First Allocation For '89 Shows Promise

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that the first city allocation of 1989 continues to show promising increases in sales tax rebates to local governments.

"Most cities, counties and metropolitan transit authorities can expect a little extra spending money for their 1989 budgets. That additional money can be put towards needed local projects or set aside for a rainy day," Bullock said.

Checks totaling \$64.1 million were Friday sent to 924 cities that collect local sales tax at either one or one and one-half percent.

The payments to the cities reflect 19.4 percent more money than was sent in the January 1988 allocation, Bullock said.

According to Bullock, the state's

six metropolitan transit authorities and one city transit department received \$29.9 million in rebates.

The increase in payments to the MTAs showed a 22.7 percent increase over the 1988 January payments.

Checks totaling \$6.1 million were also sent to 81 counties that collect the one-half percent county sales tax, Bullock said.

January's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in November and reported to the Comptroller's office by December 20.

Locally, Blossom received \$1,488.11 for this period, compared to no payment in 1988.

Deport received \$628.75, compared to \$551.07 for the same period

in 1988, for a 14.10 percent increase.

Paris received \$162,572.35 for a 16.58 percent increase over last year's payment.

Bogata received \$1,108.63 for this period, compared to \$1,005.23 in 1988 for a 10.29 percent increase.

Clarksville received \$14,803.50 for this period, for a 26.30 percent increase over last year's payment of \$11,721.24.

Detroit received \$619.25, compared to \$630.89, showing a 1.85 percent decrease.

Mt. Pleasant received \$76,806.14 for a 15.25 percent increase.

Talco received \$1,086.56 for its payment this period, compared to \$1,973.14 for last year, showing a 44.93 percent decrease.

