Local Sales Tax Figures Show Increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent checks totaling \$120.7 million to 1,041 cities and 81 counties that levy local option sales taxes.

"The economy of Texas is recovering," Bullock said, "and the consumer confidence is reflected in the rebates going to local governments."

City sales tax rebates totaled \$111.4 million.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$9.3 million to the counties which have approved a half-percent county sales tax. The largest allocation this month went to Houston, \$19 million. El Paso County received the biggest county

allocation, \$1.3 million.

Blossom received \$3,447.64 for a 5.82 percent increase while Deprot received \$2,961.55 for a 9.38 percent increase over last year's payments.

Paris received \$246,805.47 for an 8.11 percent increase.

Bogata received \$4,651.24 for a 4.60 percent increase while Clarksville received \$215,687.13.

Detroit received \$4,129.43 for a 100.39 percent increase.

Mt. Pleasant received \$111,381.87 and Talco received \$3,329.20 for a 1.33

percent increase over last year's payment for the same period.

May's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in March and quarterly filers for the first quarter that were reported to the Comptroller's office by April 12.

The wedding photographers were Jimmy Smith and Keith Woods, friends of the bride.

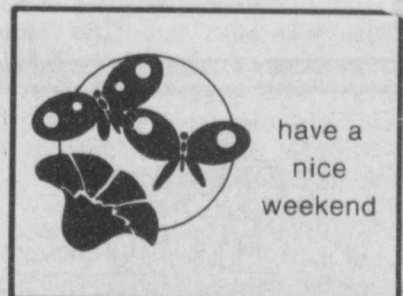

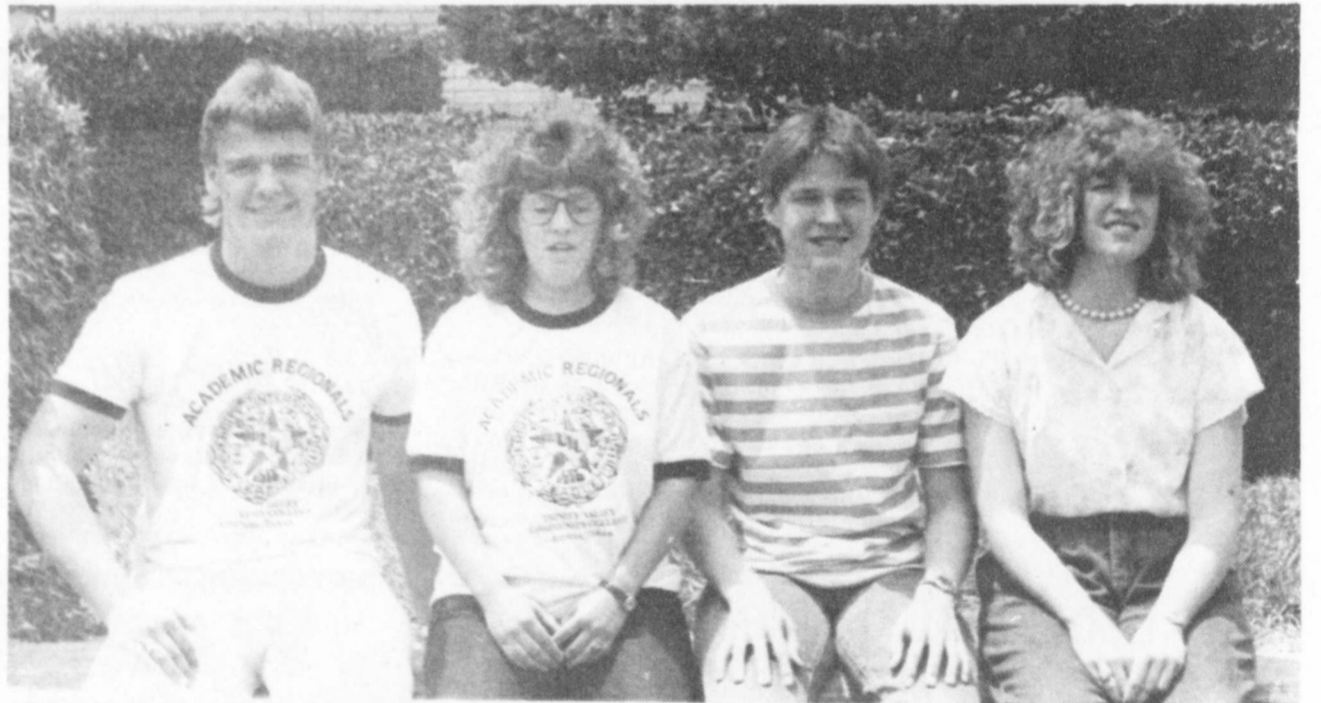

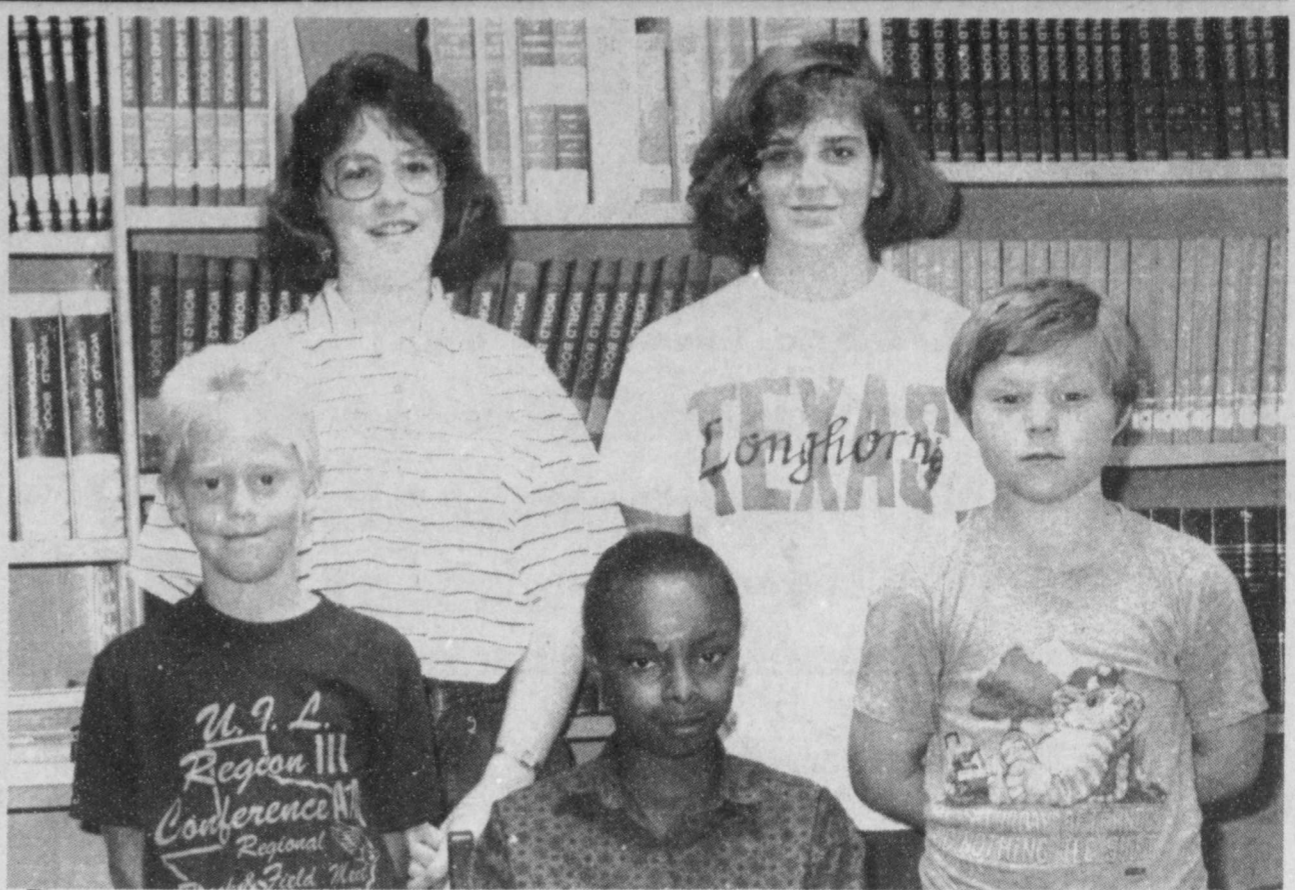
