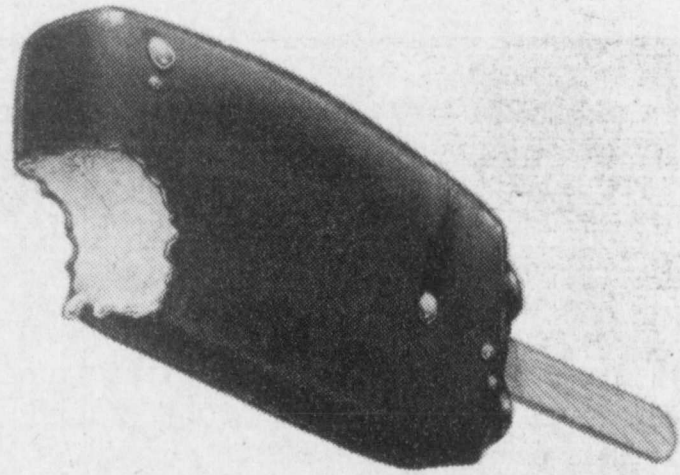

## Eligibility Guidelines Announced For Reduced-Price Meals

The Talco-Bogata Schools serve nutritious meals every school day. Students in grades K-8 may buy lunch for \$1.05 per day or \$5.25 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades 9-12 may buy lunch for \$1.20 per day or \$6.00 if they purchase a weekly ticket. Students in grades K-8 may buy breakfast for 55¢ and high school students may buy breakfast for 65¢.

Children from households that meet Federal Income guidelines are eligible for free meals or reduced-price meals at 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast. To apply for free or reduced-price meals, an application must be completed, signed and returned to the school.

If you are currently receiving Food Stamps or Aid to Families with Dependent Children for your child, you only have to list your child's name and food stamp or AFDC case number, print your name and sign the application. Since you have already given income information to the welfare office, the school can confirm your eligibility.

If your household income is at or

below the level shown on the scale, your child is eligible for either free or reduced-price meals. To apply for meal benefits, you must provide the following information and sign the application: list the names of everyone who lives in your household. Include parents, grandparents, all children, other relatives and unrelated people who live in your household, list the social security number of each adult age 21 or older. If an adult does not have a social security number print "None", list total monthly income and amount of income, before deductions for taxes, social security, etc., each person received last month and where it is from, such as wages, retirement or welfare. If you have a household member for whom last month's income was higher or lower than usual, list the person's expected average monthly income.

The information on the application may be checked by school officials at any time during the school year.

If you list income information and your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by \$50 or more per month, or when your household size decreases.

If you list a food stamp case number or AFDC number, you must tell the school when you no longer receive food stamps or AFDC for your

child. Your foster child may be eligible for meal benefits. If you wish to apply for meal benefits for a foster child, contact the school for help with the application.

Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C.

If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official: Harold Cowley, Box 130, Bogata, TX 75417 or call 632-5205.

The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determination and verification of data.

You may apply for benefits any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but need to apply later in the year, please fill out an application at that time. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

The three sentences total 62 years.

## Former Resident Is Successful Romance Novelist

When Sibylle Garrett lived in this area 11 years ago working as a physical therapist for Red River General Hospital and Red River Haven Nursing Home, little did she realize that she would become a successful author of romance novels, writing under contract for Silhouette Books. Mrs. Garrett admits that her success did not come overnight, but was obtained by a lot of hard work and perseverance.

Mrs. Garrett began her writing career at the urging of friends who felt that her years of traveling around the world would serve as a basis for interesting stories. Her friends were right! Using settings in Afghanistan, Mexico and Arizona, Mrs. Garrett eloquently creates characters and situations that keep romance readers enthralled page after colorful page.

Sibylle Garrett was born in Berlin, but, as stated on the inside cover of her books, considers herself a citizen of the world. Her father's work as a German diplomat kept her family moving from place to place. Her trav-

els continued after her marriage to Wade Garrett, who was a psychology student attending schools in different states. Mr. Garrett was a 1958 graduate of Bogata High School and also traveled extensively with his parents. His father, Thomas Garrett, was employed for many years by Haliburton Oil Co. During those years, the family lived in Bolivia, Columbia and Italy. They now reside in Bogata on Highway 37 south.

Wade and Sibylle Garrett, along with their two children, settled in Long Island. Unable to pursue her career as a physical therapist due to other obligations she now had, Mrs. Garrett found herself bored and in need of a challenge. So with encouragement from family and friends, she began writing romantic novels.

Mrs. Garrett is quick to confess that as a school girl, she never really liked writing. "As a matter of fact," she says laughing, "I hated it!" She refers to herself as a good storyteller and says she has always enjoyed reading romance stories. She says

these traits, along with her vast geographical knowledge, education and determination helped her accomplish what she set out to do. Her husband is also involved in her work.

He edits her stories and sets them on the computer. Although she speaks English fluently, as well as French and Farsi, she says his help has been essential to her success.

Books written by Sibylle Garrett and published by Silhouette Books are "September Rainbow" and "Surrender to a Stranger". Her third book, "A Rebel's Return" is a sequel to her first book and will be available to the public in January. Her books have been published in the United States, Canada and in most of the French speaking countries in Europe.

Mrs. Garrett and hand have just returned from visiting friends in Arizona. While there she gathered material for her next novel, already taking shape in her mind.