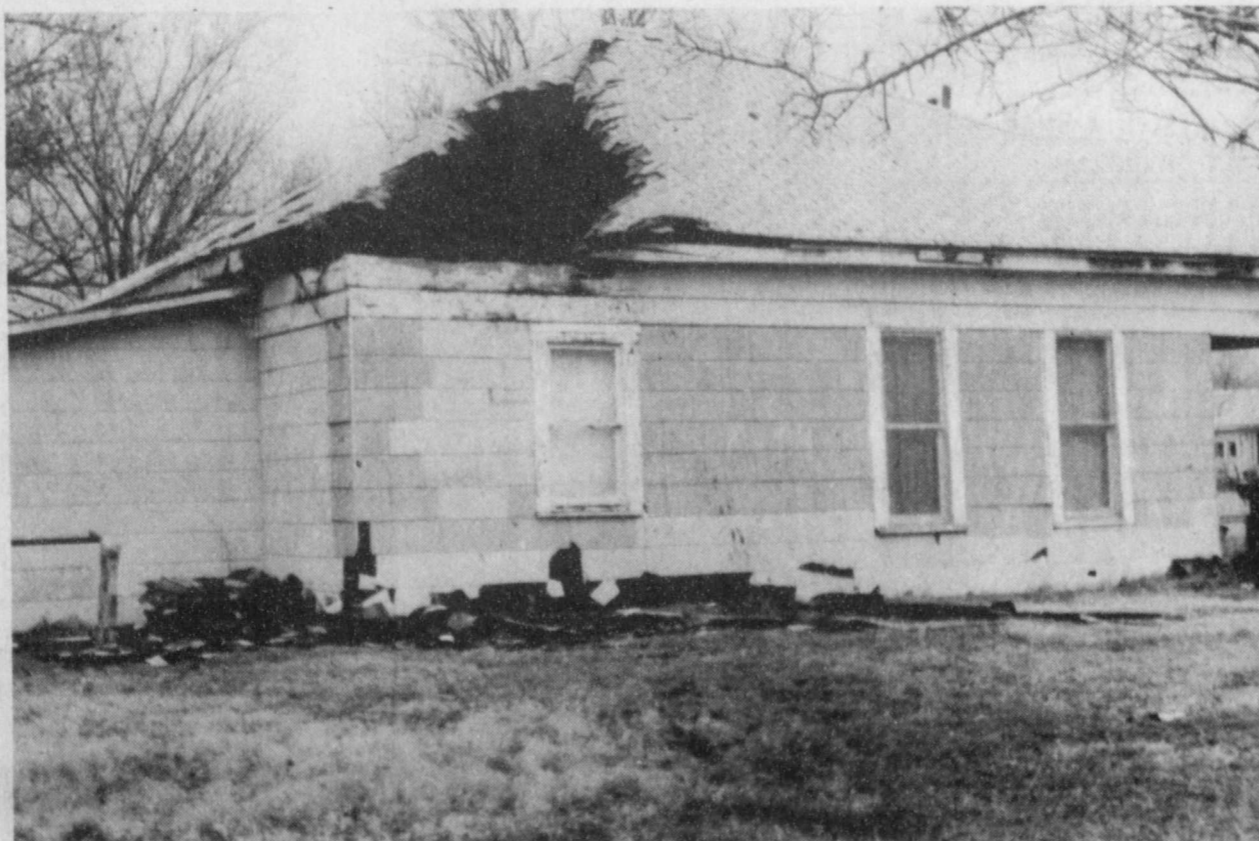
In other business, the board ap-

THIS HOME owned by Mr. English, caught fire and burned around 2 a.m. Saturday morning. The house was rented by

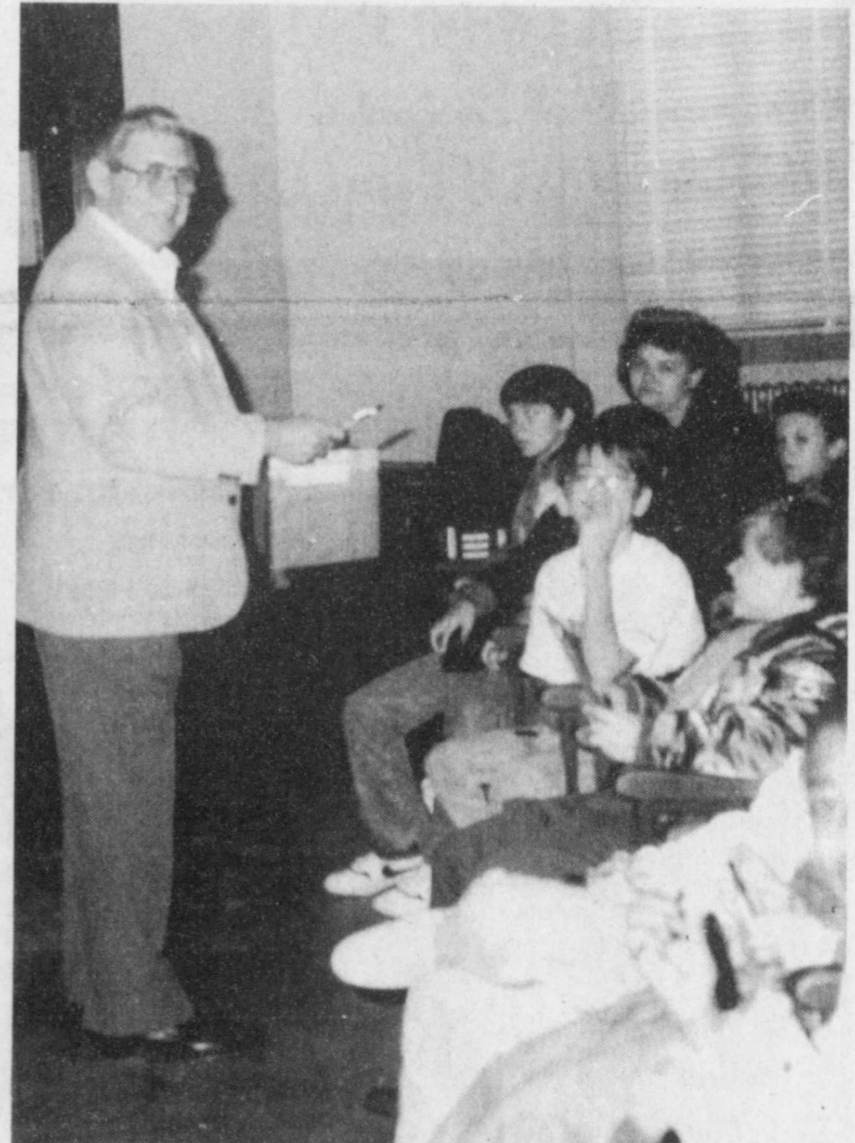
the Prado family at the time of the fire. The Talco Fire Department responded to the fire and no injuries were reported. Cause

The Talco girls and boys junior high teams traveled to Chapel Hill for tournament play this past week. The boys led off Saturday at 12:45, playing Harts Bluff.

