## Citizens Should Recognize Talco Warning Signals

The Talco Volunteer Fire Department would like to announce the storm and disaster warning systems which have been set up. The system will serve Talco and the surrounding area.

For Talco, the system will include signals for both tornadoes, tornado warnings and disasters. Disasters include both natural and man-made.

The man-made disasters are things such as gas trucks and other things spilling or blowing out in town. The signal for a tornado which is sighted or is on the ground, or for a disaster in which notice should be taken will be ten blows on the siren at 30-second intervals. The siren is located at City Hall downtown.

For a tornado warning, not a tornado watch, the signal will be three long blows on the siren. A tornado watch means that conditions are favorable for a tornado. A warning means that a tornado has been sighted in the surrounding area.

For the community, the fire department will be watching the storm from various places around Talco. In the event that a tornado is sighted, the fire trucks will follow the clouds. If a tornado is sighted, the fire truck will set the sirens on the truck off and will announce over a loud speaker you need to take shelter.

When a warning or watch is cancelled, you will hear one long blast on the siren.



Letter to the Editor

To The Editor:

April 8 is nearly upon us. We, as taxpayers, have a decision to make about our college. No doubt, we have one of the finest Community Colleges equipped with the finest staff in the state. Why can't we keep it that way without spending \$9 million MORE in taxpayer's money?

Think back as to when we were approached to extend bond indebtedness to create our Community College. The founders stated that the 10¢ maximum cap per \$100 valuation was more than enough to fund ANY amount of growth. In fact, they said that it would be highly unlikely that we would ever need to be taxed that high at all.

Now they want to remove the cap completely! This means that the tax rate can be raised by \$1.50 per \$100 valuation, which is the maximum allowed by state law at this time. Friends, this is an increase of 1500%. And they tell us that this is a MINOR increase?

Do we really need to spend \$4.75 MILLION for 12 extra classrooms when one member of the Board said they can be built for \$600,000.00?

Do we really need a \$4 MILLION gymnasium and golf course?

Can the trustees devise a more reasonable plan to keep our college great, but not necessarily the most expensive in the state? (Is there no middle ground?)

Due to the present economic crunch in our area, it seems to me that we can ill-afford these exorbitant increases. Some of the propositions, in fact, fly in the face of common sense.

Let us carry forward and send the Board of Trustees a message that we want good, solid, responsible alternatives to these devastating tax increases that they propose we swallow.

Tell them thanks but NO thanks. Edward Florey Mt. Pleasant.

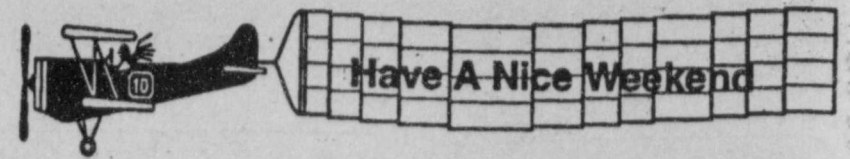

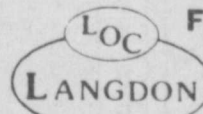

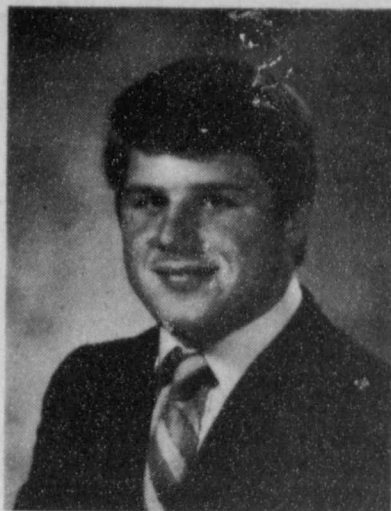

For the first time, the school will begin a girls softball program as well.

The schedules for the teams are listed below. Home games will be played at Johnstown.

