



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David Crum Receives TP&W Stewart Award

David Crum received the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Lone Star Land Steward Award May 26, 2004 in Austin for work he completed on the Frost & Leland Sandhills Ranch in Yoakum County, Texas for the June Leland Wildlife Foundation. Among those attending the award ceremony were Kay Crum, Sarah Crum Albers, Lindsay Meeks, Jim Frost, Rep. Jim and Leslie Keffer, Rob Keffer, and Dan Bullock.

The June Leland Wildlife Foundation, formed in 2001, took a 20 year lease of the ranch's 7,418 acres, a surviving remnant of original mixed grass prairie of the High Plains Region of Texas, and began an effort to preserve and improve the wildlife habitat and numbers of wildlife of the ranch. These and surrounding lands were once home to large numbers of lesser prairie chicken, mule deer, and pronghorn antelope whose numbers have dwindled due to loss of habitat. The Lesser prairie chicken, a rare upland game bird resembling a grouse, is a candidate for listing as an endangered species.

In 2001, 2003, and 2004 the foundation entered into cooperative agreements and contracts with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, US Fish & Wildlife Service, USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service, Sandy Land Soil and Water Conservation District, and Texas Soil and Water and Conservation Board to cost share efforts to improve wildlife habitat on the ranch. These agreements included the construction of permanent solar powered wildlife watering facilities, establishment of food plots, deferred grazing during growing seasons, and enhancement of habitat by reduction of undesirable plants. The partnering of the several agencies with a common goal has been of great benefit to the success of the effort.

In April of 2003 TPWD wildlife scientists and PHD students from Texas A & M University began a three year study of the ranch's lesser prairie chicken population. Substantial improvements in the numbers of the lesser prairie chicken have been noted in 2004, and it is hoped



that successful efforts like of conservation and habitat this will help prevent the bird from being placed on the EPA endangered list.

The June Leland Wildlife Foundation seeks funding assistance from the public and other non-profit organizations to pay an annual ranch lease payment and costs of implementation

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improvement plans.

Future plans include development of permanent public wildlife viewing areas educational and recreational purposes.

"David and Kay Crum and the June Leland Wildlife Foundation have become good stewards of this fragile but important habitat," said Duane Lucia, Texas Parks and Wildlife Biologist. "They have conservation instilled in everything they do to the property."

On July 16, 1969, three men began a voyage that would forever change our world, and mark their place in the history books. They were aboard the Apollo 11 spacecraft that launched from Cape Kennedy with a simple mission objective: "Perform a manned lunar landing and return safely." On July 20, just significantly since Neil four days after jettisoning into orbit, Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin became the first humans to step foot on another planet. Their lunar module, Eagle, touched down in the Sea of Tranquility on the Moon, while the third crew member, Michael Collins, the pilot and navigator for the mission, orbited above in the command module Columbia. The first words uttered on the moon, "That's one small step for a man, one giant leap for mankind," have become synonymous with space exploration and the innately American drive to continue that spirit of discovery. The two astronauts traversed the moon's surface collecting the first ever lunar samples, taking photographs and conducting

atmosphere, splashing into the Pacific Ocean where they were greeted by the aircraft carrier, Hornet, a beaming President Nixon, and a nation overflowing with goodwill,


I was a young television reporter in Houston, when I covered the heroic Apollo 11 astronauts and their families during the 1969 moon landing. Since that time I've been an enthusiastic backer of manned space exploration and in my 11 years in the Senate I've worked hard to ensure America keeps pushing the envelope; maintaining our space program as a top priority, and assuring our technological edge in the world continues.

Our world has changed Armstrong took the giant leap for mankind 35 years ago and many of the changes have been fueled by discoveries made in space. Microchips, satellite communication, cordless appliances, CAT scans and guided missiles were all advanced by the knowledge we gained in space. Even that initial lunar landing produced discoveries such as the knowledge that the Moon is lifeless, containing no living organisms, fossils, or native organic compounds, enabling us to learn more about the world that surrounds us. After the Space Shuttle Columbia disaster last year, we've been forced to reevaluate our space program and infuse NASA with a renewed mission experiments. Four days later objective for the future of Thursday, July 15, 2004 space exploration. This year President Bush unveiled a new vision for NASA, committing the U.S. to a longterm human and robotic program to explore the solar system, beginning with a return to the Moon that will enable future explorations of Mars and other destinations. proposals tremendous potential to further research in energy, geology, and other fields. This spring the robotic rover, Opportunity, discovered that there was once water on Mars and therefore possibly life.

