Somehow, at this time of year, simply saying that "the birds are singing" is a little inadequate.

The birds aren't just singing...they are creating tapestries of sound to lighten the heart, to inspire the mind, to sooth the soul!

Spend a few moments deliberating listening.

First will come the compliments of the cardinals. "Pretty, pretty" the male sings to his mate.

Then comes the liquid, pure flood of sound only a meadow lark can produce. Climbing the scale back and forth, the larks let loose a strain of song that angels might envy.

As a counterpoint there is the cheerful, fuss budget sounds of purple martin or barn swallows going about their lively, everyday business, trilling and chopping off staccato notes of sound as they do.

Occasionally, in a more melancholy burst of sound, the mourning doves remind us of lost loves or past times with their haunting coos.

The kill deer, named after it's cry for blood, and referred to around here as a kill dee, intersperses this natural orchestration with their nervous two notes.

Sparrows chirp and the occasional harsh croak of a crow adds counterpoint.

Overhead, returning northward, are the heart-tugging sounds of geese or ducks wending their way to their summer homes.

To crown this birdsong symphony comes the mockingbird.

In this part of the world the mocker stands along as the virtuoso of songbird.

From jazz to classically, rock to elevator music, the mockingbird does it all.

Day and night he pours his heart out in song. Single notes, floods of notes, complex or simple, the mockingbird does it all.

Take a little time to enjoy the music of spring, produced in a natural concert hall, decorated with spring flowers, and produced by nature's best...the songbirds of east Texas.

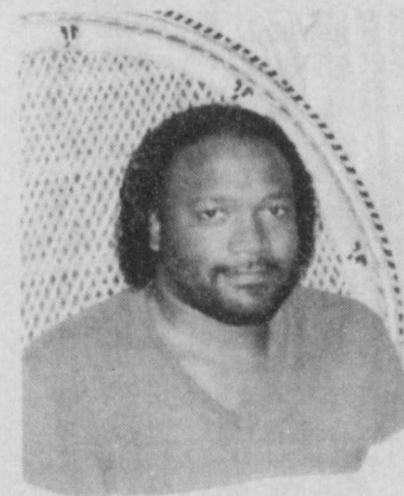
Troy M. Brown Announces For School Board

Mike Sloan Running For Talco Mayor

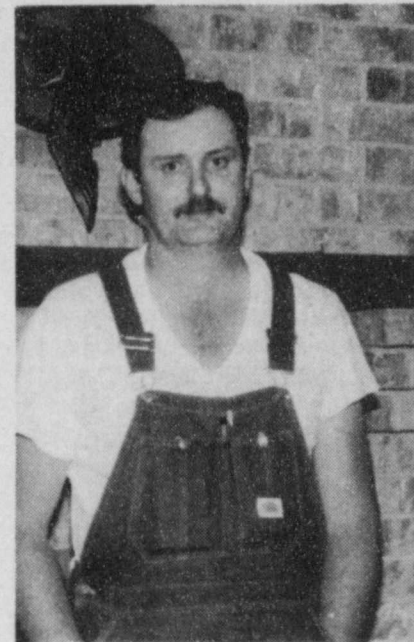
Mike Sloan has signed up to run for Mayor of the City of Talco.

Freddie Savage has signed up to run for Mayor of the City of Talco.

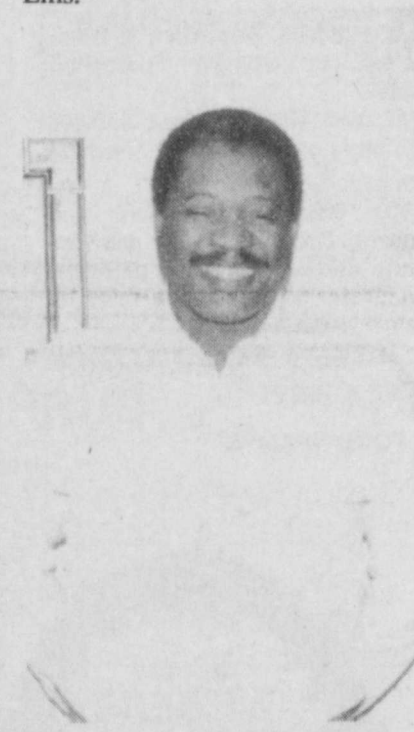

Ricky Nolen has signed up to run for Mayor of the City of Talco. Ricky and wife, Sue and children, Julie and Jody are life-time residents.