The Rivercrest track team competed in the third annual Hawthorne relays at ETSU on Saturday. This meet was composed of Class A and 2A schools. The Rebelette track team made a good showing in the meet, finishing third overall in the Class 2A division. Several Rebelettes could not compete due to injuries. Individual results are as follows: 100 meter hurdles, Melissa Horton, first; 440 run, Faye Whitney, second; high jump, Rosie Norman, third; spring relay team composed of Norman, Tonya Hawkins, Mary McKelvey and Krista Weatherall, third.

In the boys competition, the Rivercrest track team did well. Clint Tidwell garnered high individual point total honors with 30 points in the meet. Tidwell placed first in the long jump with a distance of 21'10" and second in the high jump with a height of six feet. He also captured the first place medal in the 200 meter run, and was part of the spring relay team which finished fourth. Other members were Marcus Savage, Jeremy Abshier and Jeff Bagley. Galen Logan ran sixth in the mile and Shane Beers also finished sixth in the discus.

The Rivercrest tracksters will host a track meet at Rebel Stadium on Friday, April 7. Field events are slated to begin at 3 p.m., with running preliminaries at 3:30 and finals set to begin about 6:30. Eight girls and nine boys teams are expected to compete, with last minute entries expected. ## Screening For Spinal Disorders Required By State

The Legislature passed a new law in 1985 requiring all sixth and ninth grade students to be screened for spinal deformities.

Early detection of abnormal spinal curvature can prevent serious health problems. This is a problem that may begin during the early adolescent years with an estimated 1 in 10 adolescents having some degree of abnormal curvature. Curves that are detected early may only require periodic observation by a specialist. Moderate curves may require the wearing of a brace, which is usually supervised by an orthopedic specialist. In some cases, the need for major surgery for this deformity can be eliminated through

early detection.

Screening for Bogata sixth graders has been scheduled for Monday, April 10. Students will be screened for two types of spinal deformities: scoliosis and kyphosis. Scoliosis is a condition in which the spine is twisted, causing misalignment of the upper body or lower back. This condition can worsen and lead to much pain, as well as complications of the heart and lungs. Kyphosis is a type of spinal deformity in which the upper spine shows a pronounced curve. This condition is also referred to as "round back" and can be corrected if detected early.

