Calvary Baptist Church G.A.'s will

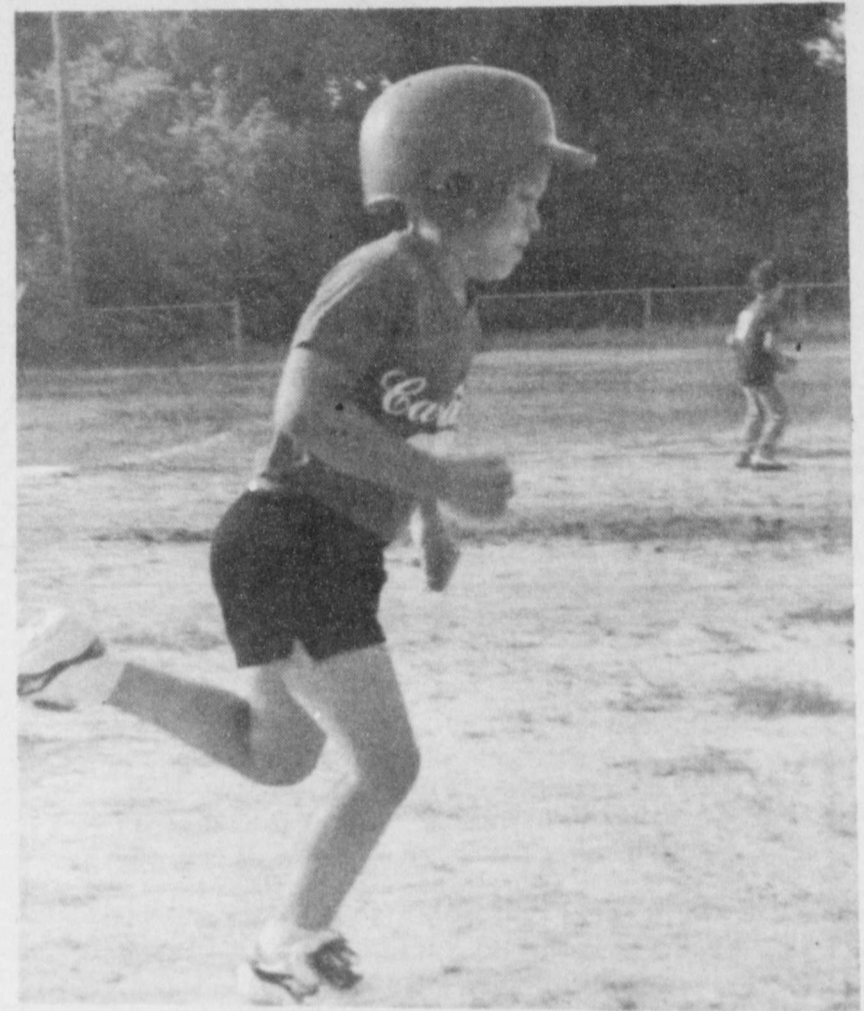

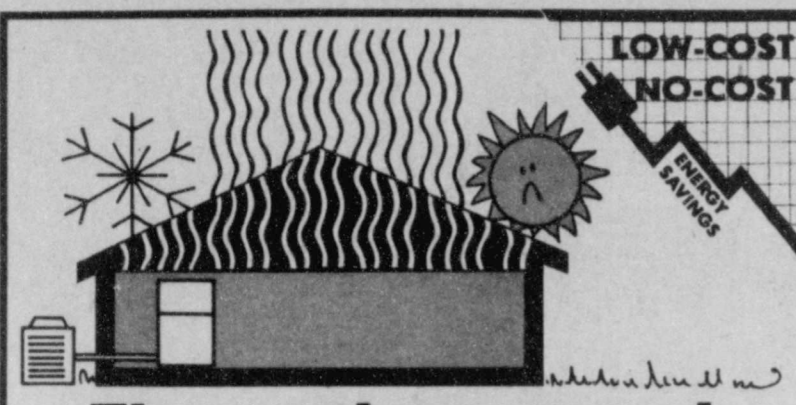

Cut Hay When The Sun Shines

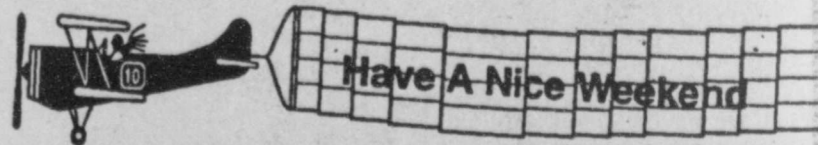

 As soon as the soil dries enough, cut hay immediately, says an agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Since hay supplies are low in Texas, producers need to harvest excess forage whenever possible from both pastures and hay meadows," said Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., extension agronomist at Overton. "Producers with ryegrass in their pastures or hay meadows should harvest the forage for hay and also to release the warm season perennials grasses. If it is not cut, the ryegrass blocks the sunlight and thus keeps the warm season grasses from growing."

Ryegrass baled at this time of year

should have high quality and high energy values. However, said the Texas A&M University System specialist, it loses quality and tonnage rapidly when stored outside in a round bale. "If at all possible, store ryegrass hay in a barn or under a shed," Reeves said. "When you start feeding hay, feed the ryegrass first."

After the ryegrass is harvested, fertilize the bermuda by soil test or use a 3-2-1 ratio fertilizer. With the heavy rains experienced in much of Texas, any nitrogen applied as long as three weeks ago has either been used by growing plants or has leached out of the soil.



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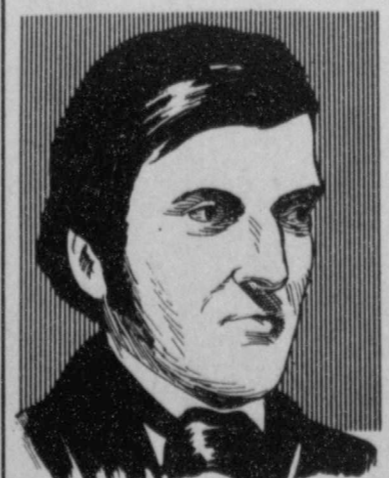
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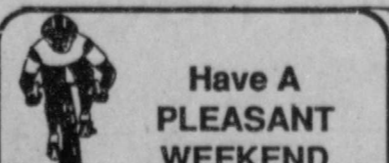