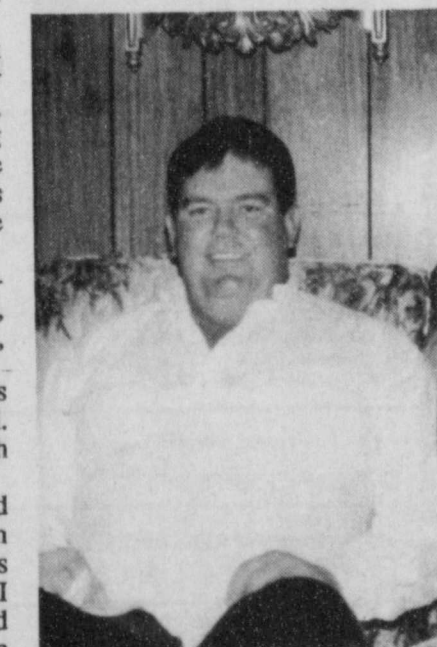

Jody, is a third grader. Mrs. Nolen is an employee of the Rivercrest School. Both are graduates of Rivercrest High School.

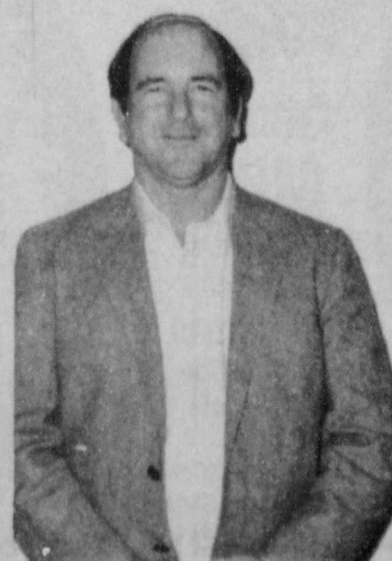

Start Early On Lawn Care

Beautiful lawns are the result of planning and good management throughout the year. Now is a good time to get into the swing of things for 1989, according to Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., Extension agronomist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton.

"Lawns should be mowed close, removing all dead grass, debris, leaves and weeds," said Dr. Reeves. "Delay the first application of fertilizer until about mid-April to prevent feeding weeds instead of grass."

Any low spots in the lawn should be leveled with good sandy loam soil. Grass will generally grow through this added soil if no more than one to two inches are applied.

"It is too late to apply pre-emerge

herbicides to lawns," Reeves said. "If weeds are a problem, several post-emerge herbicides are available. Read and follow label directions, making certain your lawn grass is approved on the label. Some herbicides are very selective while others kill a wide variety of grasses, weeds and shrubs."

A soil test should be done on the lawn every two or three years. In the absence of a soil test, Reeves suggests using a balanced fertilizer. Apply at a rate of no more than one pound of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn.

"Continued maintenance throughout the year is necessary to keep the lawn healthy and vigorous," Reeves said.