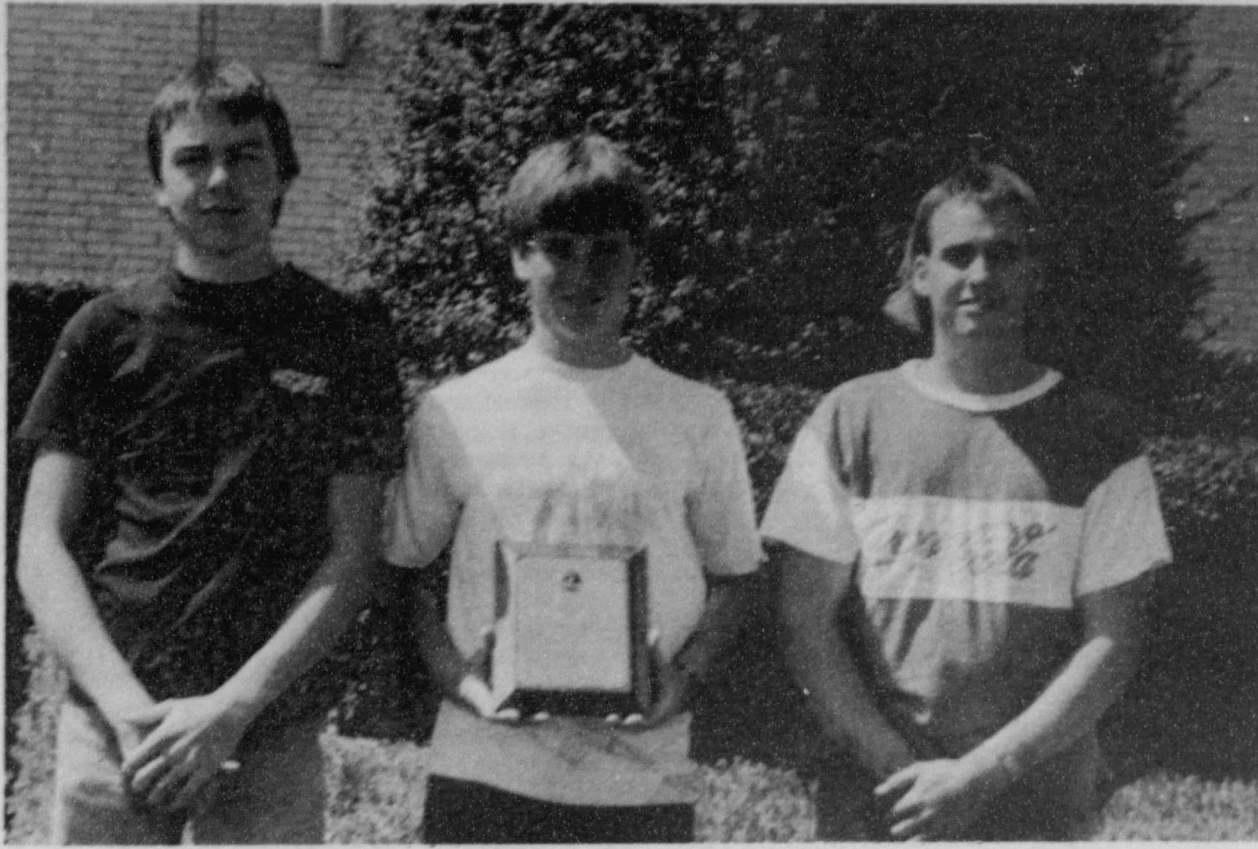

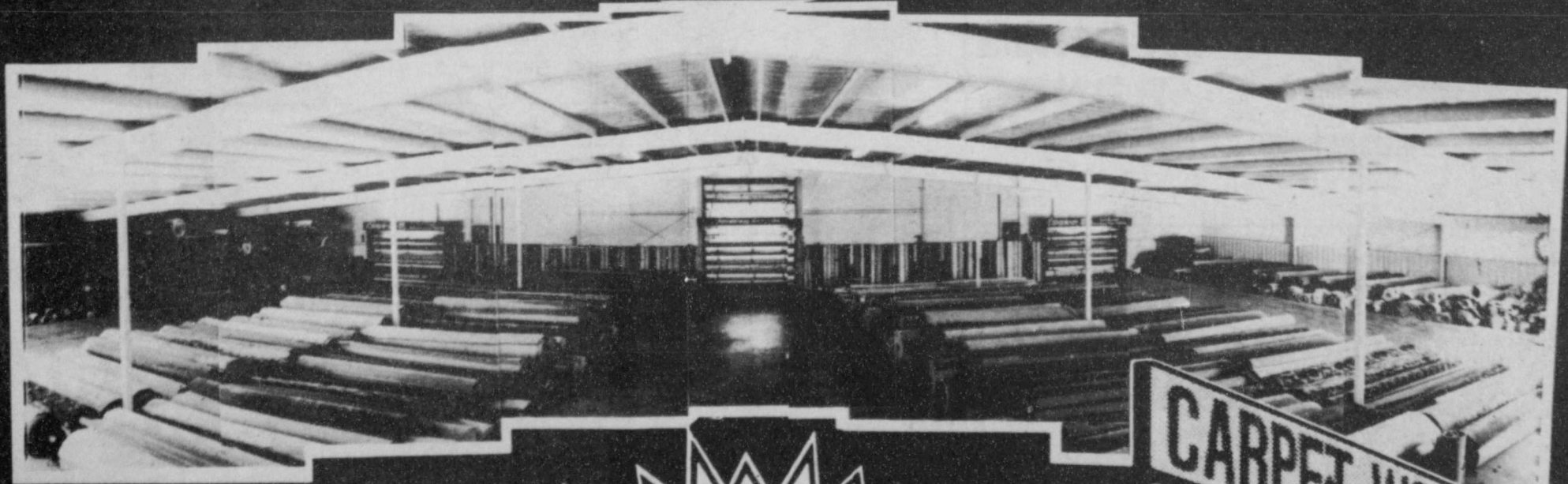

### Insect Control Is Important For Quality Product

The quality of the agricultural product delivered to the consumer often depends on the producers insect and disease control program.

"A good spray program for fruits, nuts and Christmas trees is vital to a quality end-product," said Dr. James Robinson, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The overwintered generation of tip moths is flying in Christmas tree plantations. Robinson says that producers using traps should apply the appropriate insecticide ten days from the time the first moth is caught. Repeat the application in ten days if moths are still being caught.

If traps are not being used, he recommends checking young shoots regularly for larvae and spraying