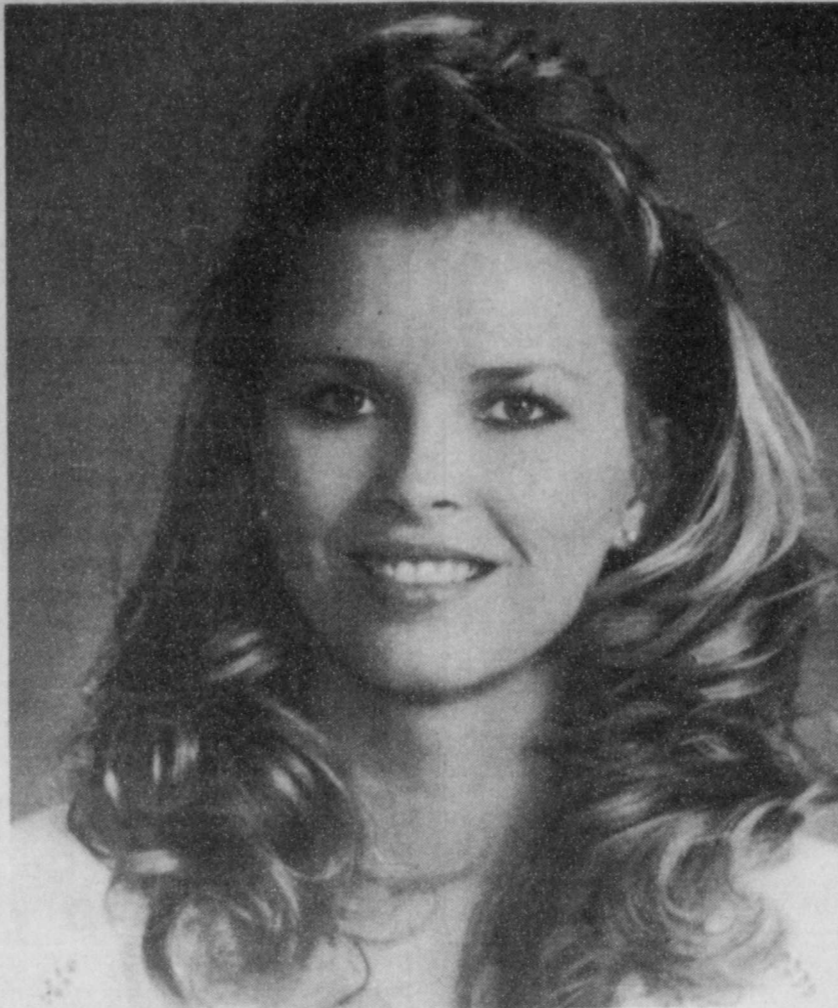

New Beetle Found In East Texas

A small ambrosia beetle, identified in Texas for the first time last year, is attacking apparently healthy trees in several east Texas counties and could spread westward and to the south.

"The presence of the beetle in Texas was first observed by county extension agents in Newton, Jasper and Tyler counties," said Dr. James Robinson, an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "The insect, *Xylosandrus crassiusculus*, a native of tropical and subtropical Asia, was first recorded in the United States in 1974. This year, infestations have also been found in Cass County."

The only state currently considering the beetle a major problem is Florida, where landscape trees in nurseries have been a major target. Dr. Thomas H. Atkinson, Department of Entomology and Nematology, University of Florida, is documenting the insect's distribution in southern states.

"In Texas, the beetle has been found in peach, pecan, fig, crabapple and apple trees," Robinson said. "Some trees have died either from the attack or from cold or drought stress after being infested. Some of these were apparently healthy when first infested by the beetle."

