For amateur auto mechanics there are impact wrenches, and electronic gadgets for calculating everything from fuel consumption to tire balance.

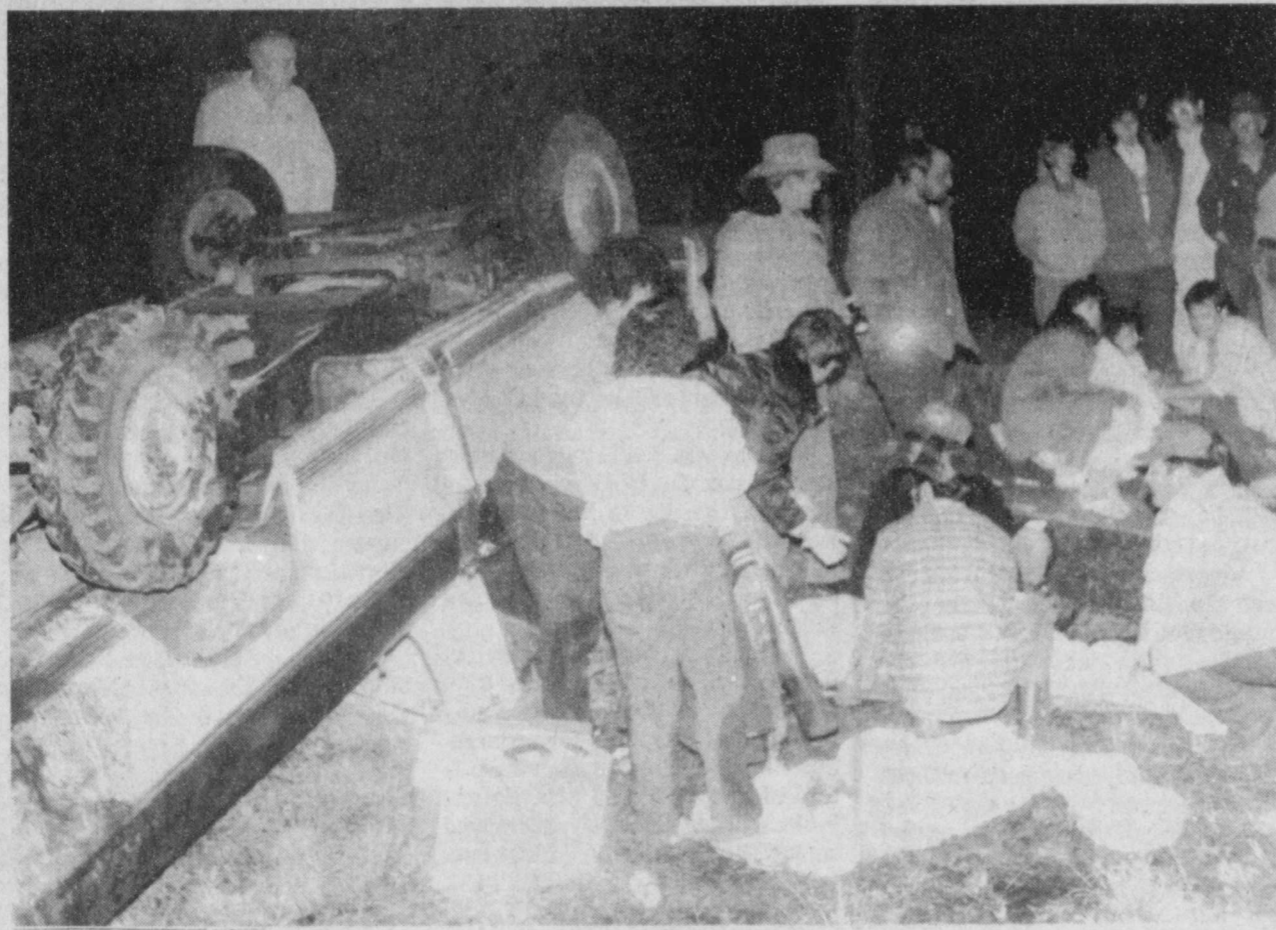
There are electric hair dryers, rollers, curling irons, manicure buffers, massagers, even chairs that vibrate!

A one-vehicle accident occurring Wednesday, December 28, on Highway 909 just outside of Bogata, injured two teenaged girls. Todd Duffer, driver of the 1972 Ford pickup truck, escaped without physical injury.

According to reports, the teenagers were traveling west when an animal ran in front of the vehicle. Duffer applied his brakes, causing the truck to "fish tail". A tire blew out then,

causing the truck to flip, throwing one of the passengers, Jerri Kay Bridges, from the vehicle. Duffer climbed from the wreckage and with the help of Miss Bridges, pulled the third passenger, Barbara Richards of Bonham, from the vehicle.

Both girls were transported to a Paris hospital and later transferred to Parkland Hospital in Dallas where they remain at this time.

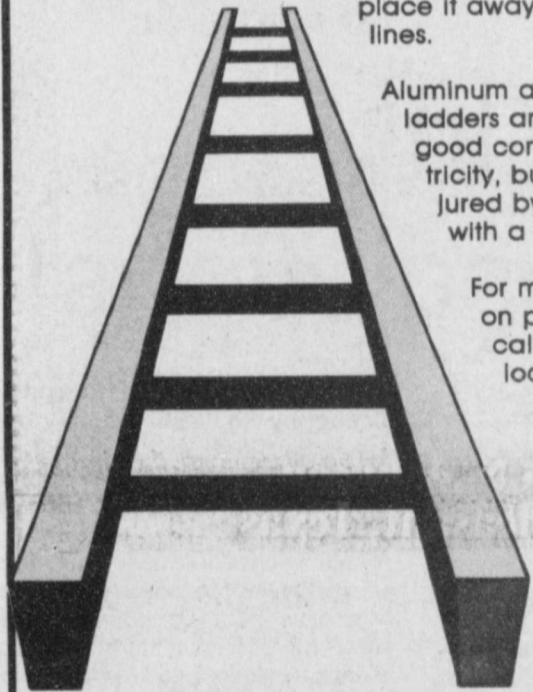

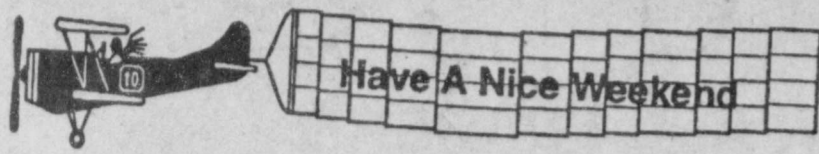