before the larvae penetrate the young shoots. A second generation can be expected in about six weeks after the first generation.

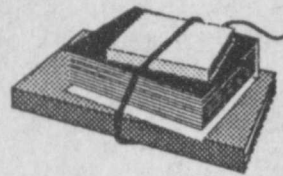
Aphids can also be a problem in Christmas trees in the spring.

Robinson also suggests that fruit producers apply the appropriate insecticide at petal fall for controlling plum curculio in peaches, plums and similar fruits. Continue spraying two or more times, seven days apart for good curculio and catfacing insect control.

A fungicide should be added to the insecticide spray for control of certain diseases.

County extension agents throughout the state have spray guides for both commercial and home fruit producers.

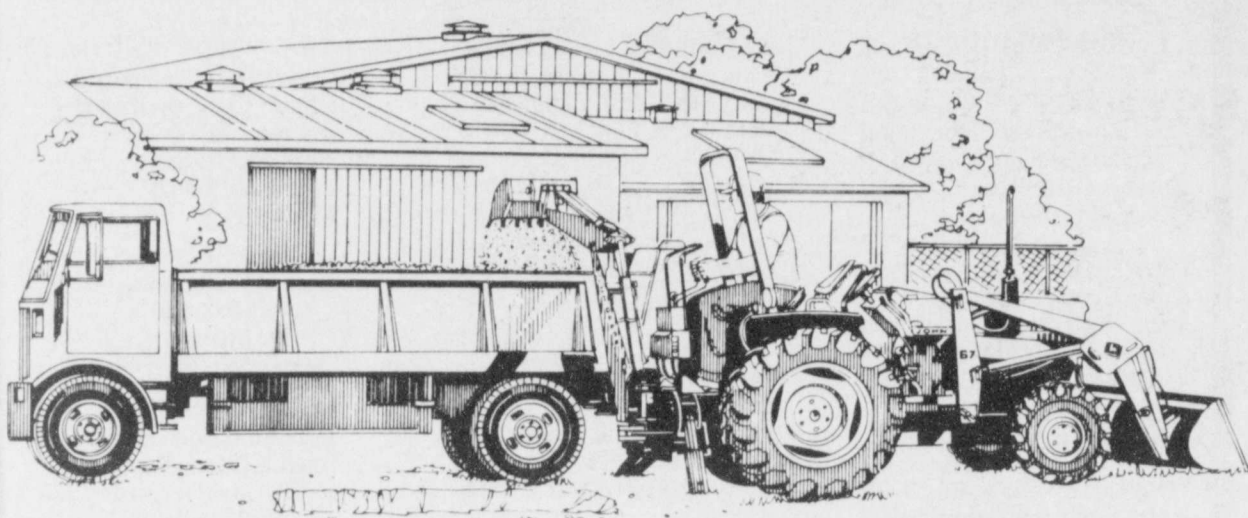