The adult beetle bores into the tree in late winter or early spring. Eggs are laid and hatch into small legless larvae which tunnel extensively through the wood. Sawdust from the numerous entry holes is pushed out of the limb. The sawdust rods may extend 1 to 2 inches from the side of the trunk or limb, giving it a whiskery appearance.

Adult beetles are most common in February to March but may be found as late as September, Robinson said. In Florida, they are active the entire year. This could allow them in the Rio Grande Valley where temperatures are similar to Florida. The beetle is not known to attack citrus; this is possible said the entomologist.

"Since the beetle is new to the state, we want people to be aware of its presence and be capable of diagnosing an infestation," he said. "It will attack most hardwood forest, ornamental, peach, pecan, plum, nectarine, apple, fig and probably pear trees."

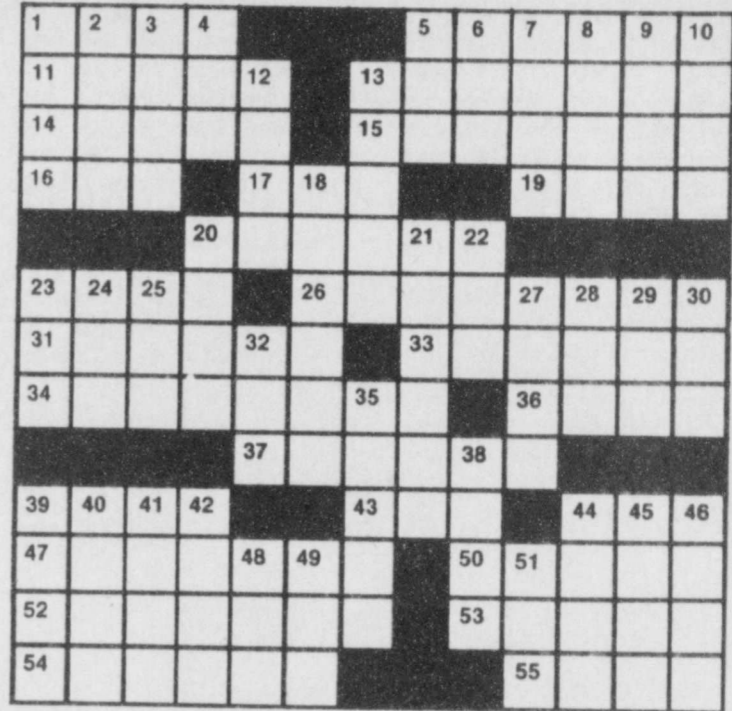

Neighbors today were surprised to learn Melvin Kline, a seemingly quiet, well-mannered man was making extra money with classified information. When questioned earlier this morning, Kline professed surprise that everyone wasn't using the classified section to earn extra income and get rid of unwanted items.