And all the while, NASA has continued its missions into space. Just last month the spacecraft Cassini successfully entered orbit around Saturn. The mission, taking place 934 million miles away from earth, and with the cooperation of our partners at the European Space Agency and the Italian Space Agency, began seven years ago when the craft first left Cape Canaveral in 1997. For the next four years the Cassini will orbit Saturn, executing 52 close encounters with seven of the planet's 31 known moons. This mission is just one slice of the amazing work being conducted by the scientists, researchers and astronauts who strive to keep discovery in the forefront of our consciousness.

This month as we celebrate the 35th anniversary of man's first footsteps on the moon, we commemorate Apollo 11, the pioneers who manned it and the great spirit of discovery that still dwells in us today. It also reminds us that staying in the forefront of space exploration will help us grow the economy and maintain defense prowess. With an ambitious plan in place, the 21st century could bring untold discoveries.

Internet gambling is now a \$3.5 billion per year business in the U.S., some three times bigger than revenues for Internet porn sites and expected to double in the next few years. This is made all the more shocking when gambling is illegal in the United States. Internet gambling is based largely on offshore sites in places like Antigua where more than 100 Internet gambling sites operate out of the capital city of St. John's.

Since the year 2000, Internet gambling sites have increased by 80 percent with some 67 percent of the access to these sites taking place at work. In other words, about two-thirds of the time people gamble on the Internet, they do so on company time. No matter what you think about gambling, think about this fact in terms of work ethic and business productivity.

Legal gambling operations in the United States are now investing in off shore illegal Internet

gambling enterprises because the opportunity to make more cash is so good. Even American credit card companies are allowing people to transfer funds to Internet gambling sites via their charge cards, typically using coded entries.

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Just Remembering

Someone has asked me to write about the things I remember, regarding the work I did in Africa. I was chosen to assist in building a Liquefied Natural Gas plant in Northern Africa, in the mid to late 1970s.

I have vivid memories of next article. the airplane rides, the people, their culture, as well as some natives who became dear friends of mine.

It all began because of my membership in the Steamfitter's Union. I was employed in Houston, Texas, as an Instrument Foreman. My crew of men installed various gauges, sensors, pneumatic and electrical devices, throughout the large plant under construction in Pasadena.

One of the Union Business Agents called me on the phone and told me he was sending me to Africa. I exploded! I didn't want to go to Africa.

He explained the job would only be for three months. I was to take three men with me, and we would be paid handsomely. Reluctantly, I accepted the offer.

While waiting for our passports, we received our four medical shots. Traveling to Arabia in 1948, it was necessary for me to receive 16 shots before leaving the United States. Traveling to the U.S. possession, Alaska, in1947 only required 12 shots. I guess that makes me a big shot.

Leaving Houston at midnight, Air France took us for an eight hour ride to Charles de Gaulle Airport in the north part of Paris. We later traveled to Marseille for a twoday stay, until we received our Visas.

I am sure most of our readers have suffered jet lag. All four of us were so confused we hardly knew what we were doing. Our watches told us it was 8:00 a.m., but the real time there was 2:00 p.m. It was confusing to us.

The French people were quite hospitable. The food was delicious and our hotel was first-rate.

We were quite disappointed when we arrived in Africa. It was a far cry from the way we were accustomed to living in the good old USA. For a moment, we forgot about all the wonderful, modern things we had back home; things that we take for granted.

Going through Customs was quite an ordeal, especially since none of us could speak the native language. The officials were very courteous however, and we were finally admitted to their country.

After a 40-minute bus ride to our camp at the construction site, we were assigned private rooms and since we. had not eaten for about seven hours, we hastened to the Mess hall, to sample the food. What a surprise! The food was prepared by a gentleman chef from England, and we were treated





Cotton Council Chair Tackles WTO, Cotton

The Plains Cotton Growers Association met in Lubbock this week, and Woody Anderson, chairman of the National Cotton Council, came out swinging against the World Trade Organization (WTO).