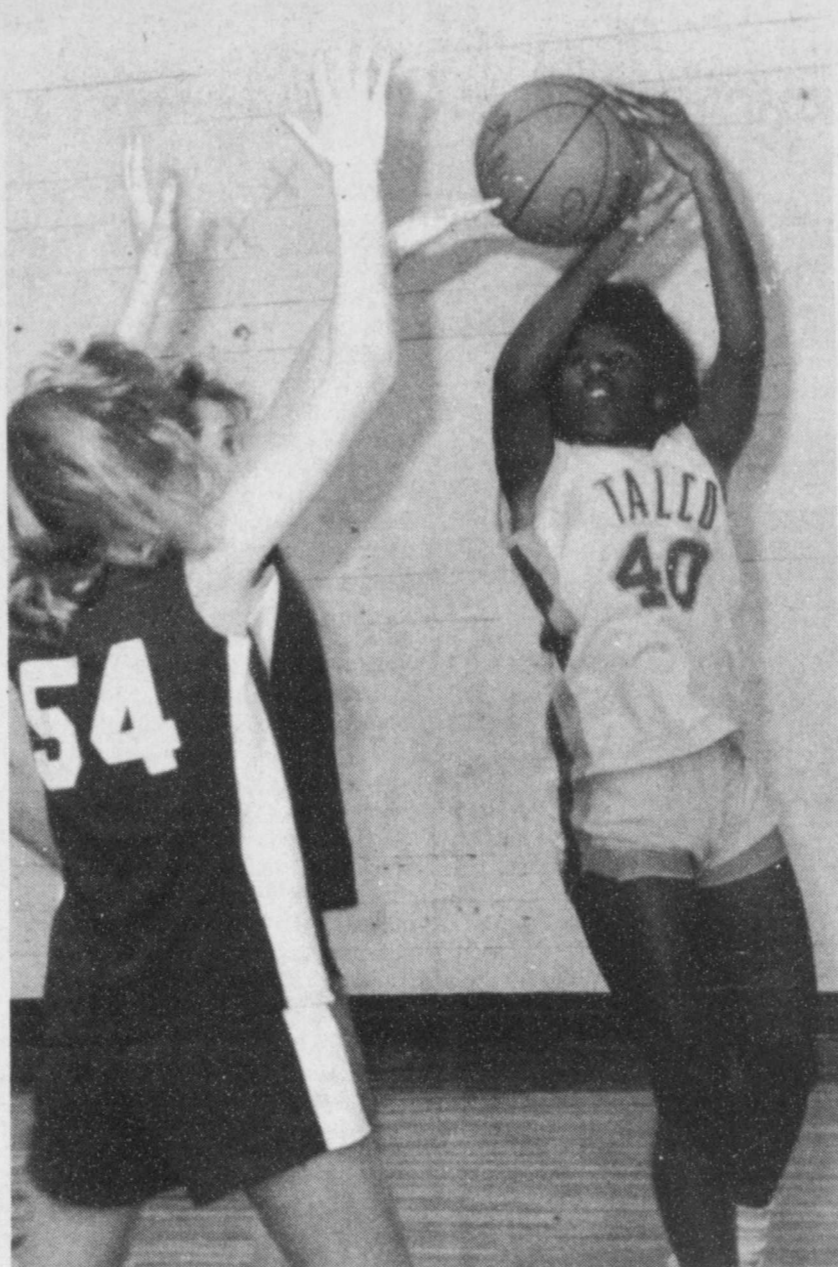

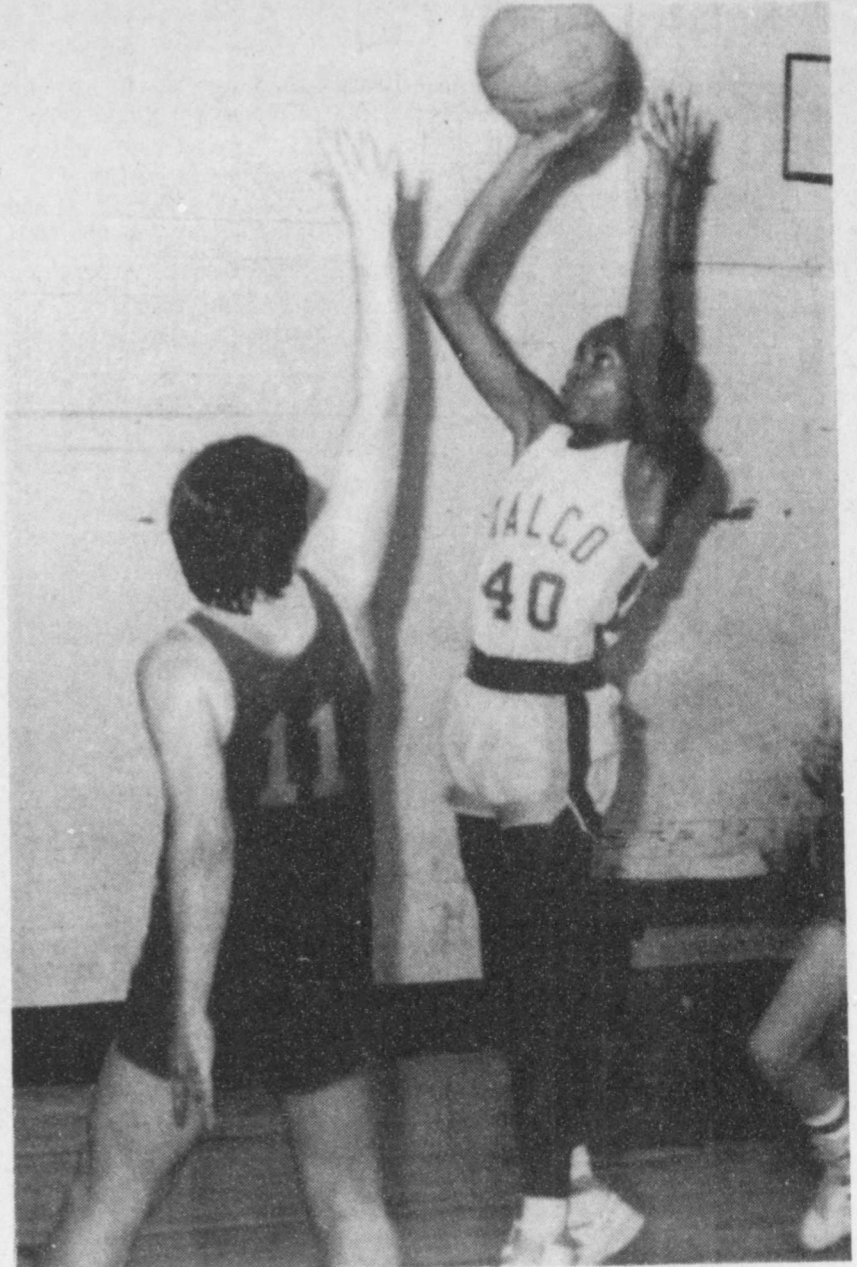

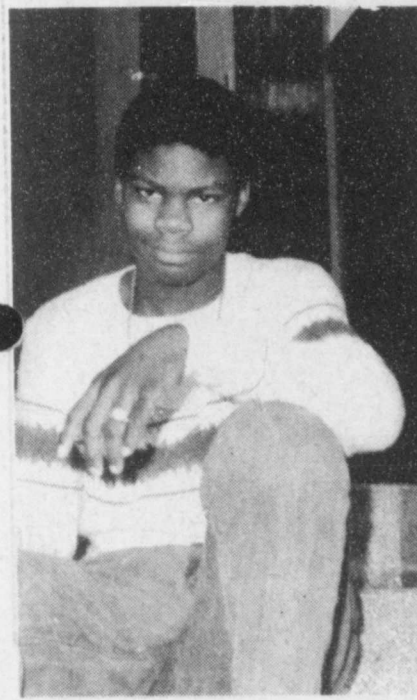
LAQUITA NORMAN has the ball for the Talco junior high girls last Saturday against the Mt. Vernon Tigerettes. The girls

Roundball Roundup

Basketball is not a game for the faint at heart. This axiom was proven last week in District 17AA play, as both varsity boys games in particular were the nail-biters which pivots on a single play. Girls action was inconsistent, as the Rebelettes faltered against Cooper but returned to form to defeat Wolfe City.