"It's common," he said. Recent studies tend to bear Kline out. Consumer Data Service reported that over 85% of the public read the newspaper and over 80% of those read the classifieds. Kline claimed widespread use was being made of the classified information. "But you have to act quickly," he remarked.

"If I have something to sell, I can be in the paper by tomorrow. I do that a lot now," he confessed. "With classified, whether I'm buying or selling, I can reach a large market instantly. And it's easy...just pick up the phone."

Asked for a last comment, Kline replied "No matter what you're looking for, a new job, a great car, merchandise, or even a home, take a long look at the classified section."

The information's all there." Research Analysis Corp. studies indicate the public does exactly that, with 98% preferring the newspaper over radio and 68% preferring the newspaper instead of TV.

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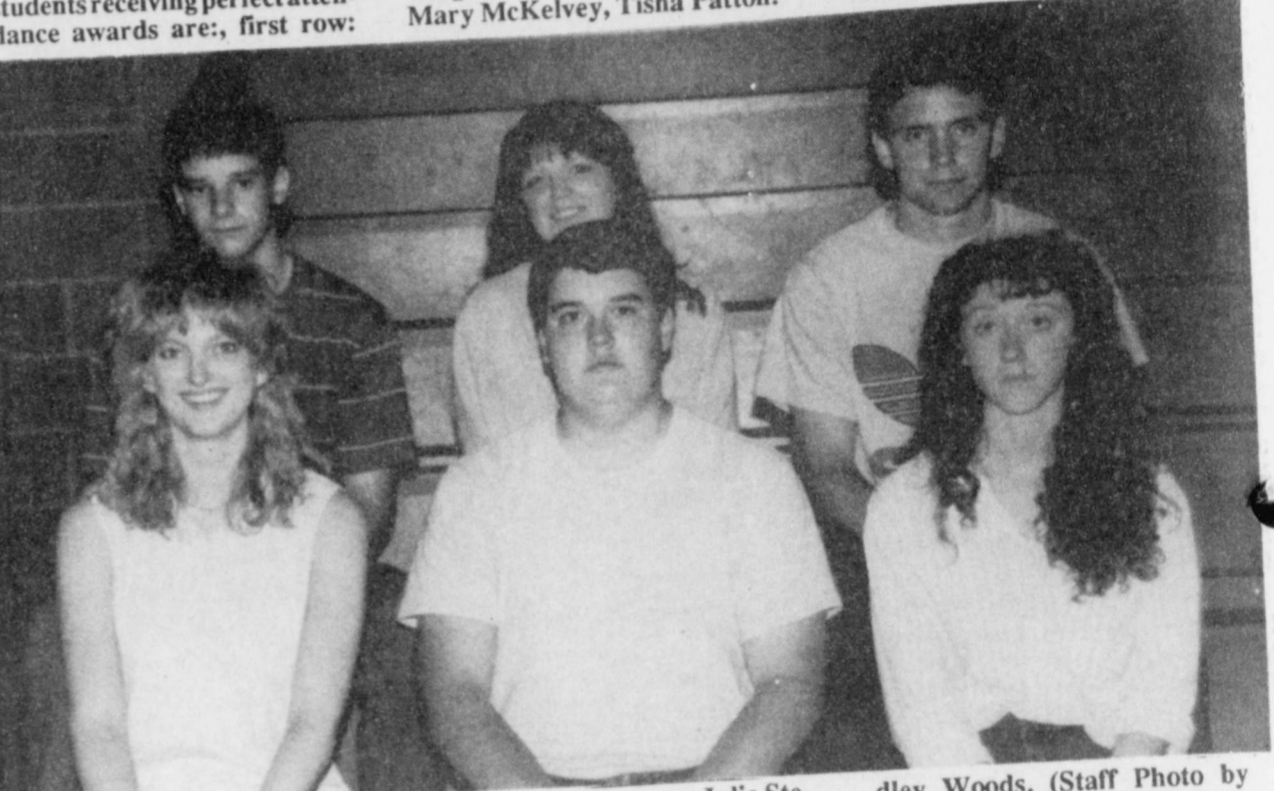