As you may recall, unofficial reports indicate that the WTO ruled this spring that federal subsidies to U.S. cotton farmers violate WTO rules regarding agricultural policy.

Anderson said he finds it "incredulous" that "the soaring value of the dollar, a 25 percent increase in Asian polyester production and a record cotton crop in China with ensuing exports could be ignored" by the WTO.

Woody also noted, accurately, that the "2004 cotton program does not support cotton at a higher level than we did in 1992."

He also pointed out the U.S. share of the world cotton market is virtually unchanged over the past 30 years at two percent, while the combined market share of Brazil and China is expected to climb by six points to 34.5 percent in 2004.

I totally agree with Woody's assessment of this. When we appeal this, I look forward to finally having the opportunity to sit down and read the position of the WTO panel and then use that knowled the edge to begin coming up with

a solution.

An ideal solution is for the appeal to be successful, and we throw out this case and wait for a new WTO round to begin to get new policy that will in fact be in the best interests of cotton farmers everywhere in the world, including here in West Texas.

South Plains Cotton

The past couple weeks have created some trouble for cotton growers in the South Plains. In many areas rain, hail, and wind have taken around 100,000 acres of the

However, Texas Cooperative Extension agronomists say the outlook for the overall cotton season is bright. In some areas there have been cooler, wetter conditions with higher humidity, but the crops are still above normal in heat unit accumulation.

Texas farmers planted approximately six million acres of cotton this year. About onethird of these crops are irrigated and the rest is dryland.

Overall, the 2004 Texas cotton crop is off to a strong start and is progressing well. The excellent sub-soil moisture conditions give the crop a yield potential of at least 5.3 million bales compared to last year's 4.3 million bales.

Rural Development Matters

As you may have heard me mention these last few weeks, the House Appropriations Committee has made some tough cuts in Farm Bill programs to be able to fund other areas, like animal identification, BSE testing, and salaries and expenses for USDA agen-

This week I want to give cut 30 percent. you a few things to chew on regarding the implications this budget has on matters of importance to rural development and rural America.

Rural business investments,

broadband loans, value-added grants, local TV loan guarantees, and rural firefighters are all programs that took hits.

Of the nearly \$1.3 billion that was cut from the Farm Bill, \$426 million of the Farm Bill funding cuts were in rural development programs.

Take value-added grants for example. Value-added grants help to increase agricultural producers' share of the food and agricultural system profit, including the small- and medium-sized farms and ranches. All \$80 million allotted, cut.

Rural business investments allow investment companies to leverage their equity resources, increasing equity funds for rural America. Out of \$324 million allotted, it was

Broadband loans are used to encourage new broadband technologies in rural areas, including terrestrial and satellite wireless service. All \$40 million allotted, cut.

The rural firefighters program provides training to firefighters and first responders and cost-share expenses to improve training facilities. The whole \$30 million, cut.

As we can see, the Fiscal Year 2005 Ag Appropriations cut many programs that help our rural communities. Out of the \$654 million that was enacted for Fiscal Year 2005, \$426 million was cut. That's a 65 percent cut in rural spending. This will surely hit home to our farmers and ranchers and business men and women in the 17th district.

These statistics are compounded when you consider that agriculture and rural America have not enjoyed the economic growth that almost every other segment of society now enjoys.

The private sector is key to solving these problems, but the private sector cannot do it all without public sector assistance. That's why the areas of

federal funding that I mentioned earlier are so important to rural America.

Windstorm Reduction

This week I spoke on the House floor in support of H.R. 3980, the National Windstorm Impact Reduction Act. As many of you know, I am a long-time supporter of efforts to reduce the damaging effects of high winds.

I have consistently supported the Texas Tech Wind Science Center and other research entities that study the best ways to reduce structural damage caused by high winds.

Back in 1997, U.S. Senator

Thursday, July 15, 2004 Kay Bailey Hutchison and I worked together to ensure the Texas Tech Wind Science Center got its first federal earmark of \$3.8 million, which was included in an appropriations bill in Fiscal Year 1998.

All these efforts paid off and the Wind Science Center has received anywhere between \$1.1 million and \$2.4 million each year since then.