Varsity Boys
Determination and hustle produced two exciting wins for the remarkable Rebels last week, leaving them atop the standings in the District race with a 3-0 mark. Traveling to Cooper, the Rebels erased a 12 point fourth quarter deficit to earn a 65-63 victory, when senior Bradley Woods coolly hit a pair of free throws with six seconds remaining in the game. The win came because of a total team effort, including the coaching strategy. Reb mentor Wake Woods switched hi defense from a zone to a man-to-man one minute into the final quarter. Coupled with Cooper's decision to sit on their lead rather than attacking the goal, the Rebels managed to turn the tide of the encounter.

"Our boys never quit, whil Cooper thought they had the game in the bag," quipped the jubilant Rebel coach. In the uphill struggle, every Rebel made a significant contribution. Jimmy Lewis' performance at low post sparked the team early on, and gained him a tie for scoring honors with Bradley Woods at 15 apiece. Scooter Brown delighted the crowd and brought the Rebels within a hoop with a three-pointer, then used his quick reflexes to steal the inbounds pass and score the game tying lay-up with 1:19 left. Jason Pogue contributed with 12 points, key rebounds and several blocked shots down the stretch. As the Bull-

dogs worked the ball for what they hoped would be the game winner, Lewis swiped the ball by leaping in front of the intended receiver to give the Rebel opportunity to win. Woods capitalized by connecting on the free throws with little time left.

The Rebels returned to Jolntown Friday night to face a Wolfe City squad which had beaten them 59-56 in the Celeste tournament. The Rebels revenge that loss with a 62-57 win, which virtually shut the door on teh Wolves' prospect of post-season play, as they now sport a 3-2 district record. The Rebels remained unbeaten with a 3-0 mark, prior to facing Honey Grove (2-1) on Tuesday night.

The Rebels were on target early as they hit seven of eleven field goal attempts to build a 17-11 lead. But by the third quarter, the touch was gone, and Wolfe City took the lead only to see it vanish on a three point aerial from 35 feet at the buzzer by Jeremy Abshier. The game was tied at 46 with 5:25 to play, but the Wolves did not score again for three minutes, whil the Rebels consistence led them to a 12 point lead.

It was the Rebels swarming team defense that kept the Wolves in check, while offensively the Rebel team members complimented each other. Abshier and Bradley Woods tied for scoring honors with 14 each, while Scooter Brown had 13 points, of which nine came in the final quarter, while Jason Pogue had nine points and played good defense.

Significant contributions were made by Rebel sophomores Galen Logan and Kevin House with six points each, as another sophomore, Ronald Simmons, played well in relieving Pogue in the post position. The Rebels finished the game with a 40% field goal average (23 of 58) and

a .500 free throw mark, (15 of 30). The Rebs gathered 38 rebounds.

Varsity Girls
The Rebelettes could do little right against the Cooper Bulldoggettes, in a lackluster 47-35 loss. The Cooper press, and Rebelette turnovers coupled with an ice cold shooting night 14 of 36 (38%) combined to give the Rebels their second district loss along with two wins.

Rosie Norman scored nine of her game high 11 points in the second half to keep the Rebelettes close, but the lack of offense, only eight points in the last quarter, led to their defeat.

It was a much different Rebelette squad that took home court against the Lady Wolves on Friday night. The final quarter saw th eRebelettes break open a close affair to seal a 63-51 victory. The ladies played well to stretch a one-point first quarter lead into ten by halftime. The key was the relative ease with which the Rebel-

ettes broke the Wolves zone press, and the outstanding shooting rom teh field, (69%), and better than 50% from the charity stripe. Support form the Rebelette bench added to the victory, as Kristi Brooks made crisp inside passes to Amy Gladden, and D'Ann Stephenson's defensive play held the Wolves in check. Norman paced the scoring with 15 points, Kristie Stansell had 10 while sophomore Jerilyn Russell and junior Tonya Hawkins hit for eight, and Angie Kay had nine. Freshman Krista Weatherall made her varsity debut an impressive one, as she pumped in two three-pointers on consecutive trips to give the Rebelettes a 14-point lead with three minutes left. The Lady Wolves could make little progress form that point. The team showed much more spirit and spunk than in their loss to Cooper.

Junior Varsity and Freshman JV Girls 59-Cooper JV 43. Krista Weatherall was hot with 23 points, including five three-pointers. Tiffany Parish contributed 15 in the victory, which gives the young ladies an 11-3 mark with the losses coming to varsity teams. The freshman girls have assumed the junio varsity schedule.