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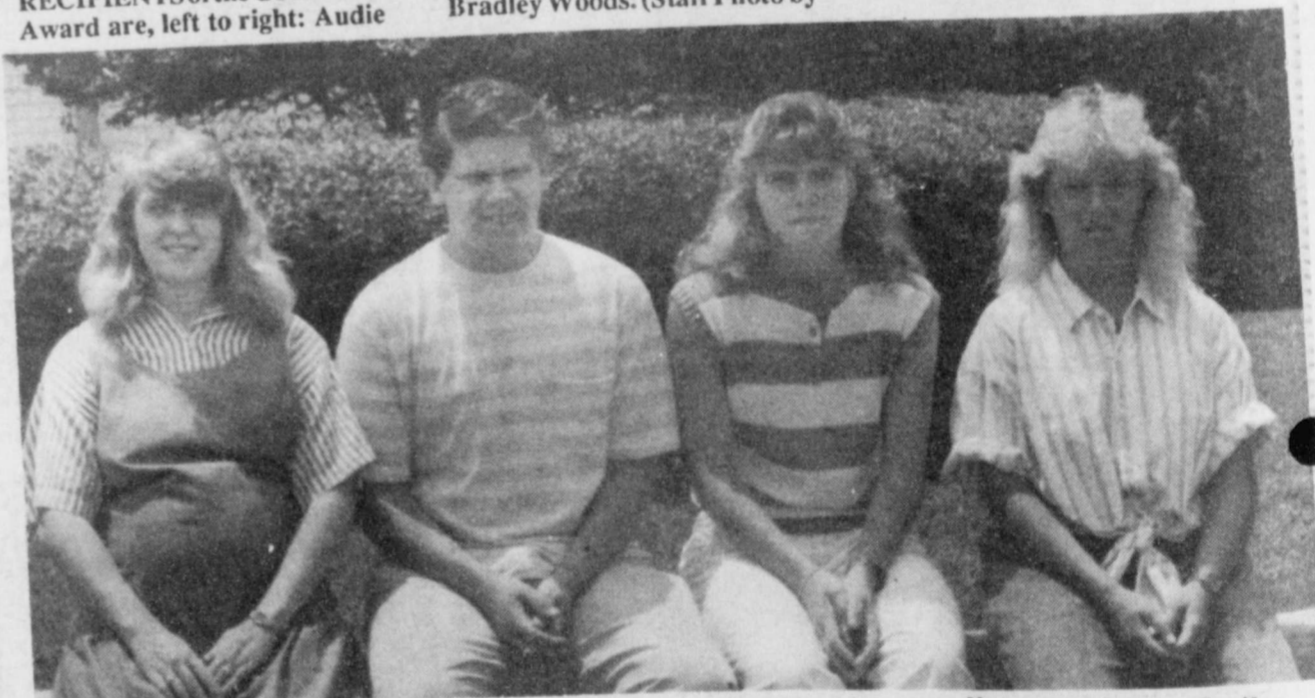

Eunice Turner-Still Brightens Lives

Seventy-eight year old Eunice Turner has recently set up house-keeping at Heritage Manor Nursing Center and staff and residents alike are glad of it.

This perky, former nursing home owner possesses a highly contagious enthusiasm for life and refuses to look at the negative side of anything.

Eunice, or "Eunnie" to her friends, was born in Cypress, located somewhere between Winnsboro and Mount Vernon. She was the middle child of three girls and, like most people from that area, was raised on a farm. Eunice sang in a small church choir and she, along with one of her sisters, would often sing at different churches in the surrounding communities.

She started dating Pleas Turner when she was 17. By the time she was 19, they were husband and wife. They spent the first four years of their married life working the farm and then in 1934 bought the Mt. Vernon school bus for \$800. During the week, the bus was used for its intended purpose of getting students to and from school, but on the weekend it was transformed into the community's public transportation. Two years later Pleas was offered a job in a variety store in Bogata. This was the beginning of a 50-year career which was interrupted only by World War II.