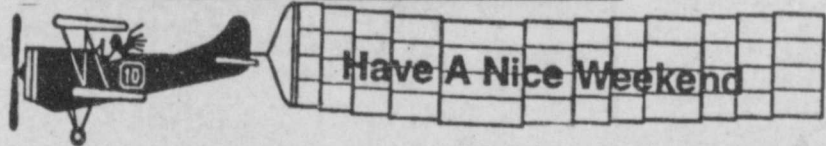

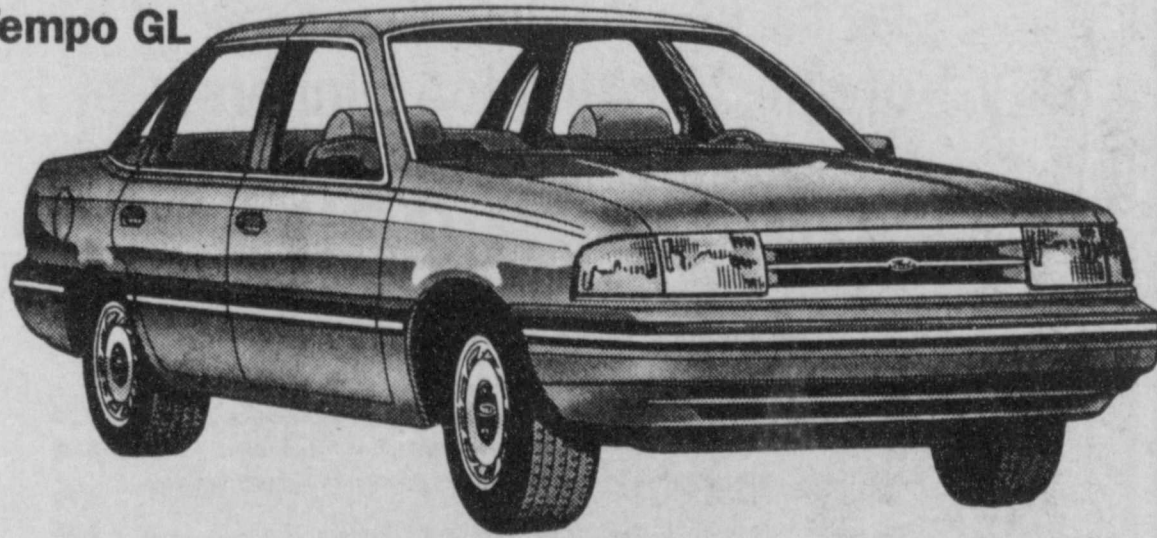

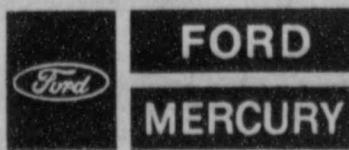

Elderly May Avoid Capital Gains Tax

If you're 55 or older, you could be eligible for a "once-in-a-lifetime" \$125,000 exclusion of gain on the sale or exchange of your home, the Internal Revenue Service says.

You may qualify if you are 55 or older on the date of the sale or exchange. You must have owned and used the home as your principal residence for a period of three years out of the five years ending on the date of the sale, and you or your spouse must have never excluded gain on the sale of a home after July 26, 1978.



A principal residence is the home in which you live. Of course you must own the home, whether it be a houseboat, mobile home, condominium, apartment, or house. If

you own two homes, and live in both, your principal residence is the one that you reside in most of the time.

Your gain is the selling price of the residence minus selling expenses and items included in the basis of the home. The basis is generally the original purchase price plus improvements, minus any deferred gains from the previous sale of a home you owned.

If you are married and filing a joint return, you may not choose to exclude the gain unless your spouse joins you in making the choice. If you meet all the requirements, and are married but

filing separately, you may choose to exclude your share of the gain up to \$62,500. Your spouse must agree with your choice to exclude the gain. You may make or revoke your decision to exclude the gain from a particular sale or exchange at any time before the latest of: three years from the date your return for the year of the sale is due, three years from the date the return was filed, or two years from the date the tax was paid.

For further information, IRS Publication 523, "Tax Information on Selling Your Home"; Publication 554, "Tax Information for Older Americans"; and IRS Form 2119, "Sale of Your Home," are available free. To obtain these publications and IRS Form 2119, use the handy order form found in your tax return package or call toll-free 1-800-424-3676.

IRA Deductions

To claim an IRA as a tax deduction, taxpayers must meet the eligibility requirements, the Internal Revenue Service said.

The eligibility requirements for deducting Individual Retirement Arrangements (IRAs) on tax returns are based on the size of the taxpayer's adjusted gross income (AGI) and whether the taxpayer is an active participant in any type of employer-maintained retirement plan.

Taxpayers can claim the maximum deduction for IRA contributions (\$2,000 or 100% of compensation, whichever is less) only if they meet one of the following criteria:

- the individual is not an active participant (or in the case of a married couple, neither spouse is an active participant) in an employer-maintained retirement plan during the year, regardless of the amount of the taxpayer's AGI,

ble IRA contributions, any earnings realized on nondeductible IRA contributions are not taxed until distributed to the taxpayers, generally at retirement when the individual may have a lower taxable income.

Tax law changes on IRAs, through the Tax Reform Act of 1986, include changes in the rules concerning spousal IRA deductions, qualified voluntary employee contributions, and the purchase of gold and silver coins for an IRA.

The spousal IRA provisions have been changed to eliminate the requirement that the spouse have no compensation in the year in order to be eligible for the spousal IRA contribution.

The law repealed the IRA deduction previously allowed for voluntary employee deductible contributions (DECs) to a qualified plan. Also, beginning in 1987, taxpayers are allowed to establish an IRA by investing in certain gold and silver coins issued by the United States.

Other basic tax rules concerning IRAs were not affected by the law. Taxpayers may continue to establish or contribute funds to an IRA at any time during the tax year and the following year, up to the due date for filing their tax return, without extensions, prior to the year they reach 70½.

