They also have only one poisonous snake in the whole of their country, where we have rattlesnakes, copperheads and moccasins. We warned them about sitting on logs, kicking over rocks and logs or reaching in to pick things up in heavy brush without looking first.

The look on their faces when we warned them about chiggers was priceless. Having exposed them to a variety of Texas tales they first thought that we were pulling their leg about chiggers.

Tiny red bugs that bit without you knowing it, left welts and weren't visible sounded to them like another tale. However, numerous people were willing to confirm that chiggers were real, and they ceased sitting on the grass!

Poison ivy was shown to them and its effect was explained. They looked at one another in horror...again, England, peaceful and garden-like, has no such thing.

Coyotes howling at night convinced them that wolves must be waiting to tear the throats from newborn calves, and when we told them about the butcher bird hanging his victims on barbed wire fences they were certain that we were telling lies again.

But a foray into the bird book confirmed that we told the truth.

When word of two people shooting at one another came over the police scanner they were absolutely horrified.

In a country where policemen seldom carry guns, only night sticks, even law enforcement officers made an impression on them.

They met the local constable, game warden and a Texas Ranger, and they all had on weapons...something these ladies found vaguely disturbing.

Everywhere they heard about hunting and fishing...something that is in short supply in their small, crowded country.

The "blazing heat" nearly melted them, and they can't conceive just how hot it really gets in the summer. Already it is ten degrees warmer than their July and August ever gets!

In short, as Texans, and as Americans, we take for granted the left-over harshness that goes with our vast, sprawling nation.

Over and over they were impressed by what our pioneer ancestors must have had to face...and in commenting on it, brought us to realize that things we take for granted don't always seem normal to the rest of the world...but instead seem harsh and a little frightening.

Dear Editor:

What is sickle cell anemia? Sickle cell anemia is a hereditary blood disease that occurs among black people. It causes attacks that include severe pain, high fever and damage to the body tissues. Sickle cell anemia may injure almost all parts of the body, especially the bones, the central nervous system, the liver, the lungs and the spleen. Some victims suffer blindness, convulsions, paralysis or loss of speech.

Many die in childhood and few live past the age of 40. Sickle cell anemia occurs if a person's blood cells contain too many hemoglobin molecules of an abnormal type. Hemoglobin gives the red blood cell their color and carries oxygen to the body tissues. Too much of the abnormal hemoglobin called hemoglobin S, causes the cell to sickle (change to a sickle shape). This occurs if the blood drops too low. Sickle cells clog blood vessels and interfere with the flow of blood. This interference deprives the body tissues of blood, oxygen and causes a painful attack called a crisis. Sickle cell crisis may last several days. Many blacks are born with some hemoglobin S in their blood. A small amount inherited from one parent does little harm. A large amount inherited from both parents produces sickle cell anemia, in all cases.

Until 1970, doctors knew no way to prevent attacks of sickle cell anemia. That year a team of doctors from the USA discovered that urea, a chemical compound, reverses the sickling process, some doctors believe that a daily of urea can also cause excessive loss of fluids through urine.

Researchers are experimenting with methods of safely adding to the blood. The reason I choose this topic is because I myself have sickle cell anemia. More black people must help us find a cure for this disease.

The final two Rebel runs came after Purviance tripled to force Shane Joplin across the plate, Roach then flied to right field, allowing the Rebel second bagger to trot home from third. The final score was 10-7.

The Rebels ended their first baseball campaign in many years with a well-played contest against the play-off bound Como-Pickton Eagles on Monday. Although losing the outing 7-5, Coach Eddie Barker called the game the best overall effort of the year. "This speaks well of the determination and dedication of this group, and provides a foundation for next year, since eighth players will return."

Como-Pickton used the long ball to gain a 5-0 advantage through three innings. The most severe blow was a three run homer by Rodney Carpenter, which came in the second after the first two Eagle hitters were retired. A hit and a walk set the style for the base-clearing hit.

Jeremy Abshire opened with a double to center, after two outs, Kevin Binion singled to drive home Abshire, this was followed by consecutive hit by Kevin House, Audie Earley (RBI) and Victor Lee (RBI) to bring the Rebels close at 5-3.

Como scored single runs in the fourth and fifth innings but good pitching by Rebel ace David Davidson, who has carried the bulk of the pitching load this year, resulted in two consecutive strike-outs.

The Rebels made the Eagles sweat in the final stanza, as they scored two runs and threatened to tie the game. After Lee and Jim Purviance walked, Davidson singled sharply to right to score them both. With two out and a runner on second, Craig Easley, the Rebel clean-up hitter, hit the third pitch on a rope to right field for an apparent hit, but the Eagle fielder made a basket catch to end the game.

Thus the Rebel season closed. Although they didn't win many games, the Rebel squad improved greatly over the course of the year. A late start, lack of a practice field for much of the year, and injuries to key players did not deter the desire and dedication of the team. Remember that this team practiced after school, operated on a shoe-string budget and overcame obstacles to make a good showing.