After Pleas was drafted, he and Eunice worked for a year in the PX at Fort Maxie. When his orders finally came through, he was shipped overseas as a member of the signal corp in General Patton's army and was there

on D-Day. Eunice still shivers at the thought of the war stories her husband shared once he returned home and is grateful she didn't realize what was happening at the time. "If I would have known that," she said, "I would have just flittered."

Eunice kept busy during the war and, like many women of that era, took on a job that had primarily been dominated by men. She became the projectionist at the local movie theater. Tyrone Power was a major star then and the films of that time were mostly Western or war stories. "All shoot-em-ups," Eunice said, laughing.

Shortly after Pleas returned from the army, they purchased a dry goods store and were back in business. Throughout the years that followed, the locations of the store changed and they went from dry goods to groceries back to dry goods. One thing remained constant and that was quality. "We bought the best," said Eunice, "and everybody knew it."

In 1963 Pleas formed a partnership with several of the businessmen of Bogata and built Red River Haven Nursing Home. He served as president of the 154-bed facility and Eunice stayed with the store until retiring in 1973.

However, she didn't stay retired long. The administrator of Red River Haven died suddenly of a heart attack in 1974 and Pleas asked his wife to help out where she could. Without any direction she jumped in to answer the telephone, assist with finances and eventually run the laundry, a job she maintained for 10 years. In 1984, Eunice was diagnosed with colon cancer and, after 21 treatments,

declared victory over the disease. Pleas did not fare as well with his battle over pancreatic cancer and passed away in 1986.

The Turners had no natural children of their own, but called Dereca Buffo of Plano their "daughter." Actually, Dereca is the daughter of Eunice's baby sister, who passed away in 1954. Since that time, Eunice cared for her and refers to Dereca, her husband, Dominic and their two children as her "precious family".

Eunice is constantly on the move at Heritage Manor and lists church services, Bible study, sing-alongs, dominoes, story hour, the ice cream parlor and birthday parties as just a few of her favorite activities. When she is not involved with all of that, she stays busy by keeping in touch with her many friends. She's a great letter writer and remembers writing to Pleas every day for the two years he was away in the service.

If you want to know anything about sports, Eunice is the one to ask. "I'm a real sports fan," she said. Eunice likes them all - the Rangers, the Cowboys and the Mavericks, too. "I've tried to help them this year until it's pitiful," she says lamenting the past basketball season. Now her attention is turned to the boys of summer and Eunice has a good feeling about their success.

Mention Eunice Turner's name around Heritage Manor and it will elicit a smile. Sit with her a moment and she will make you happy. Eunice has always believed in focusing her energy on the positive and it has always worked for her. "We had lots of success in life," she said, smiling, "but we worked for it."

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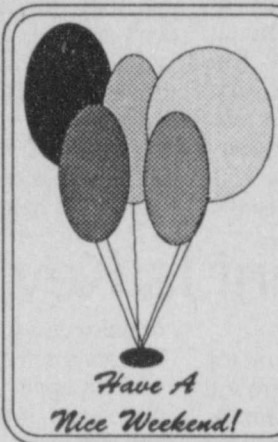

Management Is Key To Quality Hay

Producing quality hay requires top management from first growth through harvest, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., extension agronomist at Overton.

"Weed control, fertility and timely harvest are all important ingredients in quality hay production," says Dr. Reeves. "Also, there are differences in producing hay for different species of livestock."

If the hay meadow has a heavy infestation of broadleaf weeds and the hay is being produced for horses

or dairy cows, the meadow needs to be sprayed within the next ten days with an approved herbicide. On the other hand, if the weed infestation is not extremely high and the hay is being produced for beef cattle, spraying for weed control can be avoided by harvesting the hay about a week earlier than normal.

"No herbicide is approved for controlling grass-type weeds on a broadcast basis in a hay meadow," Reeves said. "Spot treatment can be done on small areas with approved herbicides."

Hay meadows should be fertilized according to a soil test by this time of year. One-hundred pounds of actual nitrogen, 28 pounds of phosphorus and 84 pounds of potassium are required to produce two tons of hay.

Quality hay should be cut when 10% of the seed heads have formed or at four weeks of age for beef cattle and three weeks of age or horses and dairy cattle.
