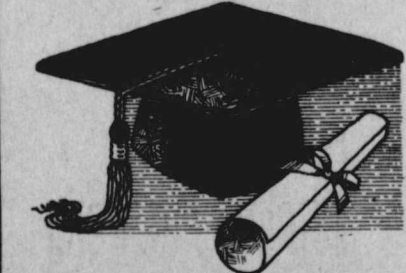
Mildred Hill Whitt, 72, of Paris, formerly of Bogata, died Tuesday, May 10 at St. Joseph's Hospital.

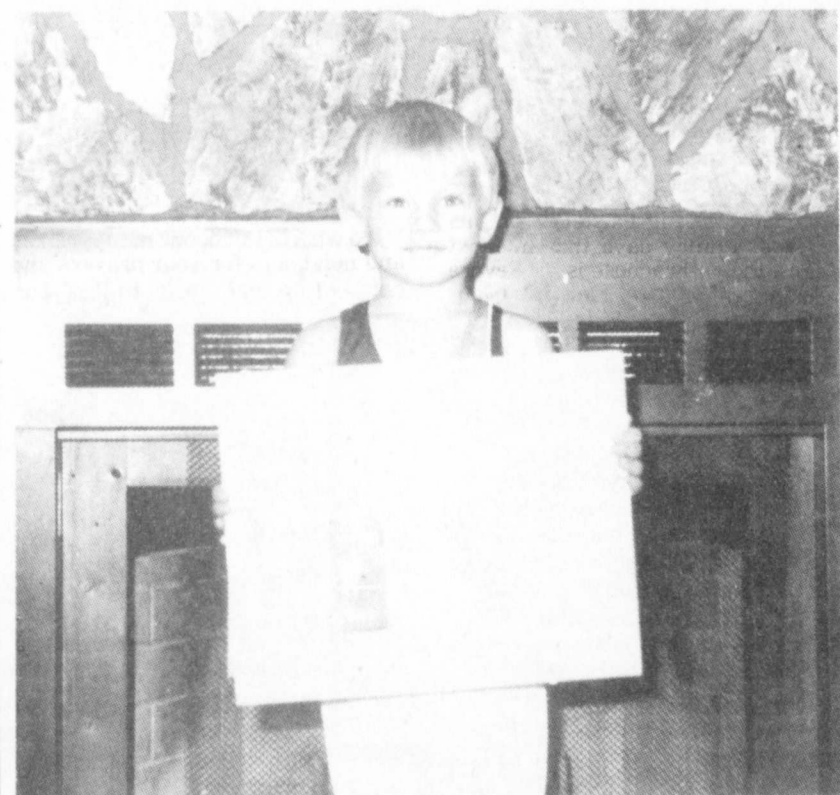

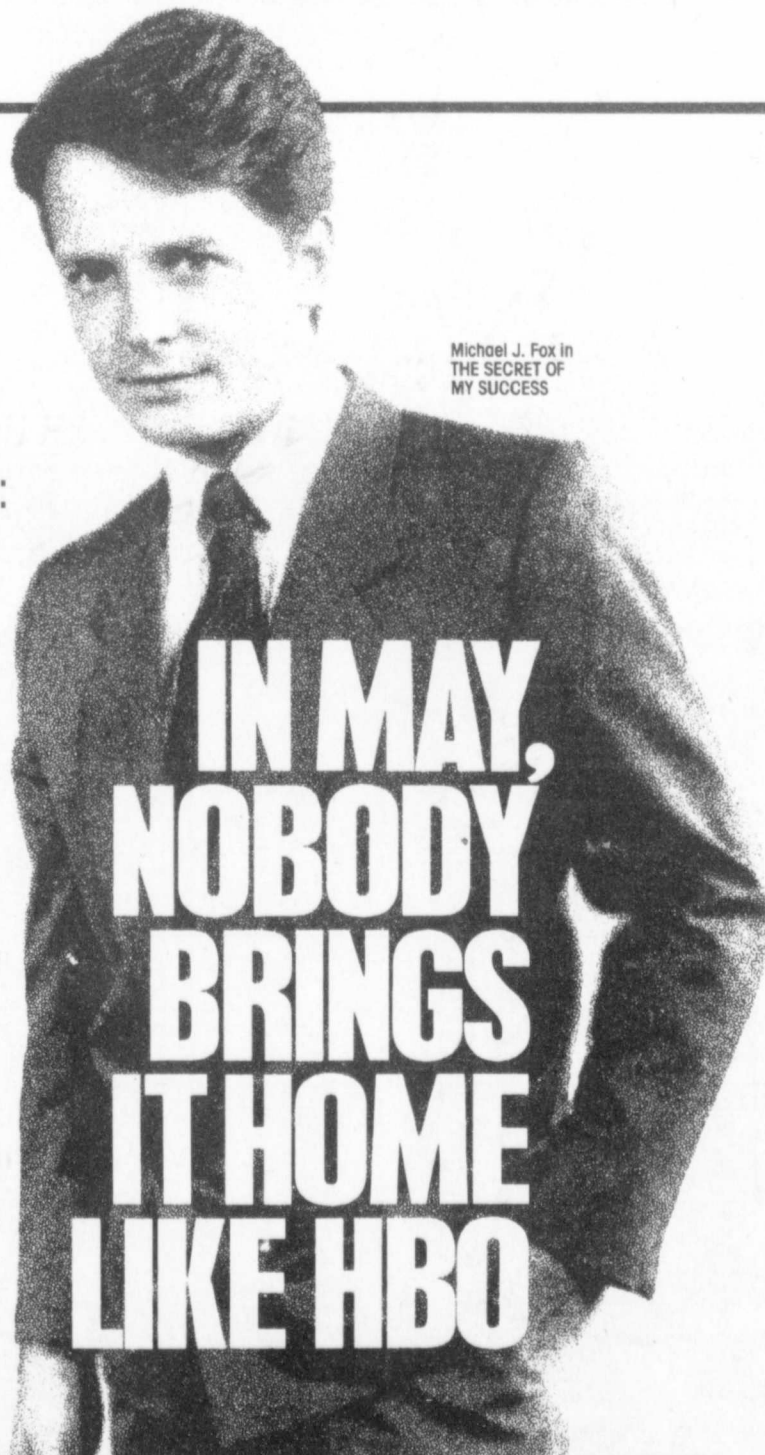

**Keeping Healthy**

**What Is Your Cholesterol Level?**

Like high blood pressure, a high cholesterol level is a major risk factor for heart disease and it, too, can be a "silent killer" because it usually presents no symptoms.

Following a diet low in fat and cholesterol is the mainstay of treatment for elevated blood cholesterol, and the physician may refer the patient to a qualified dietician to design one especially for the individual patient's needs.

When the patient does not respond sufficiently to the diet, an effective cholesterol-lowering drug may be added. This may be a drug belonging to a group called "resins"—either cholestyramine or colestipol in powder—which is usually mixed with a liquid such as a fruit juice, large amounts of nicotinic acid, or probucol tablets, which physicians report are particularly well-tolerated by patients.

Everyone should know what his or her cholesterol level is and many physicians now routinely check cholesterol levels as part of the annual physical examination. In families where there is a history of heart diseases before the age of 55 they recommend that children be checked at an early age.

## Rabies Chronic Problem

Rabies—also known as hydrophobia, the infection that makes dogs "mad"—is a chronic problem, says veterinarian Dr. Kelly. It has been around the county for years, and is sure to be around for years to come. Don't be complacent just because rabies is an old story, or because your pets are vaccinated regularly, Dr. Kelly advises. Rabies is commoner these days, especially among the skunk population, who may pass it to domestic animals. Skunks, particularly one making daylight appearances and acting strangely, should be avoided like the plague—its bite may be far worse than its smell.