Taxpayers who withdraw funds from an IRA before age 59½ are required to pay an additional 10 percent tax unless the withdrawal was due to the death or permanent disability of the taxpayer or was due to a return of nondeductible contributions. Taxpayers may also continue to make tax-free rollovers, either from one IRA to another or from an employer-maintained retirement plan to an IRA.

Additional information concerning the rules affecting IRAs is contained in IRS Publication 590, "Individual Retirement Arrangements (IRAs)." Taxpayers can obtain a copy of the publication by writing their IRS office or by calling 1-800-424-3676.

For Fast Tax Info Call Tele-Tax

Tele-Tax, a recorded telephone tax information service, is again this year being provided by the Internal Revenue Service.

Taxpayers who have tax questions can call Tele-Tax year-round for information on a large variety of tax sub-

jects such as changes in the law, filing requirements, itemized deductions, tax credits, dependents, and adjustments to income, according to the IRS.

The automated service also provides taxpayers with direct access to the status of their refunds. Taxpayers must allow for normal processing time before seeking refund information from IRS.

Details on how to use Tele-Tax are contained in IRS Publication 1163, the Tele-Tax brochure; in IRS Publication 910, "Guide to Free Tax Services;" or in the tax forms package. Publications can be ordered by calling the IRS toll-free number, 1-800-424-3676.

An Editorial On Coggins Testing

This Saturday, April 1, the Arigo Riders 4-H Horse Club is offering a very valuable opportunity and service to this community. They are holding a Coggins testing at the Bogata Rodeo Arena from 12 noon to 1 p.m.

I know that there are many people who own horses, but don't haul them off their place. This fact doesn't exempt them from getting this dread disease. This fact also doesn't exempt these horses from giving it to someone else's horses.

Though I am not thoroughly convinced of how the disease spreads, I do know that it is deadly and that it does spread and that it is a very expensive disease that can only be stopped with EVERYONE'S help.

I rodeo with my horses, and I am bound by law to keep up-to-date health papers on them at all times.

My horses are separated, by only one fence, from horses that are never taken off that place, but they are horses that have NEVER been tested for Coggins. I live in constant fear of those horses infecting my horses.

And don't think that by looking at your horse that you can TELL if he is infected. Believe me, you CANT!!

I know from a very personal, sad experience that looks are deceiving when it comes to this disease. A horse can be in very good shape and look very healthy, and still be contagious with the disease.

Though state officials are making an all-out effort to control the disease, all the steps they take will go for naught unless everyone does their part.

I feel like I am being used as a scape-goat, in a way, because I do test regularly, and I have been in the situation where I had to destroy a very nice horse. I feel this way because I see scores and scores of other people's horses who are not being tested, and believe me, some of these horses will have Coggins.

Please, take the time and make the effort to have your horses tested. You may not think you're helping out, but you are. You are doing yourself a favor in the long run, and your neighbor.

I know how badly it hurts to have one destroyed, but I also know how badly it hurts to see some innocent person's animal become infected because someone else just didn't make the effort to have their herds cleaned up.

To get a social security number, a

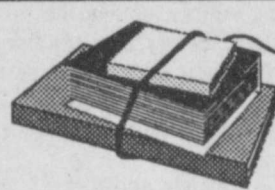
dependent must have evidence of: (1) date of birth, (2) U.S. citizenship or legal alien status, and (3) identity. A public, hospital, or religious birth record is generally sufficient for the first two items. A school record and certain other documents can be used for proof of identity. 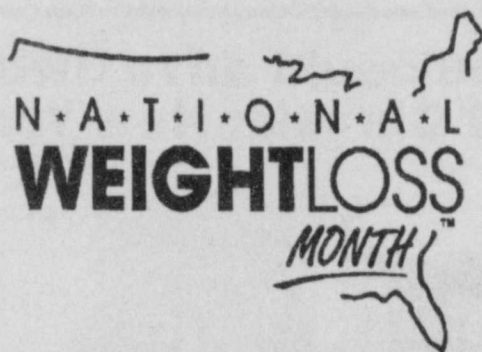

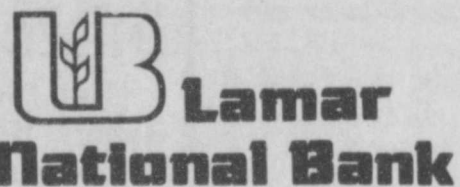