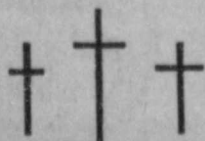

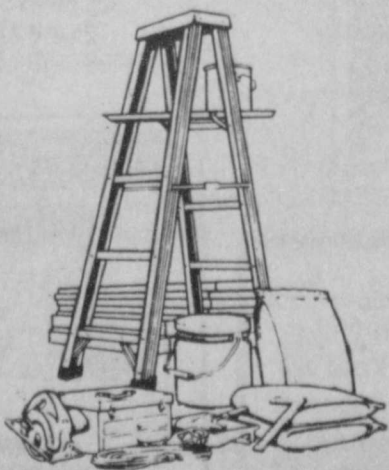

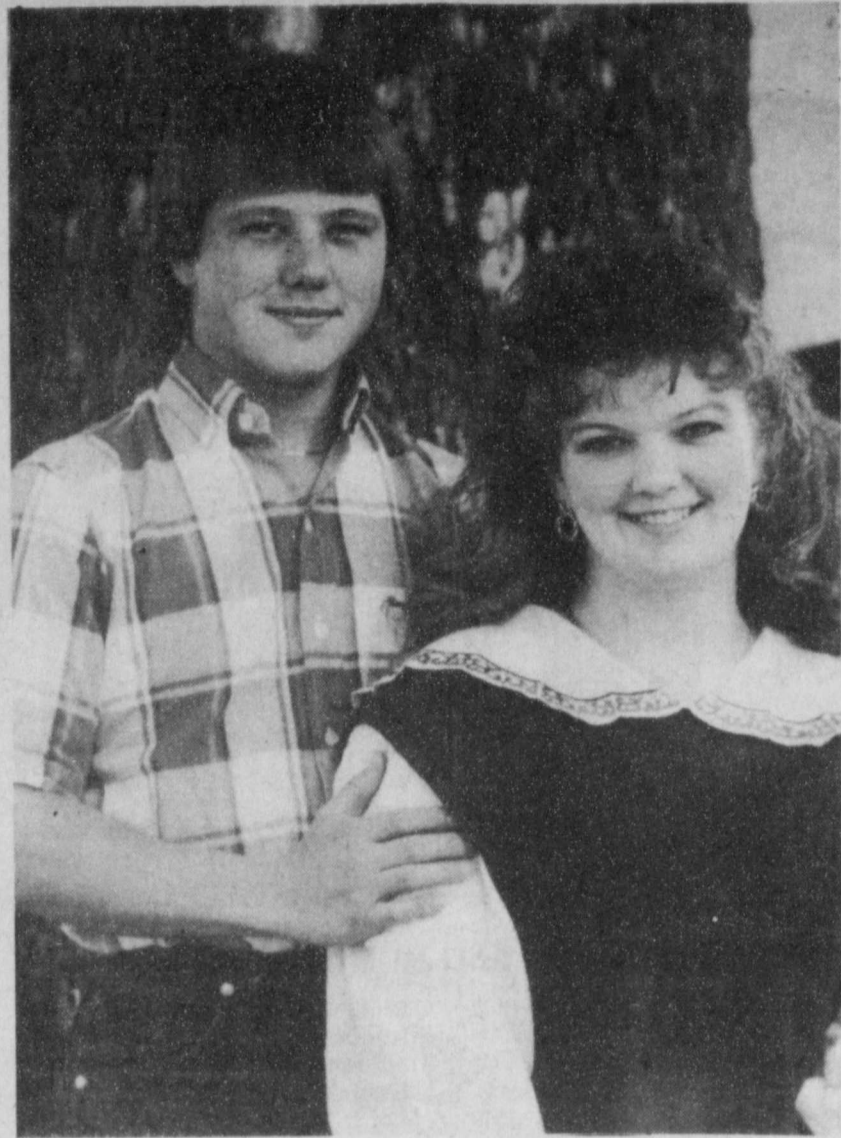

Courthouse To Be Repaired

Three years after Red River County was awarded a grant to make its century-old courthouse accessible to the handicapped, the Texas Historical Commission has given the go-ahead.

The approval, received by County Judge L.D. Williamson last Thursday, was hailed by both preservationists and those concerned to avoid the expense of building new quarters for county offices.

For three years the county and the THC have debated about the best location for the elevator that will make upper floors accessible to the handicapped. THC has now approved a plan that will preserve the architectural

character of the historic old building at a projected cost within the county's means and far less than the expected cost of a new building.

Because the Courthouse is classified as a Texas historical monument, the THC must approve any proposal for alterations. The Commissioners Court has wanted to put on a new roof and make structural repairs, and now has an approved plan for doing so.

A \$199,000 Community Development Block Grant from the Texas Department of Community Affairs will be applied to the cost of making the courthouse "handicapped accessible". Other steps, to increase the available office space in the building, will be paid for with county funds. Judge Williamson notes that some \$100 thousand has been accumulated in the county's permanent Improvement Fund for the courthouse.

The elevator will be located in the northeast corner of the building, displacing the offices of the Justice of the Peace and the District Attorney. The vaulted ceiling of the Courtroom will be lowered to allow the creation of a third floor. These and other changes will be carried out in a way that would permit eventual restoration of the courtroom to its original state, should money for this step be found.

Ponds Produce Recreation

Give the farm pond as much attention as other farm enterprises and it can provide recreation the entire year, say a fisheries specialist with the Prairie View A&M University Cooperative Extension Program.

"You get out of the farm pond in relation to what you put into it," said Billy Higginbotham, headquartered at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Overton. "If the pond is not managed, it will not produce good fishing on a sustained basis."

For ponds less than one acre in size, concentrate only on catfish. If undesirable species are currently in the pond, renovate it with rotenone according to instructions, wait at least three weeks and restock with catfish.

For larger ponds, both bass and catfish can be managed. Bluegill should be present to provide adequate forage for the bass. These larger ponds should be fertilized, provided weed problems do not exist.

"Weeds can hamper the recreational use of farm ponds and in some instances have a negative impact on fish population," Higginbotham said. "If weeds are a problem, they will reappear. Proper identification of weed species is essential before control recommendations can be made."

All ponds should have the pH and alkalinity checked before fish are stocked. Instructions for taking the water sample can be obtained from local county extension agents.