In Red River County, four skunks, one cow and one bat have recently been confirmed as victims of the dread disease. Other cases have been unconfirmed only because the animals had bitten nobody, making the confirming tests an unnecessary expense.

No human beings have died of rabies in recent times, but during the past year, sixteen Red River Countians have taken preventative shots after probably exposure. Without the shots, several of the sixteen would have died, for rabies is invariably fatal.

That is why you must have shots if bitten or scratched, even if you are unsure that the animal whose saliva you absorbed was rabid, and even though a course of three rabies shots may cost nearly a thousand dollars. Painful daily shots over a period of weeks are no longer required, thanks to the development of more powerful vaccines.

Any warm-blooded animal can get rabies, says Dr. Kelly. The surest symptom in pets, livestock or wild animals is inability to use the mouth in normal ways. Nervous departures from usual behavior are also suspicious. "Mad" dogs may be either excited and aggressive or partially paralysed and unusually passive. In cattle, constant straining often accompanies abnormal grimacing.

Dr. Kelly finds it particularly ironic that something as off-the-wall as high cattle prices may put Red River Countians at extra risk of rabies. When Old Brindle starts straining and writhing her lips, her big price tag is likely to make her owner especially concerned to learn what the matter is. Fooling around with the mouth of a rabid cow is to expose yourself to dangerously infected saliva.

A person bitten or scratched by an animal should immediately wash the area thoroughly with soap and water. The animal should be penned up and watched by a qualified person for symptoms of rabies. If such symptoms are seen, the victim should lose no time before seeing his doctor to begin injections of vaccine immediately.

If the animal cannot be found, the injections should nevertheless be taken as a safety measure, Dr. Kelly advises.