The junior varsity boys won both of their contests last week, beating Cooper 52-37 and Prairiland 56-49. Jeff Bagley and Shane Beers each had 12 points in the Cooper victory, and Jesse Woods was close behind with 11. The Prairiland game saw Donald Combs return to the hardwood, after recently enrolling at Rivercrest. Combs scored 16 points, while Beers had 12 and Woods nine in the rivalry between the neighboring schools.

The freshman boys ran into foul trouble against Wolfe City, finishing the game with only three players, and losing 51-41. David Stringer hit 12 points. The ninth graders rebounded the following day to beat Prairiland 49-28 as Corey Gable scored 13 points, Eric Curtis 10 and Brad Ingram scored nine points.

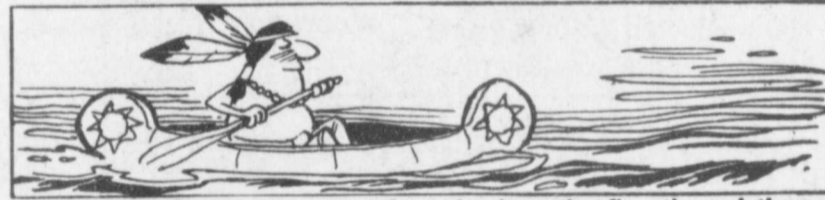

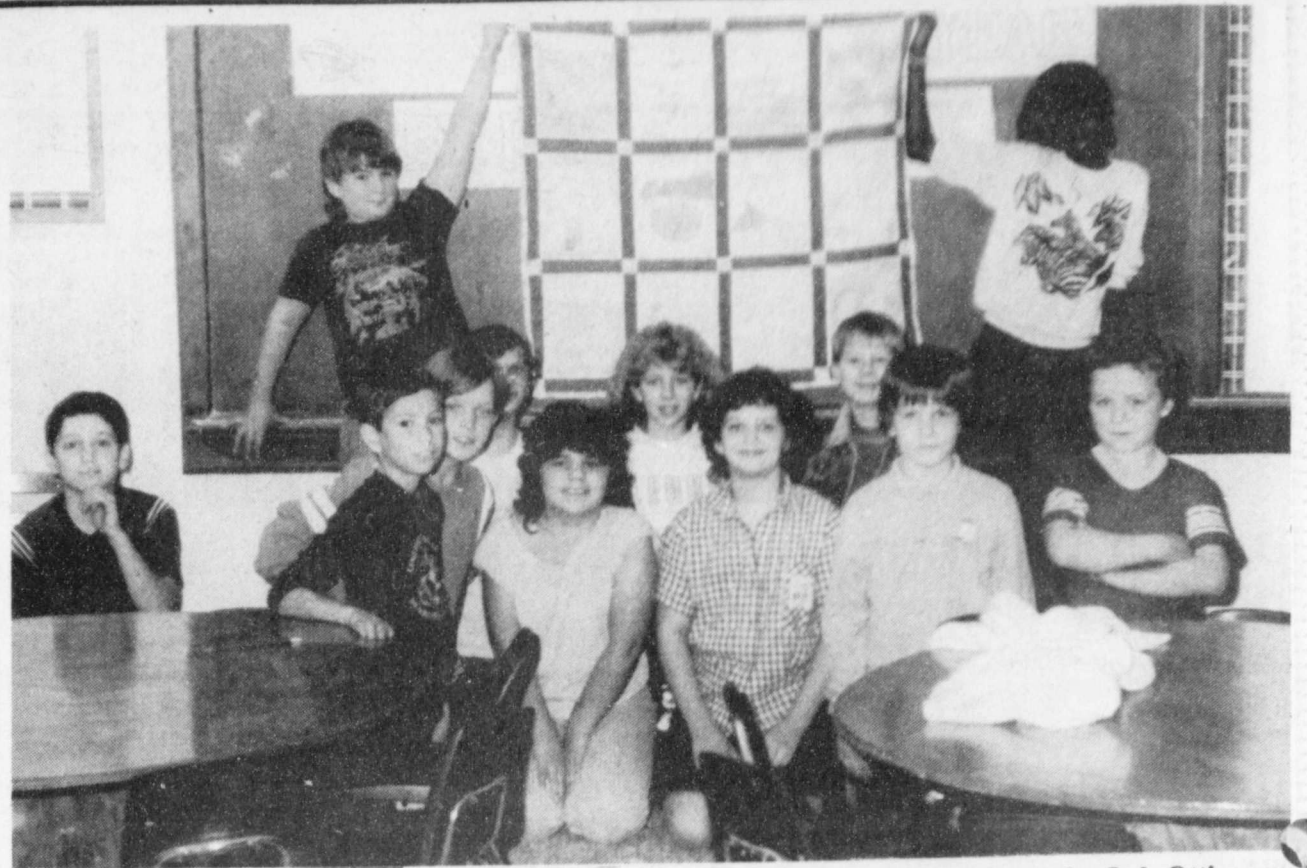

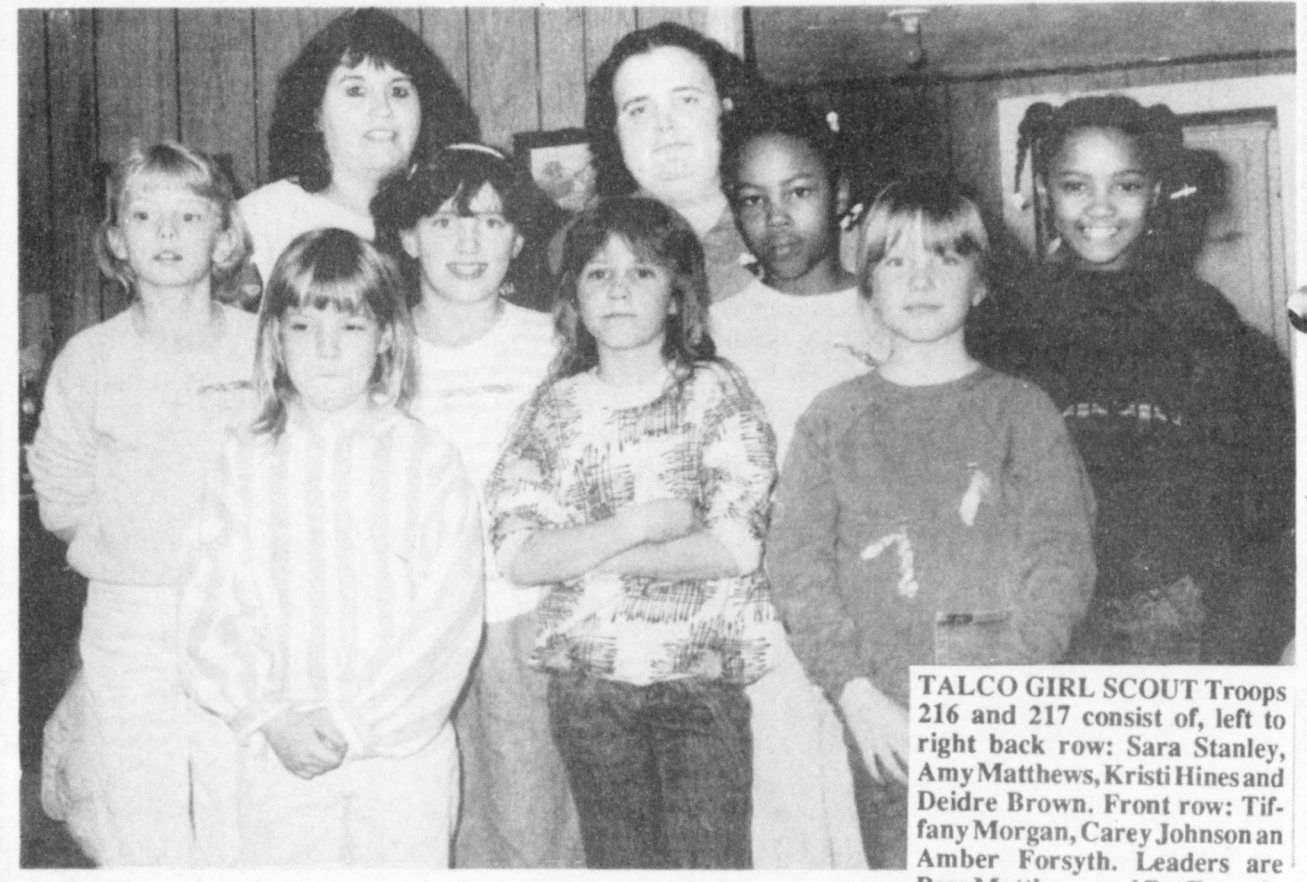