A trip to the Stephenville Public Library provided a day of enjoyment for all who went and a day of genealogical finds for part of the ones who went. It is interesting to see what other libraries have for our use. If a person were able to absorb all the information that is available one would be very intelligent. I also feel certain that one would have many

awards in genealogy. Have you ever wondered what motivated early immigrants to come to America? I have and often we do not think of all the people had gone through in their homeland before seeking a new home. Very often the reason people left their home was because of hatreds in their land. Many times it was for religious freedom. By 1661 Charles II of England had granted a Royal Charter that permitted 'freedom of molestation, punishment or disquiet for religious views." About 1 1/ 2 million Irish came to America mostly in 1840-1850 because of a famine resulting in potato crop failure. The reason about 4 million Germans came to America in the 1840-1880's was great depression and unemployment; political unrest and failure of liberal revolutionary movement. The Danes, Norwegians, and Swedes numbering about 1 1/2 million came in 1870's-1900's because of poverty and shortage of farm land. About 1 million Poles came to America in 1880's-1920's because of poverty, political repression, and cholera epidemics. In 1880's-1920's about 2 1/2 million Jews from Eastern Europe came to America because of religious persecution. In that same time frame about 4 million Austrians, Czechs, Hungarians, and Slovaks came because of poverty and overpopulation. The same reason brought about 4 1/2 million Italians to America in 1880's-1920's. 1910-1920's about 700,000 Mexicans came to America because of

the Mexican Revolution, low ages and unemployment. Then in 1950's-1980's another 1 1/2 million Mexicans came seeking better living conditions. About 600,000 Cubans came to America in 1960's-1980's because of Fidel Castro's take-over in 1959. 1970's-1980's the Cambodians, Laotians and Vietnamese came in numbers of about 165,000 because of the Vietnam War and the Communist take-over.

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Tom DeLay Investigation **Shifts To Corporations**

By Viola Payne

In late May this newspaper published an article called "The Murky World of Investigations."

It detailed the investigation of Tom DeLay, U.S. Speaker of the House, Tom Craddick, Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, and others by Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle.

The focus of the investigations was whether there was illegal spending of corporate money by Republicans during the 2002 election year in Texas.

There was also a spin-off investigation of former met in Austin and considered Speaker of the House Pete Laney, a Democrat.

In an update, Earle recently told a newspaper that this investigations had expanded to include at least five

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political organizations, a number of individuals and the corporations which financed them.

The D.A. commented that the investigation wasn't just about Tom DeLay, but corporate greed. He said they (the corporation) could always find another Tom DeLay.

But Earle, who is also investigating election spending by the Texas Association of Business, said that no individual or organization has been cleared yet. He stated that anybody who committed a crime is a target.

Several Grand Juries have evidence about the spending, which allegedly helped finance the Republican takeover of the Texas Legislature.

Earle is investigating whether the business associa-

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Thursday, July 15, 2004 tion and DeLay's committee illegally spent a combined \$2.5 million in corporate money to win the State House majority.

This majority and Tom Craddick installed as Speaker of the House, gave the power to redistrict. Reportedly the GOP gives Tom DeLay credit for resolving what they called "A West Texas problem" in this redistricting.

He spent three days last fall in shuttle diplomacy between the Texas Capitol chambers to finalize support for the maps that demolished the 17th District, expanded the 19th District and placed Midland (Tom Craddick) in a newly formed 11th District.

District Attorney Ronnie Earle is a Democrat, and for a long time the Republicans have accused him of using his office for political purposes. He has not indicted anyone in these investigations yet, and some are wondering if he will be able to do that.

A development this concerned a document turned up in the Enron investigation which allegedly implicates DeLay in fundraising there.

In the past, Earle has won some high profile cases and lost a few. So his current investigation is an on-going story.

> D. D. Parramore (1875-1946), who grew up in and around Abilene during its infancy, was a rancher, not an artist. Yet in the mid-1930s Parramore began drawing a series of pencil sketches to entertain and instruct his two young grandchildren, Eleanor Sellers (Hoppe) and Dilworth Parramore Sellers. Each sketch was drawn with a nickel pencil on unlined tablet paper with laborious hand-lettered captions.

The sketches illustrate Parramore's view of early west Texas and offer an unromanticized version of the life of early settlers and cowboys as he remembered them. His drawings show little glamour but focus instead on the humor and reality of everyday life.
